



You may feel like you are invading the privacy of your children by checking their online habits DON'T! If you don't, who will? We're not talking about adults. We're talking about your chil-

Did you know the entire Columbine massacre could have been avoided had the parents of Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold known about their online activity. Their plan to kill their classmates was there to see right on their computers.

Technology and the exposure heaped on our children have made parenting more difficult. It seems like we're fighting an uphill battle when it comes to what our children are exposed to so the prudent thing to do is stay on top of the changes and learn their habits.

In other words, get to know your child. Talk to them. Be nosey and let them know what is right and wrong. In addition, network with other caring parents so that you can monitor cyber-conduct more closely.

In Copenhagen, Denmark, there stands a sculptured statue of Jesus Christ with His arms stretched out in compassion and love. Denmark's leading sculptor, Bertel Thorwalsen, by his own admission had an allconsuming desire to create the greatest statue of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ that had ever been made. His original concept was a clay model of Jesus portrayed as a triumphant, hero king. The clay model had the head thrust back and the arms raised upward in a regal gesture of command and majesty. After exhaustively completing his clay model, Bertel Thorwalsen left his work of art to dry in the studio overnight believing that he had created the ultimate masterpiece. Unfortunately, during the night, a deep heavy fog and wind ushered in and crept through a partially open window in his sea-side studio. When he returned to his studio the following morning, he curiously found that the night had created a change to his craftsmanship. The head now was fallen forward and the hands no longer appeared triumphant, but were now outstretched in what appeared to be a gesture of love and compassion. The drops of moisture which had accumulated upon the statue took on the illusion of droplets of blood. The face, once appearing majestic and regal now was transformed and appeared to be full of compassion and concern. The outstretched arms now were inviting. And upon viewing the newly transformed figure, Thorwalsen was touched by change. The realization that this was in actuality the truer depiction of his Savior and Lord washed over his soul. Thorwalsen then decided he would create this providentially inspired version and at the bottom of the statue inscribed these words, "Come unto me, all that are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Matthew 11:33

I am so thankful today that my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ is truly the final depiction that sculptor Bertal Thorwalsen chose to create that day. That He is a loving, caring and concerned Savior who I can come to in my times of anguish. In my times of being burdened by all the things of the world! In my distress of home, job, relationships, finances, and a hundred other woes and downtrodden feelings; if I will come unto Him, He will give me rest! My rest and my assurance of comfort and safety are contained in the sacrifice of a servant Savior on the cross of Calvary. And I rejoice in knowing that even though the world was looking for a conquering king at the arrival of Jesus Christ, God's plan (Salvation) could not have been accomplished without the shedding of the blood for the remission of sin. Jesus voluntarily submitted Himself as Servant and allowed the very sin of mankind to be taken upon His flesh. And He did so freely so that you and I may forever come unto Him and find rest in His love and His grace. STEALING MONA LISA

ona Lisa, or La Joconde, as she is known to the French, is more than the most famous painting of all time, she is also a national treasure. So on August 21, 1911 when Leonardo's da Vinci's masterpiece was stolen, art-napped, kidnapped from the Louvre, Paris and all the world were in an uproar.

It was a typical Monday morning at the art gallery. The Louvre was closed but the place was still busy with art students, cleaning crew, security and museum officials. At 7:30 a worker walked by Leonardo da Vinci's Mona Lisa; when he passed by again at 8:30 she was gone. No biggie, probably just down for some in-house photography. All that day the four iron screws hung empty. No one noticed or was alarmed that the most famous smile in the world was missing. It wasn't until Tuesday authorities were notified and began to search the 49 acre art gallery for the priceless masterpiece.

How had the most valuable painting in the world disappeared in broad daylight? It would be over two years before the mystery was solved.




