Rocky Mountain Shows To Open Here Aug. 29

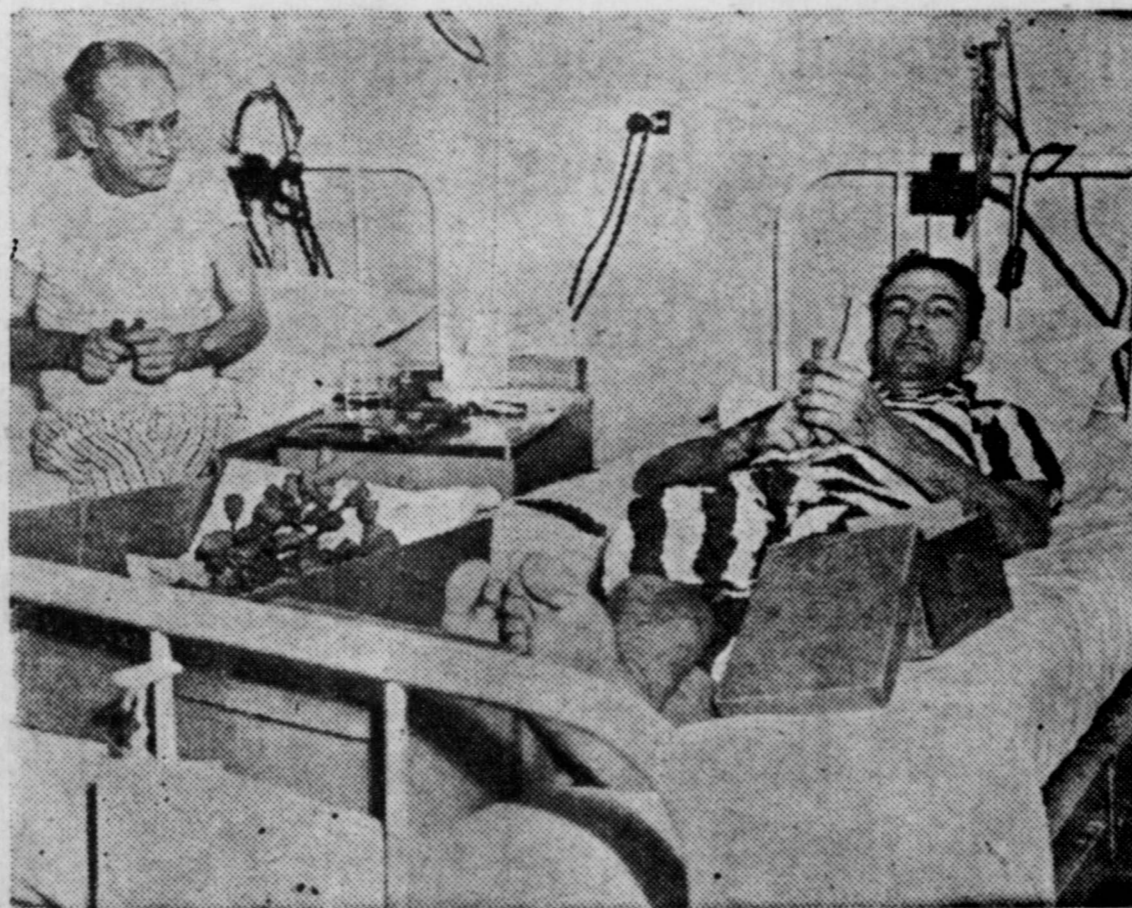
World famous Rocky Amusements will move onto the carnival grounds across from the City Hall on Wednesday, October 29, and remain through the forthcoming Festival.

