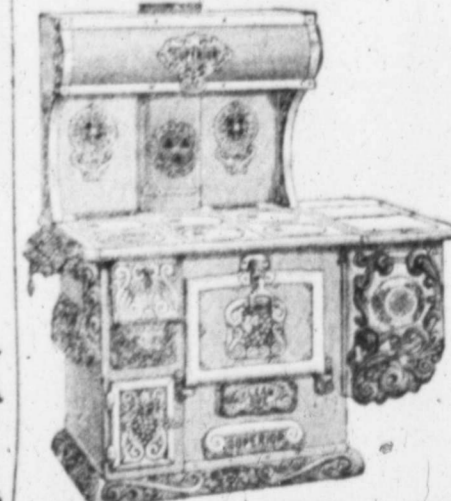

SIX STEAMERS ARE CHARTERED

By United States Government for Services in Cuba.

New York, Oct. 5.—Six steamers belonging to the Ward line have been chartered by the United States government to go to Newport News to take on troops and army supplies for Cuba. The City of Washington left yesterday afternoon, and the following boats are scheduled to sail today: The Niagara, Seneca, Monterey, Antilla and Bayamo

Secretary Smith of the Ward line was unable to say yesterday how long the boats would be in use by the government, as the charter merely stipulated that they were to be used as long as necessary. The fitting up of the steamers for the accommodation of troops was done by the company.

In capacity the boats vary from 400 to 1000 men each.

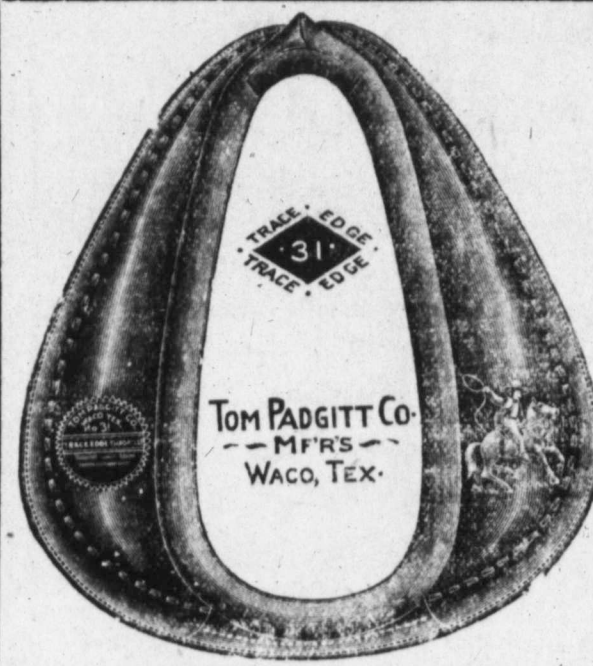

TOBACCO TALK.

Historical, Statistical, Practical and Profitable.

Tyler, Tex., Sept. 29, 1906.
Editor Nacogdoches Sentinel,
Nacogdoches, Texas.

Dear Sir:

I have noticed in the Dallas News and other papers recently, and also last year, clippings from your valuable paper in regard to the tobacco industry in Nacogdoches county.

You are perhaps unaware of how Nacogdoches got her first experiment in this industry. About eight years ago, as near as I recall, the late W. S. Herndon, my father, became interested in the subject of tobacco growing. He sent to Washington and procured about six or seven different kinds of tobacco seed and distributed them about 200 farmers in this community, they agreeing to experiment with the same and report back their results to him, to be reported to Washington city.

My father also grew about two acres of tobacco. This was properly housed and cured, and I still have samples of this tobacco at home and in my office at Tyler. Samples of this tobacco were sent by my father to Louisville, Ky. and to the department of agriculture Washington City. All of these samples were pronounced by experts to be good tobacco. The department of agriculture at Washington sent to Tyler Mr. Selfridge (I believe that was his name) to check this experiment. He examined the tobacco carefully and took some of the soil for analysis and returned to Washington. He again came to Tyler for the purpose of locating an experimental farm, but he did not get the proper interest taken in the matter by our citizens, and as he had heard much of the soil at Nacogdoches, he went there, and your tobacco industry, I believe, is due to that fact and to the experiment made by my father.

