

One cannot preach the need for selfesteem while destroying the faculty which makes it possible: reason. One cannot teach collective identity and expect students to have self-esteem.

Advocates of "diversity" are true racists in the basic meaning of that term: they see the world through colored lenses, colored by race and gender. To the multiculturalist, race is what counts - for values, for thinking, for human identity in general. No wonder racism is increasing: colorblindness is now considered evil, if not impossible. No wonder people don't treat each other as individuals: to the multiculturalist, they aren't.

Advocates of "diversity" claim it will teach students to tolerate and celebrate their differences. But the "differences" they have in mind are racial differences, which means we're being urged to glorify race, which means we're being asked to institutionalize separatism. "Racial identity" erects an unbridgeable gulf between people, as though they were different species, with nothing fundamental in common. benopossibility for understanding or cooperation among people of different races.

Advocates of "diversity" claim that because the real world is diverse, the campus should reflect that fact. But why should a campus population "reflect" general population (particularly the ethnic population)? No answer. In fact, the purpose of a university is to impart knowledge and develop reasoning, not to be a demographic mirror of society.

Racism, not any meaningful sense of diversity, guides today's intellectuals. The educationally significant diversity that exists in "the real world" is intellectual diversity, i.e., the diversity of ideas. But such diversity - far from being sought after - is virtually forbidden on campus. The existence of "political correctness" blasts the academics' pretense at valuing real diversity. What they want is abject conformity.

The only way to eradicate racism on campus is to scrap racist programs and the philosophic ideas that feed racism. Racism will become an ugly memory only when universities teach a valid concept of human nature: one based on the tenets that the individual's mind is competent, that the human intellect is efficacious, that we possess free will, that individuals are to be judged as individuals - and that deriving one's identity from one's race is a corruption - a corruption appropriate to Nazi Germany, not to a nation based on freedom and independence.







Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. As an alternative and within the same time period, you may file a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district in certain cases.

You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken. More Information





DWELLING IN

In the 1960's, Kenya experienced the Mau Mau uprising which lead to the slaughter of many Kenyans and missionaries who were attempting to minister to that troubled area. One particular night, missionaries Matthew and Lora Higgens were returning to Nairobi and had to travel through the very heart of Mau Mau territory. Unfortunately, their Land Rover broke down just 20 miles from Nairobi and try as they may in the darkness, the vehicle would not start. They did the only thing that they could do and spent the night in the Land Rover. Knowing the grave danger of where they were, the Higgens prayed during the night and stood upon Psalms 4:8, "I will lie down and sleep in peace, for you alone, O Lord, make me dwell in safety."NIV In the light of day the following morning, the Higgens were able to restart the vehicle and continued on to Nairobi in safety. Several weeks later they returned to the United States on furlough. Interestingly, the night before the Higgens departed Nairobi, a local pastor visited and told them a harrowing tale. It seems that a member of the brutal Mau Mau rebels had confessed to him that he and three other Mau Mau's had went to the Higgens Land Rover that night to kill them. But after creeping up to the vehicle, they saw sixteen large men surrounding the SUV and they fled in fear of being killed themselves. This account perplexed the Higgens and they discussed among themselves who these men could possibly have been that miraculously saved them from certain death. Their questions were answered upon returning to the States. A few days after being back in the Unites States, they were speaking with friend Clay Brent who asked them if they had experienced any danger on the very day of their vehicle break down. "Why do you ask?" Pastor Higgens responded. "Well, on that day, God placed a very heavy burden upon me to pray for your safety. So, I contacted the men of our church and sixteen of us met at the church, interceding in prayer for you and Lora until the burden was lifted from our hearts." Now the mystery was indeed solved. The Higgens knew that God had sent sixteen angels to represent those sixteen prayer warriors who were bombarding Heaven with their prayers for the Higgens.

