The news that General Telephone Co. plans to station a man in Bovina should be especially welcome here.

This will aid greatly, we think, in making for better telephone service for Bovina subscribers. This will, in turn, improve the company's image with people here and thereby make a much better situation for all concerned.

We want to publicly congratulate General officials for their progressive move. As one citizen of the community and subscriber to the telephone service, we appreciate the steps the company is taking to provide Bovina people with the kind of service they need, expect and are entitled to have.

A General representative here will be of mutual benefit to the community and to the company.

General's decision to locate a serviceman here can possibly be labeled as a step in the right direction for Bovina and the utility companies.

For too long now, this town has been treated as a step child by the utility people when it came to having representatives of the companies stationed here.

We don't mean to imply that the service was any worse because of this.

But lack of utility people here didn't help said service, either.

The cable TV company is a shining exception to this policy. A serviceman has lived in Bovina since before the company was in business and one of the owners of the business makes his home here, too, even though he didn't live here prior to the company's beginning.

This has to be good for a company's public relations.

Another indication that conditions are on the upswing for Bovina is Pioneer Natural Gas Co.'s recent indication that it, too, will have a serviceman for Bovina who lives here. So, we're proud of the phone company and the gas company for having better attitudes about Our Town.

We're in such a good mood about the decision that we won't even point out that "it was about time."

Another boost for this community came right out of city hall; a logical place, we'll admit.

That boost was the decision to pave Second Street from Avenue B, where the post office is, south to Highway 86.

When this project is completed, another main artery will be provided almost across town. This has to be an improvement, in our way of thinking.

The city council's decision to pave Second all the way came, as we understand it, toward the end of the planning on the present paving program. But no matter when the decision was made, we think it will prove to be a wise one.

In a news story in The Blade a month or so ago, we gave the wrong people credit for founding a Bovina business.

At the time Mr. and Mrs. Willford Sikes bought Bovina Dairy Freeze from the Eldon Thatchers, we wrote that the business was started by Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Gilreath.

That wasn't true. The fact was brought to our attention by Mrs. Pearl Moore that Mr. and Mrs. Ed Sewells started the business and operated it "about a year" before selling it to the Gilreaths. We knew that, of course, but we associated the Gilreaths with the firm for so long that the fact they didn't start the business slipped our mind.

Mrs. Moore says she remembers the Sewells starting the business so well because they were good friends with her brother in Lubbock, the town they moved from to here.

Such mistakes are embarrassing to newspaperpeople, of course, and we hope this explanation will help, in a small way, to correct that one.

