**THE RECENT EPISODE** at Three Mile Island caused opponents of nuclear energy to pounce on the subject, like a cat on a mouse, virtually demanding an end to the use of nuclear power.

Never mind the fact that in more than 20 years of using nuclear energy, we have yet to have one single solitary death attributed to this field. This is quite a record, and one that no other industry can even begin to match.

Yet, the tremendous amount of publicity that the incident at Three Mile Island received, caused a big "scare" to be cast concerning nuclear energy, and the possibilities of radiation exposure posed by the presence of such power plants.

It has been said that the recent "leak" at the New Jersey plant caused those living near the complex very little in the way of radiation danger, although they may have been scared to death in the meantime.

Radiation absorption is measured by the "Rem," which is the biological effect produced by one roentgen of X-ray. Scientists measure low-level radiation in millirems (one thousandth of a rem).

These people living within a half mile of Three Mile Island, for example, received only an extra 83 millirems during the recent turmoil.

By comparison, a dental X-ray of your entire mouth would give you 910 millirems on your absorption chart. A barium enema would give you 8,000 millirems.

We are finding out that where low-level radiation is concerned, there is virtually no escaping it in our modern world. Many people are exposed to radiation on their jobs, and you can also be exposed by such simple acts as walking into a building made of granite.

In fact, a recent test made at the U.S. Senate subcommittee hearing room showed higher levels of radiation from that building than anything produced near Three Mile Island at the height of its recent excitement. But no one has suggested that we close down the Senate.

It is just that the opponents of nuclear energy have jumped on the subject, and would have us close every such power plant in the nation, without even so much as a hearing. Perhaps a more sensible approach would be in order.

Experts on the subject say that low-level doses of radiation do not present any significant threat of cancer or genetic malformation. In fact, one specialist on the subject, Dr. Edward Radford, chairman of the National Academy of Science, says: "The risks are very small. There is a risk, but it's not the end of the world."

This should be a comforting thought to the people who live in the vicinity of Three Mile Island, and it also should make the opponents of nuclear energy feel a little foolish, but we doubt that it does.

But experts do warn that one of the problems with radiation dangers is that when radium begins to decay, it gives off radon gas, one of the most serious low-level radiation threats.

There may be a problem with "radioactive sludge," the nuclear waste that has been piling up for the past 20 years. It is full of all kinds of deadly poisons that could remain dangerous for 25,000 years, the experts say.

And then there are the homeowners in Colorado, whose homes are built with material from a government uranium mill which was exposing them to unacceptable levels of radon gas.

In the case of the Colorado homeowners, the government paid to have the necessary changes made, and the corrective measures can cost up to \$5,500 per house.

## Li'l Buckaroo Rodeo Slated Here Sunday

Deadline for entering will be 5 p.m. on Saturday, June 2. All entries are to be sent to Bobby Calaway, in care of the Bovina Roping Club.

The rodeo is for youngsters ages 12 and under. An entry fee of 50 cents per event will be charged.

A horse is not needed in order to enter. An all-around trophy will be awarded in each age group, based on points earned in the individual events. Ribbons will be awarded in the individual events, through sixth place.

There will be six "greased pig scrambles," with the winner getting \$10 in each division.

A concession stand will be operated at the Roping Arena.

Events will be as follows:

Four through six years old: goat ribbon race; greased pig scramble; water bucket obstacle and stick horse race.

Seven through nine years: goat ribbon race (with horse); father-son three-legged race (parents may be "adopted"); flag race (horse); greased pig scramble; boot scramble, water bucket obstacle; mother-daughter three-legged race (parent may be "adopted") and barrel race (horse).

Ten through 12 years: goat ribbon race (horse); father-son three-legged race; mother-daughter three-legged race (parent may be "adopted"); water bucket obstacle; greased pig scramble; boot scramble; flag race (horse); and barrel race (horse).

