Lindeman Retires After 35 Years of Service

(The letter below was submitted to The Brackett News at our request.

We'd like to take this opportunity to congratulate Bill Lindeman on the professional services he provided Kinney County with, during the time he served as Game Warden.

"May your retirement be as rewarding as your career."

I was born in Hays County, Texas August 26, 1925 on a ranch 20 miles northwest of San Marcos and remained there in the ranching business until I was employed by the Texas Game & Fish Commission on June 9, 1959.

My first law enforcement job was constable of Pct. 4 in Hays County. I was appointed constable January 6, 1956 and served in this capacity until June 9, 1959. Back in those days, I was the only officer in Pct. 4 Hays County and it kept me occupied. I learned everything, then from the school of trial and error, as we didn't have all of the training centers to help beginning officers. Most of mine seemed to be errors.

I had to run for this office one time during my three and one half years. I ran a real fine race, as I had no opponent. This ended my career as a politician, of which I am very glad. However, this Game Warden job sometimes seems to require a lot of politics. But I have enjoyed 95% of the time I have served this county as Game Warden. The other 5% was bad. I don't believe many men can say that only 5% of their career was unpleasant.

I began my Game Warden career in Edna Jackson County. When I was hired, the department would hire a man and give him a lawbook and a badge and put them to work until they ran the next Game Warden Training Academy. I remained in Jackson County from June 15, 1959 until Nov. 28, 1959, at which time I was sent on a detail to work for Captain Herbert Ward in Maverick County at Eagle Pass until I was to attend the Training Academy at A&M College.

I would like to take this opportunity to say a few words about Captain Ward. He began as a Game Warden in Dimmit County, where he was raised in 1920 and served the State of Texas until 1962. At the time he went to work, he and eleven other Game Wardens was the total force in Texas.

In my opinion, Herbert Ward took to his grave more knowledge of the game of the brush country of South Texas and how to enforce the game and fish laws, than any man we have ever had. Also, he was a fine

gentleman in his community.

I left Eagle Pass in January 1960 to attend the 12th Game Warden Academy. After completion of the Academy, I returned to Maverick County as State Game Warden. I remained there, living in Quemado, until Game Warden Clarence McBee retired in Brackettville, Kinney County. Clarence retired the last day of 1961. At this time I requested transfer to Kinney County, as I had been assigned to work both Kinney and Maverick Counties.

I moved to Brackettville February 1, 1962 and have been here ever since. Herbert Ward advised me on this more. He said that Kinney County was the best county in Southwest Texas for a Game Warden to work in, because of the fine cooperation of the landowners and people of Kinney County. I have found, that as usual, Captian Ward was right. I want the people of Kinney County to know that I sincerely appreciate the cooperation I have received.

Many of the Oldtimers that were here when I came here have passed on to their reward and I want to say thanks to these people that stayed with me until their death. Most of these men left some of their descendants to replace them and we still have a fine group of ranchers in Kinney County. I hope these people get a good Game Warden to replace me and they treat him or her as well as I have been treated here in Kinney County.

My wife Ava and I intend to remain here in Brackettville as we have been here and it is home. My daughter Lou Ann and son Jim were both raised here. Jim was born here. Lou Ann was three years old when we moved here.

Jim is Game Warden in Kennedy County at this time. He is going to apply for Kinney County. However, he only has three years with the department and probably won't have too much chance of coming here.

I can't completely quit and sit in the old rocking chair, so I'm going to work 6 months out of the year as a private Game Warden for the J.K. Burr Ranch south of Spofford. This ranch consists of 90,000 acres in Kinney and Maverick counties. Kinney County has approximately 900,000 acres, so maybe this reduced area will still give me a feeling of retirement.

Again I want to thank the people of Kinney County for helping me have a happy career.

The Brackett I.S.D. School Board held their monthly meeting last Monday evening. All members were present, with the exception of Ms. Diane Bravo.

The "old business" was taken care of first. Ede and company of Knippa was accepted for the audit bid. Eileen Canblen's student transfer was also accepted. Afterwards, the executive session was held, in which principal candidates were interviewed.

