Certain dirt work by county equipment, to be paid by farmers needing the work, was approved, subject to the machines in those areas not being needed for use on county roads.

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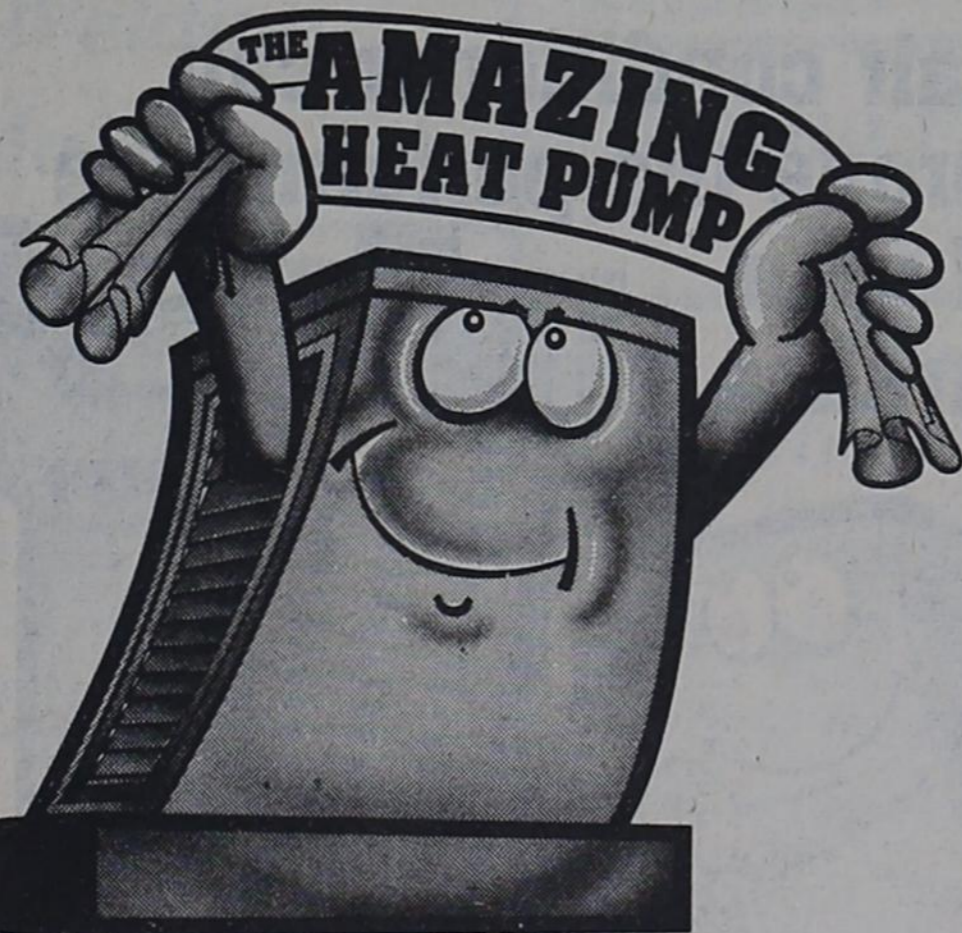
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Blade's Edge

There are alot of communities who are hurting now...hurting because they have been hit by tornadoes, as a cruel, late spring joke, or by mudslides, or, even by fire, as one area community is realizing.

Hurt, because there are people living in these communities who are hurting...financially, emotionally and physically.

The community in which I live is hurting because a small country store burned Wednesday night.

Now, maybe to some this was not a major happening, but when it was one of only two stores which serviced the area, it became a major happening.

Not, only that, but it provided a boost to the economy and was a place in which to stop in summer for a cool soft drink, or a haven in winter in which cheery conversation could take the bite off the bitter cold.

But, now, this small, cinderblock building sits on the corners of highways 214 and 145 as a charred reminder of how quickly one's dreams, hopes, and investments can so quickly be vanquished by a fire, tornado or other catastrophe.

It will take awhile for the residents of Lazbuddie to get over losing a business such as this one.

For the owners, Buster and Jan Steinbock, it might take the rest of their lives to overcome the overwhelming sense of loss that they must undoubtedly feel now.

I am sure they must think that their entire life's investment just went up in smoke with the fire there.

And, although I can offer little condolences, I feel as much a part of this tragedy as they do. How can a person not feel something when a neighbor loses all they have?

Well, it won't be much longer until BHS will have seen another class come and go.

Graduation is always a solemn occasion, I suppose, for it must make us all reflect upon the great and mighty things we had planned for ourselves at one time or another.

If there is one thing I could say to the seniors everywhere, it is that most of us have had to change our

aspirations at least once on the road of life.

It is important that these young people, who are about to go out to meet the real world for the first time, realize that they must not become disillusioned by the pitfalls, disappointments and trials in life.