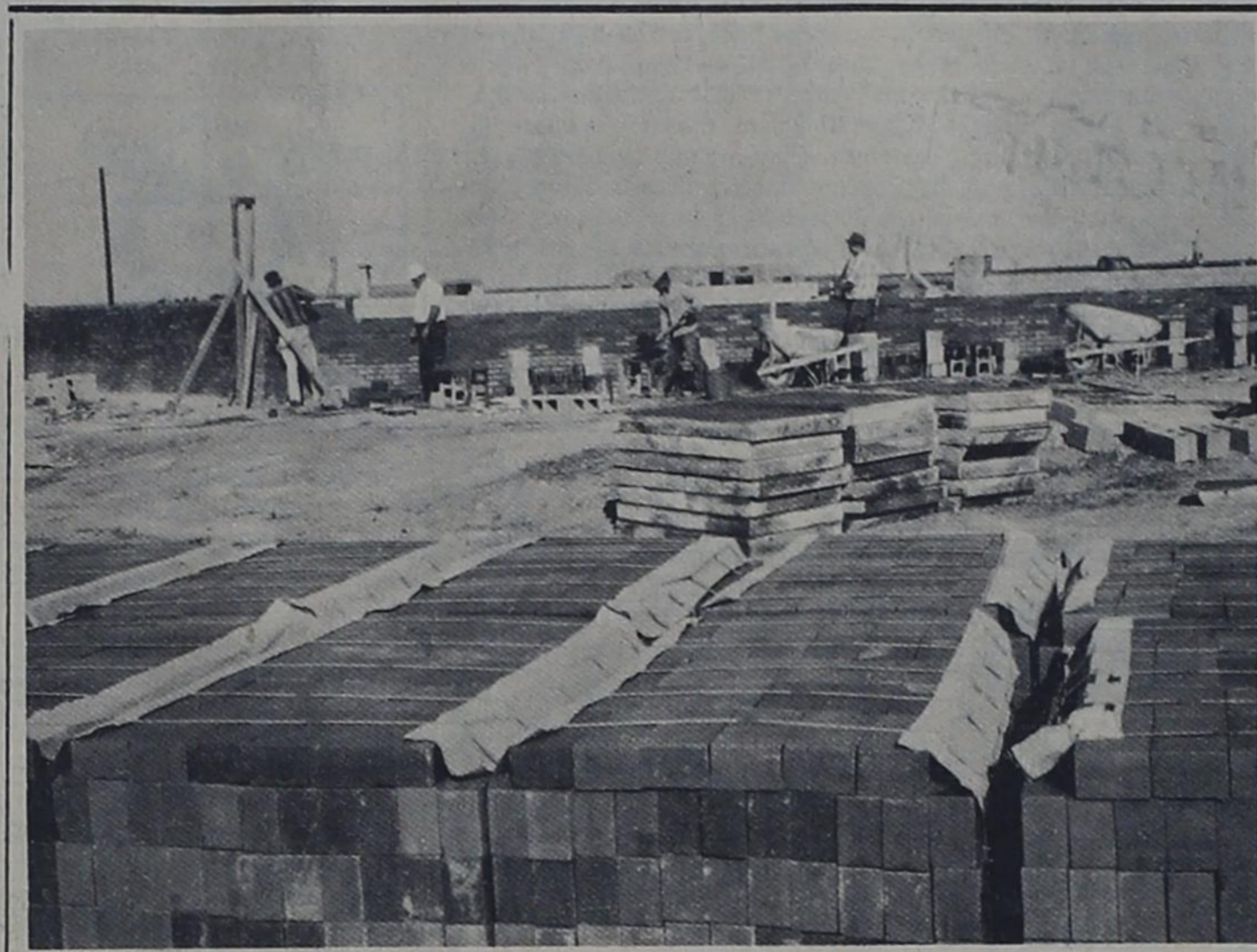

Classes Begin Here Tuesday

With an expected enrollment of approximately 725 students, Bovina Schools begin a new year Tuesday morning.

Two new administrators and several new teachers will be a part of the school system for the 1967-'68 school year. L. F. Jacobs is the new superintendent after being promoted to the head spot from high school principal two weeks ago. Gary Cox, a former grade school principal here, replaces Jacobs as high school principal. (A complete list of faculty members is in a separate story in this issue of The Blade.)

Tuesday will be a regular and complete day of school, according to Jacobs. Classes will begin at the normal time of 8:25 a.m. and will be dismissed at the regular time in the afternoon, 3:45. Busses will run on regular schedule and lunch will be served in the cafeteria. Registration for high school and junior high students scheduled tomorrow (Thursday) and Friday.

Students in grades one through six will be registered Tuesday, the first day of school.

The registration schedule for this week is: Seniors, 9 to 10:30 a.m.; Juniors, 10:30 to 12 noon; Sophomores, 1 to 2:30 p.m.; Freshmen, 2:30 to 4 p.m. Eighth grade students will pre-register from 9:15 to 10:30 Friday morning with seventh grade students to report from 10:30 to 11:45.

New students are requested to register with their classes at the designated times, Jacobs says. They should have a transcript from the last school they attended.

A meeting of all members of the faculty is set for Friday morning at 8:15. This session will be in the school cafeteria.

More than 400 students are expected to enroll in the first six grades. Approximately 100 will be in junior high, the seventh and eighth grades, and about 170 will be in the top four grades.

Principal Templeton expects 70 to 80 first graders to enroll Tuesday even though only 30 were pre-registered last spring.

Fire Destroys Parts Firm

Bovina Auto Parts was destroyed by fire early Thursday morning.

The business, located on Highway 60, consisted of a parts

supply store and an automotive repair shop. It was owned by Sonny Spurlin.

The building which housed the

business was owned by A. R. McCutchan.

The value of the stock was placed by Spurlin at \$40,000 to \$45,000.

