Child sex offender arrested by KCSO

Kinney County Sheriff deputies arrested Wallee James Kielhorn for failure to register as a sex offender in the state of Texas on June 15.

Kielhorn was taken into custody without incident at 6:50 p.m. last Friday and is currently being held without bond in the county jail.

Kielhorn, 52, a resident of Fort Clark RV Park, was convicted of a sexual offense against a female child in Rhode Island in 1988, but upon his arrival to

Kinney County, reportedly in October, 2006, failed to register as a sex offender with local law enforcement.

Texas' Code of Criminal Procedure, Chapter 62, Article 62.051 states a person with a reportable conviction must register with the local law enforcement authority in any municipality where the person resides or intends to reside for more than seven days. The convicted person must report their full name, any alias, birth date, sex,

race, height, weight, eye color, hair color, social security number, shoe size, home address, recent photograph and any information pertaining to their crime and conviction.

Kielhorn, relatively unknown to the locals, made his presence known when he was arrested on May 26, for public intoxication and removed from the Fort Clark Swim Park.


Kielhorn was allegedly behaving in an inappropriate manner with two different children at the pool and parents reported the incidents to authorities.

Days later Kielhorn allegedly tried to entice two older teenagers to leave their place of employment with promises they could see his dogs do tricks out in the parking lot.

County officers confirmed the investigation into Kielhorn's past was initiated by the incident at the swim park, but would not discuss any of the allegations, citing the matter was under investigation.

According to Sheriff L.K. Buddy Burgess, the U.S. Marshal Service was instrumental in the investigation into Kielhorn's out of state record and subsequent arrest.

Kielhorn's arraignment process before District Judge Tom Lee is scheduled for later this month.

Crown to crush city's junked cars

City of Brackettville leaders voted to prepare a contract to allow Crown Recycling in Del Rio to set up a temporary junked car recycling center at the city collection site at a regular meeting on June 12.

As part of Mayor Eduardo Esparza's push to clean up the city, Crown representative Mike Saint Peter stated his family business has helped cities including Sonora, El Dorado and Menard improve the appearance of their streets by removing junked cars from public and private property.

Crown proposes to pay citizens cash on the spot for any junked cars removed from their property, even if the car does not have title.

Saint Peter suggested the city work with citizens to compile a list of cars that needed to be removed and Crown would start to work as soon as the contract was ratified.

The city believes this project is just another step to improve the overall appearance as well

as the health and safety conditions for its citizens.

Most recently, the city hosted a clean-up campaign by placing large containers on both sides of town that allowed citizens to discard large items such as mattresses and old furniture without charge.

City takes a whack at weed smokers

After allegations of drug use by new employees were made, Brackettville city council members voted unanimously to adopt an anti-drug policy at a regular meeting on June 12.

The new policy prohibits any use, sale or production of any illegal drugs or alcohol on, in or around city property and vehicles.

The policy will also require all potential applicants to pass a drug screen test prior to consideration for employment with the city.

The policy states current employees must consent to and

pass random drug screening tests. All failures to pass the drug test are subject to disciplinary action including immediate termination.

Questions were raised, but remained unanswered, if the city's volunteer firemen would be subject to these drug & alcohol screenings. City Secretary Bonnie Mayes was instructed by Mayor Pro-Tem Matt Bland to contact the Texas Municipal League for the answer.

The city's fire department is completely staffed by volunteers, but the trucks and majority of the equipment belong to the city.

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
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Be prepared for emergencies



Here it is that time of year again when we are faced with the threat of Evacuation from our homes. We never know when we this could happen because of fire, train wreck, floods or hurricanes. It is up to us to be prepared!

We never know when we this could happen because of fire, train wreck, floods or hurricanes. It is up to us to be prepared!

1. PEOPLE: Have a plan for getting out of the house and make sure everyone knows it. Have an emergency bag of food and water for your family. Include wholesome snacks and treats for the children: dried fruit, nuts, peanut butter, crackers and granola bars.

2. PETS: Keep pet carriers and leashes readily available to lead pets to safety. Also take pet food with you.

3. PICTURES: Keep negatives or CDs of pictures in a lock box or at a family member's home. Have picture albums in one place ready to grab and go at a moments notice.

4. PAPERS: Have all your important papers in a lock box at a bank and only keep copies at the house. This keeps you from panicking. If you have them at home then put them in a folder that you can easily grab if you have to move fast. Color code it so you can find it!

5. PRESCRIPTIONS: Take your medications with you.

Don't forget the ones that have to be refrigerated like insulin. Have small ice chest and cold packs readily accessible to pack and go. If you have babies; remember their formula or medications.

6. PURSES and PETRO: This is where you keep your identification, credit cards and cash. Keep a stash of cash for emergencies and grab it.

You may not be able to use an ATM in the event of a power outage.

Make sure your car always has a half a tank of gas.