After the board was through interviewing the principal candidates, they discussed the "new business". It was passed to provide all students with insurance. The construction bid went to Bill Bizzell. That includes reconstruction of the ceiling in the elementary and auditorium, and replacing the cabinets in the band

hall with lockable ones.

Travis Wilson's bid for paving the parking lot was accepted. The asbestos abatement bids went to the Analytical Labs. Dorothy Payne's bid for the School District's '73 Ford of \$250 was accepted, provided it is approved by the state. School pictures will be taken by Life Touch next year.

They then went back into executive session. They decided to hire Mr. Don Sims as the new high school principal.

Other teachers that were hired were Karen Crumley, Becky Hubbard and Sue Sims, who is the wife of our new principal.

SHERIFF'S CORNER

KINNEY COUNTY

First of all this week, I want to say THANKS on the part of myself, Chief Deputy David Luna and Chief of Police Johnny Fritter to those citizens who had a few kind words to say about us in last week's issue of *The Brackett News*. Peace officers seldom hear words of praise for their efforts (most times just the opposite) and it is gratifying to know that at least some of the time our efforts are appreciated by some folks.

I have appointed retiring Game Warden Bill Lindeman as a non-paid regular deputy sheriff effective August 1, 1989, subject to final approval of the position by Commissioners Court at a Special Meeting to be held on July 27.

The refusal of the majority of the Commissioners Court on July 10, to approve Constable Juarez request that Bill Lindeman be appointed a deputy constable was possibly misunderstood by some folks and the bottom line of the matter is that the requirements of state law could not be met for the appointment of a deputy constable no matter who he was. Therefore, the dissenting Commissioners had no choice but to refuse the request if they wanted to abide by state law.

Though there are requirements of state law affecting the appointment of deputy sheriffs, the range of authority of a Sheriff to do so is much, much wider than that of a constable. Bill Lindeman's experience and qualifications far exceed the minimum requirements of law for a peace officer and as he has a need for a peace officer's commission and can also be a valuable asset to the Sheriff's Department in times of need. I am glad to appoint him.

I suppose by now some of you might be asking yourselves why all the hullabaloo about appointing a retiring game warden as a peace officer in Kinney County. Well, without delving too deeply into the personal business of Bill's, I will provide a thumbnail explanation in an effort to give you a clearer understanding and, hopefully, full

acceptance of the issue.

First of all I would be inclined to commission Bill as a peace officer even if there was no real need simply as a token of respect for the close to 35 years he has served the public as a peace officer. There are currently no permanent provisions in any state or local law enforcement agencies I know of to allow a retiring peace officer to retain his peace officers commission after retirement.

DPS may have a 5 year limit after retirement under certain conditions. At any rate, it is my strong belief that any working peace officer who has dedicated a major portion of his life to serving the public should receive at least a few considerations for that service, a continuing peace officer's commission as a sign of respect and continued public trust is only one of these that should be allowed if the officer desires it.

However, the primary reason I have granted a commission as a deputy sheriff to Bill is that after his retirement on July 31, he will be employed as Game Warden of a large ranch in south Kinney County and north Maverick County. This particular ranch has a large variety of wildlife on it, including trophy size whitetail deer. This brings in poachers almost year round.

These poachers hunt and shoot wildlife from the highways and public roads ("roadhunters") endangering private property, livestock, and in some cases, human lives. "Roadhunters" are a public nuisance and a danger to the public. Therefore, in order for Bill to be effective at his new job, he needs an official peace officer's commission that will allow him to patrol the public roads of our county if the need arises or to pursue and arrest offenders shooting from our public roads.

Also of importance is the fact that Bill's appointment will give us an extra experienced, certified and licensed peace officer to call on should the need arise. He will be patrolling in a rural area directly in the path of both drug smugglers and "wet-haulers" and can be of

assistance to officers of various law enforcement agencies.

All the valid reasons for his appointment are there, it just had to be done the right way, which is the legal way. And by the way, just so you'll know the whole story, the only expense to the county incurred by his appointment will be approximately \$50 a year for his bond that is required of all peace officers. I hope this clears up any and all misconceptions regarding this issue and I want to congratulate Bill Lindeman on his safe completion of nearly 35 years as a Texas Peace Officer. I hope he has many new safe ones at his new job.

