Computer program gives college bound students a lift

New software program helps students find the right school

College bound students at Post High School will have access to the latest information on prospective colleges thanks to a gift from Giles McCrary.

McCrary presented the high school with a computer program that lists colleges, majors and host of other information the prospective college student might need in choosing a school to attend. The College Planner from US News and World Reports leads a student through a series of questions about major, size of school and other information needed to make a choice of a school.

"I'm excited about the possibilities,"

said Dr. Bobby Bain, Post ISD superintendent. "It gives us a lot of capabilities we have not had before."

After all of the questions are answered, the program provides the student with a printout listing colleges that fall within guidelines set by the student while working the program. It also writes a letter for the student to the admissions office of one or a number of colleges the student might select.

The letter asks for information about enrolling at that particular college. Included in the questions in the letter are requests for a school catalog, admissions application, financial aid information, requirements for admission, results from student surveys and other information a student might need to attend the college of choice.

McCrary said he was impressed with the program because it gives students the responsibility and tools to make their own choices about which college to attend and the choice of majors to study.

McCrary was given an example by Dr. Bain of the many facets the program covers. Dr. Bain developed a mock program for McCrary, giving him a list of schools, letter and majors offered at a number of schools in the southwest.

"This is incredibly complete," said McCrary after completing his own personal college packet.

Dr. Bain said he is going to make the program available to all Post seniors.

New Garza Co. Veterans Service officer appointed

A legal requirement has forced the Garza County Commissioners to appoint a new county Veterans Service Officer. Andy Stelzer was named by the commissioners to assume the office currently held by Ann Stelzer.

The commissioners made the change at their May 24 meeting in response to a letter from Jack Ault of Post claiming the appointment earlier this year of Ann Stelzer to the position was against the law.

In a letter to County Attorney Preston Poole, Ault included statutes outlining the law pertaining to qualifications of County Veteran Service officers.

Ault pointed out that Veterans Service officers must have the service experience specified in Subsection C or be a widowed Gold Star Mother or unremarried widow of a serviceman or veteran whose death resulted from service. Subsection C of the law says a Veterans Service officer must have served on active duty in a branch of the armed forces, served for at least four months or have a service connected disability and been honorably discharged.

Ann Stelzer did not meet any of these requirements.

Included in the appointment of Andy Stelzer, the commissioners gave the new Veterans Service officer the right to hire a secretary as he sees fit. The salary for any secretary would come out of the \$100 monthly fee paid to a Veterans Service Officer for manning the local office one day a month.

In his letter, Ault also questioned the need for a local Veterans Service officer in Garza County. He noted that it is not mandatory for counties with populations under 200,000 are not required to appoint a Veterans Service officer.

"Considering the proximity of the Lubbock Veteran Outpatient Clinic and available case officers there, plus on-site state Veterans Commission Service Officer, the legal appointment of a county Veterans Service officer seems to me unnecessary and wasteful," Ault said in his letter. "I'm sure that most veterans have in the past (as I have) opted to make the trip to Lubbock rather than wait for the one day in the month when the county VSO will be available."

Judge Giles Dalby said that providing local access to Garza County veterans was worth the minimal cost of the Veterans Service officer.

"We think it is very worthy to spend \$100 a month to have local service,"

Commissioner court meets with rep. from Texas Historical Commission

A representative from the Texas Historical Commission asked to see more details on putting an elevator in the Garza County Courthouse at a special meeting of the commissioners court last Friday, May 21.