It had all been pretty easy. After his shift on Sunday night, Vincenzo Perugia, a maintenance worker and Italian immigrant, did not exit the museum. Instead he quietly hid in a storage closet. Monday morning he slipped out of hiding, unhooked the 30 x 21 inch painting and hid it under his painter's smock. His only problem occurred on his way out when a door he planned to use was locked. While removing the door knob, a security guard happened by. No problem. The hapless guard lent him a screwdriver to pry open the now knob-less door! Once in a closed off stairway, the thief removed the 150 pound wood and glass frame. Then he simply walked out of the museum with the Mona Lisa tucked under his coat. Later, the authorities would find the only fingerprint left by Perugia on the discarded doorknob tossed into a nearby ditch. For over two years Mona Lisa lay wrapped in red silk hidden in a humble apartment. Until, the thief tried to sel the painting to an antique dealer for \$100,000. Eventually caught, the culprit

Russell Graves Outdoors BEATING THE BACKLASH BLUES

When line tension is optimized for lure weight, all you need is an educated thumb

By Russell A. Graves It's been called backlash, bird's nest, professional overrun and words too lurid

to print. Despite the varied nomenclature, the result is always the same: a rank and tangled mess of monofilament, or worse, braided super line that clogs up your baitcasting reel and slows your fishing. If you're lucky, you'll be able to strip out the line and be back to fishing in a couple of minutes. If you lose the backlash lotto and get a bad case of the dreaded angling malady, your day may be over if you have to cut all of the line from your reel just to release it from the grip of the tangles. Take heed, though. Help is here for those who occasionally see the twisted tyrant rear its ugly head.

pulled from the reel by the lure," explains Bill Liston of the Daiwa Corporation — the company that pioneered magnetic anti-backlash systems back in 1982. "Backlash is influenced by both gravity and wind which tends to slow your lure. Putting a slight amount of tension on the reel's spool helps keep the spool from turning too freely and spinning at too high a speed as the lure slows." Liston says that employing a reel that uses a magnetic anti-backlash system will cut down on the occurrence of backlash but won't necessarily eliminate it completely. In addition to the magnetic controls, he advises using a simple reel adjustment to help ease the

occurrence of bird's nests. "Virtually all reels have a spool tension adjustment on the side under the reel handle. Adjusting the tension is simple and will save you many hours of picking out backlash," Liston confides. With the line through the rod guides, tie on the lure you'll be using and hold the rod at shoulder height and parallel to the ground. Press the clutch button and let the weight of the lure pull line as it free-spools to the ground. If the lure hits the ground and the spool is still turning, the tension is too loose. Add tension to the spool by turning the tension knob clockwise. If the lure doesn't move or it stops before hitting the ground, the spool tension is too tight. Loosen it by turning the knob counterclockwise. Yes, the old saying, "righty tighty,

lefty loosey" works with reels as well. Ideally, when you press the clutch button, the lure should sink to the ground and as soon as it hits, the spool stops spinning. Of course the weight of the lure has a lot to do with proper tensioning of the spool. Therefore, each time you change lures, you should re-tension the reel accordingly. Mike Bonadonna, sales representative for the reel manufacturer Shimano, advises you to use the correct rod based on lure weight.


"A heavy lure, like a 1/2-ounce spinnerbait on a light to medium weight rod casts easier than a light lure on a heavy rod. When picking out a rod, think about what lure you have and your equipment. Use light action rods with light lures and medium to heavy action rods with heavier lures," emphasizes Bonadonna. He says that beginners should start their baitcasting experience by using a magnetic, backlash controlling reel.

"Magnetic reels affect the acceleration of the spool. Using a magnetic reel can actually help educate our thumb so you can get the feel for slowing the spool's speed manually," says Bonadonna. He explains that its best to set the magnetic backlash control at zero, adjust the tension of the spool and then dial just enough backlash control to help manage the spool's speed. Ideally, your thumb should control most of the

Bill Liston says controlling backlash is actually simple if you understand backlash basics. "The whole idea here is to stop your lure before something else like the water or a tree does. You want to slow the lure's flight by gently thumbing the spool as the lure nears your target, slowing its forward movement until it gently lands at the target. The key factor is that the spool stops at the same time or before the lure does."
