SERIOUS POLITICAL observers are about to lose patience with Congress, which has been wrestling with the President's 1983 Federal Budget for several weeks, with virtually no progress to show for their efforts.

True to his promise, President Reagan proposed a budget that would allow the country to run its business in a responsible way (the way the nation expects individuals and businesses to run theirs), and cut senseless spending by restoring a pattern of normalcy to the American way of life.

Before President Reagan's budget ever arrived in the legislature, there were screams of protest from special interest groups, which includes the broadcast media, controlled by the liberal eastern establishment.

To hear these folks talk, Reagan's budget was some sort of deep, dark plot to send the nation back into a depression. Congress therefore rejected the president's budget and called for changes.

Trying to break the stalemate, President Reagan revised his budget proposal, practically wrecking some of the money-saving features in a series of compromises.

Still, the liberal leaders of the Democratic party, House Speaker "Tip" O'Neill and House Majority Leader Jim Wright of Fort Worth have rejected the budget.

Other congressmen, including some from the president's own party, have come up with suggestions which would further wreck Reagan's budget, and almost completely eliminate the tax breaks he has proposed for the burdened taxpayers.

All of this debate is being done, by the way, by a congress whose final act of the last session was to vote themselves deductions of up to \$75 a day in tax benefits, a new law applicable to Members of Congress only.

It's almost as if they are now saying: "We got OUR tax break, and now we're going back to business as usual, and the taxpayer (as usual) is going to really pay."

As one editorial writer said this week, American voters may be a lot more sophisticated than their representative in Washington gives them credit for. While there are millions who still believe in and profit from federal boondoggles, welfare, food stamps, etc., millions of others, although having compassion for the truly needy, have about had all they can take of freeloaders riding their backs.

The big argument advanced by the liberals opposed to President Reagan's budget is the "scare" tactic thrown in regarding a possible cut of Social Security benefits.

This just is not the cast, except for certain students, and dependents who should not have been on Social Security in the first place.

A big problem with the budgetmaking is the built-in cost of living allowance increases for a number of those who are already on the welfare "dole." This would be a simple matter to solve, if some of us from this section of the country were allowed to vote on the budget.

Voters--and taxpayers--need to flood their congressmen with mail, and not only protest the greedy fee they voted themselves, but urge them to pass the president's proposal-without eliminating the tax benefits he has promised the American

people.

Otherwise, most congressmen still have an appointment with their constituents, come November.

Aldermen Take Care Of Business

Bovina's Board of City Aldermen met in their monthly meeting, May 10 at the City Hall.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Dale Gober and aldermen Larry Scott, B.J. Charles, Garry Beauchamp, Dudley Hughes, Joe Jones, as well as City Manager Tom Bonds and guests Bob Davis representing Kidder, Peabody and Company, Bill Morgan, Parmer County Sheriff, Steve Sherrill, First State Bank of Bovina and James Ritchie, Radford Venable, Raymond Rocha and Ronnie Averett.

In the business session, Alderman Jones made a motion that the bills be paid and this was seconded by Alderman Charles and passed.

Mayor Gober appointed Alderman B.J. Charles as Mayor Pro-tem.

Alderman Garry Beauchamp made a motion to adopt the resolution of Certificate of City Secretary, and it was seconded by Alderman Larry Scott, and passed.

Alderman Joe Jones made the motion to adopt an ordinance by the City Council of the City of Bovina authorizing the issuance of \$210,000, "City of Bovina, Texas Utility System Revenue Bonds, Series, dated July 1, 1982: prescribing the form of the bonds, and making provision for their registration; pledging the net revenues of the city's combined waterworks and sanitary sewer system to the payment of the principal of and interest of said bonds; enacting the provisions incident and related to the subject and purpose of this ordinance;

and declaring emergency.

