Off to a rather slow start, the national political campaign is gathering speed that during the next few weeks publican and Democratic presidential pirants who are actively bidding for

April is herecmfwypcmfwypcmfwy the Kansas City and Houston conventions, both of them less than three months away, still is very much in the making. Less than one-fifth of the Republican deligates and less than one-sixth of the Democrats who will have voting credentials at Houston have been chosen.

April, however, will be a month of activity, with eight State primaries and party conventions in more than a score of States on its political calendar. During the month 555 Republican delegates, or more than half the number who will be at Kansas City, will be designated. Slightly less than half the total of Democratic delegates, 472, will be selected.

There will be 1,089 delegate voies in the Kansas City convention. Up to this time, 215 Republicans and 164 Democrats have been named. Once April is out of the way, 319 Republican delegates and 464 Democrats will remain to be selected in May and early June.

The April primary season will get under way Monday in Michigan where Hoover is seeking the Republican preferential vote and Smith the Democratic indorsement. As neither has opposition, each is assured the support in convention, at least on early ballots, of Michigan delegates who will be chosen later at party conventions. 



Since only six more weeks remain in this school year, the new plans and changes for next long session are already underway.

The most important subject at the present time is the building plan. No definite statement can be given as yet but provision will be made to take care of the great increase in the enrollment of Spur Schools. The records show that the total enrollment for this year exceed 800, an increase over last year's enrollment of about 230. The scolastics for this year show a great increase also, there being 632 last year and 925 this year. This authentic report alone should prove to the people of Spur the necessity of more room in the schools.

The greatest addition to the curriculum of the High School will be a vocational department made up of two divisions; the Home Economics for the girls, and the Agriculture for the boys. This new department will be a great help to the community for it will be open to all the men and women of Spur and vacinity. They may attend the regular classes or some other arrangement will be made This instruction will be free and will prove very valuable to the people of this community. Statistics show that a department like the one just mentioned will keep 25 per cent more students in schools, thus proving the practical value of such courses.

ing in this section of the state. The Rock Island has a dead end at Mangum, Okla., that they expected to extend onto the Plains many years ago, The Katy has a dead end at Wellington that they would like to have extended in the oil fields at Pampa. The Frisco is building into Floydada at this time. The latest move of the Santa Fe is out of Crosbyton to Dallas. This line would pass thru Guthrie and Seymour.

Building 200 Miles The Burlington and Fort Worth & Denver Railway are now building 200 miles of new lines into the South Plains with Childress as the main line terminal, ? The Burlington has surveyed north from Childress to Alliance, Neb., for a connection with the Burlington.

Citizens of Wheeler and Shamrock are planning to organize a railroad company and build an electric line from Wheeler south to Childress Power would be generated from gas wells in the Shamrock field. Many of these wells produce close to two hundred million cubic feet of gas

e, we can tell you to a opsis of an amendment to the Leatherwood Bill as offered by C. B Hudspeth, and will ask you to request your local newspaper to publish it.

> Congressman C. B. Hudspeth appeared before the Committee on Pensions of the House of Representatives this morning and made an earnest appeal for a favorable report on his Bill-H.R. 11 985- to amend and liberalize the Leatherwood Act, governing the granting of pensions for Indian War Service.

> Mr. Hudspeth's amendment provides that all veterans who can show thirty days service against Indians or in the zone of Indian hostilities shall receive pensions, whether or not they were sworn in by State or Federal authority. Many of the ranger companies were sworn in by captains of their own choosing and saw valiant service in pioneer days in protecting property of the early settlers from destruction at the hands of hostile Indians. And the condition of the times were often such that it was impossible to wait for the conferring of Federal or State authority before organizing a company and going after marauding Indians.

Congressman Hudspeth also brought before the Committee the amendment of his bill that provides that all IndianWar Veterans who can show above service be pensioned whether or not service occurred during the time that the State was out of the Union His contention is that this Indian War Service should be recognized just the same as that of all other periods of our country's history.

The committee appeared sympa thetic but it is impossible at this time to predict what action will be. The Congressmen of course strongly hope it will be favorable. Congressmen Williams, Jones, Buchannan, and Lanham, of Texas, also appeared before the Committee in favor of Congressman Hudspeth's amendment

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
