TO BECOME A MILLIONAIRE.
 Andrew Carnegie Tells the Method by Which to Accumulate Money.
 First.—Concentrate your mind and effort upon one pursuit. It does not matter much what that pursuit is, so that it be useful and honorable, and be the first authority in that. Of course you have heard the advice, "Not to put all your eggs in one basket." It is not long since I first told young men to reject that advice and pursue just the contrary course. "Put all your eggs in one basket and then watch that basket." More men fell to win competence and wealth from disregard of this advice and from scattering one's shot than from any other cause.
 Second.—You must not be content with simply performing the part assigned to you. You must do something beyond that. Watch your employer's interest at every point, no matter whether it is in your special province or not. Do not hesitate to appraise him promptly of anything that you see in any part of his business which does not commend itself to your judgment. You have heard, "Obey orders if you break owners." Do not let the graduate of old Union be so stupid. Break them any time if you are clear that breaking orders will save owners. Go boldly to your employer, point out to him how foolish he has been in giving such orders. Believe me, the young man who does not know the business of his special department much better than his employer has not the elements of the future millionaire in him.
 Another point, never try to make too good a bargain either for yourself or for your employer. Be always fair, avoiding anything like sharp practice. It is a poor bargain when both parties are not benefited and therefore happy at having made it. Every unjust advantage taken in business sooner or later proves a serious disadvantage. Men who become great millionaires, co-operating as they must with others, must secure and hold the implicit confidence of their associates and bear a reputation as being in all things fair, liberal and considerate. Their word must be better than their bond and their desire to do the fair and liberal thing better than either word or bond.
 Never speculate. The man who gambles in stocks in Wall street is not more culpable than he who gambles at Monte Carlo, but he has much less sense, because the chances of winning and losing are not as equally divided in New York as at the regular gambling establishment. The life of a speculator of course is the life of a gambler, and this is fatal to the development of the reasoning and judging faculties in man. It is a life of intense excitement, fatal to thought and to study. Avoid speculation as you would prosper not only in wealth, but in health, happiness and honor. Besides this a moral consideration should prevent you. The man who wins the money of others and exchanges it for his money in exchange, and who should be in a return for some service rendered.
 It is indispensable that the future competence maker or millionaire should begin to save a portion of his earnings early, no matter how small these earnings may be. It is a great mistake, gentlemen, to think that good habits and ability go unrecognized in this age. The millionaire employer is constantly keeping his eye open just for these qualities in young men. It is not capital that he desires, but ability, character and good, thrifty habits. Begin to lay by a portion of your earnings every month and keep up that habit, and I should like to insure you at a very low rate your future millionariness. —Address by Andrew Carnegie.

Flying Machines.
 "Some of the leading mathematicians in England, after witnessing my experiments," says Hiram S. Maxim in The Century, "have publicly stated that the lifting effect of an aeroplane placed at a low angle and traveling at a high velocity is very much greater than had been heretofore supposed, and all the conditions are much more favorable. Had this knowledge been available and had it been known 20 years ago we should have had plenty of flying machines in the world today. If one-half the money, the time and the talent which have been employed by the French balloon corps in their fruitless attempts to construct a navigable balloon should now be employed in the right direction, the whole question of aerial navigation would soon be so perfected that flying machines would be as common as torpedo boats, and the whole system of modern warfare would be completely changed."

Starfish and Oyster.
 The starfish kills the oyster by enveloping it closely in his arms; then, placing his mouth to the crevice of the shell, he injects a very acrid and venomous juice within. The poor oyster, disgusted by the poison, opens his shell to admit water and so kills himself of it, and thus falls a prey to the destroyer.

