Garza County Sheriff's Deputy finds marijuana crop in Post

Garza County Sheriff's Department arrested two suspects Tuesday after receiving a phone call from a confidential informant. The two suspects were arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance.

Garza County Sheriff, Kenny Ratke after receiving the call, turned the information over to Deputy Sheriff Clent Schoonover for processing of the paper work. Lieutenant J. W. Jolly and Sheriff Ratke then went to the location and observed marijuana growing in the suspects back yard.

Deputy Schoonover drove to the location with the proper paper work and the three officers made the

arrests without incident. Upon entering the residence 2.85 ounces of processed marijuana was found to be drying in the oven and 13 marijuana plants were found growing in the back yard.

The two suspects are charged with possession of a controlled substance, a Class A misdemeanor. The charge carries a fine not to exceed \$3,000 dollars and/or a jail term not to exceed one year in jail for first time offenders.

"The Garza County Sheriff's Department plans on cracking down on drugs and drug distribution in Post and Garza County. We want to make this area a drug free environment to raise our families," said Schoonover.

Expanded calling for Post area hits stumbling block

Expanded calling has been an issue for city manager, Rick Hanna ever since the first papers were filed. With the expanded calling in place the citizens of Post would be able to call Lubbock without a long distance calling charge. As would be expected with anything that involves a large company or corporation, technical snags occur.

Hearings are required for the Public Utilities Commission to state their case, and show the need for the Expanded calling. GTE who is the biggest opponent to the installation of expanded calling has filed many documents of opposition to Posts request for the service.

Jim Boyle, Legal Counsel for Texas Communications for Expanded Calling, said Public Utility Commission rules provide for cities to intervene in telephone rate cases on behalf of their local rate payers and to be reimbursed by the utility for rate case expenses. A prehearing conference was held on this subject August 8.

Hanna received a reply from Boyle concerning that matter, the letter stated: The General Counsel's Office at the Public Utility Commission has filed a brief saying that municipalities should not recover for municipal rate cases. The General Counsel contends that citizens don't need representation in these cases even though the telephone utilities fill up the hearing rooms at some prehearing conferences on expanded calling with lawyers, accountants, economists and lobbyists.

Not only did the General Counsel oppose reimbursement but Southwestern Bell filed a 52 page brief in opposition. GTE filed a 12 page brief in opposition.

"There is little doubt the phone companies do not want to see rural communities working together in an effective unit on behalf of their citizens," Boyle added in the letter.



Tax 'n Facts

WATCH OUT HOW YOU GIVE YOUR IRA AWAY

Most savers list their spouses and children as beneficiaries of their Individual Retirement Accounts. The trouble starts when they try to leave the money in a complicated way, through a Q-Tip (qualified terminal interest property) trust or through a revocable trust.

The advantages of a Q-Tip trust, for most assets, is that the trust qualifies for the unlimited marital deduction and can be used to support the remaining spouse, yet the assets are safeguarded for the other heirs. In such a trust, all income must be distributed to the surviving spouse. But the distribution of income from an IRA is usually based on life expectancy, and distributing all of it in one year would create a tremendous tax bite. (Not distributing all the available income from the trust yields yet more tax trouble).

A revocable trust is designed to save on probate. But because the trust has no life expectancy of its own, when an IRA owner dies and all the money is paid into the trust, it is all subject to income tax.

