Texas Agriculture Extension Service Grazing Advisory

Area livestock producers need to be careful about grazing animals on the sorghum-type fields. Plant tests have been showing high nitrate levels and also prussic acid. Sorghum plants exhibit nitrate toxicity when stressed from a freeze or lack of moisture. Death from nitrate poisoning and prussic acid is very quick often in a couple of minutes.

There are several factors that can help minimize losses. Cattle are particularly susceptible but hungry cattle that have not had quality forage for a while, will be hit harder. It is a good idea to feed some grain once a day when you turn cattle into a sorghum field to reduce the amount they consume in a day's time.

The poisoning occurs when cattle eat a large amount of stressed sorghum in a relatively short period of time. For more information feel free to contact my office.




Our continuing investigation into the crime spree that occurred in Spofford the night of Friday, June 23, 1989 has turned up more evidence in the various cases and we have recovered several additional items of stolen property including 2 expensive firearms, 3 sets of binoculars, a lockblade knife, several boxes of shotgun shells, and a box full of miscellaneous property taken during burglaries of Malone Hunting Camp headquarters in Spofford over the past few months. The firearms, binoculars and knife were located and recovered in Sonora, Texas, with the assistance of the Sutton County Sheriff's Department.

The suspect now in custody in the county jail charged with several Class A misdemeanor violations and 1st Degree Felony charges of Burglary of a Habitation has been our prime suspect in many of the Spofford crimes reported over the past few months.

He finally stepped over the line far enough to allow us to grasp a slender thread of hard evidence and we carefully reeled him, kinda like trying to land a 10 pound bass on a 2 pound test line. We've got him on the stringer now though and from here on in will be spending our time wrapping up the loose ends and attempting to locate and recover more of the stolen property still missing.

If convicted of all the charges against him, the suspect could conceivably receive 3 years in the county jail and an additional 99 years to life in prison and fines totalling \$16,000. A Class A Misdemeanor



conviction carries a maximum penalty of one year in county jail and/or a \$2,000 fine.

A 1st Degree Felony conviction carries a maximum penalty of life imprisonment and/or a fine not to exceed \$10,000. In other words, this ole boy is in a heap of trouble and should be an example to others of the criminal element of our county that crime does not pay!

JUST FOR YOUR INFO: Justice of the Peace Alvin Hall remains in the hospital in San Antonio at the time of this writing recovering from surgery. We wish him a speedy and complete recovery. For those of you who might want to drop him a get

William Johnson was squirrel hunting near his Thompson Township, Ohio, home when he heard a child's voice cry for her mother and shout "Stop, please stop." Investigating, Johnson discovered a man attempting to rape a 12-year-old-girl. The hunter halted the man's attack, subdued him and bound the would-be rapist's hands with a belt and his rifle sling. Johnson was joined by another man, and they took the attacker to the police. (The News-Herald, Lake County, Ohio 10/18/88)

A Baton Rouge, La., woman awoke to find a strange man in her bed. After raping the woman, the attacker was momentarily distracted, giving her the opportunity to pull a revolver from a nightstand and shoot the rapist at point-blank range. The seriously injured assailant fled but was later apprehended. (The Morning Advocate, Baton Rouge, La. 10/1/88)

Hearing screams and barking outside his Colorado Springs, Colo., home, David Dudley got a handgun and rushed out to investigate. Finding Rebecca Nelson, a blind teacher, being attacked by three Rottweilers, Dudley fired at one of the dogs, but his gun malfunctioned.

Chased by two of the animals, Dudley raised to his house, grabbed a shotgun and returned to the attack scene. He killed one dog and stopped the mauling. (The Rocky Mountain News, Denver, Colo. 12/8/88)

When the same man who'd robbed Frank Consalvo's Bridgewater, N.J., gas station two times previously showed up again, the owner called police and locked himself behind a door. But when the robber broke through the door, Consalvo opened fire with his revolver, wounding the man. "No charges are being brought against this heroic man," the county prosecutor said. "Mr. Consalvo fired to protect himself." (The Courier-News, Bridgewater, N.J. 1/21/89)



However I enjoy sitting near the water trough in the pasture and watching the grackle.

They come one after another, land on the edge of the trough, usually take three swigs of water and fly off to deep woods for the night. The interesting is each one will have something in his mouth.

Usually it's a super large grasshopper but sometimes another large insect. He takes the drink without ever turning loose of his food.

In the meantime there come orioles, (Orchard, Baltimore, Hooded Scott's) Scarlet Tanager, Painted Bunting, Redwing Blackbird, Yellow Headed Blackbird, the ever present cactus wren, king birds, various sparrows, vermilion fly catcher and on and on.



to three predictable liberals, one usual liberal and occasionally a serving vote the Constitution is again becoming what it was designed to do and what it should have always


The hue and cry of the liberals and minority racists is not about what the Constitution says nor what the law of the land is but that the twisted, lop

I just spent the most beautiful few days going through some old books of my Mama's and I found an article on Roquefort Cheese that literally cracked me up. I want to share it with you and I hope that you enjoy it as much as I did.

