### BUSINESS BLOCK IN ASHES.

Sunday Morning's Fire Represents A Bout \$300,000 Loss.

The expected has happened and it happened at an unexpected time, as all things usual do. What was one of the busy blocks of Nacogdoches on last Saturday night when the good people of this town retired for the night and the little ones dreaming of the pretty things seen down town, is today a heap of brick and ashes, and which represents a loss of some three hundred thousands of dollars.

Sunday morning about 1.30 o'clock the Nacogdoches fire alarm was turned in in the usual manner and the bucket brigade turned out to a man to do battle with the flames. But the fire had gained such headway that the efforts of the men to extinguish the flames seemed only to add fuel to the fire.

Just where the fire first started no one has been able to say, but the early comers are of the opinion that it started from the flue in the rear of the Blount building that was occupied by the barber shop. At any rate the fire started in the middle of the block and burned east to Fredonia street and west to Pecan street.

The only thing that saved the town from total destruction, was the fact that the wind was not blowing hard. Had the wind been blowing from the south, or west, the total loss to property would have run up into the millions. Had the wind been blowing

from the south the fire would have wiped out the principal residence district of the town. Had the wind been blowing from the west, the entire business portion of Nacogdoches would have been in ruins today.

While it is impossible to give a complete list of losses and damages, and the insurance carried on buildings and stocks of merchandise at this time, the following tells the story of the loss as far as The Sentinel reporter can gather the data, and the figures here given, in some instances, are merely estimates:

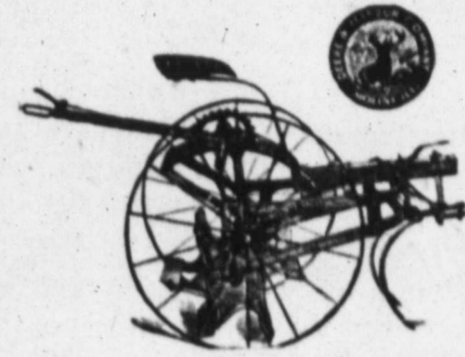

**COMMUTED TO LIFE SENTENCE**

Albert T. Patrick, is Saved From Electric Chair.

Albany, N. Y., Dec. 20.—Gov. Higgins today commuted to imprisonment for life the sentence of death under which Albert T. Patrick has remained for nearly five years since his conviction for the murder of William Marsh Rice, the aged Texas millionaire, in New York city.

In announcing commutation Gov. Higgins issued the following memorandum:  
"Albert T. Patrick has been convicted of the murder of William M. Rice, and judgment of the conviction has been affirmed by a divided court. It is not claimed that Patrick committed the murder in person but that he procured the act to be done. He has been convicted principally on testimony of Charles F. Jones, who confessed he murdered his master while he lay asleep, and Jones, by his testimony, has purchased his own immunity from trial or punishment. Neither this fact alone or a review of any of the acts already passed on by the courts at some stage of these proceedings would seem to me to warrant interfering with the judgment of death pronounced against the defendant, but three of the seven judges of the court of appeals were so strongly of the opinion that errors were committed at the trial which were substantially prejudicial to the rights of Patrick that I feel that the death penalty ought not, under the circumstances, be inflicted. In view of all these and the grave doubts expressed by these judges I am satisfied that I ought to relieve the defendant from the extreme penalty of the law and commute his sentence to imprisonment for life."

The loss in Saturday night's burn would have built a water works system and purchased suitable fire fighting apparatus with which to do battle with fire. No town was ever ruined by a big fire, but instead the calamity is usually followed by the people showing their faith in their favorite town and replacing the burned buildings with modern structures. The outside world is now watching Nacogdoches to see what steps her people will take in the matter of building a greater Nacogdoches.

IMPROVE the stock on the farm next year.

It will pay to fertilize any crop grown on the farm.

PLANT tobacco this next year on a few acres, and see what a good thing it is as a money crop.

THE Nacogdoches County Tobacco Growers' Association meets in Nacogdoches Saturday afternoon.

It is now rumored that one of the buildings destroyed in the recent fire will be replaced with a modern three story office building.

A FEW acres planted in peanuts, and then turned into a hog pasture will prove a very profitable proposition. Others who have tried it report that as a money maker it is a good thing.

THERE is market here for every acre of tobacco that will be planted and cultivated under government supervision next year. Every farmer who has a few acres suitable for the cultivation of tobacco, should try a few acres as an experiment.

SENATOR BAILEY says that there will be only a few who will have the nerve to vote against him, and that he is in no measure uneasy as to the result. If this is the truth, what in the name of common sense is he raising so much sand about?