I am also deeply interested in the subject of agriculture and have made quite a few experiments in that line, growing this year, for example, one and one-third bales of cotton to the acre in spite of the boll weevil. Hence I would like very much to know the result of this tobacco growing at Nacogdoches. I believe that your paper to get some competent man, who understands the experiment, made, to write up the tobacco industry from its beginning to the present date, telling how it is raised, the kind of tobacco raised, the amount raised per acre, the cost of raising the same, and the net profit of each kind of tobacco per acre. This article written and published in your paper will secure wide circulation and attract a great deal of attention to your community. Your lands are rich and will grow many things besides tobacco, but this one crop would advertise your section like the peach and tomato crops have advertised Smith county. I would like very much to have this information, and if you do not see fit to publish it in your paper, I would be pleased for you to put me in touch with some of the growers who can give me the details desired.

The above letter is, in a general way, probably very nearly correct. We are not altogether "unaware of how Nacogdoches got her first experiment in this industry" though

we were not aware of the work of the late W. S. Herndon. His experience as congressman and his further knowledge of the special merits of East Texas soils justifies our full credence of the statement, as above made.

While the real origin of the present stir and impetus need not cause any distress, yet it is an interesting topic. As we understand it, this special move was originated by Col. S. F. B. Morse, now of New York, but then acting traffic manager of the Southern Pacific Railroad with his famous motto "Morse all Texas." At the close of the Boer war there was a large party of leading Boers who under the leadership of several of their well known officials, came over to this country in search of a suitable land for their people to colonize. Col. Morse escorted, or had them conducted, to Texas and other places. They saw Nacogdoches, and being attracted by the red lands with their hills and dales, forests and crops which they saw looked like home, they made careful investigation, even sending a scientific expert here, Prof. Nicholas Wychgel, of Holland, who rambled over the county inspecting it in a most exhaustive manner. He sent samples of these peculiar red soils away, or carried them himself, and made a thorough analysis. He reported to Col. Morse that they would produce a tobacco equal to the best grown in Cuba. Morse thereupon proceeded to secure options on these lands in a quiet methodic manner to the extent of 100,000 acres, and arranged to have this big colonization scheme of the refugee Boers financed by a New York syndicate, but it finally failed, and left him the holder of the noted "Red Field" tobacco farm, which is six miles from Nacogdoches, north-east, on the Houston, East & West Texas Railroad, and which he had bought and paid a fancy price for.

Col. Morse then turned the whole proposition over to a Nacogdoches land agency who under his guidance and favor, went north and secured the attention and efforts of the United States agricultural authorities to test the merits of these peculiar red lands, or as they are termed Orangeburg soils, for growing fine quality cigar fillers.

Prof. Milton Whitney, chief of Bureau of Soils, of Washington, D. C. came in person and after careful investigation carried on the work, first through Mr. L. H. Shaffer in 1904, then in 1905 and 1906 under Geo. T. McNess, W. M. Hinson, and assistant operatives all being experts and operating experiment farms here and in other Texas counties, with results highly satisfactory in success of quantity and quality of tobacco grown from Cuban seed.

Experiments in tobacco culture had been made long before by many persons, notably by Mr. Wm. Hillenkamp now an aged citizen of this town, who was an expert cigar maker and grew his own tobacco from Cuban seed.

Dr. F. C. Ford of this city,

who went with the United States army to Cuba in the Spanish war, also has made experiments, based upon his observation in Cuba, and sent samples to Washington which attracted special interest.

Following the Morse Boer failure came the noted Taylor-Webb scheme, led by Miss Alice Webb, who later became Mrs. Brodie L. Duke. This also fell down, but not without a great storm with its center at the famous Red Field tobacco farm, and which it would require volumes to give details in full.

