THANKSGIVING has become synonymous with gorging on turkey and all the trimmings, and watching football games on TV.

Today's generation of football fans probably can't recall a time when this "ritual" was not performed. A genius named Tex Schramm managed to talk the National Football League into allowing his Dallas Cowboys to play a home game each year on Thanksgiving Day, much to the delight of football fans across the state.

This has turned out to be a natural "pairing" with the Detroit Lions, who are the other NFL team that hosts a Thanksgiving Day game. The Lions had been doing their Turkey Day thing for countless years, and their annual game, usually accompanied by a snowstorm, was a natural for the NFL and its television audience. Today, the Lions play their home games in the Silverdome, which gets them out of the snow on Thanksgiving.

The addition of the Cowboys' game allowed Detroit to play the "early" game, and Dallas the "late" game. The schedule-makers have even been challenged to arrange it where both NFL networks--CBS and NBC--are involved. This year the Cowboys, usually seen on CBS, switch to NBC (the Steelers' "home network,") as Detroit plays NFC rival Chicago.

Another regular Thanksgiving Day game is the University of Texas vs Texas Aggies. This battle between Lone Star State teams has been played on Turkey Day for well over 70 years--and it has the honor of being the first football game ever to be broadcast on the radio, pioneering not only the Thanksgiving Day TV football broadcasts, but all of them.

It all started on Thanksgiving Day, 1919, from the Aggies' Kyle Field. A pair of Texas A&M electrical engineering students, William A. Tolson and H.C. Dillingham, came up with the idea, and brought about the first crude broadcast.

There were very few radios in 1919, and the students had no microphone. So they devised a telegraph method and offered their "broadcast" to daily newspapers and the few radio stations across the state. Virtually all were interested.

Dillingham tapped out the code to his waiting audience, since Tolson had to play the trumpet that day in the Aggie band. The rest is history. While catching a few plays on the "tube" on Thanksgiving Day, be aware of how well the broadcast industry has improved on this idea by a couple of Texas Aggies. And in their honor, we'll even dispense with the Aggie jokes--for at least a week!

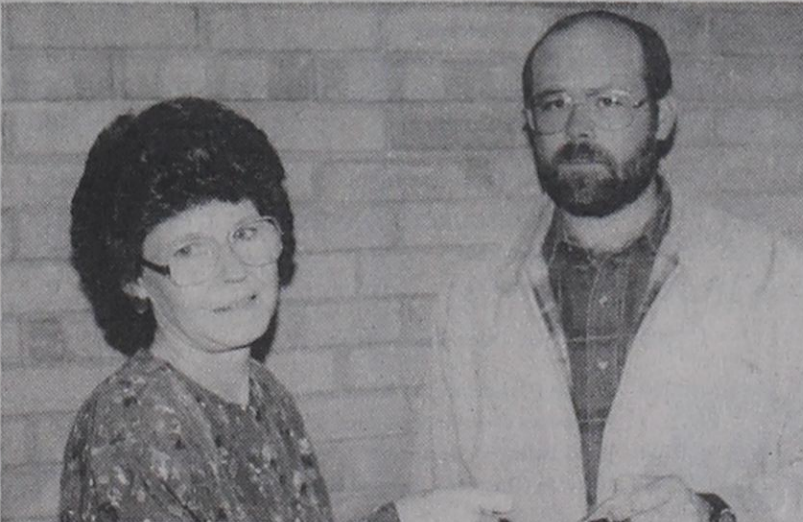
Mustangs Roll, 76-51

Mustangs Honored On 2-A All-District Team

The Bovina Mustangs' football team, which finished third in district, gained seven spots on the first and second teams All-District, announced this week by district coaches, and had 16 spots on the mythical team overall, including honorable mention citations.

Three players were named to the first team defense: Mike Carrasco, 214-pound sophomore, as a defensive lineman; Pete Castillo, 160-pound senior, as a defensive end, and Kory Mitchell, 131-pound senior, as a defensive back.

Two Mustangs were named to the second team offense. They were Corey Kirkpatrick, 173-pound senior, chosen as a runningback; and Brian Stanley, 175-pound tackle, chosen at a lineman position.

Stanley also was chosen to the second team defense as a defensive lineman, as was Hector Guevara, 155-pound senior, as a linebacker.

Gaining "Honorable Mention" status on the all-district team were (offense) Isabel Marrufo, 159-pound junior, runningback; Mitchell and Guevara, as wide receivers; Luis Ortiz, 157-pound sophomore, Castillo and Juan Reyna, 159-pound senior, as runningbacks.

Cited as honorable mention to the defensive team were Melicio Marrufo, 150-pound sophomore, lineman; Isabel Marrufo, linebacker; Angel Porras, 134-pound senior, defensive back, and Kirkpatrick, as a punter.

Happy and Nazareth, the district's two playoff representatives, dominated the all-district selections as expected, with the Mustangs being fairly represented after that.

