

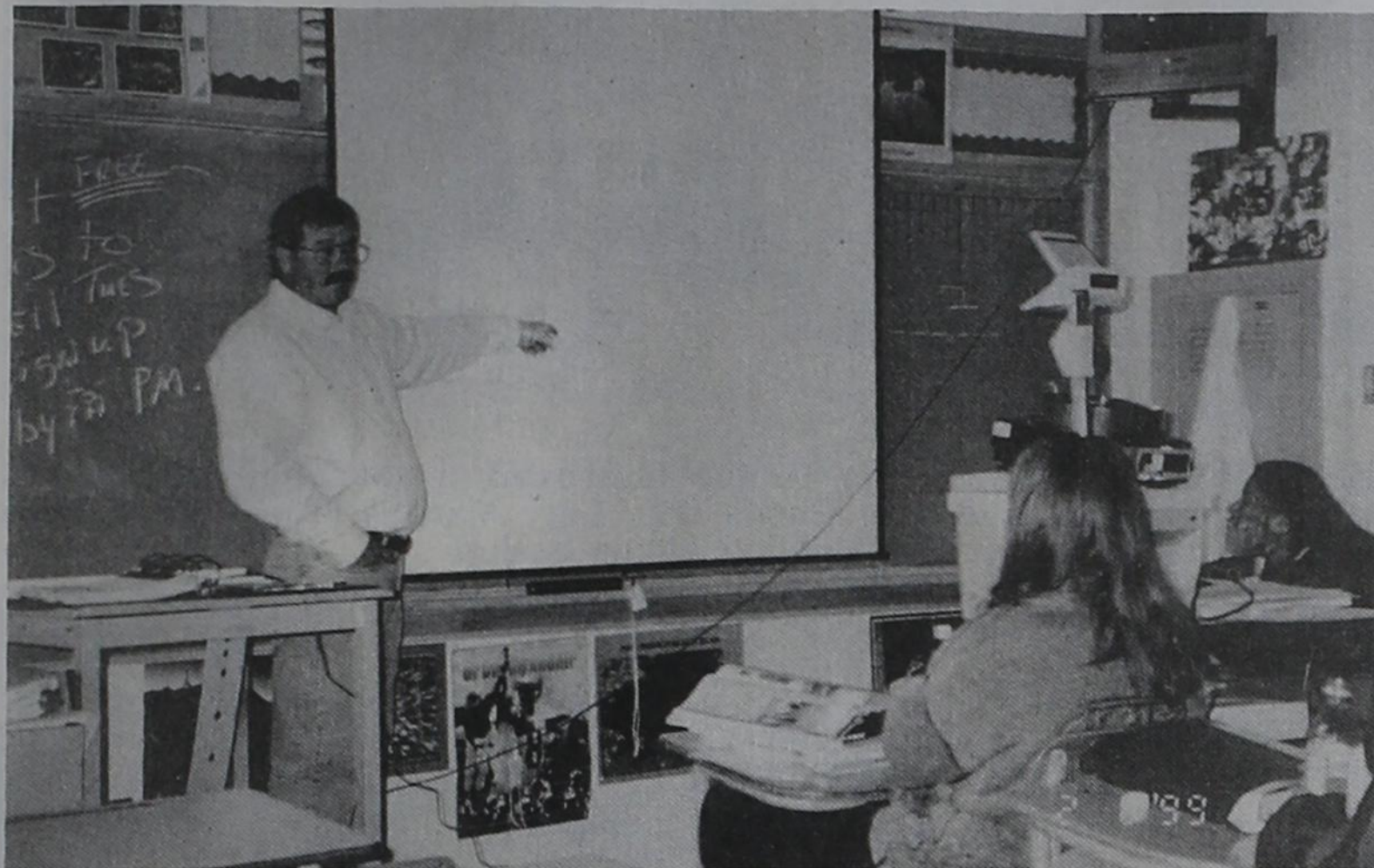

## Scroggins Relates Santa Fe Prison Riot Experiences

Nineteen years ago this month, Bruce Scroggins was coaching at Gattis Junior High in Clovis, preparing his basketball teams for a big tournament.

He was 30-years-old, married, coaching and a member of the New Mexico National Guard. Life was pretty good.

Then a phone call came that would affect him and others and provide strong memories that remain to this day.

On February 2-3, 1980, the worst prison riot in U. S. history took place at Santa Fe. It lasted only 36 hours but resulted in 33 deaths, most of them, according to Scroggins, gruesome reminders of man's inhumanity to man.

Scroggins' National Guard unit was called to the prison scene and spent 7 days on-site. He was an E6, "a mess sergeant", in charge of a ten-man squad who cooked for the prisoners and the guards and all the ancillary

personnel on the scene tending to the riot's aftermath.