I don't know about you, but the realization that God is still on the throne and that He stills answers prayer today gives me hope and encouragement? This is very similar to the account of Elisha in 2 Kings 6:15-22, "15 When the servant of the man of God got up and went out early the next morning, an army with horses and chariots had surrounded the city. "Oh, my lord, what shall we do?" the servant asked. 16 "Don't be afraid," the prophet answered. "Those who are with us are more than those who are with them." 17 And Elisha prayed, "O LORD, open his eyes so he may see." Then the LORD opened the servant's eyes, and he looked and saw the hills full of horses and chariots of fire all around Elisha. 18 As the enemy came down toward him, Elisha prayed to the LORD, "Strike these people with blindness." So he struck them with blindness, as Elisha had asked. 19 Elisha told them, "This is not the road and this is not the city. Follow me, and I will lead you to the man you are looking for." And he led them to Samaria. 20 After they entered the city, Elisha said, "LORD, open the eyes of these men so they can see." Then the LORD opened their eyes and they looked, and there they were, inside Samaria. 21 When the king of Israel saw them, he asked Elisha, "Shall I kill them, my father? Shall I kill them?" 22 "Do not kill them," he answered. "Would you kill men you have captured with your own sword or bow? Set food and water before them so that they may eat and drink and then go back to their master." 23 So he prepared a great feast for them, and after they had finished eating and drinking, he sent them away, and they returned to their master. So the bands from Aram stopped raiding Israel's territory." NIV My prayer for each of you this week is that the Lord will open our eyes so that we may see how to DWELL IN HIS SAFETY.



Russell Graves Outdoors Turkey Fest

Five miles doesn't seem like a lot until you walk it. All day long my brother Bubba and I crawled through briars, picked cockleburs from our clothes, waded muddy creeks, sat silently in the brush, and whispered to each other endlessly - all in an attempt to harvest a huge tom turkey who amorously followed three hens across the ranch in which we hunted.

I can understand why the turkey eluded us but for the life of me, I can't understand how. First off, he is huge - probably 22 pounds or better and has a beard that drags the ground when he walks. When strutting, his iridescent colors shine a coppery hue that's easy to spot against the green spring growth. Second, he was extremely noisy. Since well before sunrise, he started gobbling from the his roost and continued his audible assault on the quiet Clay County, Texas ranch most of the day.

We'd call and he'd call back. We'd move closer and he'd move further away. For eight solid hours we played a game of chess where we'd get close to calling checkmate but the tom, with his amazing sixth sense, always kept himself just out of range for us to

make a play.

So goes turkey hunting...

While admittedly frustrating, Bubba and I were having a great time as part of the third annual Clay County Turkey Fest in Henrietta, Texas.

Turkey Fest is the result of an organized, grassroots effort among the county's citizenry to bring awareness and tourism to their part of northern Texas. Since the county can't lay claim to any amusement parks or other "traditional" tourist attractions, Deborah Clark and other keen members of the Turkey Fest committee realize that they do have Rio Grande turkeys in relative abundance and

a growing constituency of hunters are willing to come to the county to chase the wary game bird. With that in mind, the community built a festival around the venerable wild turkey.

For Bubba and I this was our first invite to Turkey Fest and we were one of only nine teams invited to compete. The teams are made up of various members of the media like outdoor television personalities Dave Watson and Hal Schaffer and others who are plugged into turkey nation.

Besides the turkey competition among the teams, the weekend festivities also include an expo, live music, games, and a fun run. The last full day of Turkey Fest is capped off with the Full Strut Banquet. The banquet is a fund raising event that features a silent auction, catered meal, and the end of the night each of the "celebrity" teams are auctioned for a chance to hunt with the various groups.

Bubba and I were auctioned to a hunter from Cleburne, Texas and at 5:30am Sunday morning, we met to lay out the day's hunt plan. We were taking him to another place just about five miles east of town. Just the day before, Bubba harvested a 19-pound bird only thirty minutes after we relocated away from the first turkey.

Just before sunrise, we heard the turkeys gobbling form the roost and moved just close enough where they could hear our calling but no so close where they'd see us slipping through the dank undergrowth. Once we set up, we heard the birds fly down from the trees and instantly, two toms were booming in the oak and cedar elm forested creek bottom. A few clucks and purrs later, they appeared to our left. Since turkeys have keen eyesight, we couldn't move as they'd see us. So we waited for them to walk to the decoy we placed out front.

