delegates of other political  
faiths to lend interest to the  
proceedings.

### THE MONUMENT DEDICATED.

In Memory of Iowa Soldiers Who  
Fell at Rossville Gap.

Chatanooga, Tenn., Nov.  
20.—The monument erected in  
memory of Iowa soldiers who  
fell at Rossville Gap was dedi-  
cated today with notable cere-  
monies. Governor Cummins  
and other distinguished Iowans  
were in attendance.

Passenger service on the  
Nashville, Chattanooga & St.  
Louis railroad was tied up on  
account of heavy rains, and it  
was feared that the visitors  
from points on this line would  
not be able to attend, but  
through service was again re-  
sumed yesterday and large  
crowds come in this morning.

### JERKED INTO ETERNITY.

Garret Pays The Death Penalty  
for Murder of Dr. Paul

Center, Texas, Nov. 21.—  
Another negro has paid the  
death penalty for the murder  
of a good man. Dick Garret,  
the negro who on last Satur-  
day murdered Dr. Paul, was  
tried in the district court at  
Center this morning, and after  
hearing the evidence the jury  
was duly charged. After hav-  
ing been out for a few min-  
utes the jury announced ready  
to report. The jury was  
marched into the court room  
and the verdict read:

"We, the jury, find the de-  
fendant, Dick Garret, guilty of  
murder in the first degree and  
assess his punishment at  
death."

After the jury had made  
this announcement, Garret  
said he would waive the con-  
stitutional thirty days and  
wanted to be hanged.

Garret was indicted yester-  
day morning at 10:30, the case  
went to trial this morning at  
11:30, and 1:30 the rope was  
cut and the soul of Garret  
was plunged into the darkest  
corner of the lower regions.

Judge S. M. Davis, special  
judge tried the case in the  
absence of Judge Perkins.

The report that the grand  
jury had returned an indict-  
ment against Hon. H. B.

bill no one in Center has been  
informed.

When the news reached  
here that the judge had been  
indicted as an accessory to the  
crime it was found in an out-  
side paper, and the news of  
this report caused Judge  
Short to become very sick.  
His condition today is better.

Everything in Center is  
very quite now since the negro  
has been hanged, but last  
night and yesterday there  
was a very angry crowd of  
determined men here; in fact  
the largest crowd ever assem-  
bled in Center was here for the  
hanging.

Railroads will "Cough Up" Thou-  
sands in Event They Lose.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 13.—  
Under the ruling of supreme  
court in the gross receipts tax  
case against the railroads, the  
Texas and Pacific will be called  
on to pay over to the state,  
should the case finally go  
against the roads \$36,232; the  
Katy \$36,119, and the Sante  
Fe \$37,387. Other large  
roads will pay in the neigh-  
borhood of these amounts.

### SPEAKS THE TRUTH.

There is one thing to a certainty, the divorce laws of the state of Texas will have to be changed. It is too easy for a boy and a girl to get married and then allow some alleged grievance to be set up and allow them to have a divorce. If there was a law compelling a man to remain unmarried for a period of four years, and a woman a period of two years, after being divorced there would not be so many divorces applied for.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

The Sentinel speaks the truth in the above. The last legislature attempted to amend the present farcial divorce law, and a storm of protests from the cheap divorce lawyers succeeded in killing the measure. Many of these kind of lawyers were in the legislature at the time, and right on this point is where the rub will come whenever the state wants its divorce laws amended. The lawyers in the legislature won't stand for it. Some states still retain the old custom, which gives the power to grant divorces to the legislature only. This is not a bad idea.—Houston Chronicle.