JUST FOR YOUR INFO: Chief Deputy David Luna and Chief of Police Johnny Fritter traveled to TDC on Wednesday, July 19, 1989 to transport two prisoners sentenced to TDC to begin their prison terms assessed upon conviction of their crimes against society. One of the prisoners, Mario Alberto Sanchez of Del Rio, Texas will begin serving a 17 year sentence for drug trafficking. Chief Luna and Chief Fritter are scheduled to return to Kinney County on Thursday, July 20.

March 25, 1918, word was received by the army that a raid by bandits was being planned on the Bell Ranch. Ed Nevill and his teenage son were in Van Horn at the time. When they heard about the bandits, they rode eight hours to the Nevill Ranch in Presidio County on the Rio Grande.

Seeing no bandits, they were sitting in the livingroom of the ranch, planning their next day's work on the ranch when they heard horses in the front yard. Since troopers rode by now and then, they were not alarmed at first.

Ed looked out the window and saw a group of Mexican bandits, so he rushed out and cut loose with his rifle as he and his son ran for a ditch near the house. The boy was shot down as soon as he ran out the front door. The bandits shot to death one of the Mexican ranchhand's wife and stole supplies, clothes and bed clothes.

The bandit Chico Cano, who had led the raid, was chased to the village of Pilares on the border when a fierce battle was fought between the bandits and the troopers and townspeople.

One American was killed and thirty-two bandits. Some of the stolen loot was found in the village.

The Nevill Raid was the last big battle fought with the bandits in the Big Bend area.

Ed Nevill and his wife ran a cafe in Alpine in the 1930's, where I ate while in college. They became good friends of mine.

The son that was killed in the raid was eighteen years old and a Rodeo star. Their daughter became an artist in New Orleans and enjoyed some fame.

Ed's sister lived on her own ranch near Elephant Mountain in the Big Bend and had a very good collection of Indian artifacts. Ed, himself, was interviewed by Dobie for one of his books.

Ed Neville had been a messenger for the Texas Rangers at fourteen years of age, carrying messages through Indian country. He had a lot of fascinating adventures and told many of them to me.

