The governor has directed Judge Pollard to make a thorough investigation of the charges before any extradition papers are issued for the prisoners to the Mexican government. The cases are set for November 8.

Newspaper Passes.

According to the latest ruling of the interstate commerce commission newspaper men must in the future pay cash fares for transportation, just the same as ordinary mortals, politicians and city and county officials. The newspaper pass has never been the subject of so much assault as the rebate pass, the political pass or the officeholder's pass, but it seems the handwriting has been read that it must go along with the others. For one, the Enterprise is and has been for some time of the opinion that newspaper transportation is ordinarily the most costly of all railroad tickets. The full price is always paid by the paper for every mile used, and more often the newspaper account exceeds the transportation account than the reverse. Possibly the result of the ruling may be to reduce the newspaper travel and to that extent minimize the free advertising so many favored sections of the land have been accustomed to receive by reason of writeups of trips and tours. But the results will also in the same ratio of probability, be a saving to the pocketbook and bank account of ye newspaper writer and the railroads will run right along with the editor's seat, whether he occupies it or not, and will be forced to give up good coin of the realm for whatever advertising matter they are compelled to use.

The Nacogdoches County Tobacco Growers Association is making an effort to increase the tobacco acreage next season to 150 acres. The merchants of Nacogdoches can assist the association to a great extent by speaking of the matter to their customers and pointing out the advantage it would be to the farmers of the county to plant two or three acres in Cuban tobacco as an experiment. The experience of others can be cited, and also the fact that it is a money making proposition. A little enthusiasm manifested on the part of the business men of the city would add materially to the movement.

What is the Cotton Situation?

The sensible man in the South is beginning to be deeply impressed with the pregnant fact that the price of cotton determines his prosperity or adversity. And he is learning also that intelligence is an important factor in the profitable selling of the crop. We declared several weeks ago, when many farmers were rushing their cotton on the market around eight cents per pound that conditions all over the world warranted ten cents for every pound of the present crop. The present enormous demand for cotton is without any precedent in the history of the world. The two American crops preceding this one amounted to 24,600,000 bales. The two crops sold for an average of ten cents per pound. The estimated consumption of American cotton is placed at 12,500,000 bales. This is a conservative estimate. Estimating the present crop at 12,000,000 bales, the end of the present commercial year would witness the smallest visible supply for many years. But the spinners can not handle this crop all in a lump. They, like all other business concerns, only make purchases to supply present demands, unless they can buy at a sacrifice. The laws that govern trade and the law of supply and demand are as much alike as truth and integrity. The South is waking up to the importance of these great laws. — Henderson Times.

SEARCH FOR BOLL WEEVIL.

Efforts Being Made to Locate Pest East of Mississippi.

New Orleans, La., Oct. 31.—A search to determine whether the boll weevil has crossed the Mississippi river from Louisiana into the state of Mississippi is being prosecuted today in the vicinity of Natchez by officials of the state crop pest commission.

At the beginning of the year it was announced by government experts that the weevil would probably make its first crossing this fall, as it was agreed that the river would prove no barrier to the pest's eastward progress.

The recent cold weather, however, retarded migration and the present search is conducted under the hope that the weevil may be found still confined to the western side of the river.

THE ELECTION

The election in Nacogdoches county yesterday was little better than a farce. Not enough voters in the county having enough pride to come out and cast their ballot in order that Nacogdoches would have a fair representation in future conventions. It would not be surprising to The Sentinel if this county's representative vote in conventions would be cut down to about three in the future. There are approximately 4500 qualified voters in Nacogdoches county and it is very doubtful if more than 1200 votes were cast.

As to the democratic ticket in Texas it is elected of course, but if the democracy keeps up the pace as set yesterday it will be a matter of a few years until the republican party will put a good strong man out, turn over the boodle barrel and land him in the Governor's Mansion. It would serve the democrats of Texas just and proper for a republican to step in and snatch the honors from them one time, and then perhaps they would take a little more interest in the elections of their party ticket.

The proposed amendments to the constitution were carefully considered by the few voters who came to the election. The exemption amendment, and the amendment to provide for the payment of jurors received very fair majorities, while the amendment to increase the pay of members of the legislature was defeated by a small margin.

The New York situation is one that the entire nation was watching with much interest. From the best information obtainable at this time it looks as if Hughes, republican, has defeated Hearst, democrat for governor of New York.

There is an object lesson to the farmers of this county in the way the truck farmers are placing stuff on the market. There is not a farmer in the county who trades at Nacogdoches but what could have something for sale every time he comes to town. In fact he should raise enough on the side to supply his every want, and have a few dollars to spend while he is making his regular crop. If nothing more he could plant say two acres in Cuban tobacco and if he is as successful as those who planted tobacco last year he will net \$160 off of the two acres. There is not a farmer within six miles of the city but what can plant two acres, and handle it successfully. It has been demonstrated that the returns will justify any man to make the experiment.

Texas Oil Production,

Texas in 1905 produced 20 89 per cent of the oil output of the entire United States, being exceeded only by California, which produced 24 81 per cent of total output. Ohio stands third, with Kansas, Oklahoma and Indian Territory, together, fourth. However, when it comes to the cash value of the production, the situation changes. Ohio leads, West Virginia is second and Pennsylvania is third, Texas dropping down to sixth place. The 28,136,189 barrels of oil that the Texas fields yielded last year were worth only \$7,552,262, whereas the 16 346,660 barrels from the Ohio fields were worth \$17,054,877. The oil from West Virginia and Pennsylvania brought the highest price per gallon on the market. The first record which the United States geological survey has of oil in Texas was the year 1889, when 47 barrels is given as the production, and for six succeeding years the yield is given around the 50-barrel mark. This, manifestly, is a very incomplete record, though it is evident that the production in the state during that period was exceedingly light. In 1898 the production jumped to the half-million-barrel mark, and then went up by leaps and bounds until 1905, when the yield aggregated in excess of 28,000,000 barrels.

the ministers, from that day to this God's blessings has followed us so the latch string still hangs on the outside.