At the time the prison held minimum, medium, and maximum security prisoners. They were housed in separate wings of the prison.

Minimum security inmates lived in dormitory style cell blocks, about 40 to a dorm, sleeping in bunk beds.

Maximum security inmates were at the opposite end of the cell blocks in solitary or two-man cells. The entire prison system was controlled by a single control room in the center of the prison units.

Because of the mixed population, prison officials used a "snitch" system as a form of control. By snitching to authorities about prison activity, many hardened prisoners were punished with solitary confinement, made to wear body casts, and other harsh punishment.

Needless to say, snitches were an endangered species inside the Santa Fe prison.

In the early morning of February 2, 1980, the

minimum security prisoners who lived in the dorms were partying with their own "homemade brew" which was not allowed inside the prison.

A couple of guards, attempting to break up the brew party, were overpowered by the gang of minimum inmates. The guards had left a gate unlocked.

The minimum inmates stormed through, using metal pipes and rods ripped from bunks, they took over the central control room.

Then in a huge miscalculation, the prisoners opened all the prison's gates and released all inmates.

## Drug Bust In Farwell Nets Two

According to a press release from Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa, a law enforcement raid on Wednesday, February 17, resulted in the arrest of Kindell Ray Coates and Kimberly E. Coates of Farwell.

Two Farwell Police Department search warrants were executed at 113 Sandia, and at a Farm Supply business at 1017 Avenue A, both in Farwell.

According to Chief McGaa, small amounts of drugs, marijuana, and paraphernalia were seized. What appeared to be a small pornography studio was located at the business address, with dozens of tapes seized pending a decision by the District Attorney.

Commenting on the searches and arrests, Chief McGaa said, "Once again this is the result of agencies pooling their information. When we work together we can accomplish much."

Intelligence information was collected from the Texico Police Department, Farwell Police Department, Parmer County Sheriff's Department and the District Attorney's investigator.

The search warrants were executed by the Parmer County Sheriff's Office, Texico Police, Friona Police, and DA investigator Julian Dominguez.

## Alert Parmer Co. Dispatcher Aids In Capture of Fugitives

Thanks to the sharp memory of a Parmer County Sheriff's Office dispatcher, law enforcement officers were able to capture a Kansas fugitive in a rural area near Lazbuddie.

The 20-year-old Laotian national had stolen a 1997 GEO Tracker in Liberal, Kansas and driven to Pagosa Springs, Colorado, accompanied by a male juvenile. Once there, they picked up two female juveniles and the four drove the vehicle to the Lazbuddie area where they stayed with relatives, according to a Sheriff's office press release.

The Parmer County Sheriff's office received a tip from the Archuleta County Sheriff's Department in Pagosa Springs that the suspect, considered armed and dangerous, might be in the Lazbuddie area.

Sheriff's office dispatcher Melissa Garrison remembered the last name of the suspect from a previous case handled by the Sheriff's office. She looked up the past complaint

and was able to pinpoint the area for officers.

Following a search, officers located the vehicle and the suspect was arrested without incident. He was identified as Anoulack Chandara.

Also arrested was Anouly Chandara, 17, the suspect's sister. She was charged with harboring a fugitive and remains in Parmer County jail at press time.

Anoulack Chandara was extradited and has been picked up by Kansas authorities.

The three juveniles were

transported to Amarillo where at least two had been released to the custody of their parents.

Officers involved in the arrests were Sgt. Gary Blair and Deputy Joe Lopez, Jr., of the Parmer County Sheriff's Department, and State Highway Patrol troopers Isabel Carrasco of Farwell and Ron Mann of Dimmitt.

Sheriff Yerger said that thanks to dispatcher Garrison's keen memory and recall of details, the officers were able to apprehend the suspects quickly and safely.

## Coach Tells Of Harrowing Experience

went on a killing spree, targeting many of the snitches that had informed on them. According to Scroggins, who witnessed the immediate aftermath, most of the killings were brutal and gruesome.

He told his students that inmates were killed with grinders, cutting torches, beaten to death and burned.

Scroggins said his crew arrived at the prison during a blizzard, set up a tent and mess hall, and "cooked whatever they brought us. They bought whatever they could find to buy. They would bring items like 100 pounds of bologna and rice and we had to find ways to cook it." He said they did lots of hamburger.

His crew fed about 400 people each meal. Their customers were phone maintenance, forensics, and other support persons. Scroggins said he and his men were paid \$40 per day during their 7 days at the prison.

He had an opportunity to walk through the prison soon after the riot ended. The smells and sights, he said, stayed with him for several months after and that he still thinks of the evil a couple of times a year.