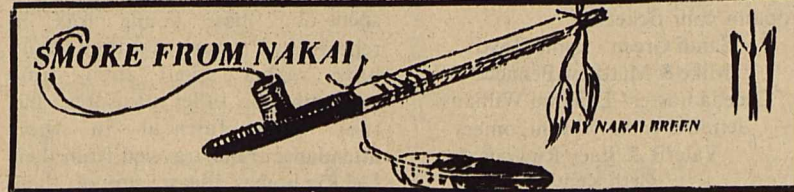
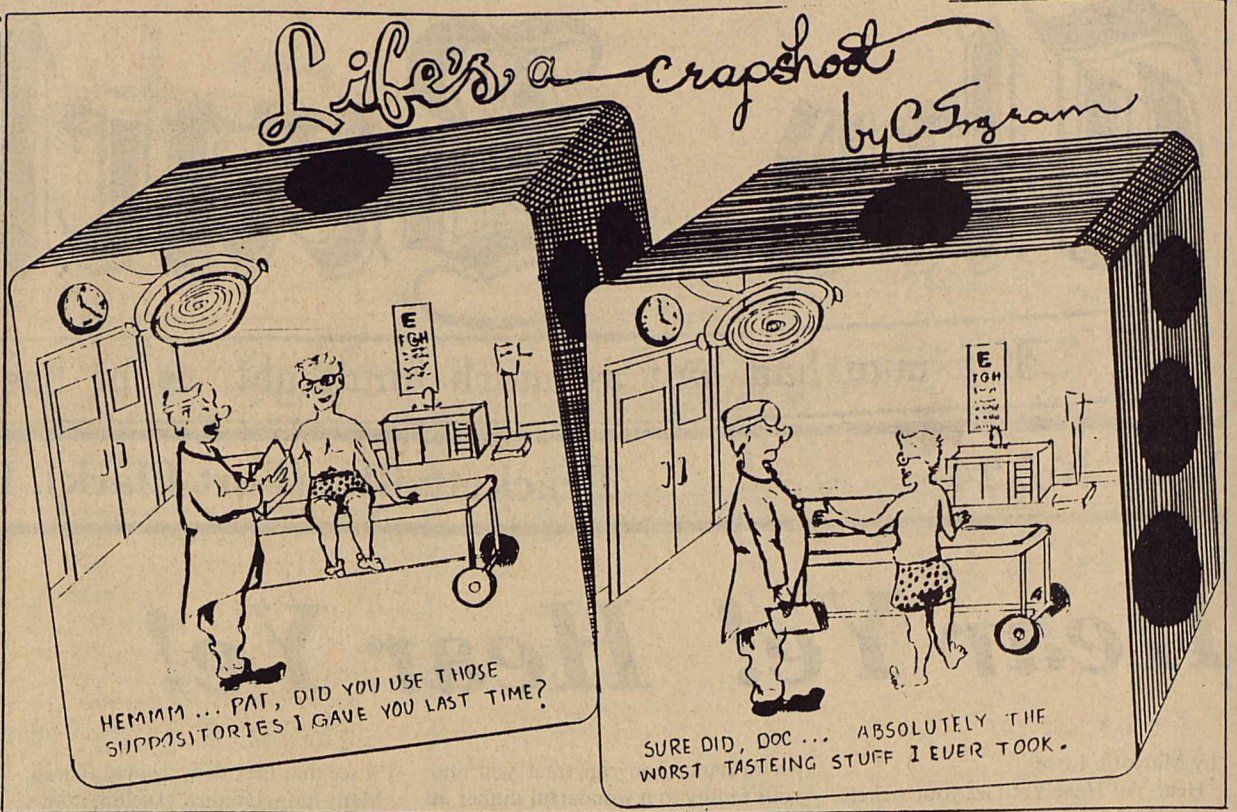

The spirit is anxious to aide all who seeks Him with a pure heart.

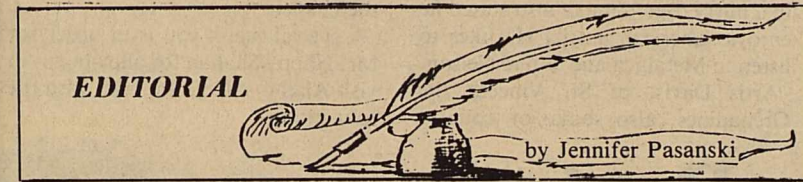
Everything we do that is not His way will come around and hurt us.

Fishing Limits Changed

AUSTIN - The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has adopted several changes in fishing regulations for 1989-90, including new bag limits on striped bass in Lake Texoma, length limits on billfish and a five-per day limit on sharks in salt water. All changes will go into effect Sept. 1.

The minimum length limits for billfish in state waters of the Gulf of Mexico are 114 inches for blue marlin, 81 inches for white marlin and 76 inches for sailfish. The length limits are intended to protect billfish from depletion. They are in line with current billfish regulations in federal waters of the Gulf.

However, the state length limits are for total lengths while federal regulations refer to fork length. Total length is measured by squeezing or rotating the fish's tail to achieve the greatest possible length. Fork length is the distance from the fish's snout to the center of the v-shaped fork in the tail. All measurements are done with the fish's jaw closed, and in a straight line distance rather than following the curvature of the fish's body.

The five-shark limit was established in response to a request by the Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management

Council to the states to take regulatory action to prevent depletion of sharks from increasing commercial and recreational fishing pressure. Officials said the federal government is developing a shark fishery management plan, to be completed in about two years. The limit is in the aggregate, meaning a person may retain only five sharks of all species combined per day.

The new bag limit for striped bass at Lake Texoma will allow anglers to retain only one striper over 20 inches in length per day as part of the 15-per-day limit for striped bass. Currently anglers may retain five 20-inch-plus stripers.