The fire started about 7:20 Thursday morning. As he opened the business, Spurlin started the shop pickup which had been stored in the building over-

night. As he did, flames erupted and quickly engulfed the shop area.

Members of Bovina Volunteer Fire Department battled the flames for approximately two hours but were unable to bring the fire under control until the building and its contents, including the pickup, which was a 1963 model Ford, were destroyed.

The fire was considered the most destructive in Bovina in the past decade.

Spurlin said the stock loss was covered by insurance.

\$400 Damage In Accident On Third St.

A two-car collision at the intersection of Third Street and Avenue C Saturday at 10:30 p.m. resulted in no injuries and a total of \$400 in damages.

Bartolo Ledesma, driving a 1960 Chevrolet, failed to control his speed, according to City Marshall Bill Denney, and ran into the rear of a '60 Buick driven by Socorro Saldana of Bovina.

The Saldana car was knocked from the street and into the yard of the E. H. Young home, which is on the northeast corner of the intersection. Ledesma was charged with driving while intoxicated. He was tried in County Court at Farwell Monday.

Damage to the Chevrolet was estimated at \$300 and the Buick's damage was set at \$100.

Bovina Auto Parts had occupied the building since last summer. Spurlin had been in business in Bovina since December of '62. The building formerly housed Bovina Glass and Paint.

Chester Rogers, who was employed as a mechanic at the business, said this week he plans to open an automotive repair shop here in the near future.

Spurlin said his future plans were indefinite.

Phone Serviceman --

General Plans Rep For Bovina

General Telephone Co. has announced plans to station a serviceman in Bovina.

The announcement was made this week by Jerry Kehoe, General's district manager at Littlefield.

He said that approval for the new position had been granted from the company's office in San Angelo and that it would be filled as quickly as formalities can be worked out.

The new job was "posted" for other employees of the company Wednesday of last week, Kehoe said. They have a 30-day period to ask for the job, if none do, then a person from outside the company will be hired for the job here.

Kehoe pointed out that the Bovina position would be an entirely new one and would not affect General's service personnel at Friona, who have been handling maintenance and repair duties in Bovina.

One of the requirements of the new job is that the Bovina serviceman will live in Bovina, Kehoe noted.

The announcement of the General serviceman for Bovina follows a meeting earlier this summer with several Bovina businessmen and phone company officials. The businessmen explained at the meeting that they considered their service from General unsatisfactory.

The company officials, including Kehoe, said that efforts would be made by General to improve the service here.

The district manager indicated that the Friona and Bovina repairmen would work together when they could be of help to each other.

Receives FFA Award --

Mitchell Lone Star Farmer

Larry Mitchell, member of Bovina Future Farmers of America Chapter, has been awarded the state Lone Star Farmer degree. This is the

highest state FFA award, according to John Paul Jones, FFA advisor at Bovina High. The award was received by Mitchell following this summer's 39th annual FFA state convention in Dallas.

Mitchell, 17, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dean McCallum, has had swine and crop projects during his three years as an FFA member.

To be eligible for the Lone Star Farmer award, a boy must have earned a minimum of \$500 from his supervised farming program and be a leader in his FFA chapter as well as in other school activities, according to Jones.

The award is made each year to two per cent of the state's total membership of 50,000 boys, Jones points out.

Mitchell is the first member of the Bovina chapter to receive the award in two years.

Billy Marshall was awarded the Lone Star Farmer degree in 1965.

