Paris, Dec. 16.—The new German delegation arrived this morning to discuss compensation for the sinking of the German ships at Scapa Flow.

BUBONIC PLAGUE IN ARGENTINA

Buenos Aires, Dec. 16.—Bubonic plague is reported to have attained grave proportions at Las Rosas, Santa Fe province. Several deaths have occurred.

JOE BAILEY AND OTHERS MUST PAY BIG TAXES

Phoenix, Ariz., Dec. 17.—Joseph Bailey, former senator from Texas, his son, Weldon, and several other Texans must pay back taxes to Arizona to the amount of \$95,000, the supreme court decided, in the Bass, Front No. 5 case, involving a land grant of 100,000 acres. The defendant claimed this land was exempt from taxation in 1913 and 1914 because the survey of the grant was not then on file.

ONE MINER'S OFFICIAL MUST ANSWER FOR CONTEMPT

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 17.—Hearing on the contempt charges against international and district officials of the United Mine Workers of America, except for the case of Alexander Howat, president of the Kansas district, was postponed indefinitely when called in United States district court today. Howat was ordered to appear next Monday. He is charged with continued violation of the court's injunction against furtherance of the strike.

POOLHALLS STAY CLOSED PENDING APPEAL OF CASE

Austin, Texas, Dec. 16.—After a conference as to whether the anti-poolhall law, pending appeal to the United States Supreme Court of the injunction to restrain state officials from enforcing the law would constitute contempt of court, at the attorney general's department late yesterday, it was decided it would not be contempt and they issued a statement that they will continue to advise local officers to close poolhalls and prosecute those who violate the law.

1,300 BRITISH TROOPS WIPE OUT IN PERSIA

London, Dec. 16.—Thirteen hundred British troops in Persia have been wiped out by the hostile population, it is claimed in a Moscow wireless.

COAL PRODUCTION NEARS NORMAL

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 16.—The production of bituminous coal today rapidly approached normal, reports indicating that 90 to 95 percent of the miners are at work.

MEXICAN GOVERNORS TO MEET CARRANZA

Mexico City, Dec. 16.—The governors of all the states of Mexico have been summoned to meet in Mexico City on December 20 for a conference with Carranza looking to more rapid pacification of the republic and to outline plans so that the approaching elections may be carried out with the least possible disturbance or unfairness.

J. BARLEYCORN TO SUE UNCLE SAM

New York, Dec. 16.—Lawyers representing large liquor interests have intimated that a civil action against the United States government might be the next step in the fight against prohibition, and compensation for losses estimated at \$300,000,000 would be sought.

BRAZOS IMPROVEMENT PROJECT ABANDONED

Washington, Dec. 17.—Abandonment of the government project of improving the Brazos river between Old Washington and Waco was recommended to congress by the army engineer corps.

BOLSHEVIKI CAPTURE ANOTHER TOWN

London, Dec. 17.—The Bolsheviki captured Novo Niolovek, on the Trans-Siberian railway, December 14, according to a Soviet communication received by wireless today. The statement said 5,000 prisoners, many guns and much material of Gen. Kolchak's army were taken by the Soviet troops.

BOOTLEGGERS SELL DEADLY LIQUORS

Washington, Dec. 16.—Bootleggers are coming in for particular attention by the Bureau of Internal Revenue as a result of the report of widespread traffic in liquors containing denatured and wood alcohol. Revenue officers in New York alone reported fourteen deaths recently in that city in one week from drinking bootleg conditions. Some of the liquor was said to have sold for as much as \$20 per quart.

Washington, Dec. 17.—An unfavorable report on the bill to repeal wartime prohibition was ordered by the house agricultural committee by a vote of 16 to 3. Representatives Rainey, democrat, of Illinois; Voigt of Wisconsin and Ward of New York, republicans, cast the negative votes.

MEXICANS ATTEMPT MURDER PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE

Agua Prieta, Sonora, Dec. 17.—Private advices from Mexico City were that an attempt was made Thursday to take the life of Gen. Obregon, candidate for the presidency after he had addressed a public gathering in one of the suburbs of the capital. The would-be assassin was jailed.

HEAD OF PAN MOTOR CO. DRAWS TEN-YEAR SENTENCE

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 17.—Abandoning Judge Landis today sentenced Samuel C. Pandolfo, organizer and head of the Pan Motor Co. of St. Cloud, Minn., convicted of using the mails to defraud, to serve ten years in the federal penitentiary and fined him \$4,000. Notice of appeal was given.