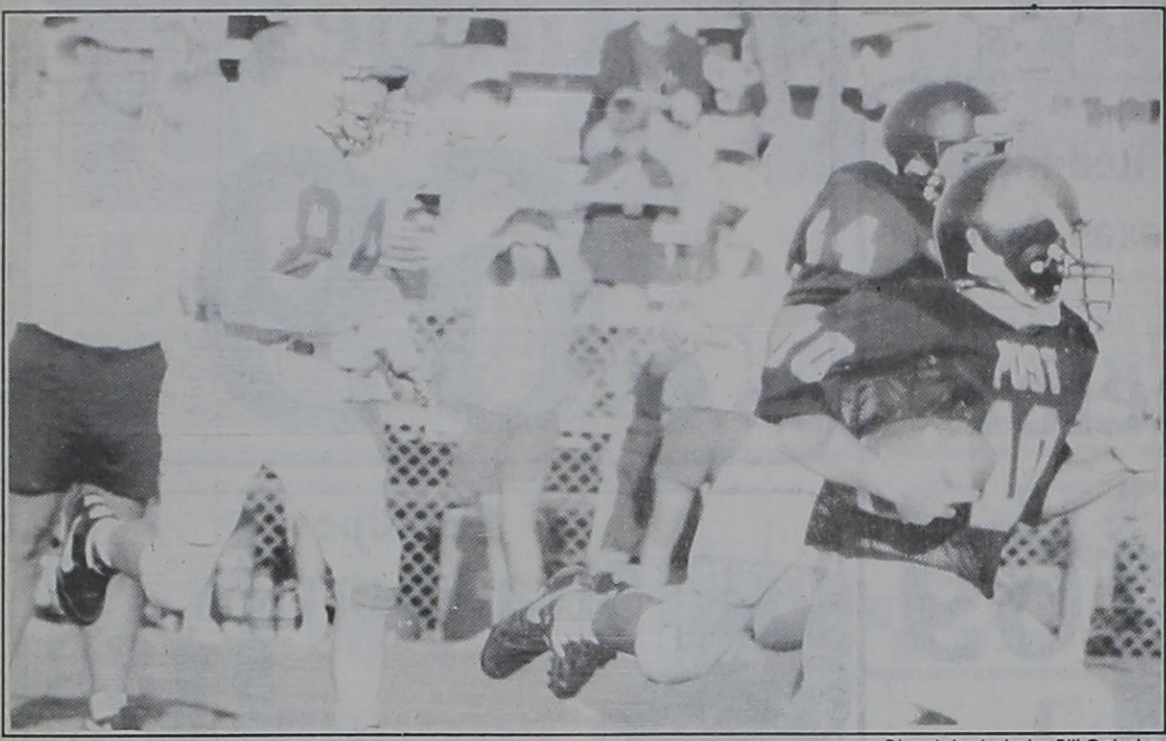

Beginning in 1978, through the leadership and determination of a group of dedicated folks, guided by former Mayor Giles McCrary, the Post EMS Association was founded with the purpose of providing top quality emergency assistance to the people of Garza County.

Over the past 15 years, volunteers of the organization have given both of themselves and their money to see that when people here need help, someone is there to respond. They aren't just sitting, waiting around for a call. They come from their homes and their places of business to respond to the needs of many. HATS OFF!

Members of the Post EMS Association are all volunteers, they pay their own money for the basic training, advanced training and paramedic training.

The basic EMT course costs volunteers \$275 and requires 148 hours of classroom instruction, practice sessions and testing, 40 hours of clinical rotations and 5 emergency ambulance runs.

The EMT-Intermediate course costs an additional \$580 and includes 80 hours of clinical rotation and 60 hours rotations on an advanced life support unit for a total of 288 clock hours of specialized training.

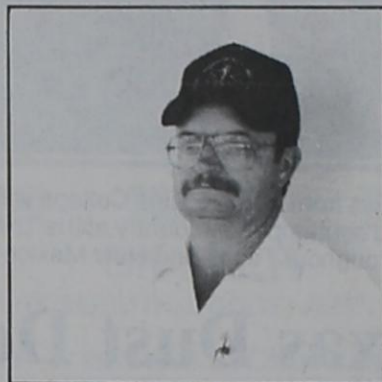
The EMT-Paramedic course is 390 hours of intensive training plus clinical rotations and 150 hours of rotations on an advanced life supports unit, for a total of 732 clock hours. An additional \$625 brings the total investment to \$1,480 from volunteer EMTs to certify as a paramedic.

Marketing our product

Some years ago a company that sold canned red salmon was being outsold by pink salmon, ten to one. In desperation they called in an advertising agency and said, "Do anything, as long as it's legal, to get our sales up." The agency agreed to try and in a few short months sales skyrocketed. When the company CEO asked the agency rep, "What on earth did you guys do?" He replied, "All we did was redesign the label on the can." The new label read, "Authentic Norwegian Red Salmon—guaranteed not to turn pink."

All of us would probably agree that in business the products do not change so much but the packaging and advertisement does, proving the point that how we market our product is as important in sales as the product itself. I have found this to be true in the church as well as in business. We in the church have the most important, and widely needed product of all time, not to mention the fact that it does not cost the customer a penny to obtain. The product is Jesus the Christ through which we gain peace, confidence, security, joy, love, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, self-control, faithfulness and much, much more. We, the church, are not the manufacturer of this product just the distributor. And being the distributor, if it doesn't get out to the public it's our fault.

If the church is the distributor then each member of the church is in a real sense, a salesperson. It would seem that we "salespersons" are not doing our jobs so well since "sales" have been declining drastically over the past several years. I think the reason for this decline is because we have begun to focus our attention inwardly, upon ourselves, rather than outwardly toward the lost. That is we design most of our ministries to benefit ourselves. We tend to assume everyone "out there" knows about our product, why they ought to want it, and how to get it. We tend to believe that they know we are here and if they want what we have they will come and get it. However a recent survey indicated that most of the unchurched, when asked why they don't attend church, responded with, "No one has asked me to."

do understand our product, and believe it can change the world, and truly is the most important product in the world, I wonder why we are out sold by every other product, from shoes, to football. Perhaps the problem is that we in the church have "got ours" and really don't care if others get theirs or not. Or maybe we are just selling the wrong product, that is, "Our Church" a separate from others, as if we are in competition with every other "church" in the country. Perhaps we need to realize that because Jesus the Christ is our product that we are not in competition with every other church in the country rather we are the partners with them.

I wonder what would happen if we in the Christian Community were to quit trying to find fault with the other "salespersons" or quit trying to show why we are better than they are, and unite in our expressed purpose of distributing Jesus to every person in the world. Who knows, the result might even be Revival. Also if we are salespersons for the greatest product in the world maybe we need to learn how to be good salespersons, for happy user of any product is the best salesperson for that product. I think that's what Paul had in mind in Gal. 5:22 when he described the "Fruit of the Spirit".

I understand that there is an effort to bring all the churches in Post and the surrounding community together for a giant combined worship experience on Sunday morning October 10, during the Founders Day festivities. At first there seems to be many obstacles against this effort, but perhaps the greatest sales promotion for the greatest product in the world would be the combining of all the sales representatives together and express our unity and satisfaction in our product to all who would witness, or even join in, the experience. At least it seems to be something to think about, and maybe even risk for the glory of Christ.
