

OVER THE WEEKEND I was thumbing through the current issue of one of my favorite magazines, when I noticed a rather provocative article about the American political scene. The magazine offered some rather interesting suggestions, and in view of the 1980 presidential campaigns coming up soon, we decided to pass along some of these innovative ideas to our readers. See what you think of them.

Political candidates shall not be allowed to receive campaign contributions from individuals or large corporations. However, they will be allowed to finance their campaigns by driving a cab or panhandling on the street.

Outside interests in large corporations, real estate ventures or the stock market will be forbidden to all politicians. However they will be allowed to moonlight as garbage men, soda jerkers, gas station attendants or something equally suitable.

Government agencies will no longer be allowed to spend tax dollars for any reason whatsoever without first having to ask permission from each and every taxpayer.

Any politician claiming to be "one of the common people" will be required to live among the "common people" in a slum neighborhood while serving his full term of office.

Expense allowances for Congressmen will not exceed \$149.50 per week. If they can't manage their budget, why should they be allowed to manage ours?

All political candidates will be obliged to draw up a contract explaining in outline form what they plan to do if elected. And at the end of their terms, they will be paid a flat fee for every promise that wasn't

Highway Work Set For County

Bids are scheduled to be received during November by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation for the reconstruction of sections of U.S. Highway 60 at Friona and Bovina in Parmer County, and for the resurfacing of U.S. 60 in Parmer and Castro Counties.

Lubbock District Engineer George C. Wall said the two reconstruction projects involve 0.9 mile of U.S. 60 in Friona from S.H. 214 eastward, and 0.4 mile in Bovina from F.M. 2290

Raised medians will be removed at both locations and the roadway will be reconstructed to provide four through lanes, continuous left turn lanes and two parking lanes at each site.

The resurfacing project will repair the existing surface of U.S. 60 from Friona northeastward to the Deaf Smith County line, a distance of 14.6 miles.

The department's engineer in charge of the work is Rhea Bradley of Littlefield.

Cotton Harvest Is Picking Up Steam

Helped by a week of dry, open weather, the area's cotton harvest was beginning to pick up steam this week.

Although the harvest really just got started in the Bovina area during the past week, gins in the southern part of the county had a slight jump.


The Blade began its weekly survey of gins in the county on Tuesday, and discovered that as of Tuesday noon, a total of 5,065 bales had been ginned in Parmer County.

Early reports are that the yield is at least average to somewhat better than average. Cotton has experienced an on-again, off-again season, with prospects changing throughout the

growing season. The crop would not have been nearly so good had it not been for a warmer than usual September and October, which allowed the crop to mature.



QUESTIONS OFTEN ASKED ABOUT YOUR EYES

By B.W. Armistead & Steven D. Smith Optometrists-Littlefield

Q: What is glaucoma?

A: Glaucoma is the result of an upset in the production & drainage of a fluid, the aqueous, which nourishes the inner eye. The aqueous may be produced in too great a quantity or, as is more common, the fluid does not drain properly from the eye. The result in either case is a build-up of pressure inside the eyeball called "intraocular tension."

Q: Will glaucoma cause blindness?

A: Yes, if not brought under control. It is the number one cause of blindness in the world today.

Q: How does glaucoma cause blindness?

A: The increased intra-ocular pressure ultimately injures the sensitive nerve tissue in the back of the eye (retina) and accordingly reduces vision. The vision loss is permanent.

Q: Are there more than one kind of glaucoma?

A: Yes. The most dangerous type is the chronic (open angle) simple type in which a slow unnoticed build-up of pressure over a long period of time gradually steals vision without the patient being aware of it. There are usually no symptoms or warning signs. There is no pain except in the

Q: How is glaucoma detected?

A: Glaucoma is most frequently detected during a professional vision examination. Optometrists check carefully for glaucoma during the "eye health" part of the vision examination and then actually measure the pressure within the eye with a special instrument designed for this purpose.

Q: Do the glaucoma pressure tests hurt?

A: No, there is no pain when measuring the pressure within the eye.

Q: Can glaucoma be prevented?

A: At the present time there is no known way to prevent glaucoma, but early detection is extremely important in its control. Usually blindness can be prevented if detected early enough. For this reason, it is important to have your eyes examined at least once each two years or more often if your eve doctor so advises.



Parmer County Brands Enshrined By A&M

The search is on throughout Texas for outstanding cattle brands to include on county panels at the Kleberg Center's "branded stairway"

at Texas A&M University.

L.A. Maddox, chairman of the unique branding project, said that some 3,500 brands, or more, are expected to be imprinted on the 254 "county oak panels" in the University's new \$9.5 million Robert Kleberg Animal and Food Sciences

"County Extension agents are working with their local beef cattle committees to select eight brands per county, and with historical societies to select other brands for the panels," Maddox, Texas Agricultural Extension Service beef cattle specialist, said.

the county's oak panel. Participating
were: James Dixon, and his two sons,

There are some 200,000 brands

recorded in Texas and on file with the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in Fort Worth. This is the state's most complete

The "branding" was an idea of Dr. O.D. Butler, for many years head of Texas A&M's Animal Science Department and now associate vice president for agriculture and renewable resources. He said that not only are cattle brands a rich part of Texas livestock history but a prized possession of ranchers in identification of their cattle.

"We felt that the branding ceremonies would bring about a closer tie-in between cattlemen and our animal science facilities on campus as well as with research and educational work throughout Texas," Butler said.

Maddox said that branding ceremonies will be conducted by Extension district groups until "all panels are branded."