Alderman Dudley Hughes seconded the motion and it was approved

Alderman Hughes then made the motion that the Ordinance 82-5 be adopted, which would raise the rate of the water at \$7.10 for 4,000 gallons and 90 cents per thousand thereafter and out of the city limits the rate would be \$9.70 for 4,000 gallons and \$1.25 per thousand thereafter. It was seconded by Alderman Joe Jones and

This ordinance which was passed concerning the water rates, will go into effect July 1, 1982 billing June water.

It was stated by City Manager Tom Bonds that the new water rates which will be about doubled beginning with the July 1 bills, were pre-set by FHA and the City Council had nothing to do with these figures.

The rates were established in order to pay off the \$210,000 in bonds for the new water system, and not affect ad valorem taxes.

There are alot of communities who are hurting now...hurting because they have been hit by tornadoes, as a cruel, late spring joke, or by mudslides, or, even by fire, as one area community is realizing.

Hurt, because there are people living in these communities who are hurting...financially, emotionally and physically.

The community in which I live is hurting because a small country store burned Wednesday night.

Now, maybe to some this was not a major happening, but when it was one of only two stores which serviced the area, it became a major happening.

Not, only that, but it provided a boost to the economy and was a place in which to stop in summer for a cool soft drink, or a haven in winter in which cheery conversation could take the bite off the bitter cold.

But, now, this small, cinderblock building sits on the corners of highways 214 and 145 as a charred reminder of how quickly one's dreams, hopes, and investments can so quickly be vanquished by a fire, tornado of other catastrophe.

It will take awhile for the residents of Lazbuddie to get over losing a business such as this one.

For the owners, Buster and Jan Steinbock, it might take the rest of their lives to overcome the overwhelming sense of loss that they must undoubtedly feel now.

I am sure they must think that their entire life's investment just went up in smoke with the fire there.

And, although I can offer little condolences, I feel as much a part of this tragedy as they do. How can a person not feel something when a neighbor loses all they have?

Well, it won't be much longer until BHS will have seen another class come and go.

Graduation is always a solemn occasion, I suppose, for it must make us all reflect upon the great and mighty things we had planned for ourselves at one time or another.

If there is one thing I could say to the seniors everywhere, it is that most of us have had to change our

aspirations at least once on the road

It is important that these young people, who are about to go out to meet the real world for the first time, realize that they must not become disillusioned by the pitfalls, disappointments and trials in life.

As bad as these may, at one time or another seem to be, they are very rarely, if ever, fatal, and most people come through these maladies of life with more strength than before.

Another piece of advice I would give a graduating senior is that it is good not to put all of your "eggs in one basket." In other words, don't plan on something so strongly that you cannot do something else should your dreams not pan out. Don't set one goal to the exclusion of all other goals in life.

Clay's Corner Store Destroyed By Fire

The country store located at the intersection of highways 214 and 145 is now just a shell, with its interior charred, as it was engulfed in flames Wednesday.

A fire Wednesday night demolished the inside of the living quarters of the store, and also smokedamaged all the contents of the store, which was owned by Buster and Jan Steinbock of Lazbuddie.

According to Lazbuddie Fire Chief, Glenn Lust, the west part of the building, which included the living quarters, consisting of two bedrooms, a living room, kitchen and bathroom, were already burning by the time the Lazbuddie firemen arrived at the scene at 11:10 p.m.

There was no actual fire in the store itself, but the contents suffered heavy smoke damage from the fire.

The Steinbocks bought the store from longtime owners, Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Clay, about a year ago.

It took Lazbuddie volunteers, with the assistance of the Muleshoe Fire Department, about ten minutes to extinguish the flames, but they stayed on the scene for another hour and one-half clearing the smoke and making sure the structure was safe enough to leave. According to Lust, the firemen left the scene about 12:30 a.m. Thursday morning.

The owners and Daina Groom, who was living with them, were not at home when the fire started.

According to Lust, approximately eleven Lazbuddie volunteers and ten Muleshoe firemen were called out to handle the blaze.

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