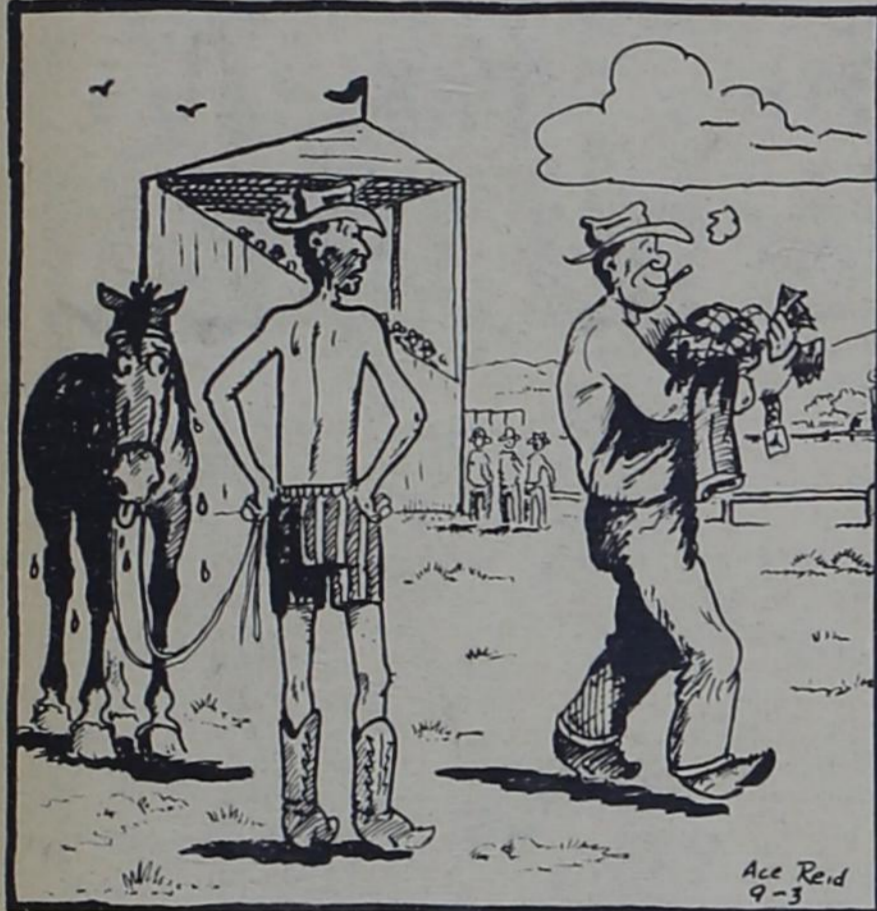

Know The Truth

Do you realize that one can be a Christian, yet not be a member of any denomination? Do you further realize that none of the denominations that we see about us existed in the first century, but the church that Jesus set up did exist? There were Christians then, Acts 11:26. Do you ridicule the Churches of Christ for their saying that they are not a denomination? All we want to be is just Christians, no more and no less. Historically, the Churches of Christ are the result of an effort to restore the purity of the church that Jesus built of which the apostles and early Christians were members. We try to reproduce the exact pattern of doctrine and practice of that church we read about in the New Testament: for instance, Acts 2:47, "And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." We do not claim a line of succession in organization back to the New Testament times. Further, we doubt that any group can trace its succession in an unbroken chain back to the apostles. Even if it could be proved that some group could find its beginning in the first century, it would take more than that to prove that it is the church that Jesus built. Paul taught there would be a departing from the faith, or a falling away, I Timothy 4:1, and II Thessalonians 2:3. All one has to do to see that the departure came is to read church history, and compare the teaching and practices of denominations with the New Testament. The teaching of Jesus and the apostles was the pattern by which the first century church was built. All religious building today must be done by the same pattern, Colossians, 3:17, "And what soever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by him." Also, we are plainly told in II Timothy 3:16-17, that the inspired Scriptures furnish us completely in all matters of teaching, reproof, correction, and instruction in righteousness. If the Scriptures are given to guide us why should we be guided by our opinions?

Following such hearing, assessments will be levied against each and every parcel of property abutting upon said street, within the limits above defined, and the real and true owners thereof, for that portion of the costs of said improvements determined by said City Council to be payable by such abutting properties, and the real and true owners thereof, and said assessments shall be and constitute a first and prior lien upon said abutting property, from the date said improvements were ordered by said City Council and shall be a personal liability and charge against the real and true owners thereof, as of said date, whether such property be described or correctly described, or such real and true owners be named, or correctly named in such proceedings or not, and no error or mistake or discrepancy in the names of such owner or owners or in describing said property in this notice or in any of said proceedings with reference to said improvements, shall invalidate any assessments or certificate issued in evidence thereof, but nevertheless, each parcel of property abutting upon said streets, and the real and true owner or owners thereof, shall be charged with, and be liable for, said assessment which shall be valid whether or not such owner or owners be named or correctly named, or such property be described or correctly described, all as provided for under the Acts of the 40th Legislature of the State of Texas, First Called Session, Chapter 106, known and shown as Article 1105-b, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended, and as adopted by the Charter of the City of Bovina, Texas, under which said improvements, proceedings and assessments are being constructed, performed and levied.