REAL BOUILLABAISSE.
 The Secret of Its Confection Made Known by an Expert at Making It.
 Since the days when Thackeray fancifully sang the praises of bouillabaisse there have been many people who would have liked to know what he was singing about. Many of them have waited for a trip to France for enlightenment, but by far the greater number would probably have difficulty in distinguishing real bouillabaisse if set before them from such a dish as haggis. Each, as they know, is something strange, but they don't know where to get it, and they wouldn't know if it they did get it.
 There is a French restaurant downtown where they make bouillabaisse, and it is probably just as good as it is made anywhere. On bouillabaisse days, which come twice or three times a week, the dish is put on the bill of fare in big black type, and you'll be extremely lucky if you get any if you are not on hand just when it's taken from the pot. There are Frenchmen in this town who go to that restaurant just for the sake of the bouillabaisse, and they like it so much that it is usually scratched off the bill within an hour or so, because by that time it is all gone.
 Bouillabaisse, you'll learn after eating it, is nothing more or less than fish chowder, but it is a chowder unlike any other. Nothing can be made that will taste like it, no matter how hard you may try. The people who like it say that nothing can supply its place, and even those who don't like it say that it has a taste peculiar to itself.
 The chef of this particular restaurant is a great bouillabaisse maker, having learned all about the art in the old country. He is proud of his bouillabaisse, but he doesn't like to tell the secret of its confection. However, if you go to him as a lover of the dish and speak of it in tones of proper respect and awe, he may tell you how to make it so you may try it for yourself. And if he tells you it will probably be in this way, as he told the other day:
 "Ze bouillabaisse," he said, "is ze grande dish of ze French peoples. Eet is ze work of art. We call eet ze bouillabaisse de Marseilles because zet is vare zey make him to ze perfection. Eet is vat you call ze blend of olive oil, of sauterno and ze many kinds feesh. Ze feesh should be long. Eet is better so.
 "For ze dish for eight persons I take ze six pound of feesh. I take one pound of cod, one pound of parrot, two pound of flounder, two pound of ze rockfish. I cut zem in slice like I fry zem. Zen I have ze 24 mussel. Ze mussel is necessary for ze bouillabaisse.
 "I put ze feesh and ze mussel in ze casserole—vat you call saucepan—and pour on zem one pint bottle ze olive oil, one pint bottle ze sauterno. Nex' a little water and a little salt and peppaire. So much for ze feesh in ze casserole.
 "Now I take ze small bag of linen and put in him two tomatoes, six onions sliced, two cloves, two bay leaves, two sliced tomatoes and ze little snip of ze orange peel. I tie zem in ze bag and drop in ze casserole. Zen I have ready a handful of parsley, chopped fine as possible, and throw in. Eet is now ready for ze fire.
 "I put on quick fire, hot. Let him boil hard for ze minutes, no more, no less. He is ready. I put for each portion in bowl small piece of toasted bread. I pour casserole out—eight portions. Voila, he is ready!
 "You eat him? You like bouillabaisse? Bon, you now know vat ze bouillabaisse he is." —New York Sun

Silk in America.
 Although the United States has been but 50 years in the manufacture of silk goods, it is said to stand second in that branch of industry. The only nation to excel this country is France. In European factories the speed of the spindles ranges from 2,500 to 4,000 revolutions per minute. Here it runs up to 12,000 and 15,000 per minute. These high speed spindles are not a monopoly, but with automatic attachments of one kind and another save labor on a grand scale. There is, for example, a belt spinner, obviating the use of hands, one belt touching the flanges of all the spindles and turning them uniformly. A weaver or spinner from Europe entering an American silk factory often has difficulty in telling what process the unfamiliar machinery is engaged on. Fifty per cent of the raw silk imported into this country comes from Japan.—Philadelphia Press.

A Good Joke on Eli Perkins.
 Eli Perkins, the humorist, visited the capital of Christian several years ago. His audience was so very small—not over half a dozen people—that Colonel Al Clark, who was to introduce the lecturer, led him to the footlights and presented him to his auditors one at a time, introducing each of them by name. Perkins was completely nonplused. He was covered with confusion, declined to lecture and acknowledged that the joke was on him and ended by inviting all heads to go with him. Most of them went, and Eli has never been heard since.—Hopkinsville Kentuckian.

Bills Passed at Austin.

Austin, Texas, April 6.—While the Twenty-fourth Legislature has a well-earned reputation for doing a wondrous amount of talking, a glance at the list of bills which has become laws with and without Gov. Culberson's executive approval will demonstrate the fact that the solons have not been altogether idle when they were not speechifying. An investigation of the matter elicits the information that thirty bills have been passed and are now in the hands of Capt. Thornton, assistant Secretary of State. Of this number eighteen bear the stamp of the Governor's approbation, while twelve have become laws without his signature. This is a good record for signing bills as compared to that of his predecessor, though it might have been better still. Of course the Legislature has passed bills which have been vetoed, to say nothing of the long list of measures which have decapitated in the two houses and other work, but the thirty acts referred to stand for the down right results of its deliberations. The bills and concurrent resolutions which have been signed by Gov. Culberson are as follows:

Act changing the statute relative to municipal elections so all qualified voters may vote for all the aldermen.

Act amending the law of limitation so that it will run against married women over 21 years of age.

Act to revive charters that have lapsed by reason of a failure to pay the franchise tax.

Act to provide for the distribution of the direct tax.

Act to regulate the insurance of executions upon judgments of courts of record to prevent such records from becoming dormant.

Act to authorize the sale of State property by the State health officer.

Act to provide for the contingent expenses of the Legislature.

Act to transfer Smith and Gregg counties from the Fifth to the First Supreme Judicial District.

Act amending the law fixing the rate of occupation tax to be paid by merchants.

Act making appropriation with which to pay the mileage and per diem of members of the Legislature.

Act provide for the choice of trial judges in case where justice of the peace are disqualified.

Act to provide colored trustees for colored schools.

Concurrent resolution authorizing John B. Hood Camp to erect a monument within the Capital grounds.

Act to transfer the Smith and Gregg county cases from one Court of Civil Appeals to another.

Act amending the irrigation bill passed by the present Legislature.