Mr. Herndon's letter is most gratifying and commendable in many respects. This reply is not intended to be exhaustive but sufficient for practical purposes.

First, as to soil. There is a belt of what is called here red land, extending irregularly through Central East Texas from the Trinity river on the west to the Sabine on the east, Nacogdoches county being about midway of the 200 miles scope. There are various shades and qualities of this soil or soils, the one used mainly for tobacco being red sandy. The Bureau of Soils designates them as Orangeburg soils, from their resemblance to soil near a place by that name in the Orangeburg Free State. The United States experiments have demonstrated that these red lands will produce a fine quality cigar filler from Cuban seed, and in good quantity at small cost.

The Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Soils, Milton Whitney Chief, has published full details in Bulletin No. 27, 1905, "Experiments in Growing Cuban Seed Tobacco in Texas," by George T. McNess and Walter M. Hinson, which Bulletin is for free distribution. Additional experiments in 1906 are far more satisfactory, and it has also been discovered

THE FREE SEED HUMBUG.

Some of The Congressional Varieties Very Ancient.

Washington, D. C., Oct 4—“Behold how great a fire a little flame kindleth,” quoted a Long Island farmer of a religious turn of mind a few days ago when he saw about ten thousand packages of government “free seed” being burned in the yard of a neighbor in one of the suburbs of Brooklyn. “Why are you burning the seed?” he asked. “Because they are worthless,” was the reply. The farmer thoroughly agreed with this statement, but he thought they might be made useful. “What will you sell them for?” he asked. “You can have all you can carry away for half a dollar,” was the reply, so he loaded up a bushel bag and took it into New York. Here he told his story to a seed dealer, with the result that these despised seeds will form one of the principal exhibits in the anti tree seed campaign when Congress re-assembles. These ten thousand or more packages of seeds which a generous government forced upon unwilling Long Island farmers were not being destroyed because they old or worm eaten as was once the case. They were probably good enough in their way, but they were not good enough for the Long Island truck farmers although especially designed for truckers. They were destroyed because they were of the commonest varieties, many of them being seeds that had been on the market twenty or thirty years. In fact some of them are so old that they have been discarded by the more enterprising seedsmen for new and imported varieties, and the only place they are obtainable is at the Department of Agriculture, which sends them out in Congressional Free Seed Distribution as “new, rare and valuable” seeds. At one time the free seed distribution was a joke, but it has now become a serious matter. Congress is wasting a quarter of a million dollars yearly in this manner, to say nothing of the \$250,000 it costs the Postoffice Department to handle them. The farmers are getting very tired of the farce. The up-to-date and prosperous farmer considers it an insult to his intelligence for a member of Congress to send him a five cent package of the same kind of seeds his father planted twenty years ago and attempt to palm it off on him as something “new, rare and valuable.”

To determine just how “new” these seeds are, which had been rescued from the flames, the seed dealers examined their catalogues with interesting results. It was found that one variety of parsnip, two of lettuce, three of turnip, one of tomato, one of onion and two of raddish seed had been catalogued by a New York firm in 1879. One of

lettuce one tomato, and one muskmelon came into use in 1884. Five other varieties of lettuce were introduced between 1875 and 1890. The newest variety of seed was an onion, introduced by a Philadelphia firm in 1899, while the oldest was traced back thirty years, and no one knows when it was first presented. In view of these facts, which will be presented to Congress, it is scarcely possible that it will continue the fiction that it is sending out “new, rare and valuable” seed, even if it continues the distribution in the face of the ridicule heaped upon it by the agricultural and daily press, and the condemnation expressed by farmers and their organizations.

TIRED OF THE WEST.

