The life of the Rural Mail Carrier could be one of everlasting sunshine were it not for some things he must know and do. The blessings he daily deals out to his patrons can only be told by the postman of the highway as he plods his 25 or 30 miles over hills and through 'hollows, in sunshine, cold, snow, hail and and the rain, meeting with mistortune here and disaster there; carrying a burden of blame, a heavy heart and a light purse. He enters the service with a bright countenance and a glad heart, which soon leaves him never to return, except when he is given assurance of a better salary.

He knows his requirements and fully realizes them to the extent of his ability. He must know the postal laws and regulations from A to Z, and woe unto him if he knoweth them not. He must carry a line of postal supplies, and at the same time he must fish the pennies out of a mail box for a patron who hasn't time to bother with the postage.

Not only must he be the

He must have a world of goodness, a modicum of wit and a little bit of wickedness. 