FORTY-THREE KILLED IN BERLIN EXPLOSION

Berlin, Dec. 17.—Forty-three workmen and women were killed and more than a hundred injured in an explosion at the Maschinenbau amunition depot, near Wilhelmshaven, today. The explosion occurred while shells were being unloaded.

STILL ANOTHER SWAT FOR THE FESTIVE JOHN

St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 16.—Motions to temporarily dissolve the injunction issued against the district attorney and the collector of internal revenue here December 5 restraining them from interfering with the sale of whiskey were granted today by United States Judge Farris.

METRIC SYSTEM EXPLAINED IN ONE MINUTE

A member of World Trade Club holds the world record for rapid explanation of the Metric weight measurements and the way in which they ought to be used. He does this in one minute. An objector who had never looked the matter up declared that the metric system was complex and that it would take a long time to learn it. It was then that the member of World Trade Club first undertook to explain, in one minute, all that needed to be known of metric units. He did it to the satisfaction of prominent auditors. Here is how he did it:

"Learn only the units, dollars, meter, liter, gram;—dollar, the measure of value; meter, the measure of length; liter, measure of bulk; gram, for weight. You know all about the American dollar. The metric units, meter, liter, gram, are just like dollar, divided decimally and multiplied decimally. If you want to compare metric units with present units, the meter is 10 per cent more than the yard; 500 grams is about 10 per cent more than the pound avoirdupois, the liter is 5 per cent less than U. S. liquid quart (18 per cent less than the British liquid quart)—that is all 90 per cent need to use the metric standards."

CONSTABLE VAUGHT CAPTURES REFUGEE IN ARKANSAS

The grand jury returned a bill of indictment against Willis Jones alias Willie Peg, charging him with carrying a pistol, and also with an assault and attempt to murder Jim Perry some five or six months ago.

Jones made a get-away and his whereabouts have since been unknown until the third of December, when Constable Vaught of Garrison reports that he captured him near Nashville, Arkansas.

Mr. Vaught brought the prisoner back to Nacogdoches county and lodged him in jail at Nacogdoches. He has pleaded guilty to the pistol case and the murder charge is still pending in the district court.

SURPRISED THAT WORLD DID NOT "END" TODAY

New York, Dec. 17.—Astonishment was expressed by the superstitious when the earth did not come to an end today. The ominous position of the planets had been well press-agented, and so-called astrologers and persons versed in witchcraft had maintained that at the precise moment when the major leaguers of the solar system formed themselves in a straight line, with Neptune, Saturn, Jupiter, Mars, Venus and Mercury on one side of the sun and Uranus on the other, the earth, which had moved four or five solar spaces to the front of the line, would behave like a one-horse shay.

LIQUOR DEALERS SHOW MONUMENTAL NERVE

Washington, Dec. 17.—Permission to institute original proceedings to have the national prohibition amendment declared unconstitutional and the federal and New Jersey authorities enjoined from enforcing it was asked of the supreme court today by the Retail Liquor Dealers' Association of New Jersey.

TWELVE HUNDRED TEXAS SCHOOLS WITHOUT TEACHERS

Houston, Texas, Dec. 16.—Twelve hundred public schools in Texas are without teachers because of low salaries paid, Professor A. Caswell Ellis, of the University of Texas, told the Rotary club at a meeting here.

"Unless the people of the state act upon the gravity of the public school situation in Texas the next generation of Texas will be only half-educated and unfit to compete with the children of other states where adequate educational facilities are provided," Dr. Ellis said.

Dr. Ellis pointed out that teachers' salaries have been increased only 25 per cent, whereas the cost of living has increased 125 per cent. The result, he said, is that more than one-third of the trained teachers in the public schools have quit, and their places cannot be filled.

Low salaries, Dr. Ellis said, not only have caused loss of many teachers but have forced boards of education to employ inefficient teachers.

SUPT. DAVIS GIVES TWELVE DAYS XMAS

Yesterday morning chapel services were held as usual, with some mighty interesting features. "The Star Sprungled Banner" was sung by the students, and this was followed by two school songs, which the students never fail to appreciate.

At the conclusion of the songs, Prof. L. B. Davis made a few remarks, in which he stated that he had a surprise for the school. He invited Ellis Haltom to come on the stage and make an address. Ellis responded admirably; his speech was greatly appreciated by the student body.

Mildred Beall rendered a very beautiful selection on the piano, and was accompanied by Miss Mayo Province; this was later followed by a cornet selection by John Johnson. The music was splendid, and fully indicative of the Doches High School.

