Monsoon season doesn't come to the Plains every year. But you can tell 'em we had one in the summer of '67.

All this moisture has started weeds growing in places that we didn't even know were places.

According to information available to us, the armed robbery of Mrs. Jessie Williams at Sands Motel early Saturday morning was the first of its kind in Bovina's history.

We checked with Willie Williams about it and he said this was the first as far as he knew. We heard, off the record, that "Dad" Bridgeford, who ran a cafe on Main Street in years gone by, was robbed by a man with a gun one time, but we couldn't get verification of this story.

Williams, who was in business here for many years, said, "They robbed me seven times, but they always waited until I went to sleep!"

Football season will be here in 60 days or so.

That fact brings to mind that Bovina's facilities for staging home games will be lacking. Nothing, you'll remember, has been done to improve the field, lights, stands or fieldhouse since the Mustangs were boosted, because of increased enrollment, into Class A competition.

For Class B, the facilities here might have been considered average. For Class A, they're on the bottom rung of the ladder; bad enough to shame most proud sports fans.

As we've pointed out before, the situation would be different if we, as a community, couldn't afford better. But we can.

Our set-up is certainly the poorest in our district and that's not much to be proud of.

This is a strange situation in a community which prides itself on being progressive . . . and is in most other areas.

A good athletic program aids in building a good school academically, educators tell us. Good facilities make for better athletic programs, we'd guess.

The time is fast approaching when we must do something to improve the facilities. The stall we're going through now isn't helping anything. Something will have to be done, eventually. The quicker we do it, the better it will be for all concerned.

For the 1967 season, it's already too late to improve the inferior facilities. Maybe by 1968 . . .

Our lack of sufficient facilities will cost us one home game this year. The contract with Friona, which was made prior to the 1966 season, said, if memory serves correctly, that two games would be played in Friona, in '67 and '68, unless Bovina had adequate seating to handle the crowd.

The Mustangs played at Friona last year, you'll remember. Guess where, under the conditions of the contract, they'll play this year.

Two or three years ago, when the Mustangs were champions of their Class B district, they had the homefield advantage in a game with Sundown.

So what happens? The game is played at Farwell because much, much more seating is available there than in Bovina, where the game should have been played.

As we've said before, we wouldn't be complaining in public if we thought we couldn't afford better than we have now. Sports are big business, important they are to the school and to the community. We need to realize this and act accordingly.

The wheels of progress continue to turn for the community. This week, for instance, a new paving project is about to start and a contract has just been let for a new grade school classroom building.

That's just mentioning a couple of progressive steps. Not bad for a burg our size, we'd say.

We had, to run at the end of this column this week, some success stories about Texas Aggies.

The decision was made not to run them, though, for fear our Texas Tech friends would be upset after reading the anti-Texas Aggie joke stories.

# Armed Robbery Staged Here Saturday

For \$173,518 --

## School Awards Building Contract

Ed Lampe Construction of Lubbock was the successful bidder for the new elementary school building here.

Lampe's bid of \$173,518 was the lowest of seven submitted. The bids were opened at a meeting of school board members and bidders Thursday afternoon.

The low bid was slightly higher than the "hoped for" figure of \$170,000, one school board member commented. However, the figure was pretty well in line with the total price which had been expected.

The amount will be the cost

of the building between that and the \$212,000 in bonds which were voted by citizens of the school district early this year.

The highest bid of the seven was \$189,700. The others ranged from the low bid of Lampe to \$185,700. Second lowest was \$175,677.

Construction is scheduled to begin right away -- possibly as early as next week. Approximately 195 days are needed to have the building ready for oc-

cupancy and it's possible the building will be put into use by mid-term of the 1967-'68 school year.

The building, which will have six classrooms plus accessory areas, will be located west of Ninth Street and just north of Highway 86.

The classroom portion of the structure will be hexagon-shaped.

Architect for the project is Arnold Maeker of Lubbock.

## Rain Continues Sunday, Tuesday

Rain continued to fall here over the weekend and early this week.

A total of .42 of an inch fell Sunday night. This was followed by .65 of an inch early Tuesday morning.