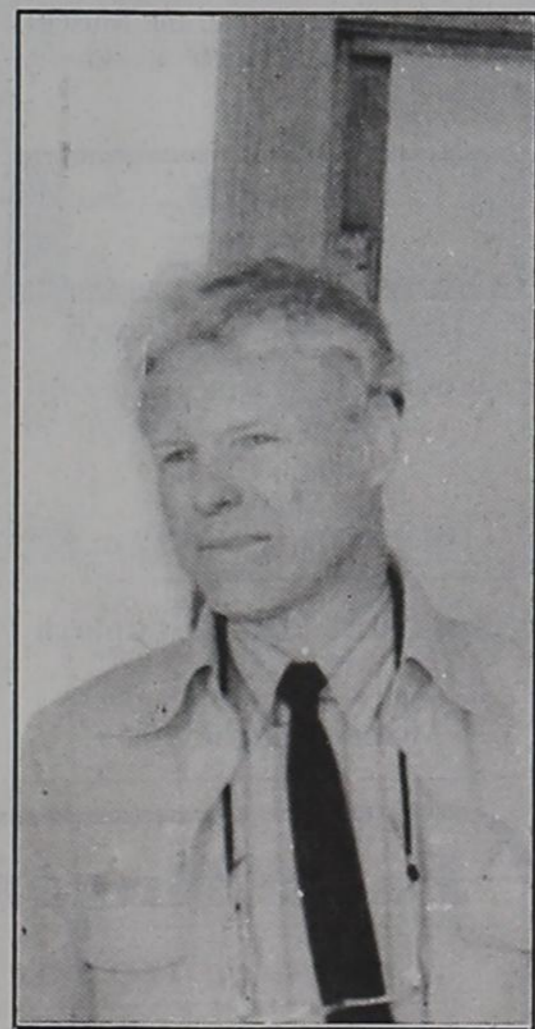
Gerron Hite from the Texas Historical Commission met with the commissioners, the engineer and architect involved with the proposed courthouse annex. The Texas Historical Commission has voiced some concern over plans to add and annex to the 70 year old courthouse. The annex is being considered by the commissioners court to make the existing courthouse handicap accessible and bring it into compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA) passed by Congress.

Hite said the idea behind the Texas Historical Commission was to work with counties on keeping courthouses with significant historical importance in their original condition and performing their intended purpose while meeting ADA guidelines.

"We don't think that they should be museums," said Hite. "They should be used as county seats. The courthouse has long been an important center of the community and it is also historically important."

He said the commission would like the county to consider putting an elevator in the existing building if at all possible. According to Hite, he has worked with a number of counties faced with similar situations like Garza County and elevators in existing buildings were feasible.

He added that if the commissioners

court decides to move ahead with the annex, "our preference would be an off site annex."

Engineer Rich Oller said including an elevator in the existing building received a long hard look but was not chosen because of several factors.

"To do something to the original building would require substantial structural changes and necessitate a rewiring of the existing building," said Oller.

He said adding an elevator would dramatically decrease office space for

county functions at a time when state and federal mandates are expanding the scope of the work performed in the county.

Oller also said simply adding an elevator would not meet ADA requirements. He said the restroom situation is almost a big a concern as getting people from one floor to another. The current men's restroom on the first floor would be extremely difficult to make accessible. The door to the room located on the north end of the building is restricted because of the stairwell. Altering this would require either ripping out the stairs or making a second entrance through the county assessors office.

Hite was given a tour of the courthouse by Oller and architect Jay Shinn. The two explained the reasoning behind the annex plan as well as showing the difficulty in making changes to the existing building.

Hite said he would take information from the special meeting back to his supervisors for review.

The commissioners are doing everything they can to meet guidelines set forth by the Historical Commission concerning the annex proposal and keeping the existing building as close as to the original as possible.

So far, the commissioners have held one public hearing concerning the proposed annex. Judge Dalby said a second meeting will be held sometime this summer.

They feel the annex proposal is the best possible one for the problems facing the county with meeting ADA. They encourage citizens to contact them with any concerns or ideas for the courthouse.

