

All the candidates in the race were nominated by petitions signed by six or more qualified voters. In addition to those six, four more were nominated but requested their names be removed from the ballot. They were J. D. Stevens, Herman Estes, Harry J. Charles, and Warren Embree. Deadline for filing was March 7.

After being nominated, Quickel requested that his name be removed from the ballot. However, he later asked that the request be withdrawn and he is a candidate. An estimated 100 voters will take part in the election. This is an "off" year from a state and national election standpoint and fewer citizens than usual are expected to have a poll tax receipt and the right to vote, A sample ballot appears elsewhere in this issue of The Blade.


THE HAPPY OMEMAKER




SEW YOUR OWN GARMENT Do you have special fitting problems? -- A slim clothing budget? Do you get real satisfaction from sewing for yourself and others?