Of all said matters and things, all owning or claiming any such abutting property or any interest therein, as well as all others in anywise interested or affected by the things and matters mentioned herein, will take notice.

Miss Linda Johnston became the bride of Richard Allen Lakin Saturday night, August 19, in the First Baptist Church of Bovina.

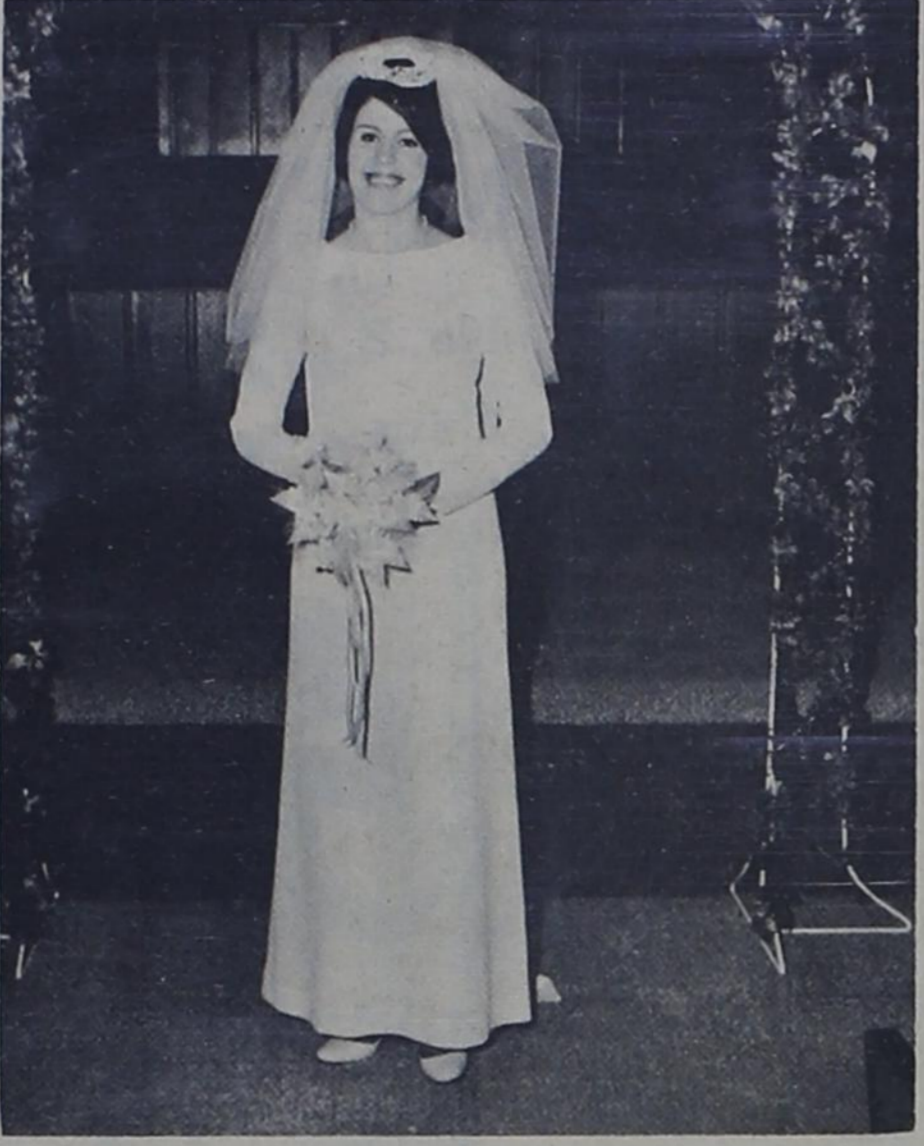
Rev. Gene Snodgrass read the double ring vows before an arch of greenery flanked by baskets of giant orange mums and orange tapers.