Department staff told the commission that the regulation should reduce the catch of the larger fish that have declined in numbers in recent years. Oklahoma previously adopted regulations identical to those adopted by the commission.

The new regulation also specifies no "culling" of stripers. Fish caught from Lake Texoma must either be kept or immediately released, rather than being saved in a livewell or on a stringer and released later when a larger fish is caught.

The red drum minimum size limit was increased from 18 to 20 inches, and the daily bag limit was reduced from five to three in six freshwater reservoirs. This was done to maximize the usage of the fish stocked into these lakes, the number of which has been reduced in recent years.

Red drum have been stocked by the department in Lakes Braunig and Calaveras near San Antonio, Colorado City in Mitchell County, Fairfield in Freestone County, Nasworthy in San Angelo and Tradinghouse Creek near Waco.

The minimum length limit on black bass in Lake Raven at Huntsville State Park was increased from the current 14 inches to 18, and the daily bag limit reduced from five to three. Officials said the state park lake's bass population is currently dominated by fish smaller than 14 inches, and the new regulation would increase total number and average size of bass in the lake.

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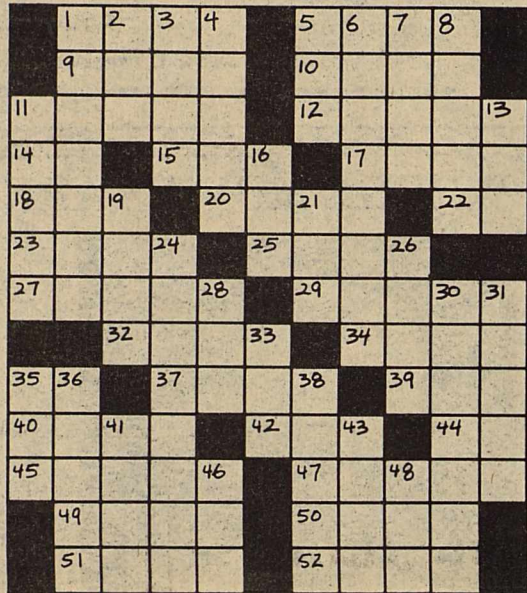

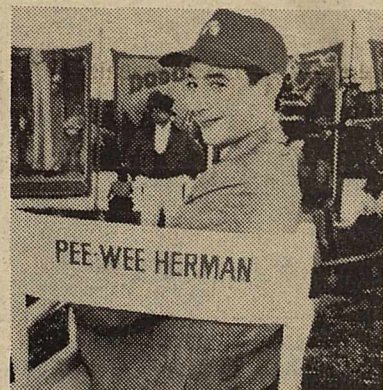

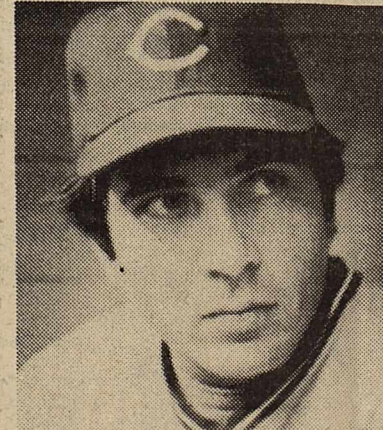

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Flick Picks

BATMAN

At long last, this flick has hit the movie theaters. People have been flocking to see it in droves. However, what they're seeing is probably not what they were expecting. For die-hard fans of the DC comic-book hero, this is not the Batman they know and love. For the Baby Boomers who thrilled to the campy antics of the TV Batman, this version is literally unrecognizable.

What makes this Batman so different? I think it is the Freudian approach director **Tim Burton** and actor **Michael Keaton** took in creating the character. This Bruce Wayne is not an avenging angel. This one is a very disturbed, dark, almost psychotic man. He is possessed by demons who torture his soul and force him to take on the brooding, humorless persona of Batman. Yes, he is out to avenge the death of his parents. However, it is not as simple or clear-cut as all that. His motivation in donning his imposing bat costume is multi-faceted.

