





"I believe that could these soldiers speak for themselves they would wish to be left undisturbed where, with their comrades, they fought the last fight.

General Pershing, himself a soldier, probably knows what he says. The brave boys who died "over there" are held dearly in the hearts of Americans as they could possibly be of buried here. Their memory is as glorious in either case.-Exchange.

New Orleans, Oct. 11.—Governors of nine cotton growing states will preside at the sessions here Oct. 13 to 16 of the World Cotton Conference at which representatives will be in attendance from 31 nations interested or affected by the cotton industry.

The governors chosen as chairmen are W. P. Hobby, Texas; A. H. Roberts, Tenn.; Charles H. Brough, Arkansas; Theodore G. Bilbo, Mississippi; Thomas E. Kilby, Alabama; Hugh Dorsey, Georgia; J. D. A. Robertson, Oklahoma; Thomas W. Bickett, South Carolina and Ruffin G. Pleasant, Louisiana.

Subjects annouced for discussion include growing and handling of cotton; transportation and new sources of production storage and insurance of cotton; transportation by river, rail and overseas; buying and selling and world problems of the textile indus-

It was decided by the executive committee that the constructive wrok of the conference should take form through hearings held and conclusions reached by the chairmen and members of ten committees, each of which woul deal with some partirular group of basic importance to the industry. Each of the ten committees will consist of twelve American and three foreign delegates.