Act amending the road law passed for Cherokee and other counties.

Act to restore civil and criminal jurisdictions to the county court of Gregg.

Concurrent resolution authorizing John B. Hood Camp to select the site for a monument in the Capital grounds.

Act to authorize the disposal of the surplus water from the artesian well at the Orphan's Home at Corsicana.

Act fixing the time for holding court in the Fifteenth Judicial District.

Act fixing the time for holding court in the Forty-sixth Judicial District.

Act to constitute the State Treasurer custodian of the bonds of the State of Texas.

The acts that have become laws without the Governor's approval are as follows:

Act to authorize the State Firemen's Association to erect a monument on the Capital grounds.

Act to encourage immigration.

Act authorizing the consolidation of the La Porte and other lines of railway.

Act granting relief to railroad corporations that have not complied with all the requirements of their charters by giving them further time.

Concurrent resolution authorizing the Land Commissioner to suspend forfeiture of public lands in the drouth-stricken districts.

Act raising the limit of theft constituting a misdemeanor from \$20 to \$50.

Act to restore civil and criminal Jurisdiction to the county court of Delta.

Act to create a more efficient road system for Fannin, Kaufman and Robertson counties.

Act creating a court with civil and criminal jurisdiction at Texarkana, Bowie county.

Act creating a road system for Cooke, Hill and other counties.

Act giving the board of regents of the State University the management of the University lands.

Act creating a road system for Bexar county.

Act amending the scalp law.

Act to establish the boundaries of cities and towns in this State and to validate their incorporation.

Stevens & Stanley sold to Godair & Cooper 1,300 head of muttons at \$2 a head wool off.

G. W. Whitehead & Sons sold to Godair & Cooper 1,000 head of muttons at \$2 a head wool off.

G. & H. A. Haby of Elward's county sold to Sam Butler of San Angelo 520 muttons at \$2 a head wool off.

F. Mayer & Sons sold to Godair & Cooper, 2100 head of mixed sheep, wool off at \$2 a head.

Jesse Mayfield sold to Geo. L. Abbott, 150 or more 3 and 4 year old steers at \$17 and \$20.

Geo. H. McDonald sold to Geo. L. Abbott, 50 or more 3 and 4 year old steers at \$16 and \$19.

Fritz Schwalbe of Crockett county sold 500 head of muttons to Chas Schauer at \$2.25 a head, with wool off.

Dragoo & Arnet bought from Lem Henderson of the South Llano his stock of cattle, range delivery for \$11,000.

A. A. DeBerry bought from Jerry Ellis of Edwards county 400 head of steers at 9, 12, 15 and \$18 a head for 1's 2's 3's and 4's respectively.

It was reported in Sonora this week that the bottom had dropped out of the mutton market. The associated press report for April 10th says: With 1100 head on the Chicago market sheep were weak and 10c lower, but later prices recovered on better general buying. Sheep sold on a basis of \$2.75 to 4.85, sales being largely at \$4.20 and upward. Lambs sold at \$4 to 5.75.

The Kansas City and St. Louis markets were steady on the same day.

From the Del Rio Record.

Tom White sold 520 head of muttons to John Ball at private figures. The latter shipped them to market from Del Rio yesterday.

No more stock can be imported through the port of Del Rio until further notice, so Deputy Inspector Jones informs us. Cattle will have to come through the port at Eagle Pass.

P. W. Thompson of Maverick county, sold James McLymont of Kinney county, 15,000 head of sheep at private terms. These sheep are all in excellent condition, and will be shipped to market at once from Spofford.—Del Rio Record.

From the Chicago Drivers Journal:

Strictly choice live stock of any kind seems to be scarce enough to command very good prices.

The packers and meat dealers, especially in the East, are feeling the burden of the advanced cost of live stock and are making a strong effort to advance prices.

The foreign demand for hedges keeps remarkably good. In fact the competition from this source has been the backbone of the trade for some time and prices have held up very well even with unprecedented receipts. There seems to be more horses in the country than any other class of stock as compared with former years and the foreign outlet is certainly better than it ever was before. A large part of the horses shipped to Europe are used for street service in buses and cabs. It is truly fortunate that the outlet is so good at present or the heavy supplies would paralyze the business.

It is more than probable that Chicago will receive a liberal supply of far Western sheep this year as many of it not more than in former years. The system of marketing them, however, has been materially changed. The lack of feed in Nebraska has driven sheep feeders from that section entirely, and outside of Colorado not many sheep are being fed in the West by old-time feeders. Sheepmen in Oregon and Washington have decided to try the experiment of fattening their own sheep and shipping direct to Chicago. They have an abundance of wheat and barley, and they see no reason why it can't be done with profit. Heretofore they have sold their sheep as stockers to middlemen, who have fed them in Colorado, Kansas and Nebraska, but the latter have lost so heavily during the past two years that the business has dwindled to very small proportions.—Drovers Journal.