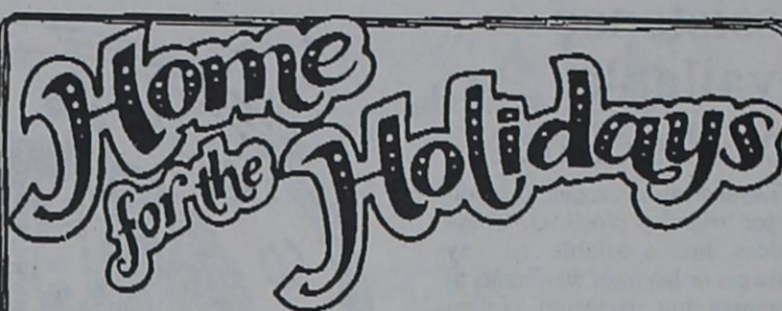

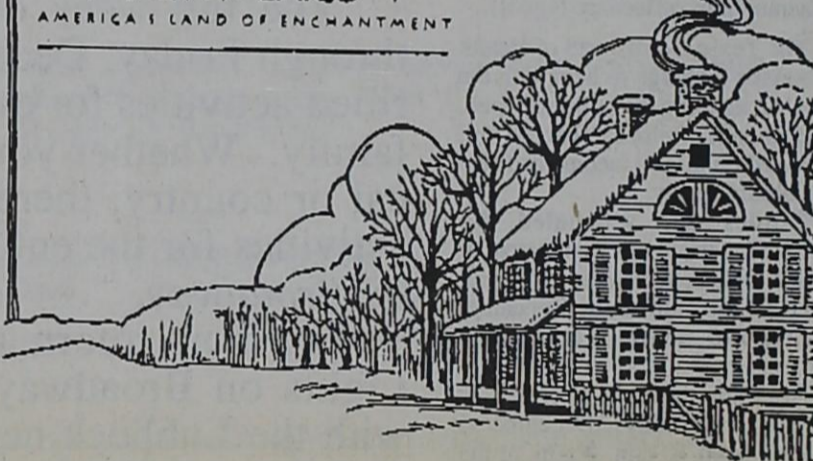

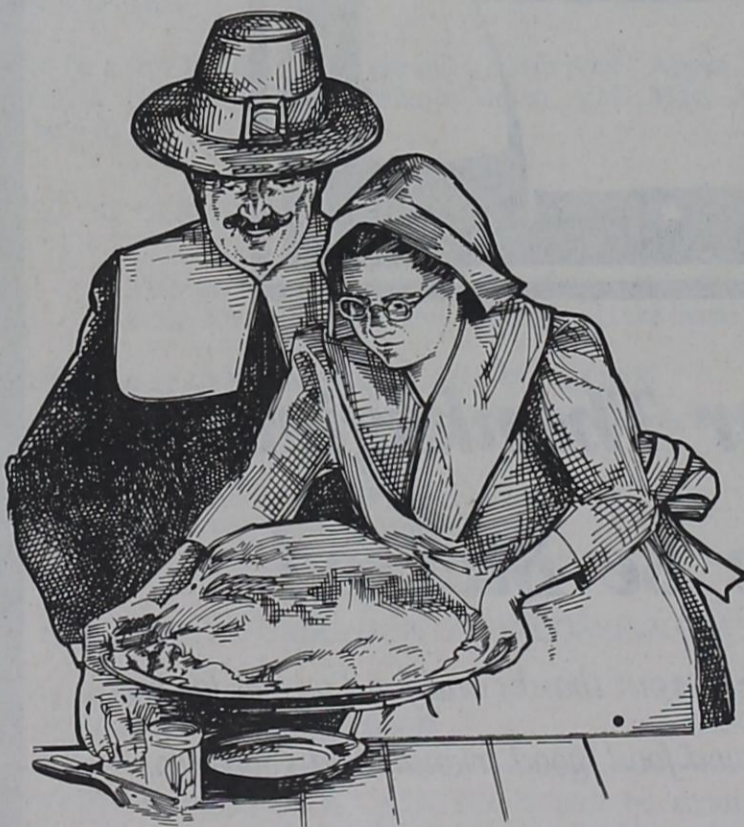

Assistance Available For Pipelines

Cost-sharing assistance is available for irrigation pipelines. These services are available to any landowner or landuser who wants to reorganize his irrigation system with underground pipelines.

This also helps the landowner to conserve water and increase the irrigation system efficiency by 5%-40%.

In 1991, 89 cost-share applications for Agriculture Conservation Program (ACP) were serviced by the Soil Conservation Service. 129,000 feet of irrigation pipeline and 6,500 of livestock pipeline were cost-shared in 1991.

These technical services are available free of charge to any landowner or operator regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion, marital status, or handicap.

Underground Water Is Safe Near High Plains Feedlots

COLLEGE STATION--Millions of cattle raised in Texas High Plains feedlots through more than two decades have not contaminated groundwater, a Texas Agricultural Extension Service study shows.

"The well water in all feedlot wells and in farm irrigation wells appear to be suitable for irrigation, livestock watering and human consumption," said Dr. John Sweeten, an Extension Service agricultural engineer.