Not a minute later, a hen shows up and leads the toms down to the creek and away from us, perhaps

Good News, Bad News for Cattle Fever Tick Eradication Effort

Commission (TAHC) has released moved without restrictions, Hillman. from temporary preventive quarantine more than 375,000 acres in Maverick, Dimmit and Webb counties. The preventive quarantine had been imposed on the three counties more than a year ago to prevent the spread of dangerous cattle fever ticks. Further south in Zapata and Starr counties, however, more fever tick-infested ranches are being detected at a disturbing rate, and concerns remain for sustainable fever tick program funding, fever tick surveillance and the ing fever tick hosts.

Cattle fever ticks are capable of carrying and transmitting 'babesia,' a blood parasite deadly to cattle. Although the ticks were eradicated from the U.S. in 1943, the vigilance against the pest cannot end, due to its existence in Mexico. A permanent fever tick quarantine line a few hundred yards to five miles wide runs along the U.S. border through eight south Texas counties, and is patrolled on horseback by the USDA's Tick preventive quarantine is the north-Force to protect against stray "ticky" livestock and wildlife the city of Eagle Pass. Livestock moved from the permanent quarantine zone must be individually inspected by USDA or TAHC inspectors, treated and permitted to leave the zone. Regardless if they are moved by inappropriate livestock movement or wildlife, sporadic cattle fever tick incursions occur, requiring producers and state and federal animal health agencies to take aggressive actions, such as temporary preventive quarantines, to prevent the spread of the potentially deadly pest. In 1973, the largest outbreak occurred, with 170 tick-infested premises detected in Texas. Last federal fiscal year (October 1, 2007-September 30, 2008) came in second, with 132 infested premises found. In the first seven months of FY 2009, 89 fever tick-infested premises already have been detected, and if the rate continues, this could be the worst year for fever ticks since eradication was achieved in 1943.

This cluster of infested premises is quarantined, as are the premises in a 10-mile perimeter. "Epidemiologists are working to determine the source and distribution of this infestation. Whether it was caused by 'ticky' wildlife or inappropriate livestock movement is not yet known. It also is still too early to know if an additional temporary preventive quarantine area

Each time another tick-infested premises is added, the eradication program costs rise, as USDA and TAHC inspectors must manually inspect cattle and horses and movement. cattle out of the dense underbrush," he said.

"A premises may be found to be tick-infested today, but 'ticky' cattle may have been moved from that ranch in shipments for the past six months or even longer," said Dr. Hillman. "We must obtain all available records, trace the animal movement, and conduct inspections and treatment to determine if ticks have been spread. This is extremely time-consuming, particularly when animals have no identification, prolonging and complicating the 'detective' work of our inspectors and epidemiologists."

Dr. Hillman noted that, to be fully functional, the USDA's fever tick program requires about \$14.7

Fate of Proposed Bill Could Impact Garza **County Property Taxes** By Rosa Latimer **News Editor**

The old saying that the only things you can count on are death and taxes is true because you can't avoid either. However, you might have an influence on the amount of county property taxes you pay by becoming engaged in the process of how oil and gas values will be deter-

mined in the future. "It is important for the citizens of Garza County to get involved as Senate Bill 2557 makes its way through the process in Austin," Garza County Judge Norman said. "I believe it is the current best solution to the process we are now under." The particular item of concern is the formula used by the state comptroller for determining the market factor value of oil which affects ad valorem taxation rates. "As currently applied, the Comptroller has created artificially low numbers," Norman continued. The market factor value being discussed for the next fiscal year is approximately \$35 per barrel which is down from \$96 per barrel used in the current year.

Sen. Carlos Uresti of District 19 introduced Senate Bill 2557 last month stating the bill that relates to the appraisal for ad valorem tax purposes of a real property interest in oil or gas in place "would go a long way to correct the undervalue of mineral interest devised by the current market condition factor."

The proposed bill was discussed thoroughly at the recent West Texas Judges and Commissioners Conference attended by Garza County Commissioners and Judge Norman. Both the Commissioners and Judge Norman encourage home owners to contact their state representatives to address this issue. "The citizens of Garza County can have an impact on the future of Senate Bill 2557, but they must act soon before June," Norman said.