Bold Gold lose playoff tilt

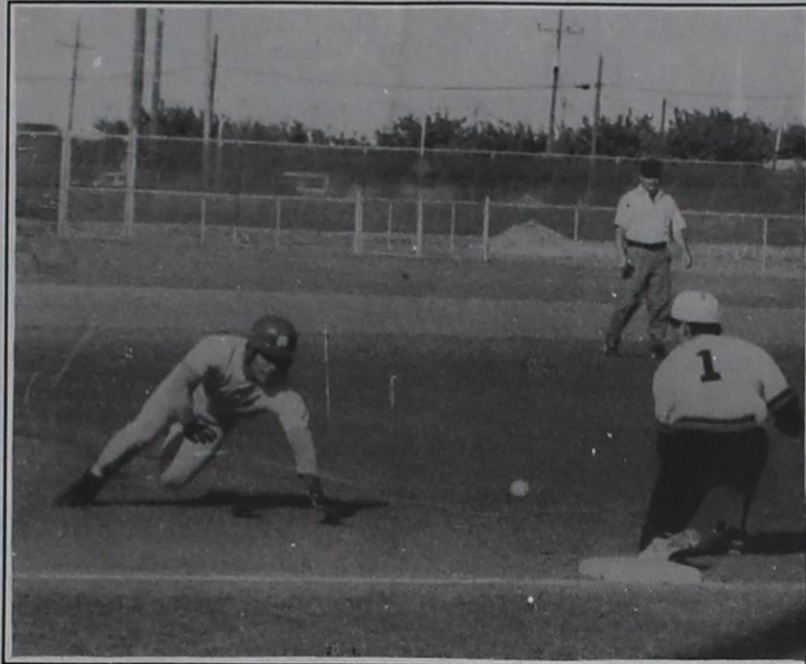
'Lopes bow out in 7-1 contest

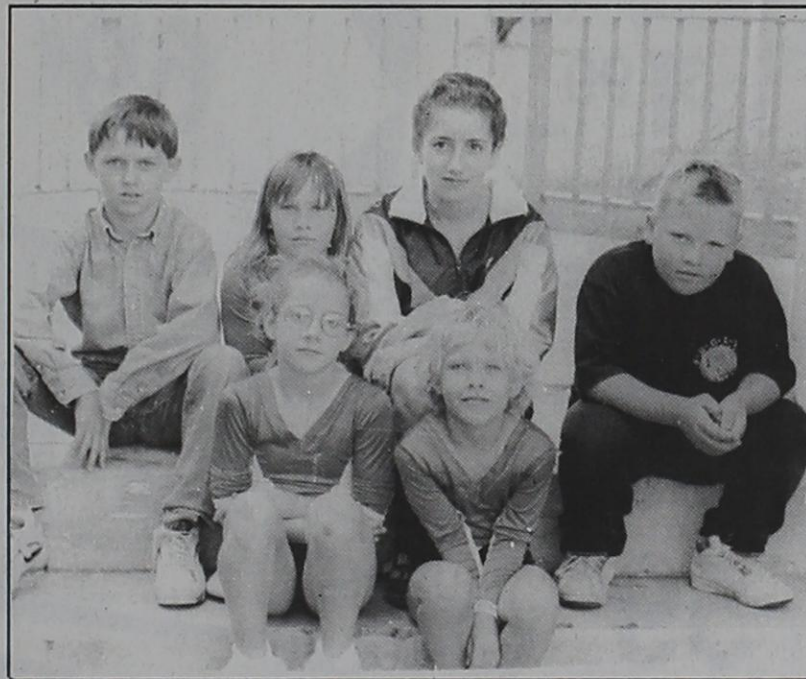

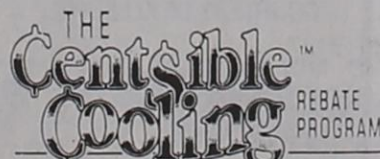

Energy saving tips just in time for summer's heat

Everyone would like to save money on energy bills, but in the scorching heat of a Texas summer, staying cool is a priority, too. With a little preventative maintenance to air conditioning systems this spring, people stay cool and still save money. The following tips from the Texas Energy Extension Service will help prepare air conditioning systems for the summer's heat.