7. PROPER CLOTHES and COMFORT ITEMS: According to the weather conditions; gather up a change of clothes along with outer clothing: coats, rain gear, boots, gloves and hats. If you have babies remember diapers.

Remember to grab your children's favorite blanket, stuffed animal or toy. A game or a deck of cards could keep them occupied and calm too.

8. PLANNER/CALENDAR/CONTROL JOURNAL: These documents have all the information you will need from phone numbers, insurance numbers and important dates. They are small and filled with things you don't have to try to remember.

9. PERSONAL PROTECTION: Many of us still have that time of the month. Be sure and grab a box of your preferred protection. It may be hard to find if you have been evacuated. Stress can cause our bodies to do strange things too. So be prepared. Take medication for cramps too.

10. PHONES, RADIOS, FUEL FOR THE CAR: Many of

us have cell phones now. Always keep them charged up and have a charger in the car or an extra battery.

They may not work in the event of power outages, but then they might.

Know which local radio station has emergency bulletins.

Keep your battery powered radio tuned to that local station and have plenty of batteries for it. Also keep an old type regular phone that does not operate with electricity.

GAS PUMPS don't work without power either. You can't leave if your car is on empty.

So keep your car fuel tank topped off when it hits a half of tank.

This way you will have gas to drive at least a couple of hours.

Evacuation routes are usually bumper to bumper traffic. Having a tank filled will keep you less stressed.


11. PATIENCE: This is one of the most important things to pack. Keep it inside of you so that you have a clear calm head. Having your P's to Preparedness list guiding you will keep you patient. In the event of an evacuation there will be lots of displaced people. Being patient will make things less stressful. Your children need to see you calm and collected. This will help keep them calm too.

We can FLY in the face of Danger and Emergency if we are prepared. Don't wait till you are being asked to evacuate.

Everyone thinks that it could not happen to them. Well it could and it is up to you to make sure you are prepared.

Don't wait! DO IT NOW!

Women must plan (EXTRA) carefully for retirement



If you're a woman, you have to be actively involved in your financial preparations for retirement - and that's true whether you're single or married.

As a woman, you have at least two special considerations associated with your retirement planning:

- You've got a longer life expectancy.

Women typically outlive men by about seven years, according to the U.S. National Center for Health Statistics - and more years of life mean more expenses.

You may have less money in your retirement plan.

Women drop out of the work force for an average of 12 years to care for young children or aging parents, according to the Older Women's League, a research and advocacy group.

This time away from the workforce results in women accumulating much less money in their employer-sponsored retirement plans, such as 401(k)s.

The prospect of a long, underfunded retirement is not a pleasant one.

Fortunately, there's much you can do to avoid this fate. For starters, know what's going on in your financial situation. If you are married, share the responsibility of making investment decisions.

What are your retirement goals?

Are the two of you investing enough to eventually achieve these goals?

And where is the money going?

You must know the answers to these questions.

You'll also need to know what you could expect to receive if your husband dies before you.

As a surviving spouse, you will likely inherit all your husband's assets, unless he has specifically named other people - such as grown children from an earlier marriage - as beneficiaries.

Nonetheless, you can't just assume that all sources of income that your husband receives will automatically roll over to you.

For example, if your husband were to die before you, you wouldn't get his Social Security payments in addition to your own, although you could choose to collect his payments instead of yours.

But if you both earned close to the same income, you might not get much of an increase in Social Security benefits.

In any case, whether you're married or single, here are some moves that can benefit you:

"Max out" on your 401(k).

If you can afford it, invest the maximum amount into your 401(k) and increase your contributions every time your salary goes up.

Your 401(k) provides you with tax-deferred earnings and a variety of investment options.

Contribute to an IRA. Even if you have a 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan, you might be eligible to contribute to a traditional or Roth IRA.

A traditional IRA offers the potential for tax-deferred earnings, while a Roth IRA potentially grows tax-free, provided you don't take withdrawals until you're 59-1/2 and you've had your account at least five years.

You can fund an IRA with virtually any investment you choose.

Do whatever it takes to help ensure a comfortable retirement - and the sooner you start planning, the better.

the identity of the writer, nor where the student resides.





Arrangements were by Rushing-Estes-Knowles Mortuary.





Colorado Chile Rellenos
6 Wonton Skins (about 6in.

square eggroll wrappers)

6 1oz. slices of cheddar cheese

1/2 cup oil

Green Chile Salsa or hot green chile

Heat oil in a skillet over medium to medium/high heat until a piece of eggroll wrapper browns easily without burning.


On each wrapper center one whole chile. Fold cheese in half forming a rectangle about 4 in. by 2 in., tuck cheese inside chile. Dampen edge of eggroll wrapper with water, fold bottom

up, top down and ends in, making a long neat package. Fry rellenos until slightly puffed and golden, turning once with a pancake turner. (You can use tongs though we find this tricky to do with the hot oil.)

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



