KATY SHOPS AT DENISON BURNED

BOLT OF LIGHTNING STARTS FIRE WHICH DESTROYS PROPERTY TO VALUE OF \$80,000.

RAIN SAVES BUILDINGS

Destroyed Structures Will Be Rebuilt at Denison With Very Little Delay—Many Out of Work.
Texas News Service Special. Denison, Tex., June 18.—As a result of a bolt of lightning striking the building about 11 o'clock last night, the Katy car sheds, mills and paint shops, and about one hundred empties were destroyed by fire last night. The total loss is about eighty thousand dollars, higher estimates placing it at one hundred thousand.

Most of the machinery in the buildings cannot be used, as it is twisted by the heat. A large force was put to work this morning removing the debris preparatory to rebuilding of the structures that were destroyed. Reports that the management of the road will entertain overtures from other points to have the shops rebuilt elsewhere are unfounded.
A hard rain began falling soon after the fire started and this undoubtedly saved the other Katy buildings. Otherwise, they would almost certainly have been destroyed, with a total loss of two hundred thousand dollars.

About two hundred men are thrown out of employment until the shops can be rebuilt. The employees assisted in fighting the fire and many risked their lives getting cars and engines out of the burning buildings. No one was hurt, but many narrow escapes are reported.
William O'Herria, superintendent of motive power on the Katy arrived this morning and his estimate places last night's losses at two hundred thousand dollars.

YOUTHFUL INCORRIGIBLES LANDED IN THE CITY JAIL.

Chief Gwinn this morning juggled two boys, hardly in their teens, who he says have been giving him more trouble than all the rest of the town together. Their latest offense consists of stoning an old man. They hit him in the face with rocks and he is painfully hurt. The chief says he will keep the youngsters confined until he feels they have learned a lesson. An unsuccessful effort was made not long ago to send them to the reformatory.

Roller to Meet 'Terrible Turk.'

Seattle Wash., June 18.—Much interest is displayed in the catch-as-catch-can wrestling match tonight between Dr. B. F. Roller of this city and Yustiff Mahmout, known as the second 'Terrible Turk.' STREET LABORER SON OF VIRGINIA OFFICIAL

O'Brien, who has been working here as a street laborer, is the son of the State treasurer of Virginia, who is wealthy. His identity was revealed through a message saying his father was ill. O'Brien came here secretly to make an independent start in life and was earning eight dollars weekly.

'BEST AND MOST PROGRESSIVE CITY OF 10,000 POPULATION.'

A Kansas City man who wrote to Secretary B. E. Paddock of the Fort Worth Board of Trade, asking him to point him to the "best and most progressive city of ten thousand population in Texas" was promptly referred to Wichita Falls and will doubtless submit some sort of proposition to this city. Capt. Paddock saw that this city filled the bill and recommended Wichita Falls.

MANY COMPLAINTS CAUSED BY OPPRESSIVE HEAT YESTERDAY.

With the thermometer loafing around the ninety and ninety-two marks yesterday and hardly a breath of air stirring, the heat yesterday afternoon was almost unbearable. Late in the evening clouds appeared in the north and west and a breeze sprang up, making things cooler, but throughout the night the weather was anything but pleasant.

AFTER NIGHT MAIL SERVICE ON WICHITA VALLEY ROAD.

Wichita Falls is making an effort through the Chamber of Commerce, to have night mail service established between this city and Abilene on the Valley. Abilene and Stamford have also taken the matter up and Superintendent Gaines, chief of the railway mail service in Fort Worth, states that the night clerks will be put on if it is found to be at all practical.

STEPHENVILLE MAN IS NEW PRINCIPAL

J. B. Jones of Stephenville, for a number of years principal of the high school of that town, was yesterday afternoon elected principal of the high school of this city, succeeding Prof. Fairchild, resigned. Prof. Jones was elected to the position over a large number of applicants.
The new principal is forty years of age and has been teaching for the past twenty years. He is a graduate of the National Normal University of Lebanon, Ohio, attending it in 1891 and 1892. He has also attended Baylor University and the University of Texas. His teaching has been at Granbury, Comanche and Stephenville. He comes very highly recommended and the school board believes it has made the best possible selection. At present Prof. Jones is teaching at a Dallas business college, where he has accepted a position for the summer.

Planning for Dallas Encampment.

Dallas, Tex., June 18.—General A. L. Meyer, commander of the Department of the Texas United States army is in Dallas today making final arrangements for the maneuvers of the troops here in August. It is expected that twenty-five hundred troops will participate.