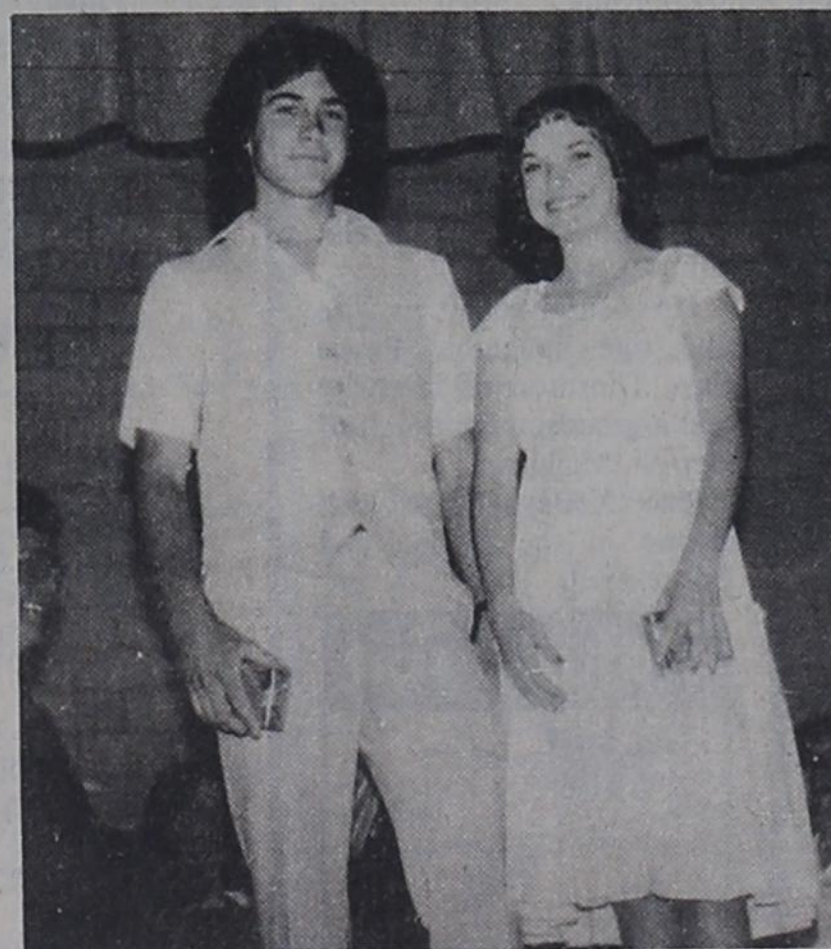

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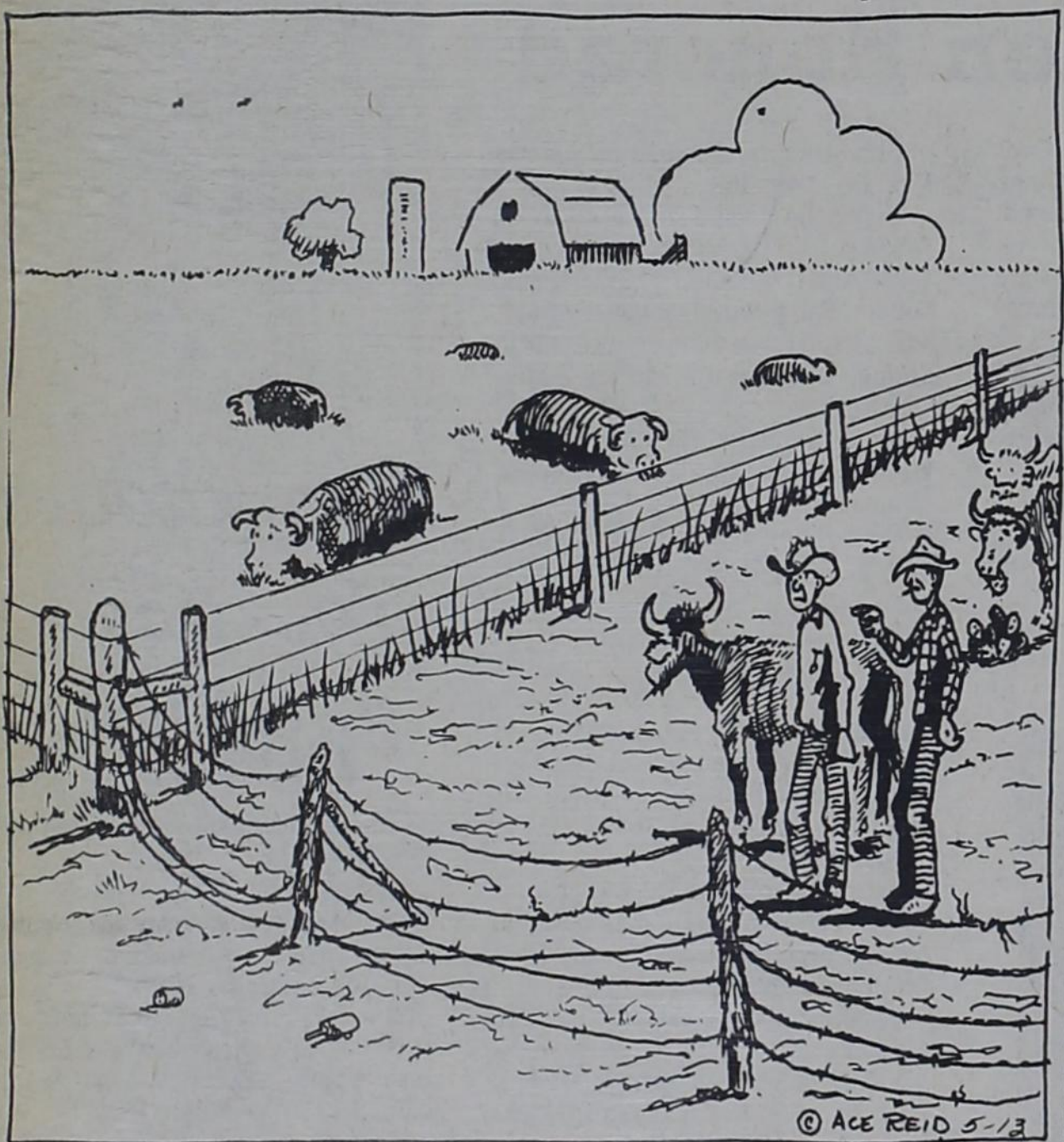

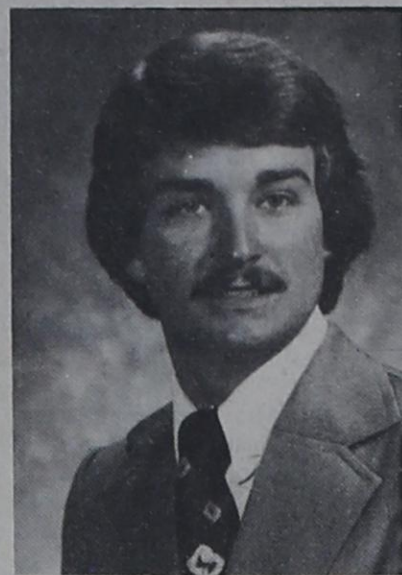

# Friona Company Has Good Report

Higher prices for grain-fed cattle and increased feedyard occupancy when compared with the prior year helped boost Friona Industries, Inc. net income to \$878,000, or 56 cents per share, on revenues of \$20.6 million for its third fiscal year ended March 31, 1979.

In the same quarter of the previous fiscal year, the Company reported net income of \$594,000, or 38 cents per share, on revenues of \$15.7 million.

"The third quarter continued the trend of the first two quarters as all segments of our business achieved higher gross profits when compared to the same periods of the prior fiscal year," said Ron Davenport, president. "Total net income and revenues were also at record levels for the first nine months of our current fiscal year."