The set designer, **Anton Furst**, is an absolute genius. The city of Gotham is stacked with elongated skyscrapers and spires. There is no sunlight. It's almost as if the developers crammed so many structures into one little area, they literally blocked out the sun. The buildings themselves sport gargoyles, Gothic arches and Deco motifs. In such a city, it's easy to see how people could become dehumanized.

This, of course, is exactly what's happened. Most of the police are crooked. The commissioner (**Pat Hingle**) is inept, and the city is being run by gangster Gus Grissom (**Jack Palance**) and his henchman Jack Napier (**Jack Nicholson**).

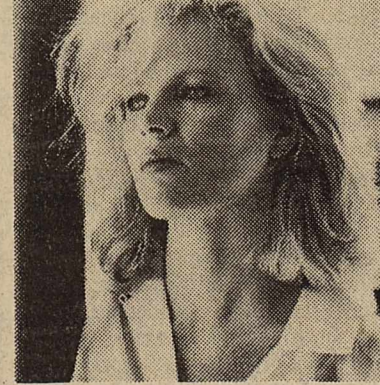
Both Nicholson (the Joker) and Keaton turn in superb performances. They are perfect foils for one another. Both delve into the psyches of their characters with such accuracy and frightening realism that they are truly masterful. The remainder of the cast, including **Kim Basinger**, turn in good performances as well, but the true stars are Keaton and Nicholson.

I highly recommend this movie. I do, however, have one major objection. Children will want to flock to this movie, but it is not a movie they should see. It is too violent, too stark, and too darkly depressing for them. It is so violent, in fact, I believe it should have been given an R rating.

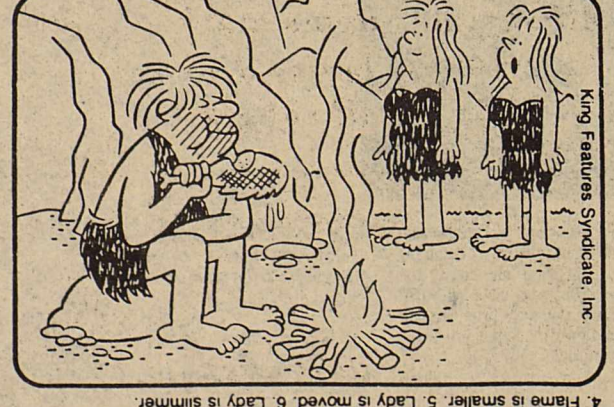

Grandma's Kitchen



My house is smelling great again. I'm roasting nuts. Gotta keep that jar full. I hope everyone's paying attention to some of the things I'm telling them.

Not only are almonds good, they are good for you, along with figs and raisins. Since the gremlins are still out of school, I figured I'd start off with something to make them happy and full. Everybody loves brownies, so here's the best recipe I've ever tried.

Golden Brownies
2 cups unsifted flour ¼ cup sugar
1 tsp baking powder 1 tsp salt
1 tsp vanilla extract 3 eggs
¾ cup butter or margarine
¾ cup firmly packed dark brown sugar

one 12 oz (2 cups) package of Nestle Toll House Morsels
Preheat the oven to 350°. In a small bowl, combine flour, baking powder and salt. Set aside. In a large bowl, combine butter, sugar, dark brown sugar and vanilla, beat until creamy.

Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Gradually add flour mixture. Mix well. Stir in the Toll House Morsels. Spread evenly into well greased pan - 15 x 10 x 1". Bake at 350° for 30 to 35 minutes. Cool. Cut into 2" squares.

For anybody who's learning to knit, or just wants to practice, here's a couple of neat things to do. This is a knit cord that has lots of uses, it's called Idiot's Delight. Cast 3 stitches on a double pointed needle. *Knit one row, slide the 3 stitches to opposite end of needle. Do not turn. Pull yarn tight behind the 3 stitches. Knit the 3 stitches again. At end of each row, slide stitches down the needle. Pull yarn behind stitches tight for first stitch of each row. Repeat from * for desired length. This is good for hanging baskets, or make up your own use, and you won't believe how strong it is.