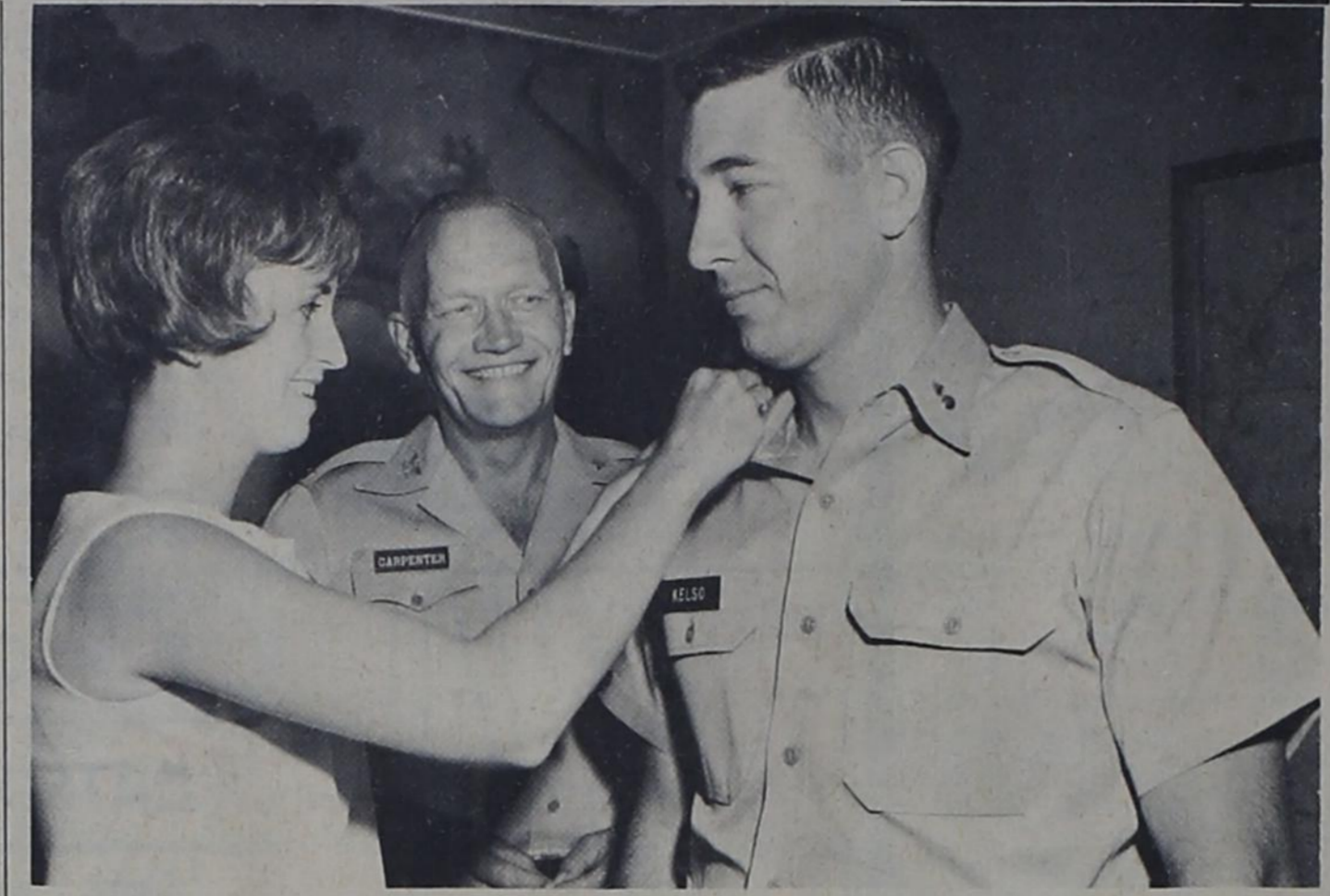

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:

"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, for the purposes prescribed by law.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