Net income of \$3.1 million, or \$2.00 per share, on revenues of \$72 million compared with net income of \$1.5 million, or 95 cents per share, on revenues of \$48.3 million in the first nine months of the prior fiscal year.

All per share earnings figures reflect the effect of a 5-for-4 stock split effected as a 25 per cent stock dividend with a record date of March 31, 1979, paid on April 13, 1979.

Company-owned cattle led all segments of business in revenues and gross profits during the nine months. Revenues of \$24.7 million were 48 per cent above those of the same period of last year while gross profit of \$3.3 million reflected a gain of 82 per cent. About 43,000 head of Company-owned cattle were marketed, an increase of almost 15 per cent compared with the first three quarters of fiscal 1978.

Custom feeding during the first nine months accounted for \$22.3 million

in revenues (up 64 per cent) and \$2.3 million in gross profit (up 75 per cent). Higher average feedyard occupancy—82 per cent versus 66 per cent—was the principal reason for the increases.

Sales of commercial feeds climbed 47 per cent to \$15.2 million as gross profit rose almost 89 per cent to \$1.5 million for the nine months. Efficiencies achieved because of more tonnage produced plus more cattle in area feed yards were the major contributing factors.

"Production and sales of range cubes were also better because livestock raisers are now more willing to supplement the feeding of range cattle due to increased feeder cattle prices," said Davenport.

The retail marketing of animal health supplies surged well ahead of the first nine months of fiscal 1978. Sales of \$7.4 million and gross profit of \$1.4 million were higher by 24 and 28 per cent, respectively.

Grain and other operations, including feed hauling and steel fabrication, also had significantly better gross profits than in the first three quarters of the prior fiscal year.

"There was a slight tightening of profit margins in the third quarter because of decreased availability of cattle for placement in feed yards and resultant price increases in feeder cattle," explained Davenport.

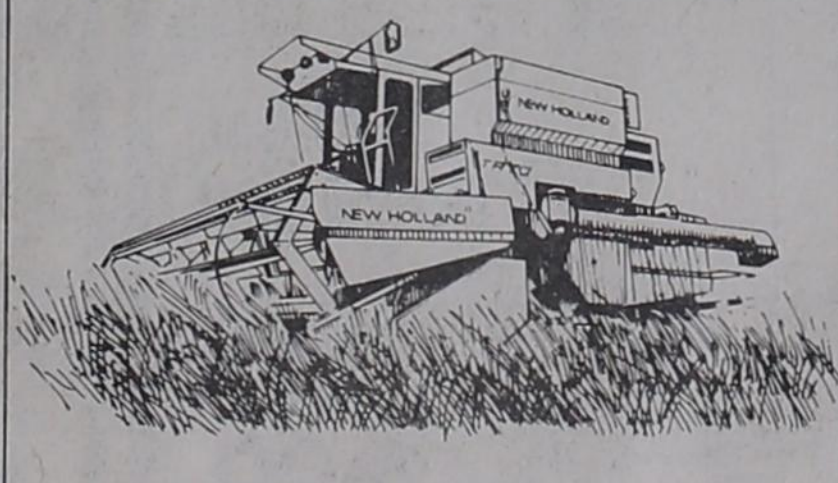

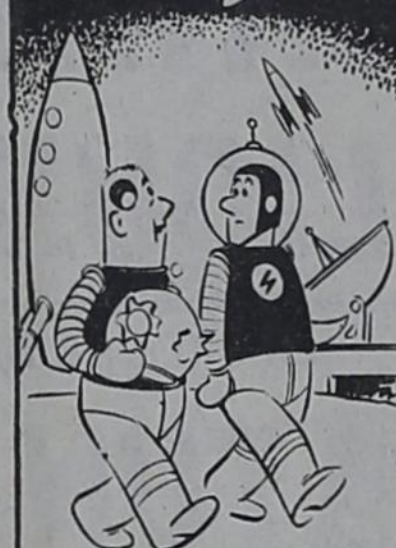