THE SENTINEL gives notice now to its exchanges that Nacogdoches will be rebuilt as soon as material can be placed on the ground. In fact architects are now at work on plans for many of the buildings that were destroyed in the fire of Saturday night.

### Prompt in Payment.

Within seven days after the correct papers concerning Mrs. Thomason's death had been received by the Supreme judge, at Omaha, Neb., one half of face value of the policy (\$500) carried by her, was paid to her husband, Mr. Hilliard Thomason of Center, but formerly a resident of this city. Mrs. Thomason carried a \$1000 policy, but as she had not been a member not two years only half of the amount became payable.

THE senatorial fight in Texas is growing spirited. Attorney General Davidson submitted to Senator Bailey certain questions touching the payment of money to the senator by H. C. Pierce of the Waters-Pierce Oil company. In reply Senator Bailey admitted having borrowed money of Mr. Pierce on several occasions, the total amounting to thousands of dollars. He claimed, however, the loans had all been repaid. He then asked the attorney general to furnish him with all the records that showed that he (Bailey) had received money from Pierce, or the Waters-Pierce company. The attorney general declined, but said he would do so if Senator Bailey would say he had not received any money from Pierce. Senator Bailey said this was an impossible condition as he had publicly stated that he had served Mr. Pierce as an attorney in many transactions for which service he had been remunerated. Attorney General Davidson then submitted to the public a statement accompanied by the documentary proofs in his possession. One voucher is on the Waters-Pierce Oil company to H. Clay Pierce, debtor, for demand loan of \$3,000 to Joseph W. Bailey and is endorsed "account Texas cases." Another voucher was for \$200, amount paid by Pierce to Senator Bailey, "account Texas cases." Other documents is a note for \$8,000 signed by Senator Bailey and payable to H. C. Pierce, and a letter signed by Joseph W. Bailey to H. C. Pierce requesting the latter to send the former \$1,750. Accompanying this letter is one from Pierce to Secretary Gruet of the oil company instructing him to send draft for \$1,750 to Senator Bailey and charge against legal expenses account of Texas cases. Mr. Pierce says in an accompanying letter that he had already advanced the amount to Senator Bailey, who had returned it, and should therefore be reimbursed. It is conceded now that Mr. Bailey has a fight on his hands for re-election.—Bryan's Commonwealther Dec. 21, 1906.

## MOST PROFIT IN HOGS

Brazos County Farmer Kept Account of Three Fields.

Bryan, Tex., Dec. 24.—Mr. A. B. McSwain, a well known and prosperous farmer of the Rock Prairie neighborhood in Brazos County, made practical tests this year of the relative profits of raising hogs, unfertilized cotton and fertilized cotton. He planted twenty-four acres in peanuts for the hogs, twenty four acres in cotton without fertilizer and twenty-four acres in cotton with fertilizer.

The results of the experiments are briefly given as follows:

Twenty-four acres in peanuts produced in pork at 5 1/2 cents per pound, \$435.10; cost of raising, \$27.50; clear profit, \$407.60.

Twenty-four acres in cotton with fertilizer, making one bale to three acres, at 10 cents per pound, \$400; expense of picking, \$96; clear profit, \$304.

Twenty-four acres in cotton with fertilizer, making one-half bale per acre, at 10 cents per pound, \$600; expense of fertilizer and picking (fertilizer \$54, picking, \$144, total, \$198; clear profit, \$402.

Calculations from the above figures show that the hogs produced \$103.60 more than the unfertilized cotton; that the hogs produced \$5.50 more than the fertilized cotton, making the result about equal; and last that the fertilized cotton produced \$98 more clear profit than the unfertilized cotton after paying expense of fertilizer.

### Falling Into Hole in Air.

One of the strange experience of a balloonist is that of falling into a "hole in the air," which Mr. Rolker reports as follows:

"So you continue sailing, enjoying the present with little thought of the startling surprises that may be before you. Ahead of you, unseen, may be what the balloonist calls a "hole in the air," resembling the vortex of a maelstrom, and down this you may literally fall at rate which is terrifying until, by sacrificing two or three bagfuls of sand at once, your pilot checks your downward flight. But these "holes" are scarce, and, as a rule, the atmosphere is of uniform carrying power." —American Magazine.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 21.—An order was issued today by the railroad commission directed against the International and Great Northern and Santa Fe railways for failure to wait for connections at Milano Junction to the great inconvenience of passengers. Gross earnings, \$31,290,277; net increase, \$5,673,496 over same four months last year, which is 22.15 per cent. Operating expenses, \$12,300,357; net increase, \$2,240,510.