Roquefort Cheese is made in France from the milk of a certain breed of sheep, which are fed on wild thyme and the cheese has a wild time trying to keep from stinking itself to death in its infancy. The wild thyme grows on the banks of the Lat Tarn and other rivers in the department of Aveyron in France. After it has first been besheeped and then becheesed it generates a lot of the tarndese smells that ever perambulated down the

Thyme is a kind of an aromatic plant with a pungent odor and after it is converted into Roquefort Cheese, it is the most pungest thing known to man. After this cheese is made, it is put in solitary confinement until its whiskers begin to turn grey and gangrene sets in, then it is taken out

and chained to a post. Before it is served, it is chloroformed or knocked in the head with an ax. It is then brought to the table in little square sections about the size of a domino. It is served at the close of meals together with black coffee. It usually has a running mate in the shape of a round cracker that has to

be broken with a maul. Roquefort Cheese is of a dull white color, except :- spots where it to be inhabited, but this is not true. Even the intrepid and mephitic microbe flees from it, as we flee from a postilence. We have seen Limburger two-bushed sack of wheat, but a piece of Roquefort the size of a dice can carry an election.

Limburger is a rose geranium compared with Roquefort. There is as much difference between them as there is between the purr of a kitten and the roar of a lion. Some people, who claim to be civilized, say they like Roquefort Cheese, but they only eat it because it is imported and expensive. A man who will eat it is an open sepulchre and should be quarantined or driven into the wilderness and never again be allowed to look into the face of a human being.

In all my life, I've never tried either of these cheeses, and after reading this, I don't believe I ever will. There's something else that has as pungent of an odor and that's the garlic. Of course, we all use and love it, but I'll bet you didn't know it came from the lily family.

Besides the savor it gives to food, garlic is said to have given strength to the pyramid builders, courage to the Roman legions and fighting spirits to the English gamecocks. It was also used as a charm against evil until

modern times. Its medicinal uses have been documented for centuries. It was always a popular remedy for colds, sore throats and coughs. When plagues ravaged Europe, people ate garlic daily as a protection against disease. Most people say that it mortification has set in. Some claim worked as a preventive simply by

keeping others at a safe distance. Now that, I believe. My, my, I've rattled on and on and nearly forgot my recipe for the week. I just went

films and on T.V. are sometimes hogwash, almost as much as the many tales of Billy the Kid. Only in the last few years of their trading do the tales hold true.

Comancheros means someone who traded with Comanches, but they also traded with other tribes. In 1786 a peace declaration was signed between the Spanish and Comanche.

As early as the 16th century the Spanish explorers traded for corn, cotton, blankets, pottery and turquoise from the Pueblos for buffalo meat and hides.

In a few years the early settlers did the same. This trading was carried on even while raiding occurred. It took place at trade fairs on the Pecos and Taos fairs in their pueblos. The 1786 Comanche peace treaty was a pact that lasted for almost a hundred

Comanche trade goods included flour, sugar, dried pumpkins, onions tobacco and corn bread.

Corn bread became so popular it would bring a good pony for a sackful. Comancheros received in turn horses, mules, buffalo meat and robes and some firearms. The comanches traded for lead and powder with the Osage tribe to the

When the Comancheros went to trade on the plains of Oklahoma and beyond to the Texas mountainlands, and to the South Platte River in Colorado, the Pueblo Fairs ceased to Even with their crude carretas the

Comancheros were pathfinders. They guided the Texas Sante Fe Expedition. The risks were great from the Kiowas, Navajos, Apaches and Utes. They traded and bought

prisoners from the Indians. In 1837 a Mrs. Horn was bought from the Comanches for a horse, four bridles, two mirrors, two knives and some tobacco. Earlier and American had offered the Indians a poor old horse for her and had been turned down.

The army had little success in dealing with the Comancheros but the New Mexicans kept up an active trade with them. After 1862 the Comancheros were used for some scouting by the army.


A leader of the Comancheros was a seven foot tall man named Tofova who at one time was called "Prince of the Comancheros". He is believed to have been from San Miguel County, and was said to have done more trading than any other.

When the Comancheros wanted to set up a trade they would send up smoke signals. The Comanches would respond, first they would feast, then compete in archery, wrestling and horse racing. In the trading later, ten pounds of coffee would bring a pack horse, five pounds of tobacco a mule, a keg of whisky or the robes off their backs. Charles Goodknight estimated they traded thousands of beavers and horses between the years 1860 and

1867. He always claimed the Comancheros caused the price of beef to drop on the markets of the territory.


Unexpected Pleasure