As bad as these may, at one time or another seem to be, they are very rarely, if ever, fatal, and most people come through these maladies of life with more strength than before.

Another piece of advice I would give a graduating senior is that it is good not to put all of your "eggs in one basket." In other words, don't plan on something so strongly that you cannot do something else should your dreams not pan out. Don't set one goal to the exclusion of all other goals in life.

Of course, I hope that all the 1982 seniors will have successful, fulfilling lives interspersed with much happiness.

But, should the pitfalls, trials and disappointments come, remember that we all have had these, and lived over them. So will you.

With summer upon us, there is a need to remind everyone who will be enjoying the lakes and pools of this state to remember safe boating and swimming rules.

Many countless people, young and old, die from drowning accidents each year, and most of the tragedies could have easily been avoided, had the person been fully informed about the hazards.

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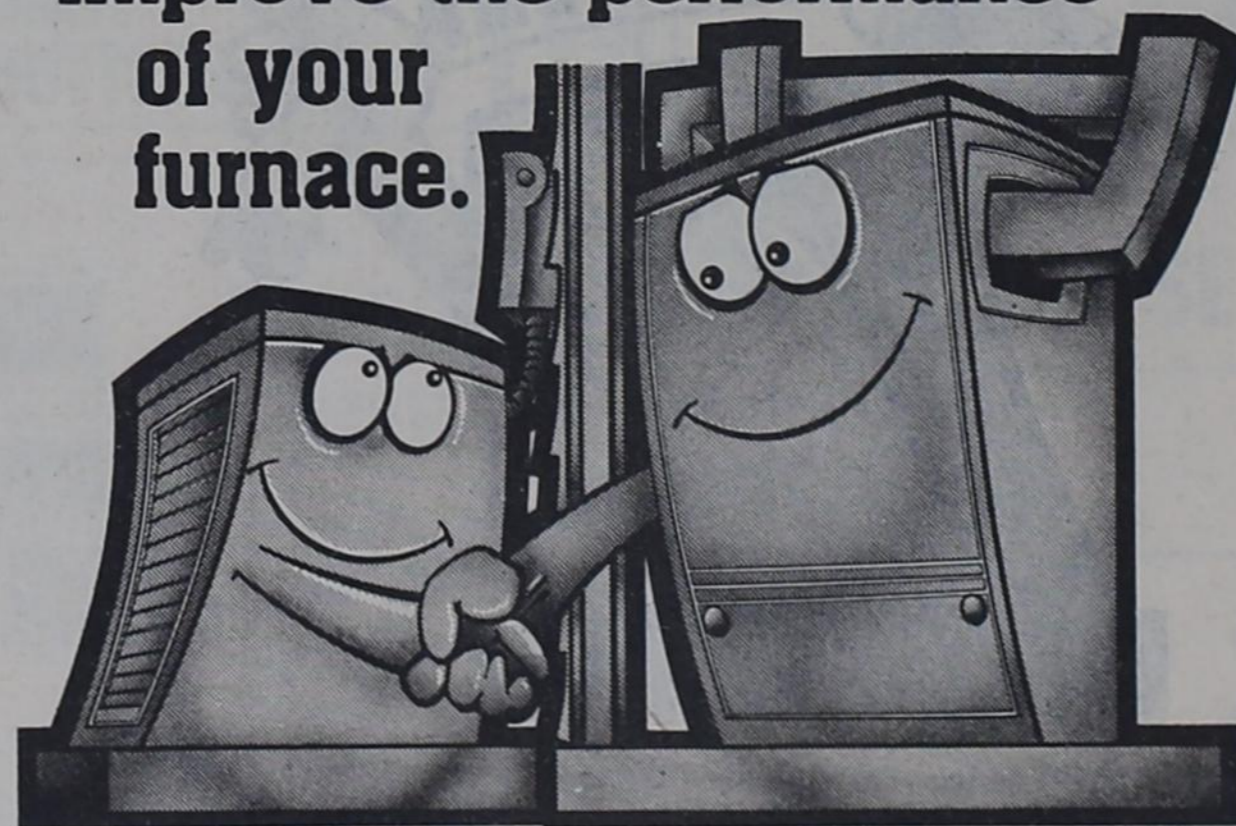
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Soil Stewardship Week Observed Nationwide