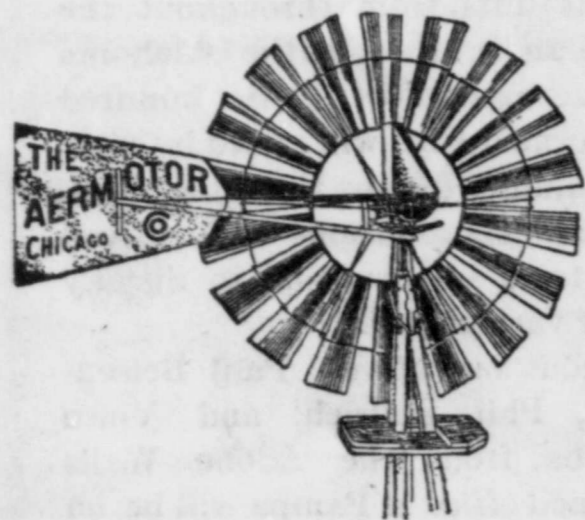

Streets To Be Blocked

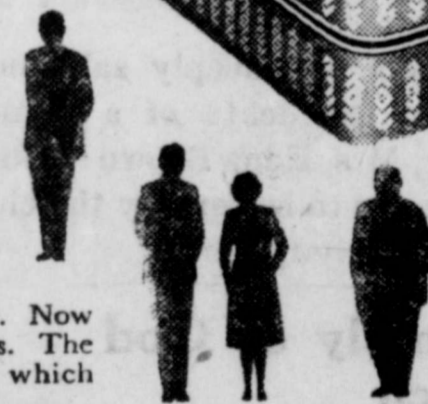

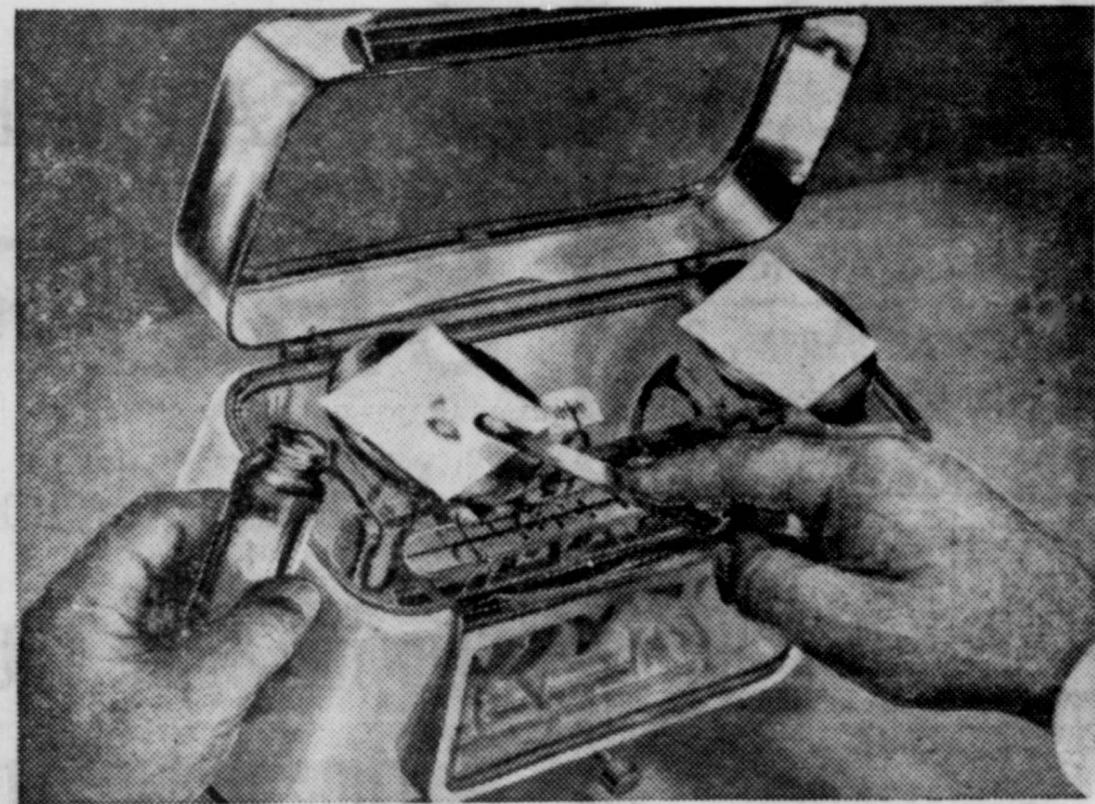