The Sunday shower halted wheat harvesting operations which were considered more than 90 per cent complete. Only the wind-up of the harvest remains to be done when the fields are dry enough again.

The Sunday and Tuesday rains make a total of 1.07 inches for July. June's total, after the rain broke a months-long drought on the first day of the month was 7.08 inches.

Except for the wheat which is still in the fields, the mois-

ture is considered highly beneficial for farmers. All other crops can use the rainfall to good advantage.

## Man Takes \$50 In Motel Holdup

"It happened so quickly I didn't have time to get scared," Mrs. Jessie Williams, manager of Sands Motel on Highway 60 in Bovina, said after being the victim of an armed robbery early Saturday morning.

The armed robbery was believed to be the first in Bovina's history.

Shortly after the robbery was reported, Clovis police officials arrested a Clovis man driving west toward Clovis. The arrest was made about three miles west of Texico. He was in a car which fit the description of the vehicle the man was in at the motel here, according to Henry Minter, Parmer County deputy sheriff stationed in Bovina.

Charged with the robbery was Dee Edgar Shephard, 46. In his car, according to Minter, was the money, \$50, which was allegedly stolen and a gun which was believed to be the one used in the "stick-up."

Mrs. Williams, who has been managing the motel since December of last year, said she was awakened by the night bell at the motel at 4:45 a.m. Saturday.

A man came into the office

and wanted to know if she had a room for rent. She answered, "Yes."

She then asked the man to sign a registration card. It was then, Mrs. Williams says, that she looked up and saw the gun.

The man told her he wanted the cash drawer, as the robber repeatedly warned her not to pull a gun on him, and gave him \$50. The money was in larger bills as the man didn't ask for the one dollar bills or the change and Mrs. Williams didn't offer to give them to him.

The man then asked Mrs. Williams to write down her name and the name of the motel on a piece of paper. He told her he would send the money back in two weeks.

Without the man being aware of the fact, Mrs. Williams made a mental note of how much money she gave him.

Mrs. Williams, who was congratulated by Minter and City Marshall Bill Denney on her accurate description of the man, his clothing and vehicle, noted that he was driving an old model Packard automobile. She noticed, too, that a Poodle dog was in the car. He was a large size and dark, the motel manager remembers.

When the robber left, Mrs. Williams locked the front door behind him. As he drove his car away, she noticed the license plate was from New Mexico with the first number '5'. This indicated the car was registered in Curry County (Clovis).

The car left the motel going east but evidently the man turned around and went west.

"Bill (Marshall Denney) was here in five minutes after the man left," Mrs. Williams said, "and he told me there was an all-points watch for the car."

Mrs. Williams said it wasn't unusual to rent a room at that time of the morning. She didn't suspect there was anything wrong until she saw the man's gun.

She went to Clovis later Saturday morning with Denney and Minter to identify the car.

Mrs. Williams said she stayed calm while the robber was in the office. "I had a hard time

The club will make the weekly selection of the featured teenager.