A good way to start is to insulate the air-conditioning ducts. Before beginning, tape any cracks or gaps and all the joints in the ductwork with duct tape. Then, wrap the ducts with two-to-four-inch thick R11 insulation and secure with tape. Be sure the insulation has a vapor barrier. This prevents vapor from condensing on the cold duct.

Have the air conditioning unit inspected by a professional cooling service person before the warmest weather arrives. A thorough inspection and checkup by a professional should include: oiling the condensing unit fan motor, cleaning the condensing coil fins and condenser fan, checking the condensing unit for refrigerant leaks, inspecting the compressor start and run capacitors for leaks, cleaning the supply-air fan motor housing and oiling the motor, and checking the fan-control switch. The cost of an annual maintenance check is usually between \$25 and \$50.

The air filter should also be changed seasonally and then once a month during the summer.

Another way to save money is to protect the outside portion of the air conditioning unit from the sun's rays. Shrubs or lattice work can effectively shade the unit and help to lower cooling costs.

When buying a new air conditioner, look for an EER rating of 10 or better to save money and energy for years to come.

Living on the Edge of the Caprock

Pesticide recordkeeping requirements dictate detailed paperwork

Recordkeeping requirements for restricted-use pesticides were issued April 9 in the Federal Register. As a result, recordkeeping requirements for federally restricted-use pesticides became effective May 10, 1993.

The United States Department of Agriculture - Agricultural Marketing Service recordkeeping rule requires all private applicators keep the following records when restricted-use pesticides are used:

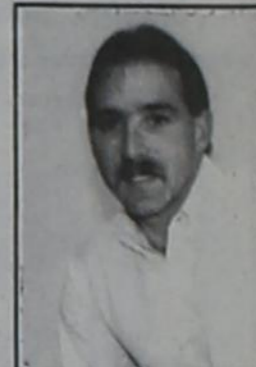
- Brand name or product name and the EPA registration number.
- The total amount of restricted-use pesticide applied.
- The location of the application, the size of the area treated and the crop, commodity, stored product or site to which a restricted-use pesticide was applied.
- The month, day and year when the restricted-use pesticide application occurred.
- The name and certification number (if applicable) of the certified applicator who applied or supervised the application of the restricted-use pesticide.

Application (s) of restricted use pesticide in a total area of less than one-tenth of an acre occurring on the same day, shall require brand name or product name, EPA registration number, total amount applied,

designation of "spot application" for location and date of application. (This final item does not apply to nursery or green house applicators).

All records must be kept for two years from the date of application. They are to be released only to an agent of the USDA or EPA or to a licensed health care professional if the licensed health care professional

determines access is necessary to provide medical treatment or first aid to a person who may have been exposed to a pesticide for which records were required to be maintained.

It is also important to note at this time there is no official record keeping form. It is likely that some standardized form will become available but, until this happens, private applicators should keep the required information in a central place and in a form as outlined above.

If you have specific questions about any portion of this material, feel free to come by the County Extension Office in the courthouse and request a copy of the "question and answer" materials from the USDA regarding these requirements.



Memorial Day pays tribute to vets

Twice each year America sets aside a day to remember veterans: Memorial Day and Veterans Day. These are rightful days of tribute to more than two million who gave their lives and to those 27 million still living who served America.

It was President Lincoln who signed legislation in 1862 establishing national cemeteries. Memorial observances for honoring the war dead began in the mid-1860's in Columbus, Georgia; Columbus, Mississippi; Waterloo, N.Y., and Carbondale, Illinois. Apparently inspired by President Lincoln's attendance as speaker at Carbondale, retired General John A. Logan as Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, the private organization representing Union veterans, issued a general order on May 5, 1868 establishing a nationwide Decoration Day on May 30.

In the state of Texas, VA National Cemeteries at El Paso, Houston, Kerrville, and San Antonio conducted 5,558 burials in Fiscal Year 1992.

Throughout the national cemetery system, famous men, such as President Zachary Taylor and Ernie Pyle, heroes such as Admiral Chester Nimitz, Barry Sadler, General Holland "Howling Mad" Smith, and Lt. Gen. Troy Middleton, and the unknowns rest side by side in a national cemeteries.