Prof. R. F. Davis made a few remarks, in which he expressed sympathy for the seniors, who were in the main beaten by juniors last Friday, but still maintained that he had yet a huge quantity of confidence in that body. The juniors were jubilant over their victory and made no efforts to conceal it. Beating the entire high school was some record, in their estimation.

He had the students go vote on the matter, and it was decided by a large majority to dismiss for holidays Tuesday, and take up school on the 5th of January. The students were much pleased.

"I want every one of you to have the finest time imaginable during Christmas. I want you to throw yourselves into the celebration like you mean business, and get what is coming to you. Don't let it be said that you did not enjoy yourself," were the remarks of Supt. R. F. Davis at the conclusion of chapel exercises.

PEOPLE ARE THINKING FOR THEMSELVES

Though the republican forces are quite active with the preliminaries of the next presidential campaign, Mr. William J. Bryan seems to be the sole democratic factor showing any unusual concern at the present time.

Mr. Bryan, through his Commoner and personal friends, are making a noise in an endeavor to arouse the hibernating democrats, but apparently they do not care to be aroused at present. This may be due, however, to an objection to Mr. Bryan as the chief pan-beater in the work of living the democratic bees.

If one will look beneath the surface at present, there is palpable on the part of the people an aloofness from partisan endeavor that is rather unusual six months before the assembling of the national conventions.

The people are not indifferent exactly, but conscious of conditions to which they are not accustomed, and of factors in politics that are new to them.

The old party slogans have no bearing upon conditions now in evidence, and naturally people are beginning to take notice and observe the shaping of the newer issues.

Making due allowance for the predilections of individuals for old affiliations, there is still a consciousness that party leaders in neither of the old parties are offering any specific solutions for new problems of which there are many.

There are abundant indications that there will be in 1920 many changes from one party to another. Here in Texas—in Houston—many men who have long been identified with the democratic party in prominent ways are openly allied with a somewhat resuscitated republican party, and there are others who are endeavoring to awing another third party movement.

This condition of loosened party attachments—even separations—is not confined to Texas. There has sprung up everywhere a consciousness of new issues with a more direct appeal to the citizen's attention than the sentimental attachments for old parties. For many years past, the civil war and its issues and incidents went far in fixing party affiliations, but now it is realized that the Great War which has since intervened has eclipsed the civil war in both interest and significance, except for the diminishing remnant of the generation of that receding era.

Everything considered, almost anything is possible in the campaign of 1920. Admitting that the democratic administration has made many blunders during the past eight years, and that the people are anxious to visit the accustomed punishment therefor, what has the republican party to offer?

It certainly can't wave the bloody shirt of the sixties and get anywhere with it. It must come with solutions for big problems, for problems are what concern the people most at this time. And up to this time it hasn't offered a solution for a single problem.

INVENTOR MAKES WATER TALK

Contrivance Known as "Katie" is Hailed as a Most Valuable Aid to Navigators.

"Katie," one of the most wonderful inventions exhibited at the recent shipping engineering exhibition in London, is likely to prove the most valuable aid to sea captains and navigators yet discovered. "Katie" is the name given to the invention of an engineer, by which he makes water talk.

It is an automatic float, with a sensitive depth-finding mechanism connected telephonically, and is placed on the surface of the water. Another delicate instrument rests on the bottom, with a wire connection. When an engineer wants to know the depth of water at a particular spot he rings up "Katie" on the phone and she tells him the exact depth.

She speaks in soft, jerky buzzes in the manner of the Morse code, and when she gets out of her depth she stutters. If the current is too strong she becomes speechless. "Katie" will also warn a captain how much water has got into the hold or the engine room after a collision.

The floating ship's safe is another wonderful invention. It automatically casts itself adrift from a sinking ship, and will send up a distress signal every hour for twelve hours. A sound signal is also given, and it will burn a light at night for three months.

Death-Blow Dealt

John Barleycorn

Washington, Dec. 13.—The war-time prohibition act was held constitutional today by the United States Supreme Court in deciding appeals from Kentucky and New York. The opinion was read by Associate Justice Brandeis. Decrees in New York dismissing proceedings brought by Dryfoos, Blum & Co. to compel internal revenue officials to permit the withdrawal from bond of whiskey for beverage purposes were dismissed by the court.

In deciding the question the supreme court also dissolved injunctions restraining revenue officers from interfering with the removal from bond of about 70,000,000 gallons of whiskey, valued at approximately \$75,000,000, held by Kentucky distillers and warehouse companies at Louisville.

