### DOORS WERE CLOSED.

Banita Manufacturing Plant Forced To Quit Business.

The Banita Manufacturing plant of this city has closed its doors and the plant and all the machinery and lands belonging to the corporation will be sold by the trustee, W. G. Ratchitt, on November 6, 1906, to the highest bidder.

The Banita Manufacturing Plant was established years ago by A. C. and J. W. Ireson, and for a long time the Ireson Bros. were apparently successful in their venture. A few years ago J. W. Ireson sold his interest in the plant and moved away.

The new management made expenditures for improved machinery, etc., but the business did not increase to that degree to enable the plant to pay out.

The liabilities of the plant will amount to about \$1,000.

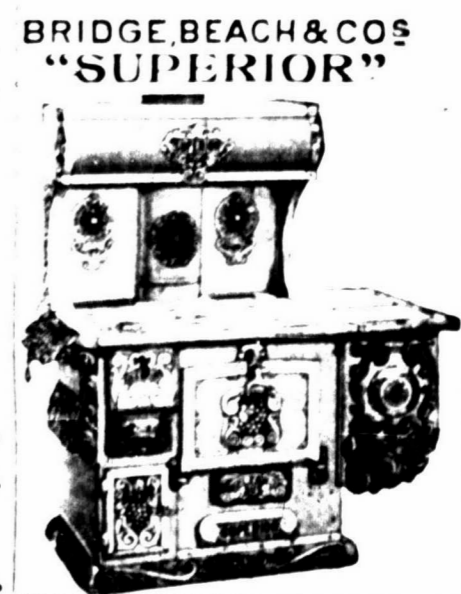

NACOGDOCHES should go after the T. & N. O. railroad and see if double passenger trains cannot be put on the Dallas-Beaumont branch.

WATCH Nacogdoches grow. There will be a business men's club organized tomorrow night for the purpose of looking out for the interests of the town.

THE Nacogdoches county Tobacco Growers' Association is taking the proper steps to develop this section of the state as the center of the tobacco industry.

SENTINEL readers should study proposed amendments to the constitution. These amendments are to be voted on at the general election and will become laws of a majority of the voters if the state say so by their ballot.

THE next big rush of homeseekers from the north and west will be to East Texas where the cut over pine lands are placed on the market at low prices, and Nacogdoches county should get in a position to land some of these good people.

SENATOR BAILEY has issued his statement to the people of Texas concerning his connection with the oil trust. He says that the work he done did not interfere with the duties he owed his constituents. He defies his enemies to find one time where he ever represented the Waters-Pierce Oil Co. in the senate.

LUTKIN has a wide awake commercial club, and the business men of that town are backing up the club. The first big thing the club of that city proposes to pull off is a county fair next year. Good for Lutkin. There is nothing better to get a town and county before the people than a county fair and agricultural exhibition.

IN reference to the challenge of the president of the Good Government Club of Houston, Senator Bailey is reported as saying: "I shall not notice this challenge or any other similar doings of H. F. Ring or his associates in the club he represents. Whatever I may have to say in that or a similar connection I will say publicly to the people of Houston when I make a speech in that city."

MEETINGS are being held over the state by democrats condemning the actions of Senator Bailey in connection with his employment by the Waters-Pierce Oil Co. It looks as if the junior senator will have a hard time to explain the matter in a satisfactory manner to the voters. As he has been nominated by the party in the primary election last July it will be a hard matter to arouse sufficient interest to defeat him.

### CALL IN THE TRASH.

The Brown News Co., of St. Louis, has taken the initiative in a move that will be sanctioned by every American who has an interest in the moral training of the youth of the land. The company has sent out a general order to all of its news stands to discontinue the sale of cheap literature that has a tendency to make heroes of criminals. The Jesse James, Younger Brothers and Dalton Brothers books are ordered sent in immediately. It is expected that other news companies will join in the move for a reform in literature. It is to be hoped that the move will meet sufficient encouragement to ultimately put a stop to the publication of cheap, trashy literature, particularly of that class that warps the mind and demoralizes the better nature of the young people who become addicted to the habit of reading such literature.—Val Verde Country Herald.

If the news stands throughout the country would only follow the example of the Brown News Co. a better class of men would be made of the young men of today, and there would be less work for the sheriff's department. In Nacogdoches there are many boys, scarcely in their teens, who hang around the news stands until the regular shipment of this class of literature arrives, and then they get a lot of cigarette material and go into a place of hiding and read this trash. Cut out "One-Eyed Pete, of The Terror of Rocky Gulch" and similar stuff from the news stands and the publishers of this trash will soon quit the business and happier homes and better men will be the result.

