A concrete tank with a capaclity of approximately $130,000 \mathrm{ga}$ lons of water has been buitt, a
new Burnaman steam pump and new Burnaman steam pump and air compressor have been installd with which to pump water from the artesian well, located at the light plant, into the tank. All the machinery is of the most way to get the full service, and if the well proves sufficient in supply and durability, Nacogdoches will in future be supplied The well water
The well at present is furnishing about 180 gallons of water
per minute, which would seem like a good supply to the layman.
The plans were drawn and the work supervised by Carroll Holt, skill and ability, both as an architect and superviser
The old waterworks system will be kept intact for any emergency that might arise, and with this arrangement Nacogdoches can boast the possession of two good systems of waterworks collectively as desired.