The signing of the armistice did not abrogate the war-powers of congress. Justice Brandeis said, reading the decision of the court. He said the government did not appropriate liquor by stopping its domestic sale, as the way is left open for exporting it.

Reported Hugo Released

Eagle Pass, Dec. 15.—Fred C. Hugo of El Paso, manager of J. M. Rolle's ranch, near Muzquiz, has been released by the Villistas who had held him for \$10,000 ransom, according to advices received here today. No ransom money was paid. Information of Hugo's release was contained in a telegram received by the Carranza garrison at Piedras Negras from Gen. Alfredo Ricaut, commanding one of the columns of government forces sent to intercept the Villistas. Several prominent Mexicans, held for \$5,000 ransom each, also were released without the payment of any money, the telegram stated.

November Cotton Consumption

Washington, Dec. 13.—Cotton consumed during November amounted to 10,490 running bales of lint and 25,182 bales lintless, the Census Bureau announced today. During November year ago the consumption was 9,811 bales of lint and 23,366 lintless.

Americans to Probe

Mexican Kidnapers

(By Associated Press)
Washington, Dec. 15.—The American embassy at Mexico City was directed today by the state department to make representations to the Mexican government regarding the kidnaping of Fred C. Hugo by Villistas. The embassy and the American consul at Eagle Pass have been instructed to make independent investigations of the incident and also to investigate the report that Villistas had carried off another American named Phelps.

IT'S TIME TO MAIL YOUR CHRISTMAS PACKAGES NOW

Let me urge upon you the necessity of mailing your Christmas packages early, wrapping securely and addressing plainly. Post offices everywhere are going to be flooded with packages after this week and, with many trains being called off on account of the coal shortage, mail is bound to be delayed. Get yours away before this happens. Wrap in heavy brown paper and tie with strong twine, as they will have to be handled lots and must be wrapped well to withstand handling. Don't come in with a package wrapped in tissue paper and tied with baby ribbon, as the contents will be strung all the way from here to the point of destination. Address packages just the same as you would a letter. That is, to whom going in the lower right-hand corner and by whom sent in the upper left-hand corner. Write plainly so we can read readily and despatch accordingly. Please prepare for mailing before coming to office, and state whether or not you want it insured when you put it in the window. About the Red Cross Seals. They should be pasted on the back of the package so as not to be confused with the postage stamps and should be so placed as to not seal the package, as that causes first class postage to be collected. Please bring your keys with you and don't ask to have your boxes opened.

Chops and Bacon

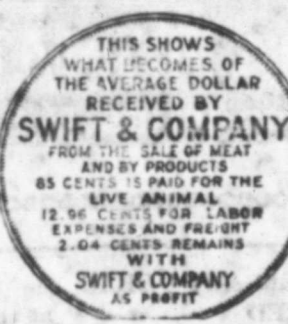

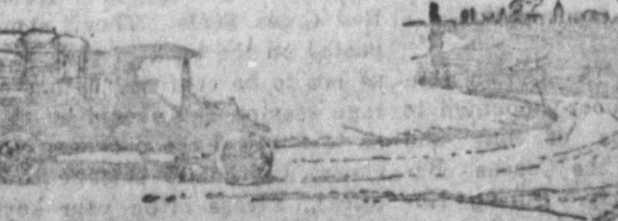

Austin, Texas, Dec. 12.—Nugent E. Brown and Vera Spears of Nacogdoches have been selected as two of the 38 delegates chosen from the University of Texas to represent that institution at the Student Volunteer Convention to be held at Des Moines, Ia., December 31 to January 5. Nine alternates were also chosen.

This convention will be attended by approximately 9,000 students from the colleges and universities of the United States and Canada, and will probably have representatives from every country in the world. The speakers will be brought from all the nations of the world, and will be Christian leaders in those countries, often missionaries. The purpose of the convention, which is held every four years, is to promote a feeling of world fellowship, and to arouse an interest in work of every sort among non-Christian lands.

Every college and university in the United States and Canada is allowed one representative for every 100 students enrolled, proportionally distributed among the men and women. This gave the University of Texas 37 representatives, and one extra was granted. The delegates were chosen from every class, every department, every school, every protestant church, every student activity, and every kind of student so that a body of students might be sent who would represent every part of student life in the next four years. The representatives were chosen for their influence and leadership among the student body and their seriousness of purpose, as well as for the phase of student life they represented.

