One time when Abraham Lincoln was in Springfield, Ills., where he lived before becoming president, he met a little boy who was introduced to him and who was allowed to shake the great man's hand. Why Snow Is White.

The pure white luster of the snow is due to the fact that all the elementary colors of light are blended together in the radiance that is thrown off from the surface of the crystals. It is quite possible to examine the individual snow crystals in such a way as to detect these several colors before they are mingled together to constitute the compound impression of whiteness upon the eye. The snow is then clothed with all the varied hues of the rainbow. The soft whiteness of the snow is also in some degree referable to the large quantities of air which is en-

tangled amid the frozen particles. Snow is composed of a great number of minute crystals. More than a thousand quite distinct forms of snow crystals have been enumerated by various observers. These minute crystals and prisms reflect all the compound rays of which white light consists. Sheets of snow on the ound are known to reflect beautiful pink and blue tints under certain angles of sunshine and to fling back so much light as to be painful to the