THE way jurors have to dispose of their jury scrip, should be sufficient cause for the voters of this county to vote for the amendment to the constitution providing a tax to pay jurors. It will be a good thing for the people and cut out money sharks who make it a point to buy jury scrip at the present time and get it at a big discount. Think this matter over and vote for the amendment providing for the pay of the men who have to do jury service.

THE readers of The Sentinel are reminded of the fact that the general election is not very far off, and that there will be several amendments to the constitution to be voted on. The proposition to amend the constitution to allow members of the legislature a salary should be snowed under so deep that it will not be heard of for many years to come, and if it is ever again presented to the voters let it be so amended that it will cut down the representation. Don't increase the expense of the big machinery of the government, by doubling the pay of the members of the legislature.

THERE should be a law passed prohibiting senators and congressmen accepting employment from trusts and combinations. The members of the National house cannot very well serve the people and corporations at the same time.

### EXCHANGE COMMENT.

Just think another farmer, Dave Muckleroy, reports that he netted \$169.55 off of two acres of tobacco. The Sentinel is highly pleased with the reports so far turned in concerning the tobacco crop this year. There will be a meeting of the farmers in this city on Saturday afternoon for the purpose of organizing the Nacogdoches County Tobacco Growers' Association. A cordial invitation is extended every farmer and truck grower and all parties interested in the advancement of the tobacco interests of this part of the State to attend the meeting.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

Just how many pounds he raised and what he got for it would have been interesting reading. More than this, the amount of labor expended in raising his crop ought to have been mentioned. The Sentinel and the Nacogdoches people are not the only people who are interested in the tobacco crop of that locality. There are thousands of people who want to know every detail connected with the crop, for raising it in Nacogdoches county may be yet said to be experimental. Thousands of dollars are seeking investment in land which will raise a high grade of cigar tobacco. As has been stated many times, the Bureau of Soils in the Agricultural Department announced the land about Nacogdoches was the best for producing the character of tobacco mentioned in all the United States, and even as good, or nearly as good, as the cigar tobacco lands of Cuba. If this is the case, men who desire to raise fine tobacco would prefer the Nacogdoches land to the Cuban land since in the latter they have no security of being able to gather their crop after they produce it. The Nacogdoches people should get busy at once and advertise their lands to the world, and in doing it they should enter fully into particulars. For men with money want to be thoroughly informed before the invest.—Gal-Dal News.

J. E. Reece was in the city this morning and to The Sentinel reporter stated that as all the other tobacco growers had given in their experience with this year's crop, that it would not be out of place to let his experience be known. He planted one acre, and from the first crop he gathered 608 pounds, and made no effort to save the sucker crop. For his 608 pounds he received \$97.00 and a \$10 premium, making his acre bring him \$107.00. His expenses amounted to \$25, and as part of this expense was of a permanent nature he considers that he did not really spend that much in the production of his crop. While he had in one acre last season it is his intention to plant three acres next year.

THE chairman of the Nacogdoches county democracy will not call a meeting as has been done in other sections of the state to get an expression on the actions of Senator Bailey.

### A Douglas Prediction.

Judge J. H. Broady of Lincoln, Neb., recently received a letter from Charles Neely of St. Paul, Minn., from which letter this interesting bit of unwritten history is taken.

"The pioneers of Illinois were accustomed to meet once a year in Chicago for a good visit and incidentally they would drift into political discussions. In 1861 the following named distinguished men met by agreement at the Tremont House in Chicago: Judge Stephen A. Douglas, General John A. Logan, 'Long John' Wentworth, William H. Gilman, Alexander Neely and Dr. R. S. Molony. When they were about to separate and return to their respective homes they were in the parlor of the hotel and I was present with my father. Judge Douglas said: 'Now that you are going I want to make a prediction. This government is fast drifting away from the masses and will soon become a money power. Some of you gentlemen may not live to see this come true, but this young man (referring to me) may do so.' General Logan replied: 'Judge Douglas, I fear what you say is too true.' All the gentlemen present have since passed away, and I am the only living witness."—The Commoner.

### A Serious Charge.

He was given a hearing at Texarkana Monday afternoon and his bond fixed at \$1,000 to await the action of the Federal grand jury at Tyler.

Grover Stegall was carried to Tyler Monday where he waived examination and was released on a bond of \$500.

The news of Grover's arrest was a great surprise to his many friends here, who firmly believe in his innocence. In justice to him it may also be stated that Postmaster Campbell does not believe he has committed any offense against the government, but that Bouvier is wholly responsible for the whole transaction. The friends of Mr. Stegall feel confident that his innocence will be easily established, and, in fact, it is doubtful if he will ever be indicted.—Lutkin Tribune.

MONDAY the free term of school opens and the attendance at the city schools will be greatly increased. Those who did not start with the first month should try and enter Monday and get advantage of the full term of the public school.