TEXAS BLACK HANDER GETS BOND REDUCED

Mrs. Irwin was arrested at the place where the letter directed the sum of money be left. She says she was forced to go on threats from others. Mrs. Irwin was at one time court stenographer for Judge Townsend of Ardmore.

GOULD SERVANTS STILL TESTIFYING

REGULAR PROCESSION OF FAMILY EMPLOYES ON STAND IN SEPARATION CASE.

HOWARD GOULD TO TALK

Defendant Will Probably Take Stand in Own Behalf This Afternoon. Large Crowds Attending.

By Associated Press. New York, June 18.—The long procession of servants and employees of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Gould to the witness stand in the separation proceedings continued today.
Attorney Nicoll, the defendant's counsel, stated today that there was a possibility that he would reach his client during the day and call Gould to testify in his own behalf.

Harry Veitch, employed as a valet in the Gould household during 1905 and 1906, testified this morning that he had seen Mrs. Gould under the influence of liquor several times. He traveled with her in the West Indies and Europe.

The usual crowds in attendance at the trial thronged the court rooms today, being larger than usual on account of the prospects of Howard Gould himself taking the stand. His testimony is expected to be very interesting.

IRON MOUNTAIN TRAIN HELD UP

OKLAHOMA ROBBERS TRY TO SECURE MONEY FROM CREW. OFFICER KILLED BY THEM.

CHASED BY LARGE POSSE

One of Three Robbers Shot in Breast and Captured—Others Being Rapidly Pursued.

Texas News Service Special. Muskogee, Ok., June 18.—Three train robbers held up an Iron Mountain freight train near Bragg, Oklahoma, this morning in an effort to rob the members of the train's crew, who had just been paid off.
They are now being pursued by a posse and in a running fight which took place not far from Bragg, Deputy Constable Kirk was killed.

Paul Williams, one of the robbers, was shot through the breast and captured, but the others are still at large. A large force is pursuing them, but the robbers are well supplied with ammunition and are putting up a stiff fight.

The train crew had just received their month's pay and the robbers, knowing this, attempted to rob the entire number. Just how successful they were has not been learned.

The crew had just received its pay when three masked men boarded the train and covered the engineer and fireman with revolvers. Conductor Ashley and brakeman White, who were armed, opened fire on the robbers, who put up a fight.

Constable Wicks and Deputy Kirk pursued the robbers, overtaking them. Two of the robbers escaped. Sheriff Ramsey and a posse are in pursuit with bloodhounds. Excitement is high.

CAPTURE OF H-L-F BREED MAY LEAD TO TROUBLE.

Paris, Tex., June 18.—It was learned today that Will Hendrix, the Choctaw half breed who escaped from the Paris jail yesterday is now under the protection of friends in Oklahoma, who will resist his capture. The horse on which Hendrix escaped was recovered at Boggy Bend, near Red river. A posse is hunting Hendrix and if the parties meet a serious clash is expected.

DEFENSE OFFERS EVIDENCE AT IKE KNIGHT TRIAL.

FINISH PLANS FOR NEW HIGH SCHOOL

NEW BUILDING TO BE ERECTED WILL BE ONE OF THE FINEST IN NORTHWEST TEXAS.

MODERN IN EVERY WAY

To include Gymnasium, Manual Training Equipment, Rest Rooms, Fire Escapes and Other Features.

The plans for Wichita's new high school arrived from the architects and bids are now being prepared by local and Fort Worth architects. The building is to be one that will reflect great credit on the city, and will be the largest and best equipped structure of the kind on the Denver road.

The school will be 2 stories in height with a deep basement. In this basement will be installed the manual training department, with the carpenter shop, blacksmith shop, sewing and cooking departments, the steam heating plant and the toilets. A well-equipped gymnasium will also be placed in the basement.

On the first floor will be six large and roomy classrooms, and the city superintendent's office, the waiting room, and locker rooms. On the second floor will be an auditorium with a seating capacity of six hundred, the principal's office, rest-rooms for the teachers and toilet rooms.

The building will be heated by steam or by some other modern system, with electric lights and fire-escapes. Every door will open outward, thus insuring quick egress in case of a fire.

Very little wood will be used in the construction of the building. The window sills and similar fixtures will be of brick and while the building will not be altogether fireproof it will be very nearly so. The basement will be of concrete blocks and the upper stories of white brick with stone trimmings.

The cost of the building, complete with equipment and furnishings, will be nearly sixty thousand dollars.

CONVICED BANKER IS ALLOWED TO APPEAL HIS CASE.



