Man Takes \$50 Motel Holdup

The armed robbery was believed to be the first in Bovina's history.

Shortly after the robbery was reported, Clovis police officials arrested a Clovis man driving west toward Clovis. The arrest was made about three miles west of Texico. He was in a car which fit the description of the vehicle the man was in at the motel here, according to Henry Minter, Parmer County deputy sheriff stationed in Bovina.

Charged with the robbery was Dee Edgar Shephard, 46. In his car, according to Minter, was the money, \$50, which was allegedly stolen and a gun which was believed to be the one used in the "stick-up."

Results of this test proved to be insignificant, according to Ware, because of the trouble which stopped the drilling at the 1215 mark, "We expected to have to go deeper than that to find an additional water source," Ware said.

Deep water is being used in some areas of the Plains, Ware points out. There's a possibility the deep water will be salty

Know The Truth

Now, what does it mean to us that we are living under the New Testament and not the Old? It means that we will do what Jesus and the apostles taught rather than what Moses or David taught or did. 

AUSTIN -- Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith has announced the appointment of Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon to the Texas Legislative Council.

The Legislative Council is a permanent legislative service agency with a fu'l-time professional staff, which conducts studies requested by legislative resolution, provides bill-drafting services during sessions, and is also charged with the statutory revision function. Members of the Council, who determine policy and direct the work of this agency, are appointed after the adjournment of each regular session by the presiding officers of the two Houses, who also serve on the Council, with the Lieutenant Governor as chairman and the Speaker of the House of Representatives as vice chairman.