Women veterans, spouses and certain dependents are buried in the national cemeteries. The first woman service member buried was Florena Budwin of Michigan who, disguised as a man, had followed her soldier husband to war.

Rep. Counts announces Senate passage of school funding bill

State Representative David Counts (D-Knox City) announced the passage of the House substitute for Senate Bill 7 on Friday. According to Counts, the substitute was approved and sponsored by all 11 members of the House Education Committee, chaired by Representative Libby Lineberger of Manchaca, and passed the house with 101 votes.

The Local Option plan allows each of the 109 school districts in the state with property wealth in excess of \$280,000 per student to choose from five options to bring equity to school finance. Each of the 109 school districts could create a local taxing district by consolidating tax bases, purchase attendance credits to achieve the amount of weighted average daily attendance necessary to bring property wealth to \$280,000 per student, or wealthier schools could contract to educate students in other districts. Counts noted that these three options would require local voter approval. The plan also allows districts the option of voluntary consolidation with one or more districts, as well as permitting districts to move some of their taxable property to another school district.

"This plan simply lays out all of the options the legislature had left and permits each of the 109 local school districts decide which one plan might be workable for some of the schools, there is not a single plan that is workable for everyone," stated Counts. "Each school district can work in conjunction with their community to determine which option will be most palatable."

"Many critics of the different finance plans have said by dedicating lottery funds we could solve the school finance problem. That is simply not the case. Although all of the money from the lottery, as well as additional funding, has been allotted to education, the total amount of revenue generated by the lottery is not enough to bring equity to school finance. The only ways to achieve equity are to redistribute a small amount of wealth, or to inject approximately 8 billion dollars in additional funding into the current education system, which would require additional tax money. People from the district have sent a clear message to me that they are against any new or additional taxes," said Counts.

Counts noted that under the Local Option Plan, any tax increases, other than those required to provide current funding, must be approved by local voters. "The bill has several elements which promote accountability in our public schools," said Counts. "The plan allows the Education Commissioner to set a maximum percentage of a school district' budget that may be spent on administration, taking into consideration the size and needs of the school district. There is also a provision which requires the schools

to send parents a report card on their school district. The annual report will contain information on student test results, dropout rates, student-teacher ratios, the amount of money being spent on students, as well as, information on administrative costs. Overall, I think these provisions for accountability will help inform the general public on the performance of their local schools."

"No one likes any of the options available to the legislature at this time," said Counts. "However, with the court's order to cut off funding on June 1, it really is not a matter of finding a plan that is popular, but finding a plan that we can live with and that will ultimately keep our schools open."

The compensation and pension payments made up the largest area of payment with \$216,290 going to veterans.

AN IRA THAT LASTS AND LASTS
When you turn 70 1/2, you must start taking money out of your IRA, the amount determined by life expectancy. With a life expectancy of 20 years, for instance, you must take out 1/20 of your total IRA funds. If you don't, the penalties are a confiscatory 50 percent of what you should have withdrawn.

Under the "recalculation" rule, life expectancy is recalculated every year; the longer you live, the better your odds. At the death of the account owner, the spouse can roll over the money into another IRA, or must pay taxes on it in a year. "Term certain" allows longer-term distribution for the owner and beneficiary, thus trimming taxes.

It's important to note that life expectancy, with an IRA, is figured on the account owner and the beneficiary together. A young wife, say, may extend joint life expectancy. A non-spouse beneficiary 10 or more years younger than the owner-child, perhaps-is treated differently, but the account can be made to last 50 years or more.

"I was asked to help develop an operational plan for the museum under the umbrella of the CCA," explained Mock.

Mock said that before any work is considered for the building, a strong organization needs to be in place first. With this in mind, Mock has developed a detailed blueprint of ideas for a working organizational plan for the museum. Criteria for persons serving on the permanent management team for the museum includes high interest in the museum, a good people person and good character.