"This is 'A Time for Tenacity' in our faith, in concept, in communication, in cooperation, in the political arena, in experiments and research, in leadership, in priorities, and in total commitment," cites the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) in the 16-page Soil Stewardship Week booklet. 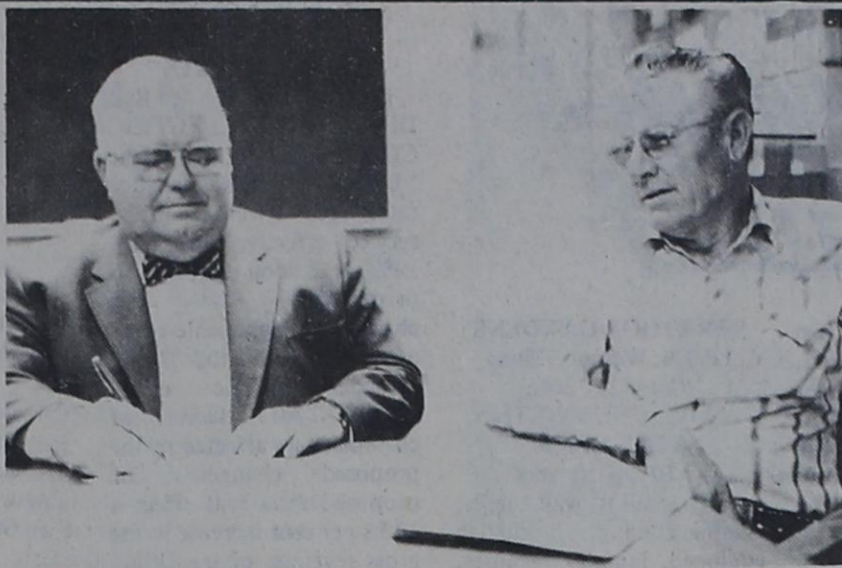
for the publication was written by President Ronald Reagan.

NACD has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week since 1955, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

Informative material on the Soil Stewardship Week theme each year is distributed through local conservation districts to clergymen, lay leaders, churches, civic and educational organizations and to individuals participating in the observance.

"With the growth of population and the world demand for food and with the clearing and development of most land that is suitable for cultivation, we must turn our attention to the task of saving every acre," Schueler says. "The dream of adequate supplies of food and shelter must cover a period that extends far into the future because this is the only world we have and the total heritage of our descendants," he concluded.

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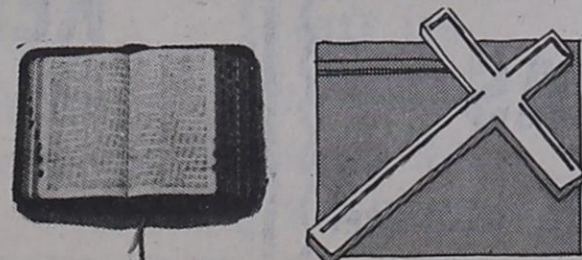

Clay's Corner Store Destroyed By Fire

The country store located at the intersection of highways 214 and 145 is now just a shell, with its interior charred, as it was engulfed in flames Wednesday.

A fire Wednesday night demolished the inside of the living quarters of the store, and also smoke-damaged all the contents of the store, which was owned by Buster and Jan Steinbock of Lazbuddie.

According to Lazbuddie Fire Chief, Glenn Lust, the west part of the building, which included the living quarters, consisting of two bedrooms, a living room, kitchen and bathroom, were already burning by the time the Lazbuddie firemen arrived at the scene at 11:10 p.m.

There was no actual fire in the store itself, but the contents suffered heavy smoke damage from the fire.

The Steinbocks bought the store from longtime owners, Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Clay, about a year ago.

It took Lazbuddie volunteers, with the assistance of the Muleshoe Fire Department, about ten minutes to extinguish the flames, but they stayed on the scene for another hour and one-half clearing the smoke and making sure the structure was safe enough to leave. According to Lust, the firemen left the scene about 12:30 a.m. Thursday morning.

The owners and Daina Groom, who was living with them, were not at home when the fire started.

The Lazbuddie fire official said there was no way of knowing exactly when the fire started and how long it might have been going before the fire departments were called out. He said nearby neighbors reported smelling smoke before they went to bed, but thought it was the Steinbock's fireplace going, and did not think anymore of it.

Lust said he did not have an idea of what might have caused the fire, but said that the fire department would probably look into the possibilities later on.

Fire Chief Lust did indicate that the fire had not burned through the roof, and he also said he felt the building was still structurally sound and could be re-furbished. Lust said he did not feel that the entire building was lost.

According to Lust, approximately eleven Lazbuddie volunteers and ten Muleshoe firemen were called out to handle the blaze.

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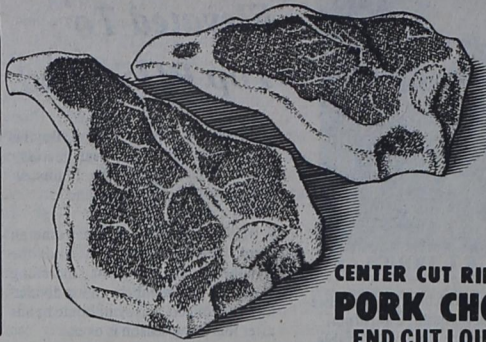
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