## TEXAS' GREAT DEVELOPMENT.

Commissioner Clay Prepares Article for Southern Trade Journal.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 15.—W. J. Clay, state superintendent of insurance, agriculture, statistics and history, at the request of a trade journal of Chattanooga, Tenn, has prepared an exhaustive statement concerning the wonderful development of the state of Texas since 1850 to the present time. Commissioner Clay says that "from the date of the inauguration of the first governor of Texas to the present time, the state has enjoyed a season of almost uninterrupted prosperity. It has grown in commercial and political importance, in wealth and renown, until now it is recognized as one of the leading states of the union, and its people are known and respected throughout the civilized world. The savage Indian, the cruel Spaniard, the wild animal, the herds of buffalo and mustang horses are numbered with the past. Civilization under a republican form of government has changed the scene. The once impenetrable forests and sandy deserts now present a vast panorama of beautiful rolling prairies, fertile plains and lovely woodlands, dotted with thriving villages and cities, with churches and schools with plantations of sugar cane and cotton, with farms teeming with corn, grain, vegetables and fruits of every clime, ranging from the orange of California to the banana of Florida."

The statement shows that in 1850 the population of the state was 212,599 and in 1906 it is 3,600,000. Its area equals 265,780 square miles, or 170,099,200 acres. Its greatest extent from east to west is 800 miles, and from southeast to southwest over 1000 miles. Texas is sixteen times larger than New York, seven times larger than Ohio, and 100,000 square miles larger than all the Eastern and Middle states combined, including Delaware and Maryland.

The statement shows that in 1850 there were 12,198 farms and in 1905 this number has

increased to 400,000. There were 7,500,000 acres in cotton in 1905, 350,000 acres in hay, 30,000 acres in potatoes, 750,000 acres in oats, 1,500,000 acres in wheat, 5,000,000 acres in corn and 100,000 acres in rice. The total value of all these crops is \$238,600,000. The total acreage in fruit, vegetables, sugar cane, tobacco, barley, rye, etc., is 19,380,000, and valuation, \$275,000,000. Texas leads all the other states in the union in the number of cattle and the total value of beef cattle, etc., excepting milk cows, ownership of one-sixth of the total number in the United States, and estimated at one-ninth of the total value of such cattle in the United States. Over \$10,000 have been expended in actual operation of the oil fields of Texas. The total capitalization exceeds \$300,000,000.

ANOTHER American girl has paid a dear price for the privilege of becoming the wife of one of the high-flyers of the codfish nobility of Europe. When Count Bonide Castellane came to America in search of an American heiress he sought the hand and fortune of Miss Anna Gould. The high sounding title tacked on to the ousted condition of the suitor completely turned the head of the heiress and she consented to get him out of the hole with some of "papa's millions." They were unhappily married and lived ever thus until the countess could stand it no longer, and she was forced to apply for a divorce. When the judge of the trial court granted the divorce, and Count Bonide saw the good thing he had been enjoying for the past several seasons slipping away from him, he wanted the court to grant him \$50,000 per year alimony. The judge gave the count the 23 sign. The only satisfaction the count will have will be the privilege of seeing the children semi-occasionally.

THE farmers of Garrison, Appleby, and Cushing should plant tobacco next year. They will have the assistance of the government experts if they will get together and plant sufficient acreage to justify the expert to make weekly trips. The farmers of the county who are in a position to grow tobacco should attend the next meeting of the Nacogdoches County Tobacco Growers' association which will convene in this city next Saturday and become interested in the culture of the Cuban weed in this county.

Nacogdoches people are rejoicing over the fact that at the San Antonio fair the tobacco exhibit from Nacogdoches county was awarded the first premium. The tobacco was grown on the famous Red Field farm north of the town, and was raised by J. L. Gill. This award will be the cause of adding a little enthusiasm to the culture of tobacco in that county next year. As it is there will be about 150 acres planted and the Nacogdoches County Tobacco Growers' Association is working hard to run the acreage up to about 200 acres.—Alto Herald.

Two hundred acres should be planted in tobacco next year in this county.

**TOBACCO MEN**

Growers Held Interesting Session in Houston Business League.

The Texas Tobacco Growers' association met in third annual session yesterday in the office of the Houston Business League, with an attendance from nearly every section of the tobacco raising area of Texas.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Mr. George Bruce of the Southern Pacific Railway company, who in a few words recounted the history of the organization and showed what it had accomplished in the way of uniting the tobacco growers and creating enthusiasm among the farmers.

The officials who served the association during last year were all re-elected, as follows:

George Bruce of Houston, president.

French Simpson of Hallettsville, vice president.