The editor was shown a letter yesterday addressed to a merchant from a man who was reared in Shelby county and spent his whole life here until a few weeks ago when he was seized with the “western fever.” It was a most pathetic appeal, in which the writer promised to leave for his return on the first train after the money had been received, and the further statement that he would not stay that long if he could get away. The money was sent to him and the “prodigal” now swears life time allegiance to good old Shelby. We mention this for the benefit it will be to others. The farmer who has been reared in East Texas and learned to get along here cannot readily adapt himself to western conditions, and it is seldom that his purse will fit the new climate. Farm lands at from \$50 to \$100 per acre and the method of “artificial rain” are all new to him and usually beyond his reach or hope of attainment, and after a short residence he invariably longs to be back where the sun kisses the dew drops, where the rain is God-given, and where nature responds to every effort. The west Texas blizzard reminds him of the good old East Texas pine knot, and the lime water he is forced to drink reminds him of the flowing springs and babbling brooks that a moment of folly and instinct of unrest has deprived him of. Truly he will soon see the error of his way and concur with this paper that it is a privilege to live in East Texas, and a dangerous experience to leave.—Center News.

TEXAS IS undoubtedly the greatest state in the union and the best place on earth. Near Corpus Christi palm dates grew to maturity this year and ripened in the open field. If the experimenting business is continued a few more years Texas could build a wall around the state and people live and wax fat off the fruit of the land.

TEXAS TO LEAD BY JANUARY 1

Her Mileage Will Be Greater Than Any Other State.

The railway mileage of Texas is being increased at a rapid pace this year, and by January the Lone Star state will easily lead all other states of the union in the number of miles of main line track. During the first six months of the year 260 miles of new line were added in the state, and unofficial reports now show that the track laid since January 1 aggregates 425 miles. Work is being pushed to completion on several important extensions and the indications are that not less than 245 miles of track will be laid between now and January 1, 1907, which will make a total of 670 miles of new line for the year 1906. Various minor extensions under way have not been taken into account in the above estimate and it will not be surprising if the total new mileage for the year exceeds 700 miles. On January 1, 1906, Texas had 11,936 miles of railways, or only six miles less than Illinois, but the area of Texas is nearly four and three-quarter times that of Illinois—265,780 against 56,650 square miles. It has room for several times its present railway mileage.

The foregoing from the Railway Age does not convey the information that when Texas leads the union in railroad mileage next year it will be the second time in her history that she has attained such supremacy.

According to the statistics of the interstate commerce commission Texas in 1904 had 11,823.03 miles of railroad which Illinois, the second on the list, had 11,000 miles.—Houston Chronicle

THE Farmers' Union and the Southern Cotton Association will push the price of cotton, this year to ten and better. The cotton planters of the south have in the past lost a great amount of money by not being thoroughly organized, but now they are in a position to demand a living price for their product.

EARLY fall plowing will assist greatly in making good field crops. Nacogdoches county farmers who plowed their fields last fall grew better crops than their neighbors who waited until spring to break their lands.

It has been proven that onions will grow in Nacogdoches county to perfection. Try an acre this fall and see how well you will come out when the crop is harvested.