DETROIT TURNS OUT TO HONOR WRIGHTS

Dayton, Ohio, June 18.—"The Wright Brothers' Home Celebration" culminated today in a blaze of glory. Through streets thronged with cheering thousands, the famous aviators rode this afternoon in one of the greatest parades this city has ever witnessed. Enthusiasm was the keynote of the monster demonstration. Waving flags and colors flashing everywhere, the two Daytonians who brought such high honors back with them from across the seas, were given an ovation that surprised even the promoters of the affair.

In the great parade the State of Ohio was represented by her governor and other high officials and by two regiments of national guardsmen, while the city showed its official favor not only in declaring the day a public holiday, but in decorating the city buildings from pit to roof with the national colors and banners bearing inscriptions appropriate to the occasion. In addition to the soldiers the parade included many civic organizations and children of the public school.

The procession was viewed by the Wright Brothers from a large reviewing stand in the downtown section. Occupying seats with them were their sister, Miss Katherine Wright, their father, Bishop Dright, and their brother, Laurin Wright, who is engaged with them in the manufacture of their aeroplanes. Representatives of the State and city, members of the Aero Club of America and a number of other invited guests also occupied seats on the stand.

Earlier in the day Wilbur and Orville Wright had been presented with the medals, one voted by an act of congress and the other by the Ohio legislature. The presentations took place at the county fair grounds, where many thousands of persons gathered to witness the exercises. Presentation speeches were made by Governor Harmon of Ohio and Mayor Burkhardt of Dayton.

The several features of the day's program were witnessed by thousands of visitors who flocked into the city from far and near to join with the citizens of Dayton in doing honor to the famous young inventors of the aeroplane. Every appearance of the Wright brothers in public was greeted with enthusiastic cheers. The warmth of the demonstration for once penetrated the natural reserve of the noted aviators, and their smiling faces plainly indicated full appreciation on their part.

DAMASCUS.

An Isolated Oasis in the Midst of a Vast Desert.

The situation of Damascus is remarkable—she stands isolated on an oasis of the vast desert which everywhere hems her in. You may see from Damascus the sunset touch with purple the low western hills twenty-five miles away. These hills mark the beginning of the great desert. Beyond them there is nothing but a rolling waste and the long roads to Palmyra and Bagdad. The permanence and prosperity of Damascus are due to the presence of two rivers, which have converted this spot of the dreary, desolate and uninhabited desert into a smiling and well watered plain. The Pharpar approaches only within seven miles of Damascus, but by means of canals and aqueducts sends its life-giving waters to the gardens of the city. The Abana is the stream from which the city's main supply of water is obtained. Minerva-like, it springs full born from the base of a perpendicular rock at Ain Fijib, in the heart of the Anti-Lebanons, and runs a course of ten miles in a gorge, a large river twenty to thirty feet wide and four feet deep, its waters always fresh and ice cold, casting out branches everywhere, permeating every nook and corner of the city, until, as one has said, "literally there is scarce a street, bazaar, khan, courtyard or dwelling house which has not its marble or stone fountain constantly filled with running water supplied directly by the Abana itself." Thus the Abana, not fruitlessly wasting her waters on that thirsty land, saves them in her narrow gorge till she can fling them well out on the desert and expends all her life at once in the creation of a single city.—Biblical World.

AMERICAN REFUSES TO SHIP LIQUOR.

Guthrie, Ok., June 17.—Hereafter no person in Oklahoma can secure a shipment of intoxicating liquor delivered to him by express at any office of the American Express Company in this State. S. W. Stone, State agency superintendent, today received a copy of an official order to all agents in the State, issued from St. Louis headquarters by F. D. Adams, general superintendent of the southern division of the American Express Company, directing them to deliver no such shipments. The order reads: 'Pursuant to order received from counsel to the governor of the State of Oklahoma, you will decline to deliver to any person any shipment of spiritous, vinous or malt liquors now in our possession, or that may come in our possession. Any such shipment on hand must be immediately returned to shippers, if known. This order refers to interstate shipments as the laws of Oklahoma already prohibit the transportation of liquors between points in that state except when handled through the State agency.'

The American Express Company handles its business over the Missouri, Kansas and Texas road, which will make all points along this line dry as far as express shipments are concerned. It is rumored that the Katy railroad is also contemplating such an order, although no official confirmation of such action has been received here. The Pacific Express Company has already informed State Enforcement Attorney Caldwell that it will refuse all interstate shipments of liquor to federal license holders in Oklahoma.