Income from operations, \$10,965, or 55.43 per cent.

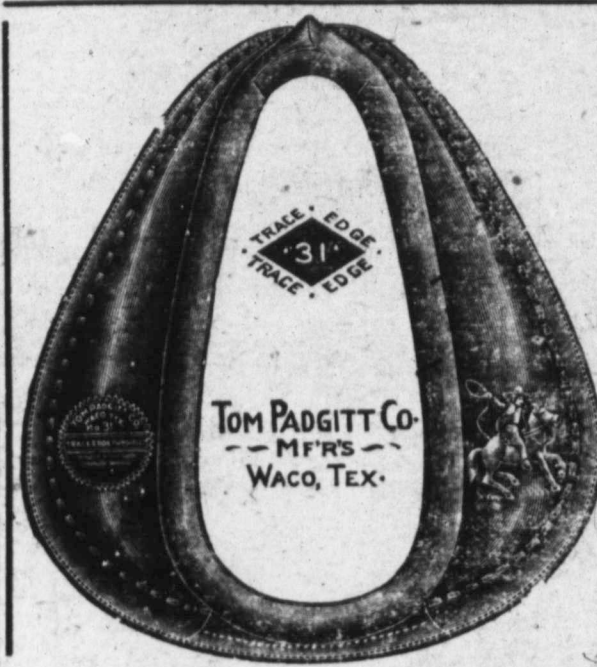

### "WITHOUT AN HOURS DELAY"

President Roosevelt Orders Harriman to Repair Break.

Washington Dec. 20.—President Roosevelt is exerting his efforts to have the break in the Colorado River in Mexico repaired as soon as possible by the California Development Company, which he declares is ultimately responsible for it. He today sent a telegram to E. H. Harriman at New York reciting the conditions and the inability to secure action by Congress because of the adjournment for the Christmas holidays. The President told Mr. Harriman that it is incumbent upon him to close the break again and that action should be taken without an hour's delay.

Mr. Harriman replied saying that the Southern Pacific Company had no control over the California Development Company, but he would authorize the Southern Pacific officials to try to repair the break, trusting Congress to take action later to assist with the burden. The President gave assurance he would make recommendations to Congress to this end.

It has been repeatedly asserted that unless the break in the river is promptly repaired the losses in the Imperial Valley, already enormous, would be at a conservative estimate \$14,000,000. The President felt that longer delay was not justified in the case.

The President in his message to Mr. Harriman said:

"It is incumbent on you to close the break again. Question of future permanent maintenance can be taken up. Reclamation service engineers available for construction. This is all the aid that there is in the power of the Government to render. The danger is due only to the action of that company in the past in making heading, completed in October, 1904, in Mexican territory. The present crisis can at this moment only be met by the action of the company, which is ultimately responsible for it, and that action should be taken without an hour's delay. Through the Department of State I am endeavoring to secure such action by the Mexican Government as will enable Congress in its turn to act, but at present Congress can do nothing without such action by the Mexican Government. This is a matter of such vital importance that I wish to repeat that there is not the slightest excuse for the California Development Company waiting another hour for the action of the Government."

Mr. Harriman responded:

You seem to be under the impression that the California Development Company is a Southern Pacific enterprise. This is erroneous. We are not interested in its stock and in no way control it. What the Southern Pacific Company has done was for the protection of the settlers as well as its tracks, but we have determined to move the tracks on to higher grounds anyway. However, in view of your message I am giving authority to the Southern Pacific officers in the West to proceed

with efforts to repair the break, trust that the Government, as soon as you can procure the necessary Congressional legislation, will assist us with the burden."

The President answered as follows:

"Am delighted to receive your message. Have at once directed the reclamation service to get into touch with you so that as soon as Congress reassembles I can recommend legislation which will provide against a repetition of the disaster and make provision for the equitable distribution of the burden."

In a note to Director Walcott, the President says:

"Mexico has behaved admirably and has expressed willingness to do anything within reason that we desire in the Colorado River matter. Of course Mexico is not to do the work. The immediate work must be done by Mr. Harriman's company, as I pointed out in my telegram to him. But we should be prepared to put a definite request before Congress immediately upon its reassembling. To do that I must, of course, know just what separate or joint responsibilities there should be as regards this country and the California Development Company. Please formulate a plan at the earliest moment, submitting it to the State Department so that Mexico can be fully informed."