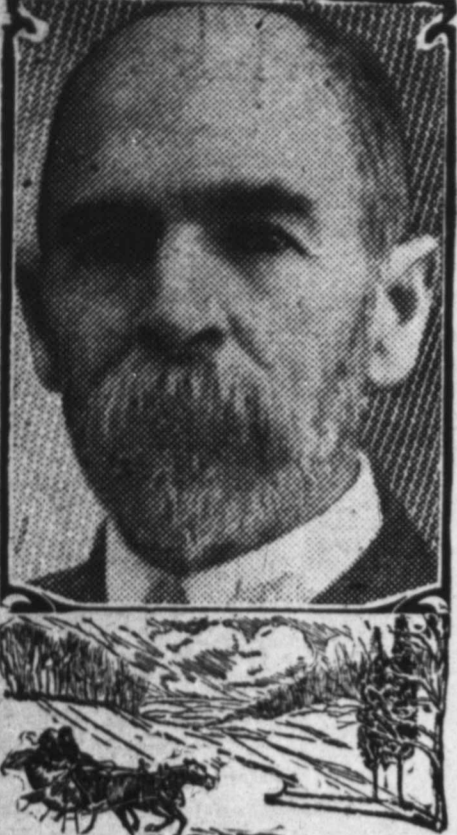

DEATH OF GRAIN HANDLER

Fell Into Wheat Pit and Smothered to Death.

New York, Nov. 6.—Patrick Dolan, foreman of the grain handlers at the elevator of the William Baird Company, Brooklyn, fell into a pit containing 3000 bushels of grain yesterday. The little kernels, rolling against one another like myriad cogs of a great machine, clasped his feet, ankles, legs and knees, crowding each other like honey cells, held him fast and drew him down with a power that was irresistible.

Dolan plunged this way and that, and with every step the quicksands gripped him more firmly. He called for help, and Petro Mazio, a fellow workman, went to his assistance. He threw a rope to Dolan, which the latter seized so desperately that he drew Mazio also into the pit.

Other workmen, who had been to lunch, now heard the outcries, but both men had disappeared when they reached the scene. A rush was made for the chutes through which the grain is unloaded, and unfastening the covers, the men let the wheat run into the street.

Soon Mazio's body shot down the chute and Dolan's followed. The latter was dead, having smothered, but Mazio was still alive and will recover.

CHANGES HIS VIEWS.

Railroad Commission Now Proposes to Regulate Pullman Charges.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 6.—The proposition on the part of the railroad commission to take the Pullman Palace Car Company under its jurisdiction has created surprise. Two years ago Representative Union and Peeler introduced a bill in the legislature for this very purpose; that is, putting this concern under the control of the commission.

The Pullman Company in opposing the measure published and circulated a statement from Commissioner Colquitt to the effect that he was opposed to the idea, as it would make the Pullman Company a common carrier and negroes would be permitted to ride in sleeping cars and he did not want to ride with negroes. This statement was largely responsible for the defeat of the measure.

The motion to assume control over the Pullman Company was made by Commissioner Allison Mayfield. It reads:

"I move that notice be issued requiring all the railroads operating passenger train service in this state to file with this commission a detailed statement disclosing on what trains it operates sleeping cars; the number of such cars, and what it pays each; that at the next regular hearing the commission propose a horizontal reduction of 20 per cent in all charges now extracted for berths in sleeping cars and that the railroads be required to continue in use all sleeping car service that now exists, and such other additional sleeping car service as may from time to time be authorized or directed by the railroad commission."

Chairman Storey indorses the motion as follows:

"All right; set it down for hearing."

Commissioner O. B. Colquitt indorses the motion as follows:

"The first part of Commissioner Mayfield's motion is not necessary to set down for hearing. It calls for information that can be secured without a hearing. I vote for it."

"If the second part of the motion is to be addressed to the railroad commissioners and the sleeping cars are to be treated as equipment of the railroad company as we did in the refrigerator tariff regulating the icing and furnishing of refrigerator cars by railroad companies, then I vote for the second part of the motion also. I think we have power to regulate any service which the railroad companies themselves advertise to furnish to the public, whether the cars and equipment used by them to furnish same belongs to themselves or to others. Over sleeping car companies, as such, the passenger train service in this state to file with jurisdiction. But I believe that we can treat the sleepers as equipment of the railroads—the carrier who offers to the public sleepers in which to travel."

ENORMOUS PULLMAN SURPLUS.

Company Said to Fear to Distribute Its Millions.

Chicago, Nov. 2.—The Pullman Company fears to distribute to stockholders its enormous surplus of \$30,000,000 has been taken from the public in eight years, and also 8 per cent regular dividends.

In 1898 the company had \$36,000,000. A stock dividend of 50 per cent and a distribution of 20 per cent were made. Noticing the enormous earnings the state of Illinois began a fight on the company, which forced it to get out of the real estate business. Big revenue was gained from the town of Pullman. As the company's charter did not provide for a real estate business, it was forced to sell all lands and leases and houses in Pullman, but was allowed to retain an office building in the city.

Stockholders want the surplus, but the company fears it may be hit by the law.

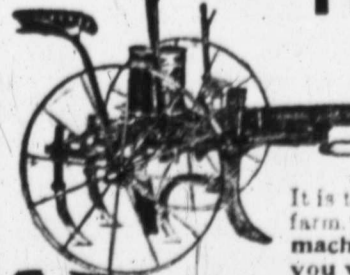
