We spent the weekend in Cowles, N.M., at the Mountain View Ranch, and the ranch received anywhere from three to four inches of rain while we were there.

We were in the mountains for parts of five days, and it rained some every day. Saturday night was a real treat. It started out with one of those good old mountain showers, in the middle of the afternoon. Then in the middle of the night it set in and rained until almost dawn, between two and three inches of good, wet moisture.


Paving Fund Deposits Up Over \$5400

Farm Program Deadline Near

With less than one week remaining until the Monday, July 15 deadline for farm program signup and certification, Parmer County grain and cotton farmers are reminded that program participation provides disaster insurance and eligibility for support loans and payments.

"Now that crops are planted, we want to remind farmers to come by the ASCS county office at their convenience to sign up and certify-just as long as they do so by no later than July 15," said Prentice Mills, county executive director.

Signup and certification are as important as ever to producers this year, he noted. The new program provides for

disaster payments to participants if their feed grain, wheat or cotton crops are lost or the yield substantially reduced because of natural disaster. Also, as in prior years, eligibility for support loans and payments is dependent upon being in the program. Accuracy is extremely important in certifying crop acreages.

"Remember, July 15 is the last day farmers can sign up and certify their farm program participation. We hope that every eligible producer has visited the Parmer County ASCS office by then," reminded Mills this week.

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

ALA Reports TB Increases

Mrs. Pearl Cervantez, director of the Bovina Neighborhood Center, and Mrs. Cordie Vargas, an associate, attended a recent meeting of the American Lung Association of Texas, Top of Texas Area, at High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo.

The increase in the number of tuberculosis cases in Texas was the main topic at the meeting. Mrs. Cervantez reported that 1271 cases in Texas had been reported through June 8 as compared to 905 at the same time last year.

The Christmas Seal organization also reported on plans to promote the rights of nonsmokers in public places and plans to support medical research and training on such lung diseases as emphysema and asthma through an expanded memorial gifts program.

"Monuments don't fight emphysema," said Charles McIntosh, director of the Top of

Texas Area group, "but memorial gifts to research do. I think people ought to know that the lung association has this program. It gives them a way to fight back at one of the most vicious diseases in the world."

The association sets the next meeting for Sept. 28 in

Social Security **Benfits Raised**

The second part of a two-step increase in monthly social security benefits will be included in checks delivered in July, according to William Ent, social security field representative in Clovis, N.M.

A seven per cent increase was included in checks beginning in April. Since the total increase over the amounts received before April is no more than 11-per cent of which seven-per cent has already been applied, the amount of the increase to appear in the July 3 checks will be slightly less than four-per cent of the benefits received on May 3 and June 3. "The increase will enhance

the financial security of over 1,035 Parmer County residents, Ent said. "People getting social security checks don't have to do anything to get the higher payments. The increase will be added automatically."

For 1974 the amount of yearly earnings subject to social security deductions has been increased from the first \$10,800 to the first \$13,200, but there is no increase in the contribution rate. Employees and employers will continue to pay 5.85 per cent each on covered earnings, and the rate for self-employed people drops to 7.9 per cent.

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

His daughter, Mrs. Amos Steelman, recalled that the house had no ceiling and only two partitions-one running the length of the house and the other

dividing one section into two bedrooms. She said the Glover family lived there about 18 months before selling and moving to the farm. "I can remember a terrible storm during the time we lived there," she recalled. "Mother and we children sat in the middle of the house and watched the adobe walls actually swaying in and out. We thought they would surely tumble in on us. After the storm, Daddy and some other men brought timbers down to reinforce the walls.'

Dismal Sorghum **Yields Predicted**

"High Plains crops have been well seasoned this year-peppered with hail, salted with isolated floods and baked to a crisp by the driest year in recent history. They lack the important topping of anhydrous ammonia," said Elbert Harp, executive director of Texas Board in Lubbock, Texas.

"To make matters worse," he continued, "area crops are being sampled by grub worms and spider mites, with midge and greenbugs standing by awaiting their turn."

Harp painted a dismal picture of crop conditions in an area that normally produces 25 percent of the nation's grain sorghum. He said that much of

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

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
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