SENATORS and congressmen should not forget the fact that they are paid to represent the people in Washington, and if the salary is not sufficient, they should resign before accepting fees from corporations. That would be an honest way out of a bad fix.

FARMERS who are in a position to raise a few acres of tobacco should become members of the Nacogdoches County Tobacco Growers' Association and get in the game next year. The dues of the association are only \$1 per year, payable every three months, and the benefits to be derived from membership is of great importance to the farmers who expect to plant tobacco for profit.

There is no reasonable excuse for any man to live in a town if he does not like it. If you have no word of commendation to say for your town, its institutions or people, emigrate. You won't stop the town clock by going away. The church bells will have the same musical ring, the little dogs will play just as well and the pure air, bright sunshine and sparkling water will have the same health giving properties. Speak a good word for your neighbor, if you can; if you cannot don't everlastingly enlarge on their faults. If you have become thoroughly disgruntled move away; go somewhere where things will suit you.—Cherokee Banner.

## Packers Agree on Labels.

Washington, Oct. 1.—After numerous conferences about 40 representatives of the various meat packing houses have agreed with Secretary Wilson on labels which under the law must be put upon meat products after this date. Throughout Secretary Wilson stood for labels which would state exactly what the package contained, and thus the packers finally have accepted, with a compromise that the percentages of different meats contained in any canned article put out under one name need not be stated.

Secretary Wilson of the Department of Agriculture says of the new meat inspection law:

"The new law will be enforced strictly. We have an appropriation of \$3,000,000 a year to enforce it and we will have enough inspectors. Packers who do not keep their plants strictly clean, who allow unclean habits among their workmen or who fail to produce meat products under the most sanitary conditions will not get the government label.

"This means that they will not be allowed to ship their goods, and, in view of recent agitation, I am reasonably certain that no packer will be suicidal enough to throw the slightest hindrance in the way of an inspection of the products and supervision of the manufacture from the time the stock enters the yards on the hook until it leaves in the form of food.

"There will be no controversy by the Department of Agriculture with the packers. If they do not want to let our inspectors keep a close watch on every detail of manufacture, that is the outlook, but in such case they will get no labels.

"I want to emphasize the fact that there is going to be a different kind of inspection at the yards under the new law. It will be more complete and more systematic and the regulations will be enforced more rigidly."

The secretary said there were a great many independent packing houses in the United States, concerns representing investments of between \$100,000 and \$200,000 each, which the big packers called "small," where there were no inspectors at present. These were to be supplied with inspectors now.

## MAY CUT OUT WHITE SUGAR

Pure Food Commission Taboos the Whitening Process

New York, Oct. 2.—Unless the United States pure food commission changes its mind, the people of the United States will soon be using granulated and other sugars that have a distinctly yellowish tinge. The commission has decreed that no mineral bluing substance shall be used in bleaching sugars. Sugar chemists say they use four pounds of a mineral bluing substance to every one million pounds of sugar for bleaching purposes. This, the sugar chemists say, is not adulteration; that it is merely purification by a thoroughly healthful process. The pure food commission can not see it in that light and insists that the whitening process be abandoned.

AFTER all it is the cotton gambler who should be put out of commission. Were it not for the manner in which the cotton gambler manipulates the market the spinners would send their agents direct to the cotton producing states and the farmers would get better prices than they get now.

## Constructing Engineers Sought

Washington, Oct. 1.—The United States civil service commission is today holding examinations to secure eligibles from which to make certifications to fill vacancies in the position of constructing engineer in the Reclamation Service of the Geological Survey, at \$150 to \$250 a month. The great majority of these positions are for field service in the western part of the United States and in places remote from cities and ordinary lines of transportation. The commission has experienced considerable difficulty in securing eligibles for this position.

**Tobacco Growers Association.**

Saturday afternoon the Nacogdoches Tobacco Growers' Association met in the city hall, with a good attendance.

The meeting was called to order by Dr. Mayfield, president. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The by-law committee, Messrs. T. J. Meroney, W. H. Boozer, and D. H. Muckelroy, reported the following to the association:

**CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.**

**I. Name**—This organization shall be known and hailed as the Nacogdoches County Tobacco Growers' Association, of Nacogdoches, Texas.

**II. Objects**—The objects of this association shall be to promote the interests and welfare of the members, and secondly the welfare of their neighbors, especially with reference to tobacco culture.

**III. Membership**—Any tobacco grower residing in this county, or near it, may become a member upon election by a majority vote of all the members, or by a two-thirds of all members present vote at a regular meeting.

**IV. Officers and Their Duties**—The officers of this association shall be a president, whose duty it shall be to preside at the meeting of the association in a parliamentary way; a secretary who may also act as treasurer with the usual duties incumbent upon such officer in similar organizations; and five vice-presidents, who shall, in numerical rank, perform such duties as is customary or may be imposed by a majority vote of the members present.

