Washington, D. C., Feb. 18, 1918. Ion. S. M. Adams, Nacogdoches, Texas.

Reply to your letter, advise that Roberts, Collins and Crow carried insurance in each case, mother beneficiary, Collins \$10,000, others \$5,000 each. Payments will be made monthly, Mrs. Collins receiving \$57.50 per month. Full data is being mailed.

It will be remembered that Lewis Roberts of the vicinity of Nacogdoches, and Jennings B. Crow and Arthur W. Collins of Appleby were apart of the boys from Nacogdoches county on the ill-fated ship, the other two, Ruell A. Parrott and B. Fancher of Garrison being reported saved. The boys who lost their lives were all poor farmer boys leaving dependennt relatives, and while nothing can restore the lives of these noble sons to their loved ones, the insurance comes first in helping provide for them, a feature that should help make every citizen more proud of the glorious country is which we live.


