FEDERAL COURT FOR SAN ANGELO.
Judge Noonan Successor to the
late has been elected the
President.

The people of San Angelo were delighted Thursday evening upon receiving the following telegram:
Washington, D. C., June 11, 96.
J. L. Mills, Paugh,
San Angelo, Texas.

The San Angelo bill has been signed by the president.
Geo. H. Noonan.

All the prominent republicans, and lots of the democrats gathered in groups and congratulated themselves and each other on the welcome intelligence. Congratulations as a rule are much more satisfactory in a liquid form and it was not long until the group had faded from the streets and the "guggle ugle" of good red liquor told of Angelo's good fortune and the spirit in which it was received.

The effective work done by Congressman Noonan in the face of almost unsurmountable obstacles were favorably commented upon. The bill as it becomes a law is as follows, and while the district over which the Angelo court will preside is not as large as it might be, it is doubtless as large as our congressman could obtain without stirring up sufficient opposition to defeat the bill:

That terms of the United States circuit and district courts for the Northern District of Texas shall be held at San Angelo, in the county of Tom Green on the 4th Monday of March and the 1st Monday in November of each year.

All process issued against defendants residing in the counties of Glasscock, Sterling, Coke, Tom Green, Crockett, Schleicher, Sutton, Irion, Mills, Runnels, Coleman and Brown shall be returned to San Angelo.

Sec. 3. That all actions and proceedings now pending in the courts of said district against parties residing in either of the counties from which process is made returnable, as provided in this act and in case of such transfer all papers and files therein, with copies of all journal entries, shall be transferred to the office of the deputy clerk, of the said court, and the same shall proceed in all respects as if originally commenced in said court.

Sec. 4. That there shall be appointed, in the manner required by law, a deputy clerk, who shall keep his office at the city of San Angelo.

Judge Rector, of Waco, will preside over the court and the first term will be convened in the city on November 2nd next.

In the meantime a resident deputy clerk will be appointed by the judge and a lively scramble will be made for the pie. The Standard understands that at present there are 15 applicants for the job and half the district does not know that he job is vacant.

The Federal court in San Angelo will add to the city's importance as a business centre and in after years as the district grows may result in a Federal court house. The benefits to be derived at present will consist largely in the bringing of large numbers of litigants, lawyers and witnesses here during the session of the court and will aid in sustaining hotels, etc. Incidentally it will save the government large sums of money which was spent in carrying witnesses hundreds of miles to El Paso at enormous expense.

All honor to Congressman Noonan for his good work, and while we are not associated with his politics, we have a great respect for the judgment of a friend of Angelo.—San Angelo Standard.

Prof. R. F. Gillam is a graduate from Baylor University and the Lone Star School of Oratory. His success in high school and normal work, with his high attainments, eminently qualify him for any position to which he might aspire.

A fourth teacher who will aid in the work, gathered his inspiration from the University of Texas, from Sam Houston Normal, and from Col. Francis W. Parker's famous National Summer Normal at Chicago in 93.

While, then, many other Summer Normals have only local talent, the Sherwood Normal has teachers who have even more than a state reputation. But this is not the only advantage; the location is to be considered.

The Death of Dr. J. B. Taylor.

Dr. J. B. Taylor one of the best known and most popular stockmen in the State died at the San Antonio Infirmary yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock of blood poisoning resulting from injuries received on June 3 by his horse falling upon him at his ranch in Sutton county.

By the accident Dr. Taylor's left arm was broken in two places the bones of the forearm being fractured and those at the shoulder joint being shattered and driven through the flesh. In this terrible plight he was forced to make a ride of 80 miles to San Angelo traveling through the awful heat that distance. Though everything possible was done for him when he reached a place where medical attention was to be had he grew rapidly worse, blood poisoning having set in and Dr. Watts of this city was summoned to his aid. Upon reaching San Angelo Dr. Watts decided to have his patient brought here, and he arrived Monday night in a special car, having traveled from San Angelo over the Santa Fe to Milano and thence over the International & Great Northern to San Antonio. At Temple Dr. Taylor was joined by his brother, Mr. John G. Taylor of Chicago, and by his warm personal friend, Mr. Charles R. Brown of Galveston. All along the road at every station friends of Dr. Taylor were gathered to express their sorrow at his condition and wish him early recovery. To those who were admitted to the car Dr. Taylor gave a pleasant greeting, and at Temple he received something of an ovation, a large number of friends beseeing the car anxious to learn of his condition.

Dr. J. B. Taylor was born in Bristol, Ontario county, New York, in 1846. In the early '60s he moved to Quincy, Ill., whence he returned to New York a few years later and took up the study of medicine. He was appointed coroner and served on the board of health of New York, and was in that position for nearly twenty years, when he retired and shortly after moved to Texas, taking up his residence here some nine or ten years ago and engaging in the stock business. He had two ranches, one lying in McMullen county and the other in Sutton and Schleicher counties. He was an ardent lover of good horses and with his brother owned a stable of fine ones, among them the noted Joe Patchen. He never married. His mother, brother and sister survive him. His brother Mr. J. G. Taylor, lives in Chicago and his brother lives at East Bloomfield, N. Y. to which place his body will be taken for burial. His brother will accompany the remains.—San Antonio Express.