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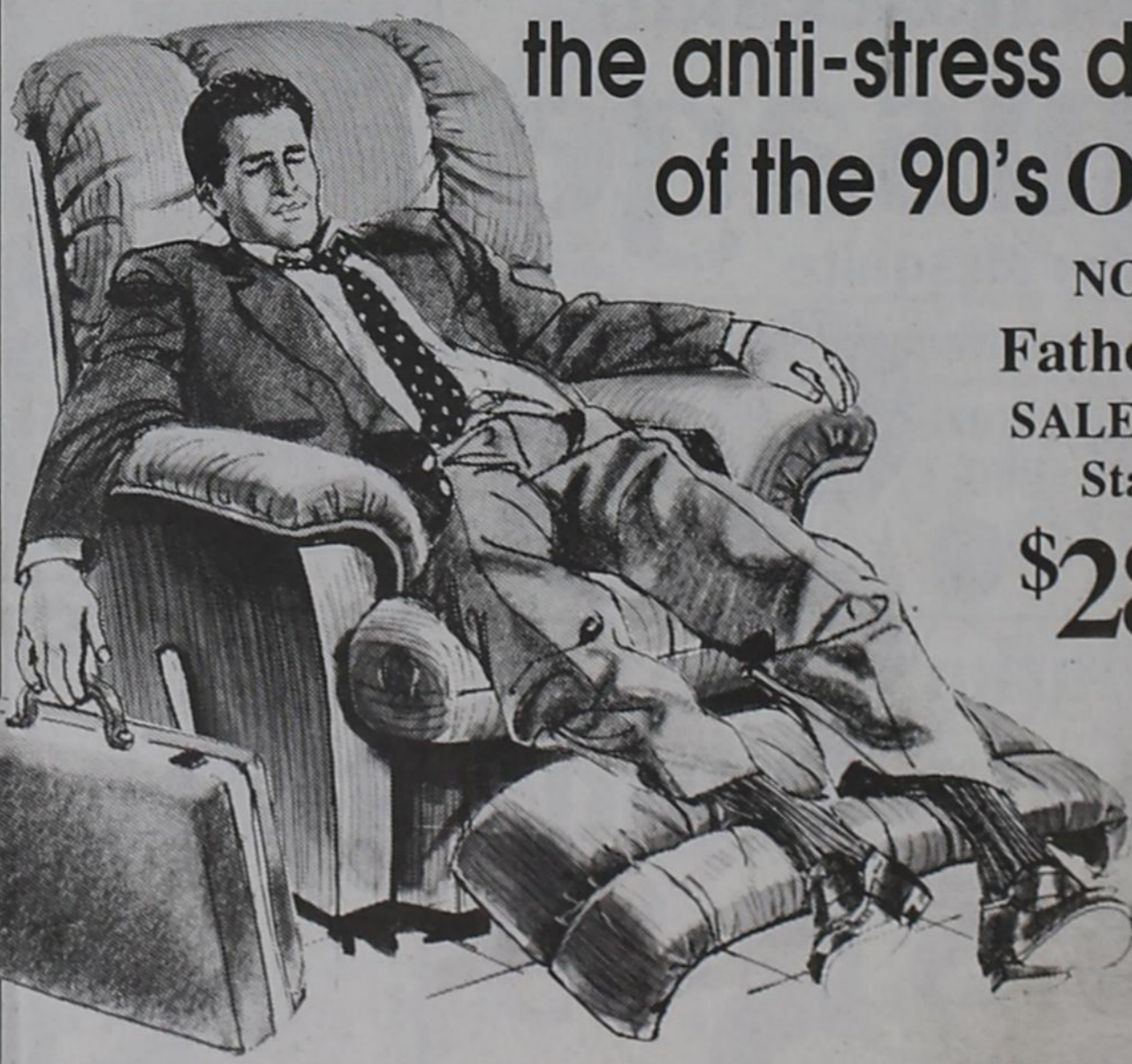