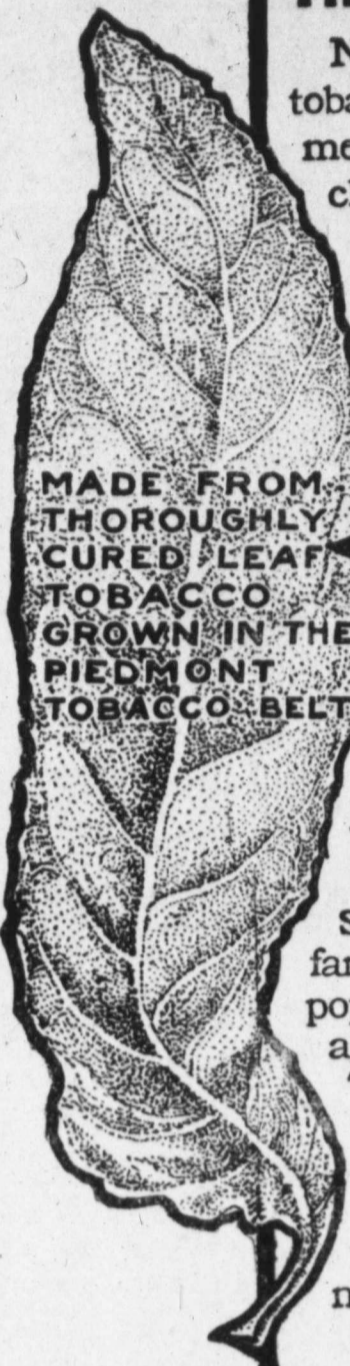

WHY MONEY IS TIGHT

Caused by the Expansion of Industrial Development.

New Orleans Oct. 5.—In recent weeks the South has had cause to wonder why money is harder to get for the present crop moving season than heretofore. An official of the Hibernia Bank and Trust Company of New Orleans, who is in close touch with financial affairs throughout the cotton and sugar belts, sheds this light on the situation:

“Crops are large, but the expansion of industrial development has been more rapid than has been the expansion of working capital in the South. The tightness of the money market, however, is temporary only for the reason the South today offers many splendid investment opportunities which are attracting capital in increasing volume.”

In New Orleans alone more than ten million dollars worth of new buildings are now in course of construction, while more than double that amount of money will be required to construct hotels and monster skyscrapers planned or contracted for. Within three weeks the New Orleans underground sewerage system, costing some twenty millions of dollars will be opened to public use while the first contracts for a complete new pure water system have just been let by the Municipal Council.

BRYAN ABANDONS FIGHT

Against Roger Sullivan Until State Elections Have Been Held.

Chicago, Oct. 5.—Congressman Henry T. Ramey, who has the lonesome distinction of being the only democrat in the Illinois congressional delegation, announced the more or less comforting news yesterday that William Jennings Bryan had temporarily abandoned his fight on National Committeeman Roger C. Sullivan and would campaign Illinois for the entire democratic ticket. Democratic politicians believe this action is due to the ugly row that has been started by Hearst, who is defying the party organizations in the West and working harmoniously with Tammany in New York. Bryan, it is pointed out, is willing to sacrifice his pride in order to keep his record clear on party loyalty. In other words, he will be a “regular” democrat until after the state election, when he is expected to again go after the scalp of Sullivan.

“Mr. Bryan sometimes changes his mind very quickly,” was the comment of Sullivan.

There is general rejoicing among the regular democrats over the fact that Bryan is to invade the state. Owing to the rebellion against Hearst, and the springing up of all sorts of socialistic and other mushroom offshoots of the dissatisfied party, the chances for victory were rapidly fading.

WAS A GENERAL FOR A DAY

Kansas Man's Commission in Cuban Army Was Revoked.

Wichita, Kan., Oct. 5.—A. Mosher of Wichita received a commission as general in the Cuban army Wednesday, and the next day he was asked to resign. His commission came directly from President Palma. He intended to raise a regiment of rough riders, similar to the one led by Theodore Roosevelt in 1898. In replying, Mr. Palma sent him a general's commission dating the commission back three months. When Secretary Taft arrived in Havana, Mosher was asked to resign and return the contract sent him by the Cuban government. In the same letter a draft was sent to him for his salary as a Cuban general since the date of his commission.

Mr. Mosher is more than 60 years old and is an old soldier. He served in the Union army as a lieutenant in the Eighth Illinois Infantry. Although he is more than \$1200 richer, he is sorry that Secretary Taft recalled his commission. His actual expenses of securing the commission amounted to 25 cents.

New Orleans Ready for the Big Convention.

New Orleans, Oct 5—Fifty thousand Pythian Knights, with a probability of a total of 100,000 visitors will assemble in New Orleans from Oct. 15 to 25 to celebrate the Biennial Conclave of the Supreme Lodge of the order and to see the sights, enjoy the hospitality, the rare cooking numerous theatres and many pleasures of the old Creole City.