**V. Quorum**—Seven members attending any legal meeting shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of transacting any business coming before the association.

**VI. Directors**—The president, three vice presidents and the secretary shall constitute a board of directors, subject to any change or restriction by the association, and three of said board shall constitute a quorum of the meeting of the board of directors.

**VII. Business Rules**—The customary forms and rules of similar bodies shall govern this association. All questions to be left to a vote, and in ordinary affairs a majority, but the minority may appeal to the entire body when a majority of all members shall decide; the vote being viva voce or by ballot, and including written proxies if authentic.

**VIII. Time and Place**—The meetings of this association shall be held in the town of Nacogdoches on the last Saturday in each month at 2 o'clock p. m. (subject to change by a vote at any meeting) and special meetings may be called when deemed necessary by the president, and attested by the secretary of the association.

**IX. Terms of Office**—The official terms of all officers of this association shall begin with the first meeting of the association in January, and continue in office until their successors are elected and installed.

**X. Dues**—The member-

shis dues in this association shall be \$1 per year, payable 25 cents every three months.

Mr. W. A. King said that he had been requested to turn in to The Sentinel, his experience with the tobacco crop this year, but had neglected doing so, but as the reporter was present he would make a statement to the association. He had planted 1 1/4 acres and had gathered a total of 1087 pounds from the patch, and for this he received \$163.05, and that his total expense was \$22.50 but that as he had hands employed on the place by the month that he had allowed \$37.50 for their help and that would make his expenses \$60.00, leaving a net profit of \$100.05. The crop this year was raised to a better advantage than in the past and that he found that it was easier to raise succeeding crops than the first.

Mr. L. P. DeMouche addressed the association on the subject of wrappers, he said that while the government had been conducting experiments in filler tobacco that he would show to the farmers of that county the truth that the red lands of this section would produce as fine wrappers as is grown anywhere on earth. His remarks were well received and the members present appreciated every thing that he said.

The association has now a membership of thirty-four and there has been pledged for the next crop sixty-five acres.

**Letter to Sheriff Buckner.**

Nacogdoches, Texas.

Dear Sir: Here's a tale with three or four tails to it. Professor Irvine has an Academy, Mercersburg, Penn. He paints the floors in summer vacation. It used to take 90 gallons of paint. There were two paint-stores there, and he used to buy (one year of one, next year of the other) 90 gallons year after year.

Now he paints Devoe; 60 gallons; and the difference is a saving of \$150 a year.

**THE TITLE TO MORA GRANT**

Is Believed to Lie in Those Who Are in Possession.

Nacogdoches, Texas, September 27.—Since the refusal of our county surveyor to survey the Mora grant, on which Oil City, with its great oil field, is situated, Colonel T. N. Jones has made application to the general land office at Austin for relief. On the 22d instant the land commissioner, Hon. John J. Terrell, wrote me as follows:

"The Mora grant is disclosed by the official map of Nacogdoches county in use in the general land office and is not now recognized by the commissioner as a vacancy."

The Mora grant has been recognized as valid from the day that the agent of the Spanish government, Flores, took Mora with witnesses to the "four corners" and "pulled herbs and threw stones," thus completing the sale by "livery of seisin." All this is of record here and at Austin. Mora at once moved his family on the land and his heirs and assigns are there to this day. While the records do not show a patent, which would have been nothing more than a certificate that the land had been sold, something after the manner of a marriage certificate handed to the groom after the nuptial knot has been tied, yet the Mora grant is disclosed by the official maps of Nacogdoches county and its occupants have been forced to pay taxes for about 100 years. The doctrine of equitable estoppel ought to apply with more force to a government than to an individual, but as the records show a valid grant by livery of seisin a resort to the plea of estoppel will not be necessary.

It is the opinion of Nacogdoches lawyers that there is no merit whatever in Mr. Jones' contention. Land and timber are selling at the same price as formerly. The two oil companies which were ready to begin boring for deep oil on the Mora grant have been "slowed up" some, but not "scared off." Nearly everybody in the county is interested in the result of this unfortunate and untimely attack, and is awaiting with almost breathless interest to see this gallant Don Quixote charge the windmill with all his might and whip it if he can.

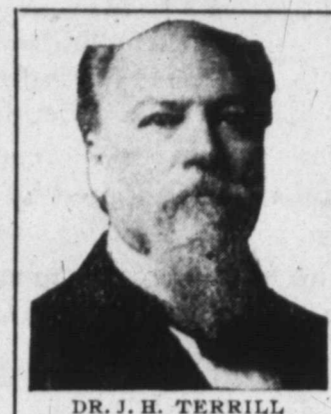