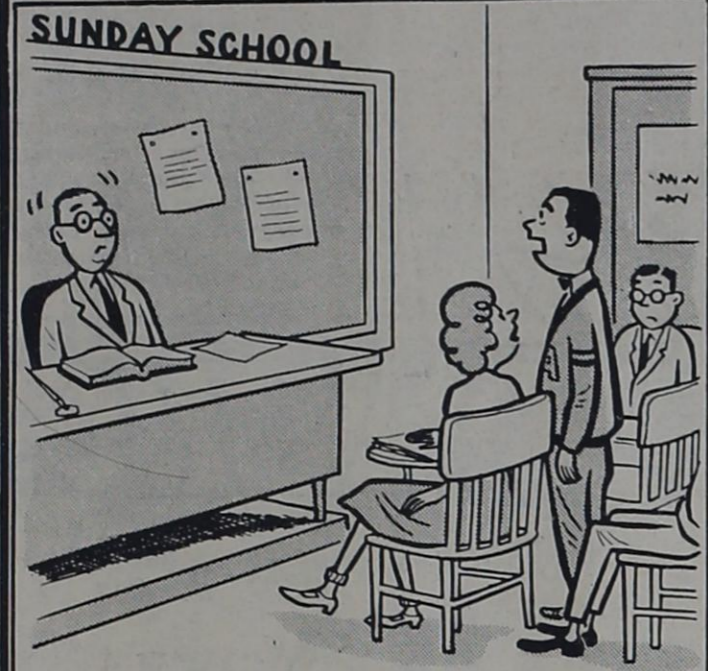
Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."

European Trip Highlights Told By Gwen Christian

Gwen Christian, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wendol Christian,

returned last week from Europe where she toured Norway, Germany and visited England.

Gwen left Lubbock by jet August 2. She flew from Lubbock to Dallas, New York and on to Oslo, Norway where she was met by Trudy Skjerve, exchange student in Bovina during 1965-66.

She stayed at the home of Trudy for several days. They visited islands around Trudy's home as well as mountains, and the capital of Norway, Oslo. Gwen noted that she visited several churches and the market place. One of her greatest surprises was the breakfast meal. Cheese, hard bread and butter make up an ordinary breakfast for the family. Sweetened Beet Deal

Results of negotiations between the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association and John Bunker, new president of Holly Sugar Corp., have brought growers an improved contract for the 1968 crop.

James W. Witherspoon of Hereford, executive secretary of the beet growers association, announces that larger initial payments, price per ton, hauling allowance and additional piling facilities may all be a part of the contract. He outlined these points:

1) The price per ton will be increased again by another 30 cents per ton for the beets delivered by the grower;

2) The company will pay a hauling allowance of 5 cents per mile per ton that beets are hauled over ten miles to the factory or a dump; and

3) The company will place pilers near Widorado and Dimmitt and other points, beginning stockpiling on the ground sometime in November and thus release growers to harvest all the beets they can as fast as possible. This action on the part of Holly will accelerate harvesting operations, the growers say, cutting time down considerably from the three months it has required in the past.

Growers are also hopefully anticipating a larger initial payment on their beets; the payment to the farmer is based on sugar content (checked as the beets are first brought to the Holly mill) and the anticipated price of sugar. The initial payment is followed by smaller payments throughout the year, with the final payment coming after the selling price of the sugar has been seen. The 1968 initial payment is expected to be based on a higher sugar selling price.

The new contract, to replace the old Red River Valley contract, will be as good a contract as anyone in the beet growing business has, the growers believe.

California, in certain parts of its contract, has a little higher per ton payment, but there are other offsetting conditions. At 17 per cent sugar, the new contract is better, if sugar content is over the 17 per cent mark (payments to farmers are based both on anticipated sugar selling price and the sugar content). At 16 per cent sugar, the new contract is about 15 cents under California.

Market conditions differ in California, Witherspoon pointed out, because of cane sugar competition. Cane sugar also has marked effects on prices of Holly's beet sugar in the South.

the Farmers & Manufacturers Beet Sugar Association, and Witherspoon of the Texas-New Mexico group, along with presidents of the five organized growing areas, are engaged in working on price factors and other national undertakings for the benefit of sugar beet growers, Witherspoon said. They also are watching the administration of the Sugar Act, as

well as additional amendments to this legislation.

Holly has agreed to delay the 1967 harvest until Oct. 5 this year, Witherspoon pointed out, with better sugar content to be a likely result. Holly has also provided a new piler and converted an older one into an end and side dump piler which will allow for faster deliveries in 1967.

A great many of the growers had to replant this year, the association secretary said, and Holly agreed to take this factor into consideration. The growers' association, with 675 members, has 32,000 acres in sugar beets this year, with predictions aimed at 40,000 acres next year. President of the association is Jay Boston of Hereford.