At one cell, an inmate had locked himself in for

safety but others used a cutting torch to get into the cell. Then they used the torch to torture and kill the inmate. Scroggins said the cell, bunk, and wall were all burned from the violence.

He said that everything that could be burned or destroyed was. Only the gas chamber and the Catholic Chapel were not damaged.

At another cell, they were told that was where an inmate had been beheaded with a spatula.

Scroggins took pictures. He gave a talk and slide presentation to his 4th period biology class on February 9, hoping to make a point about life in prison.

The prison is closed now. It was closed for good in 1997. But folks like Bruce Scroggins will long remember the dreary winter of the prison riot as an example of how man can manifest his non-sensitivity to human life.

# Cotton News



from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

William B. Dunavant, Jr. and Congressman Charles Stenholm have been confirmed as speakers for the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. (PCG) 42nd Annual Meeting April 9, 1999.

PCG's meeting will be held in the Civic Center Theater at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center beginning with registration at 8:30 a.m.

Dunavant will be asked to discuss the current situation regarding the cotton market and present his thoughts about cotton's prospects during the 1999 marketing year.

Congressman Stenholm will be discussing the current legislative climate in Washington and his thoughts on the future of crop insurance reform, Step 2 and other important cotton issues.

In addition to the speakers currently announced reports will also be presented by PCG President Don Langston and Executive Vice President Steve Verett. Updates will also be presented on the status of the Plains Cotton Improvement Program and boll weevil eradication.

The afternoon of April 9 the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be presenting a producer workshop tentatively entitled "Managing the Boll Weevil On Your Own in 1999". Focus of the event will be taking a step by step walk through boll weevil management during each stage of cotton crop development. Attention will also be placed on what producers should expect as they enter into diapause treatments as part of a full-scale eradication program.

Delegates to the National Cotton Council have agreed on a unified position regarding the effort to revitalize the recently ended Step 2 portion of the 1996 Farm Bill's Cotton Competitiveness Provisions.

Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) is supporting the NCC policy and will work with the NCC to revitalize the Step 2 Program.

The NCC's Step 2 policy includes agreement by the industry to seek procurement of additional funding for the Step 2 with safeguards to prevent the depletion funds in the middle of a marketing year. It will also include:

- Language supporting the continued use of the current world price formula for loan redemption purposes.

- A return to the 1.25 cent trigger level for Step 2.

- Discontinuance of the use of Step 2 values when calculating Step 3 when the monthly projection of season-end US stocks fall below 16 percent.

- Reducing the number of weeks of non-competitive prices from 10 to 4 to trigger import quotas under Step 3.

- Cap the quantity of Step 3 import quotas that can be landed during the marketing year at a level equal to 5 weeks of domestic mill use.

- To include the option of Step 2 payment recipients to receive those payments in cash or generic certificates.

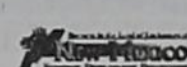

Excel Corporation has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) for issuance of Air Quality Permit No. 40299 to authorize expansion of a Bone Dryer and Bone Grinding Mill located on Highway 60, one mile southwest of Friona, Parmer County, Texas. The existing facility will emit the following air contaminants: particulate matter and the products from the combustion of natural gas including (but not limited to) oxides of nitrogen, volatile organic compounds, sulfur dioxide, and carbon monoxide. A person who may be affected by air contaminants emitted from the proposed changes to the facility may request a hearing.

If the applicant demonstrates the proposed changes to the facility will comply with all applicable air quality requirements, the applicant will qualify for issuance of a permit. The subject of a hearing would be limited to applicable air quality requirements, which do not include issues such as water quality, noise, traffic safety, or zoning. If a hearing is held, it will be a legal proceeding similar to civil trials in state district court.

To request a hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) the applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement, "I/we request a public hearing;" (4) a brief, specific statement of how and why emissions from the proposed changes to the facility would adversely affect you in a way not common to members of the general public; and (5) the location of your property relative to the facility.

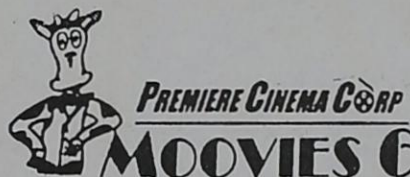

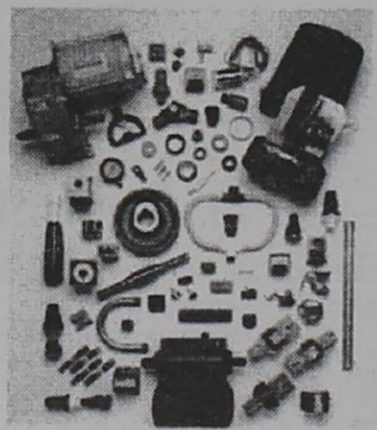