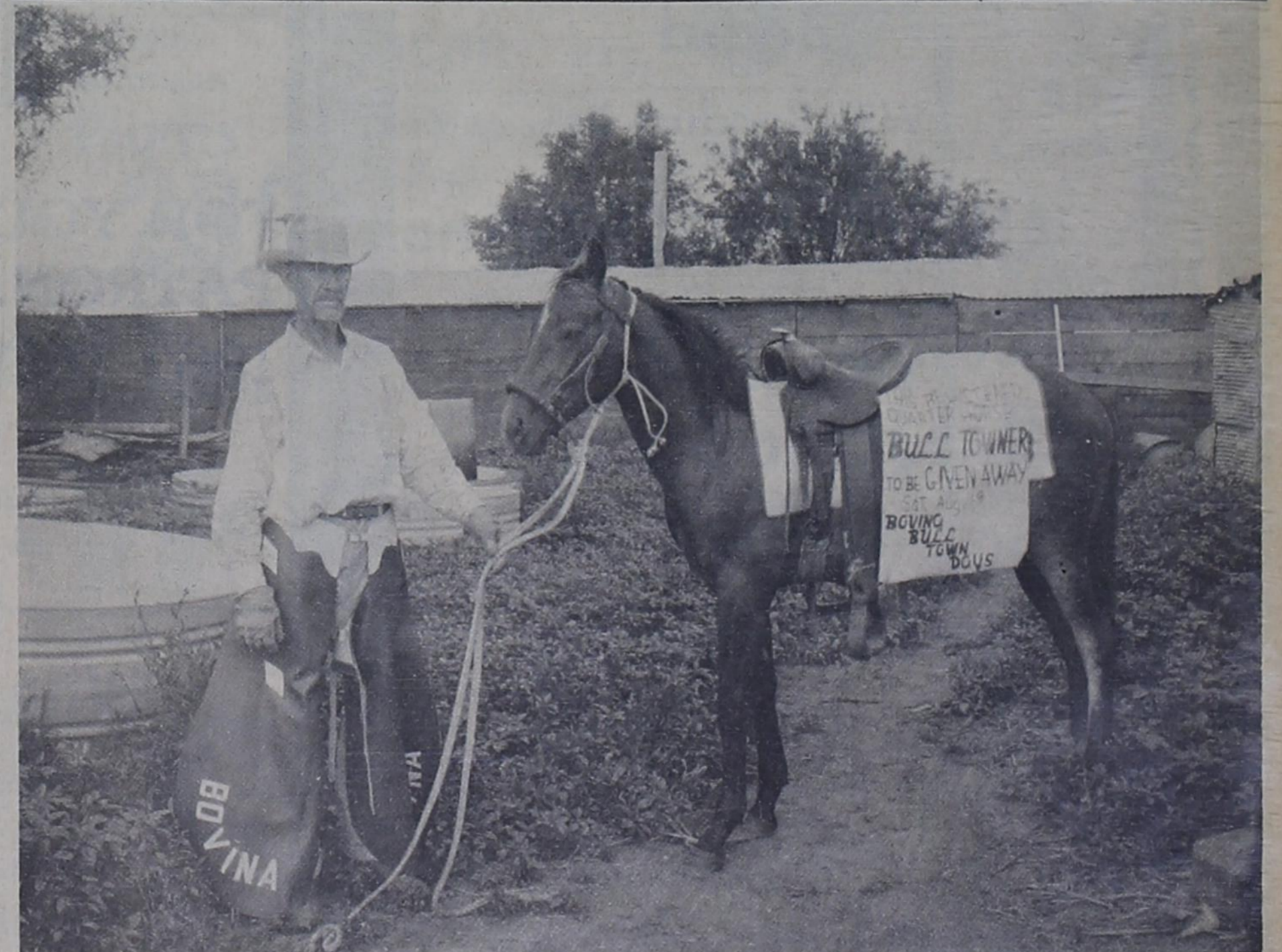

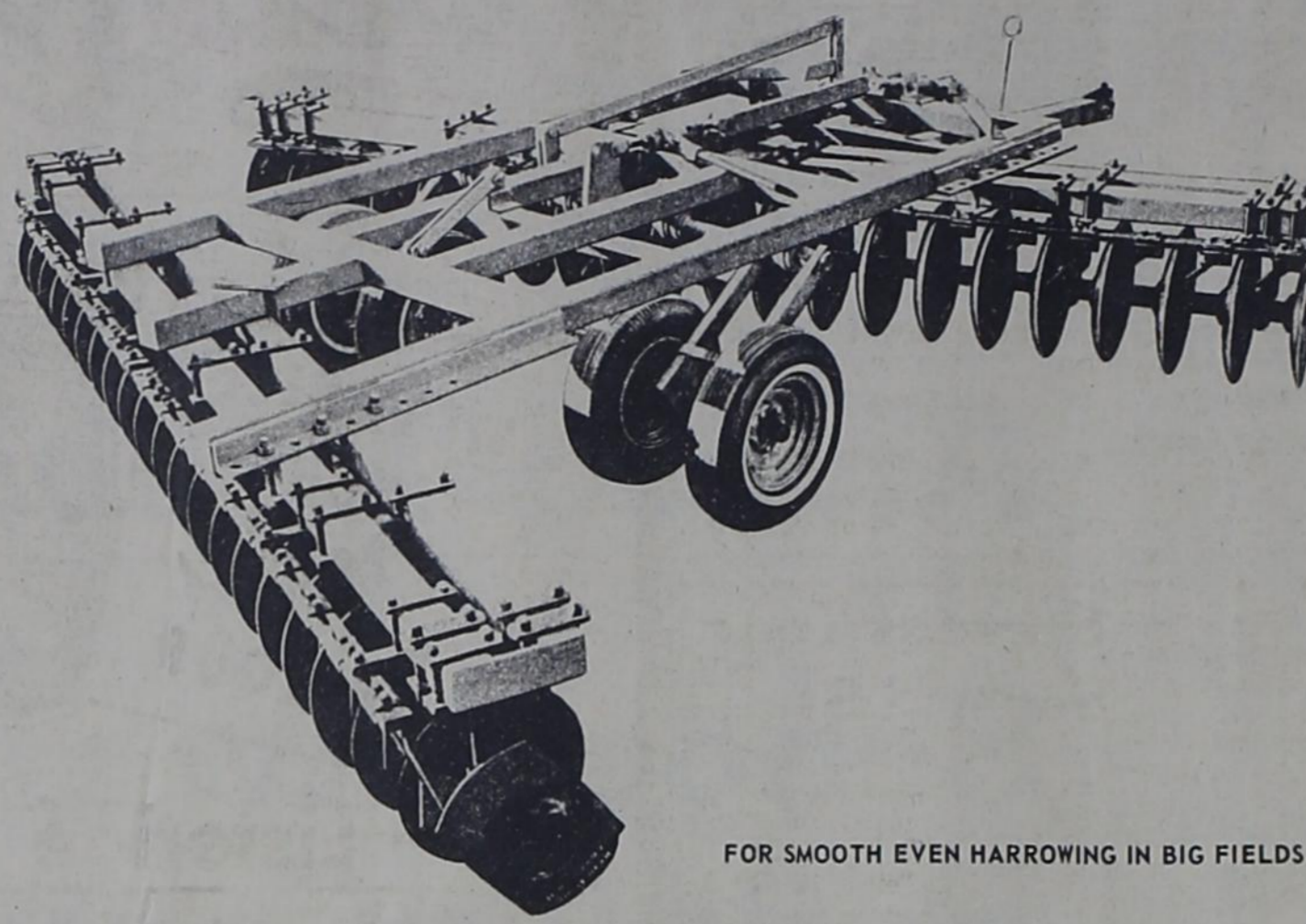

## Considering Deep Water For Irrigation Source

A recent effort to determine if deep water is useable for irrigation here failed when the driller had trouble and abandoned the project at 1215 feet.

The drilling company, from Abernathy, had been contracted by a group of interested individuals here to drill 1500 feet. Drilling of the deep test hole was sponsored by Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, according to Jim Ware, manager of the organization.

The hole was drilled on the farm of Melvin Muse four miles west and two miles north of Bovina.

Ware says the group estimated the test hole would need to

be 1500 feet and be drilled through the redbed and into the Santa Rosa sands, where water is expected to be available.

Muse, in an attempt to get an irrigation well, had contracted for the first 500 feet. The interested individuals then contracted the driller to go to 1500 feet. Results of this test proved to be insignificant, according to Ware, because of the trouble which stopped the drilling at the 1215 mark. "We expected to have to go deeper than that to find an additional water source," Ware said.

Deep water is being used in some areas of the Plains, Ware points out. There's a possibility the deep water will be salty

and therefore unuseable, but there's also a good chance that it will be poor.

"Water for irrigation, even if it is deep, can be of great benefit to some of our farms which are short of irrigation," Ware points out. "Some of our area's best land has the least water," he says.

Ware says there's a possibility that another test hole will be drilled in another effort to determine the feasibility of irrigating with deep water.