Sweeten and Dr. Thomas Marek, a researcher for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Amarillo, devised the study in cooperation with the Texas Cattle Feeders Association and the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District based in Lubbock and the Environmental Sciences Laboratory at Texas Tech University.

The team examined well water from 26 feedlots in 1990 and expanded the study in 1991 to include wells near two typical feedlots, both of which have existed for more than 20 years.

After the wells in the first study showed no contamination, the second trial was designed to see if contaminated groundwater could be detected away from the feedlot wells. None was found.

More than five million head of cattle are marketed annually from feedlots in about 26 Texas High Plains counties. The area also includes about four million irrigated acres of cropland and sits atop portions of the Ogallala Aquifer which reaches into Nebraska.

Sweeten pointed out that most of the feedlots have operated under Texas Water Commission permits requiring no discharge of wastewater since the late 1960s. The commission is requiring revised permits for many feedlots under updated 1987 rules that have rigorous groundwater quality protection criteria, he said.

The research, for the first time, shows the condition of underground water at and near High Plains feedlots, according to Wayne Wyatt, manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District.

"Now we have a data base to measure against in case any appreciable changes are detected in the future," said Wyatt, whose agency enforces groundwater laws in that district. "We are very pleased with the results, but the important thing is that we will continue to monitor from time to time. Then if there ever is a problem, the feedlot can correct it quickly."

The first study included samples from wells at 26 feedlots that have a combined capacity of 730,000 head of cattle. The nitrate-nitrogen levels averaged 2.8 milligrams per liter. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's standard for human drinking water is 10 milligrams per liter.

The samples also were tested for ammonium, sodium, chloride, sulfate, potassium and phosphorus. The average values indicate that this well water could be used for irrigation or livestock watering without restriction, Sweeten said.

"Once the sampling results from

those wells turned out good, I felt there was no problem with contamination," Wyatt said. "But we felt that we needed a full-fledged study that would extend to include all the wells upgrade and downgrade from the feedlot."

After meeting certain criteria--such as feedlot capacity of at least 5,000 head of cattle, in operation for at least 20 years and surrounded by irrigated farmland--two "typical" High Plains feedlots in Parmer and Castro counties were chosen for the study.

At both locations, groundwater was sampled from four feedlot wells and two-thirds to seven-eighths of a mile from the feed pens or feedlot runoff collection playas.

Nitrate concentrations at and around the Castro County feedlot were all less than 2.2 milligrams per liter. Nitrate levels at and around the Parmer County feedlot ranged from 2.6-9.5 milligrams per liter.

Sweeten said the geological makeup of the High Plains, in which the depth to the water aquifer is often more than 250 feet and layers of clay under the surface retard chemical movement, helps prevent water contamination by the feedlots.

"Though these feedlots have existed for more than 25 years, they are not causing groundwater contamination problems," Sweeten said. He added, however, that a different set of geological circumstances may lead to different contamination findings elsewhere.

Higher Education: An Agenda For The 1990s

 Texans can take pride in some important developments in higher education in the past decade, including the testing for basic skills, reform of teacher education programs, core curriculum legislation, and the incorporation of certain second-tier schools into larger university systems.

On balance, however, these efforts represent modest approaches to the needed revitalization of our colleges and universities. Too much emphasis has been placed on short-term and singular interests; for example, the importance of higher education to a diversified economy.

Efforts to improve our colleges and universities should seek to re-

claim the civic function of higher education, to underscore the connections that exist between these institutions and the wider society, and how these institutions further democracy, preserve free institutions, promote civic responsibility, and address pressing social and cultural issues.

The Preparing for Texas in the 21st Century book series argues that efforts should now focus on:

***Improvement of general education**--New priority should be given to the development of sound general education courses grounded in the liberal arts that all students must take. Class sizes in introductory courses should be reduced, and

more senior faculty should be assigned to teach introductory courses. Colleges and universities, through legislative support, should reduce the number of part-time instructors while increasing the number of full-time faculty.

***Development of core curriculum programs**--State funding is needed to develop model core curriculum programs grounded in the liberal arts. Sequential learning and multidisciplinary courses should be central to all core curriculum programs.

***Teaching and scholarship**--Colleges and universities should establish teacher-scholar programs through which outstanding teaching can be recognized. Matching funds should be authorized for endowed chairs in general education programs. Increased emphasis should be placed on teaching effectiveness. New incentives and rewards should be developed for scholarship that enriches general education. The importance of maintaining intellectual freedom on all campuses should be underscored.

***Public service**--A public service scholarship fund, modeled after the science and technology programs in place, should be funded by the Legislature, to encourage research on social, cultural, and political topics of importance to the state. Regional humanities centers should be developed to disseminate such scholarship to the public and to encourage private support for research and public programming. In promotion and tenure decisions, more emphasis should be placed on public service scholarship.

Reforms should be built upon a broadly based consensus about the future direction of our colleges and universities that counters entrenched power that all too often has set the agenda for higher education in Texas.

This is the eighth in a series of eleven articles made available by the Texas Committee for the Humanities as part of a three-year project focusing on the future of Texas. James F. Veninga is executive director of the TCH.