THE RIVER SEINE.

It is the Most Picturesque of the Highways of Paris.

We have heard almost too much of the streets of Paris and not enough of that street most distinctive of all—the river Seine. Flowing through the city for six miles, it is a highway, with its bateaux mouches, its bridges and its quays. Of a dark night the Seine may seem to lugubrious fancy the symbol of death in the city's life abounding—murky death and luky crime, oozy and silent wickedness. Yet normally, even perhaps to suicides, the Seine is but the mirror of a city's mood. There are lights everywhere—lights lengthened in the water. The Louvre and the Conciergerie shown in the stream are things fairer than their originals. It is better to look upon the eddying reflections of the bridges here than to stand in the Place de la Concorde, bright with its orange lamps in honor of an auto show. The lights on the Seine and its images are more alluring, more innately of fairyland and Paris, than the gilded boulevards.

Nor is it only in the moonlight that the Seine has charms. The holiday sculler finds it a paradise for miles above the city, and there are ever such fishermen as Maupassant's Renard. Line fishing is more than a mild sport at Paris. Even to watch its devotees seems to amuse your true Parisian. A legend tells us that in the commune days, when the Hotel de Ville was fired on and a dark page written in the city's history, the Seine fishermen pursued their pastime, imperturbable. And the tale seems likely enough as the saunterer watches the fisher folk, whose leisure may be envied more than their occupation and who are found not on the city quays alone, but in the banlieu, where the Seine's green bank is dabbled with villages in brown and red and gray and where one stops to watch the peasants bathe their horses in the stream itself, rubbing them down soon afterward by the river's brink. Within the city there are the men who clip poodles on the quays and higher back and picture stalls with their merchants and shifting groups of bargain hunters—the Odéon arcade for new books, the riverside for old.—Scribner's Magazine.

"The Prettiest Girl in Paris" is the promising title of a new musical comedy by Messrs. Aaron Hoffman and Harry von Tilzer that will be brought out early next season.

Songs of Tom Cats all remind us That, at some sweet future time, When at midnight you may find us Watching with our weapons fine.

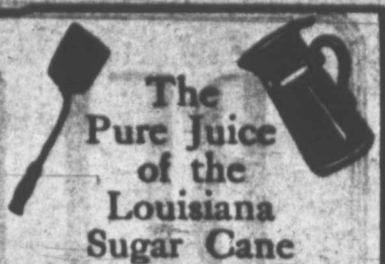

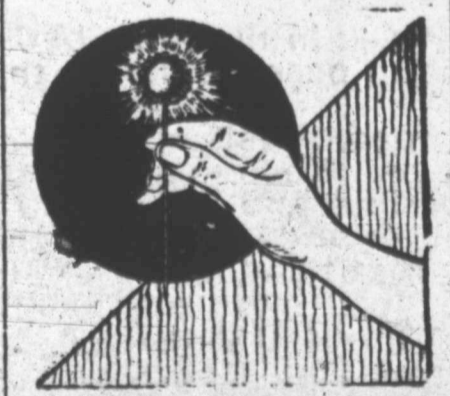

Stephenson the Oldest Senator.
Washington, June 18.—Senator Stephenson of Wisconsin was eighty years old today, though he might easily be mistaken for a man of sixty. He is as vigorous as many of his younger colleagues in the Senate and few have taken a more prominent part than he in the recent tariff debates.

The Wisconsin senator has the distinction of being the oldest member of the upper house. He is five months the senior of Senator Cullom of Illinois, who will reach his eightieth milestone next November.

Mr. Stephenson is not only the oldest member of the senate, but it is likely also that he is the wealthiest member of that body. He has a fortune estimated at from \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000, the bulk of it made in the lumber business in Wisconsin. When he went to the Badger State he was only sixteen years old and he was one of the first to plough its soil.

The first year he was in Wisconsin Mr. Stephenson broke 130 acres of land near Janesville and helped put in 400 acres of wheat. During the summers he sailed vessels on the lakes, carrying freight between Chicago and Escanaba. In the winters he worked in the lumber camps, and being a good judge of the value of timber, was able to locate for himself and associates hundreds of thousands of acres in Northern Wisconsin and Michigan, which in a comparatively short time made them millionaires.

Senator Stephenson has led a strenuous life, but he still has had leisure to engage in politics and has been a sturdy republican since 1856, when he peddled Fremont and Dayton tickets on the court house steps in Chicago. Few men have had more intimate acquaintance with public affairs or have enjoyed the confidence of more public men than he.
