City: No adverse impact from Dec. 25 sewer spill

There was no adverse impact to the City of Rockwall's water supply following a Christmas day sanitary sewer spill, according to a news release from the municipality.

The spill occurred at the wastewater collection facility in the area of Yellow Jacket Lane between State Hwy. 205 and FM 740. The affected area included the creek adjacent to the Union Pacific Railroad, upstream of FM 740 and the drainage way between Yellow Jacket and the creek.

The incident, reported on Dec. 28, was contained and cleaned up the same day, according to the release.

The spill was disinfected and deodorized, and the solids were

removed and disposed of in the city's wastewater system. Grease buildup in the apartment's private wastewater service, probably from cooking grease, was the suspected cause of the spill,

according to the news release. The spill involved about 169,721 gallons of domestic wastewater; however, city officials, who are in the process of confirming the calculations used to estimate the spill volume, said that number could be reduced.


The municipality has notified the appropriate local governmental officials and the Texas Commission for Environmental Quality regional office. Although it is believed there was no adverse impact to Lake Ray Hubbard, the city also has contacted the Dallas Department of Water Utilities that oversees and manages the lake.

Modern day lunacy

Sen. John Rockefeller, D-W.Va., chairman of the Senate Finance Subcommittee on Health Care, and Rep. Joe Courtney D-Conn., a member of the House Education and Labor Committee, have introduced the Pre-existing Condition Patient Protection Act, which would eliminate pre-existing condition exclusions in all insurance markets. That's an Obama administration priority. I wonder whether President Obama and his congressional supporters would go a step further and protect not just patients but everyone against preexisting condition exclusions by insurance companies. Let's look at the benefits of such a law.

A person might save quite a bit of money on fire insurance. He could wait until his home is ablaze and then walk into Nationwide and say, "Sell me a fire insurance policy so I can have my house repaired." The Nationwide salesman says, "That's lunacy!" But the person replies, "Congress says you cannot deny me insurance because of a pre-existing condition." This mandate against insurance company discrimination would not only apply to home insurance but auto insurance and life insurance as well. Instead of a wife wasting money on costly life insurance premiums, she could spend that money on jewelry, cosmetics and massages and then wait until her husband kicked the bucket to buy life insurance on him.

Insurance companies don't stay in business and prosper by being stupid. If Congress were to enact a law eliminating pre-existing condition exclusions, what might be expected? Say I'm a salesman for Nationwide and you demand that I write you an insurance policy for your house that has already gone up in flames. I send an appraiser out to your house to get an estimate how much money it would take to make you whole. Let's say it comes to \$400,000. Guess how much I'm going to charge you for the policy? If you said somewhere in the neighborhood of \$400,000, you'd be pretty close to the right answer. You might say, "Williams, you're right. Forcing fire and auto insurance companies to sell policies for a preexisting fire or auto accident is bizarre and stupid, but it's different

with health insurance." Yes, health insurance is different from fire and auto insurance but the insurance principle remains the same.

If Congress and the president are successful in making the Pre-existing Condition Patient Protection Act the law of the land, their treachery won't stop there. Insurance companies will attempt to charge people with pre-existing health conditions a higher price to compensate for their higher expected cost. Those people will complain to Congress. Then Congress will enact insurance premium price controls. Insurance companies might try to restrict just what treatments they will cover under such restrictions. That means Congress will play a greater role in managing what insurance companies can and cannot do.

The dilemma Congress always faces, when it messes with the economy, was aptly described in a Negro spiritual play by Marcus Cook Connelly titled "Green Pastures." In it, God laments to the angel Gabriel, "Every time Ah passes a miracle, Ah has to pass fo' or five mo' to ketch up wid it," adding, "Even bein God ain't no bed of roses." When Congress creates a miracle for one American, it creates a non-miracle for another. After that, Congress has to create a compensatory miracle. Many years ago, I used to testify before Congress, something I refuse to do now. At several of the hearings, I urged Congress to get out of the miracle business and leave miracle making up to God.

For a president and congressman to shamelessly propose something like the Pre-existing Condition Patient Protection Act demonstrates just how far we've gone down the road to perdition. The most tragic thing is that most Americans have no idea that such an act violates every principle of insurance and it's something that not even yesteryear's lunatics would have thought up.



William Rapp scored 85 points to lead four members of Rockwall's RACE swimming club who earned points in the City of Richardson "A" Winter Classic Meet Dec. 4-6 at Loos Natatorium in Addison.

Among the 10 RACE swimmers who had qualified for the meet by reaching at least three "A" Texas Age Group Swimming time standards for their age group, Claire Walters, Brooke Arnold and Coach Brigitte achieved TAGS times, enabling Heuer also scored points.

The meet attracted about 800 swimmers from 32 teams from Texas and other states. Nitro swimming won the event with 2,885.5 points. RACE was 19th with 151.

Rapp was competing for the last time in the 11-12 age group before moving up to the 13-14 division. To qualify for the finals, he had to finish among the top eight in the preliminaries for each event. In the 13 and above age groups, 16 qualified for the finals, making them eligible to score points.

He reached the finals and lowered his former best time in all six of his events. Rapp's top finish was second in the 50-yard freestyle in 25.25, behind only the North Texas Natadore's Colin Giddings in 24.02. Rapp placed third in the 100 freestyle in 54.97 and fifth in the 200 free (2 minutes, 2.79

seconds). All three times reached AAA qualifying times.

In the 50 backstroke, Rapp placed fifth (29.47) and in the 100 back he was eighth (1:04.06), both AAA times. Rapp was sixth in the 100 breaststroke in 1:13.90, a AA time that beat his previous best by four seconds.

Clark is candidate for congressional seat

Rockwall businessman Steve Clark has announced he will be a candidate in for Texas' Fourth Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives in the upcoming Republican primary.

she said. "This (office) is great for this community. I've told all my friends," says Maggie, who already has persuaded one family member and several friends to give the office a try.