"We think the potential is great and well worth checking into," Ware explains.

Most irrigation water in this area is pumped from 150 to 300 feet.

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### Know The Truth

People of this age are living under the New Testament. In former times, God governed His people by the Old Testament. ## Fiesta To Be Held Soon

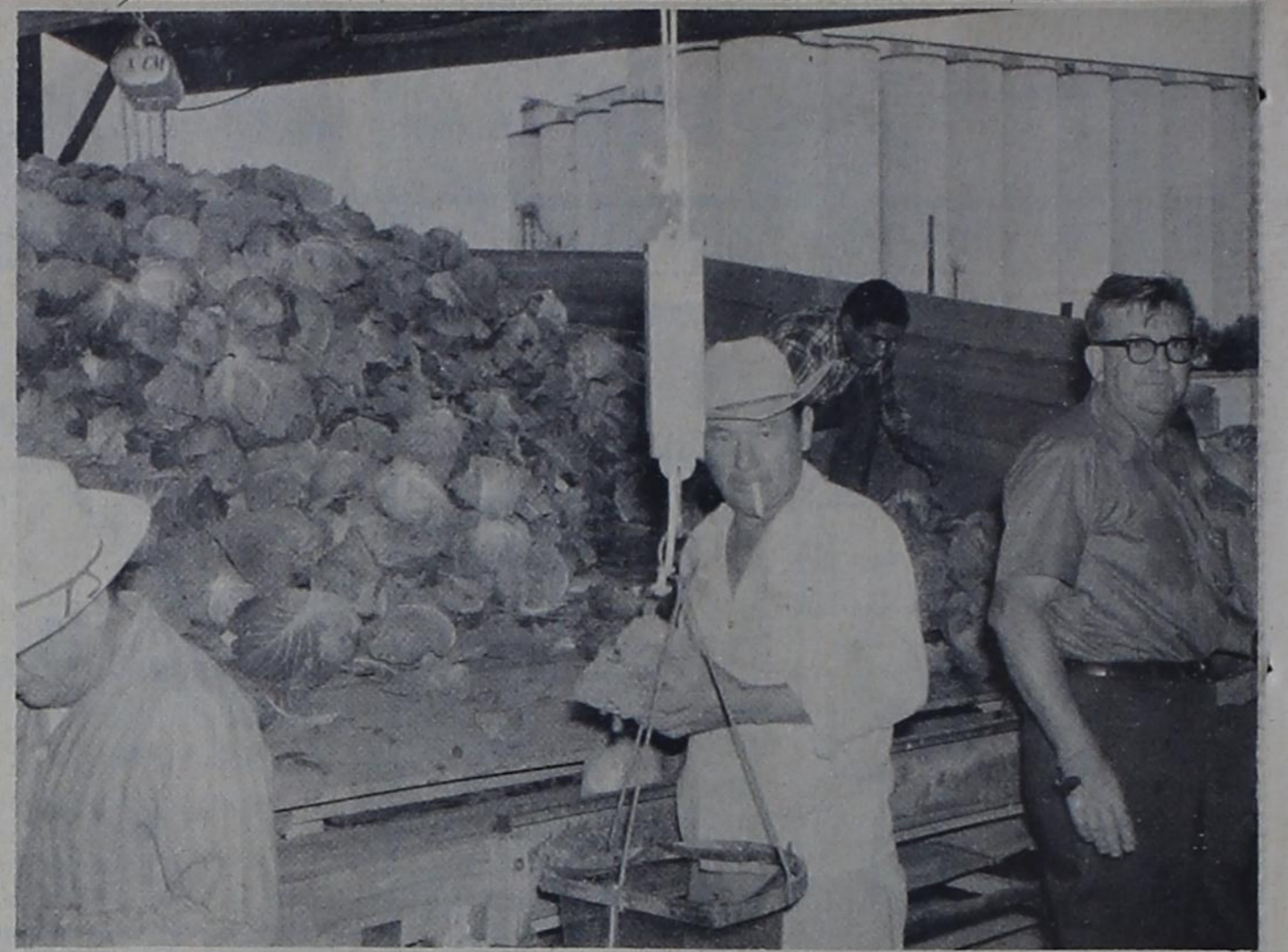

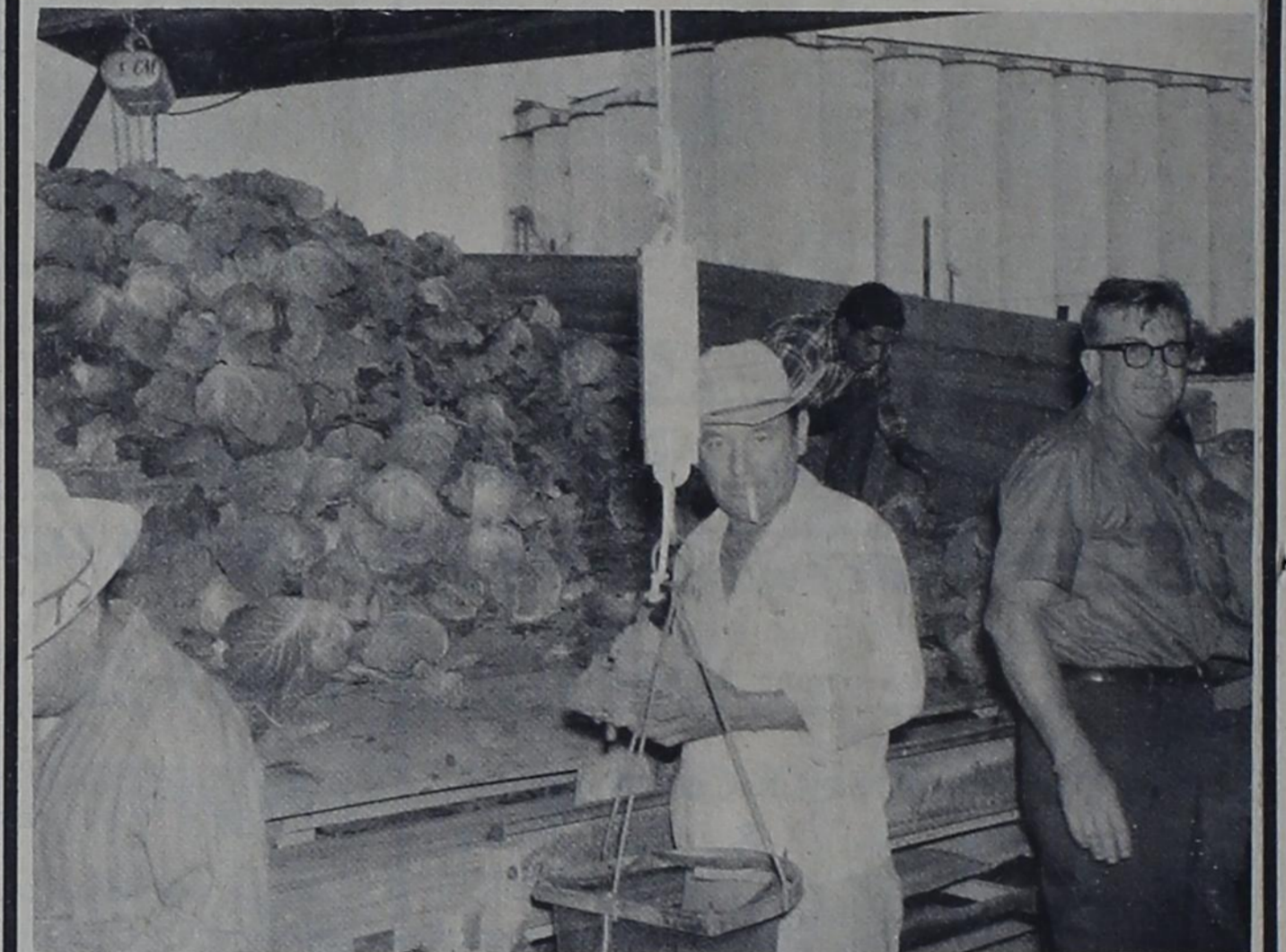