With dish cloths so cheap, it never occurred to me to make my own, until these past two months. I've seen several people making them and what a cheap, easy and practical gift, and also great practice for the beginners. Get one skein, or ball of cotton yarn. It makes 3 dishcloths and you will also need a #10 knitting needle, cast on 4 sets.

Row 2: Knit 2 sets, yarn over, (this adds a stitch) then knit 2 stitches, or to end of a row. Repeat row 2 until there are 43 sets. Next row: knit one, knit 2 tag, yarn over, knit 2 tag, knit to end of row. Continue the last row until 4 sets remain. Knit 4 sets and bind off. I've heard that once you've knit your own, you'll never want to purchase dishcloths again.

I'm going to have to hunt up my cotton yarn and give this a try. Even the kids could do these projects to keep busy. Why, I taught all my kids how to do things like this with their hands and they had a fun time, until the boys got big enough to be embarrassed when they got a compliment, then they thought it to be sissy and quit.

Back in the 60's, my youngest son

used to enjoy going with me when I taught knitting classes and he was quite proud that he was knitting his own sweaters and the compliments he used to get. I wonder if he remembers this? While at my cousins a few months back I had the taste of 2 different peanut butter chocolate pies that, hey, were delicious, but one taste was all I had. So if you're real skinny or a growing child, give this one a try.

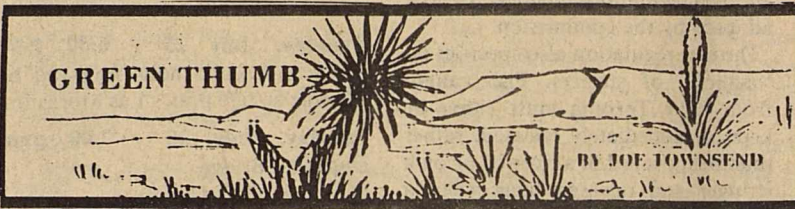
Peanut Butter Chocolate Cream Pie
½ cup sugar 1 tsp vanilla
½ cup milk ½ cup cocoa
1-3 oz package cream cheese
2 heaping TBS of peanut butter
8-oz container whipped topping
1-8 or 9" graham cracker pie crust.
Combine cream cheese, sugar, peanut butter and vanilla in a small mixer bowl until blended. Add cocoa alternately with milk, beating until smooth. Gradually add and fold in whipped topping until well combined. Spoon into pie shell, chill firm or freeze. The one I tasted was frozen and mighty good.

Another way to keep unused cloves of garlic fresh is to peel the cloves and place them in a small jar filled with olive oil. Cover and refrigerate. Garlic stays fresh and is ready for use and the oil makes a nice ingredient in salad dressings.

Watering is merely a life sustaining substitute for rain. Such intense heat, especially when accompanied by wind, is devastating. The best aid to the situation is water and more water.

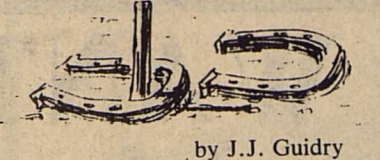

Texas Agricultural Extension Service Recommends Composting

Do you have trouble looking for a place to throw your weekly grass clippings? Well, there is an alternative to dumping or sacking the clippings to be hauled away. Try saving clippings and put them to use in a compost pile.

Besides being a good source of organic matter for gardens and flower beds, composting is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and similar plant material and reduce the amount of land-fill space needed.

The compost pile should be 4 to 6 feet wide and any length depending on material and space available. Simple composting method is to 4 to 6 inch layers of plant material, such as leaves or grass, with 2 to 4 inches of good garden soil. Add manure to the soil layer of plant material to speed up the decomposition.

You will need a cupful of fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ratio per 10 square feet. The compost pile's top layer should be soil and should form a basin to hold water. Also water each layer of organic matter before adding the soil layer. Water the pile thoroughly when you have finished building the pile. Add water as needed to keep the material moist but not soggy because the leaves will decompose slowly if too dry.

Be sure and turn the compost every three to four months to aerate the material and speed up the decomposition process. Within six months to a year, you will have good compost that will enrich your flower beds and add needed nutrients back to the soil. You will also have a place to go with all your grass clippings and leaves around the house.