J. H. Hearne, Palestine.

J. W. Gill, Nacogdoches.

The executive committee was given the authority to place the name of at least one member of the association from each county in the organization on the list of vice presidents, and this will be done in the near future.

In his opening speech Mr. Bruce stated that although the organization was small in numbers it more than made up in enthusiasm what it lacked in the way of numerical strength, and it was by small beginnings that great things were often accomplished in due time.

He paid a compliment to the department of agriculture of the United States, which has been a pioneer in calling the people of this section of country to the fact that tobacco could be grown with success and with great profit, and that the growing of tobacco for market would not only be of great benefit to the farmers who produced the tobacco but to every class of business, because it would be the means of putting more money into circulation and also giving employment in a remunerative way to a large number of people.

Lewis P. DeMouche, one of the best informed tobacco men in Texas, delivered an address that was very interesting, his theme being that the tobacco industry in order to be a success needed a large number of tobacco farmers to come to the State from the older States and teach the people here how to raise tobacco. He said that the work of the agents and experts of the government was alright; but as soon as the experts turned their heads the tobacco farmer, as a rule, neglected to follow instructions and so a failure generally followed. Mr. DeMouche is manager of the Nacogdoches Cigar company and also one of the most enthusiastic tobacco men in all that section of the country. He is a good speaker, too, and always commands the attention of the audience which he addresses.

**A Big Tree.**

R. J. Spinks, who has charge of the commissary at Camp No. 2 of the Southern Pine Lumber company, has presented the Tribune with a photograph of an immense pine tree recently cut into lumber by that company. 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### THE CENTER TRAGEDY.

From the quiet little town of Center is flashed the news of a terrible tragedy; one which has thrown the entire town of Center into a state of excitement, and which has cast a gloom over a large area of Eastern Texas. Dr. Paul a prominent physician of Center was assassinated by a negro last Saturday and yesterday, Monday, the grand jury of Shelby county indicted the negro, Dick Garret for the murder of Dr. Paul, and also returned an indictment against Hon. H. B. Short as an accessory to the crime. While The Sentinel knows nothing whatever about the details of the unfortunate tragedy, yet Mr. Short has many close friends here who are shocked to hear of the fact that he has been accused of being an accessory to the crime, and believe that there has been a mistake made on the part of the grand jury in their findings, so far as Mr. Short is concerned. He was in his 69th year. On October 18 Col. Mott fell from a street car and suffered injuries from which he never recovered. He had an illustrious record, having reached the highest place in the state within the gift of one of the noblest orders in existence.

Let the state exempt it from taxes, and if it is not able to exempt it, send the bill to Texas and I will guarantee that it will be paid without a murmur. So, Americans, wake up, and especially the people of Long Island.

**FOR UNIFORM DIVORCE LAW**

National Congress at Philadelphia Will Consider Model Statute.

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 13.—Lawyers, clergymen and men of affairs, representing many states, assembled at the Bellevue-Spratford in this city today, at the opening of the meeting of the national congress on uniform divorce laws. The attendance was larger and of a more representative character than that of the first meeting, which was held in Washington last spring. The present meeting, which will be in session several days, is to consider the draft of a statute which the congress will seek to have adopted in every state of the union. The statute was drafted by a committee of eminent lawyers and jurists and prominent clergymen, all of whom are conversant with the so called divorce evil.

The act is divided into three chapters, the first consists of jurisdictional provisions, the second procedure and the third general provisions, and is entitled "an act regulating annulment of marriage and divorce." While little or no change is made in the given causes for divorce as now existing, certain provisions were evidently made with a view of arresting the increasing demand for legal severance of marital bonds. Under these provisions secret, or "star chamber" sessions for hearing divorce cases before masters or other representatives of the courts are done away with, and "all hearings and trials shall be had before the court \* \* \* and in all cases be public." It is also provided that "a decree dissolving the marriage tie completely as to permit the remarriage of either party should not become operative until the lapse of a reasonable time after hearing or trial up to the merits of the case." The Wisconsin, Illinois and California rule of one year is recommended.

Another part of the proposed law prohibits the solicitation of a divorce case by advertisement, circular or otherwise, and prescribes for such an offense a fine of not more than \$1000 and imprisonment of not more than one year. Annulment of the marriage contract, as distinguished from divorce, will be made for the following causes: Impotency, consanguinity, existing former marriage, fraud, force or coercion, insanity and illegal age.

Divorce, it is provided,

shall be of two kinds—absolute and divorce from bed and board. Under the first classification the grounds shall be adultery, bigamy, conviction and sentence for crime, followed by two years continual imprisonment; extreme cruelty, wilful desertion and habitual drunkenness for two years. The same cause will prevail in the second class with the additional cause of "hopeless insanity of the husband." No divorce shall be granted if it appears to the satisfaction of the court that the suit has been brought by collusion or that the plaintiff has secured or connived at the offense charged, or has condoned it or has been guilty of adultery not condoned. The new law also makes some important changes in the practice and procedure in divorce cases and their trial.

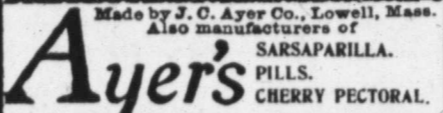

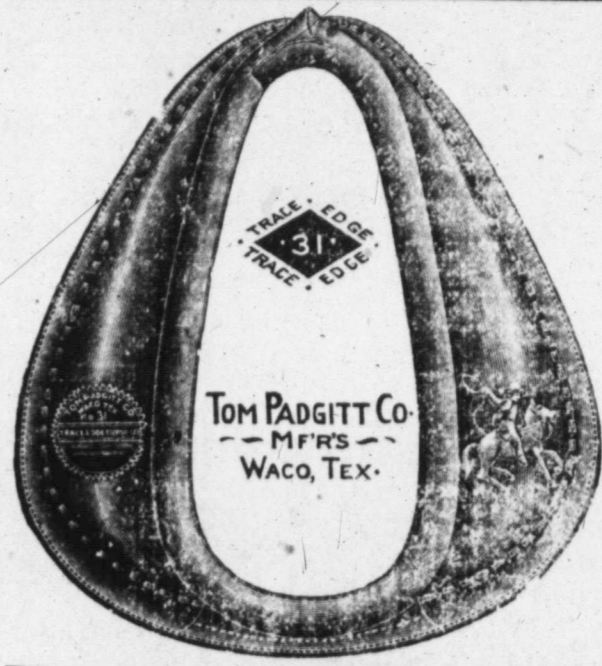

## PRESCRIPTIONS DON'T GO

### Smith County Booze Bazaars Given a Highly Colored Eye.

Galveston, Texas, Nov. 14.—Prescription houses don't go in Smith county, says the district court of that county. This since the booze bazars and other like public institutions conducted for private gain were voted out of the county by the preponderance of dry over moist voting strength.

The county attorney of Smith county, in the name of the state of Texas, filed suit for statutory damages against M. E. Edgar, H. P. Faulkenhagen, Lee Weaver and G. R. Kennedy, alleging that on October 16, 1905, Edgar opened up in Tyler, Smith county, Texas, a prescription house for the purpose of engaging in the sale of spirituous, vinous and malt liquors and medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication (which is the legal phraseology with trimmings for the plain word "booze").

The state proved its case to the satisfaction of a jury, and a judgment in the sum of \$2500 was rendered against the defendants named. This was on June 27 last. Yesterday afternoon in the court of civil appeals the transcript on appeal of said cause was filed.

M. E. Edgar was principal, and Kennedy, Faulkenhagen and Weaver were sureties on a bond in the sum of \$2500 which bound the said Edgar not to sell liquor except on prescription of a regular practicing physician; second, that the prescription be on white paper and that the physician state that the patient is in need of alcoholic stimulant; third, that not more than one quart can be sold on any one prescription; that the liquor can not be drunk on the premises, etc.

Nineteen prescriptions were offered in evidence in the court below. They were signed by four physicians, one of the doctors signing ten of them, another six, another two and another one. La grippe and colds, with one instance of cholera, were the troubles the liquor was supposed to relieve, according to the prescriptions. Unless the case is advanced in can hardly be finally determined at this time of the court.