Mr. Brown entered the University in 1916, and has been in school continuously since that time, except for 18 months in the marine and the aviation service, in the latter of which he held a commission as second lieutenant. He has been business manager of the Daily Texan, the class newspaper, since January, 1918, and is a student of journalism, expecting to make journalistic work his profession. He was last spring elected vice-president of the Students' Association, and is president of the Student Volunteer Band, the organization of students intending to be missionaries; vice-president of Sigma Delta Chi, honorary journalism fraternity 1919-20; president of the Methodist Baraca Sunday School class, 1919-20; secretary of the B Hall Association, 1918-19. He is a member of Acacia, the national Masonic fraternity.

Miss Spears, in addition to the activities mentioned in a recent story at cut her, is an assistant in the department of education, with the duties of grading papers, keeping records, and aiding the professor in any way necessary in his class work.

PROFITTEERING ELIMINATED IF PEOPLE WOULD REPORT IT

Dallas, Texas, Dec. 11.—From the apathy shown by the public the people are willing to be "gouged" by profiteers, according to F. M. Spencer, special agent of the department of justice in charge of the bureau of investigation here. Without cooperation of the public he said the department's hands are tied in its effort to suppress profiteering.

"I have received numerous complaints about profiteering, but when I suggest prosecution the complaining witnesses hold up their hands in horror and ask me to not get them mixed up," said Mr. Spencer. "The Lever act has teeth and they are sharp, but the department cannot proceed against profiteers unless victims will act as prosecuting witnesses."

"When any one buys anything and has reason to believe he or she has been charged an excessive price and will testify against the accused I will gladly arrest and prosecute, but I must have the cooperation of the public before I can do any effective work. "If the people are willing to be gouged let them stop howling about profiteering. The Lever bill gives this department ample authority on which to operate and I am willing and anxious to arrest and prosecute. "Profiteering must stop and will be stopped if men and women who buy anything will tell me when they think they have been victimized."

ALLIES WILL AGREE U. S. RESERVATIONS

Paris, Dec. 13.—As a result of the conference being held in London by Prime Minister Lloyd George and Premier Clemenceau the American government will be notified that in order to facilitate a compromise between the adverse parties in the American senate the Allies are willing to accept, to as great extent as possible, some of the reservations to the Versailles treaty made by the foreign relations committee, according to the Matin. It is said the Allies will do everything in order that America may participate in future conferences. Important problems, the newspapers says, will henceforth be settled by a council of the premiers of France, England and Italy in the presence of John W. Davis, the American ambassador to Great Britain. It is said Clemenceau and Lloyd George assured the Italian foreign minister there was necessity for an early settlement of the Fiume problem, and indicated that England would intercede with the United States for Italy. Scialoja will leave for Italy today to lay the matter before his government.

His Skill Produces Variations That Nature Would Require Thousands of Years to Accomplish

With a watch glass and a fine camel-hair brush the plant inventor performs miracles. His crosses were changes in six generations from nature, unaided, would produce in 120,000 years. The plants may be growing in his garden, and of course are separated by continents. Their structure, habits, breeding tendencies and identities have been preserved through thousands of years. The plant inventor takes the pollen from one, transfers it to his young plant, carries it to the other, and from the glass transmits it to the stem. The resultant seed is sown. The new plants may resemble one plant or the other, or they may be like neither, or they may be the result of a combination. There are thousands of developments for one process in the work.

Another Burbank chose one seedling out of 65,000 when he learned the prize money. The rest were ruthlessly destroyed. The new prize-winning is a cross between the raspberry and the blackberry, but has a fruit much larger and finer than either. Mr. Burbank has produced 300,000 varieties of plants, 80,000 peaches and nectarines, 500 almonds, 5,000 walnuts, 3,000 apples, 2,000 grapes, 2,000 pears and thousands of different kinds of berries, flowers and vegetables in equal profusion.

WEALTH IN BAMBOO GROVES

Their Cultivation in the Southern States is Expected Soon to Be a Recognized Procedure.

One thinks more readily of an American farm with a wood lot than of one with a bamboo grove, but bamboo groves may yet become common in the southern states, if the idea of "instruct the farmer" in the desirability of planting them makes reasonable progress. It will be a new idea to the farmer, and he will have to think it over. Meantime the country has one important bamboo grove flourishing in the state of Georgia, where it stands in the custody of the United States department of agriculture, to serve as an object lesson. The young bamboo shoots provide an early spring vegetable, said to have a flavor much like that of sweet corn, and the stalks have a wide range of uses which should make a bamboo grove profitable. It is worth the farmer's consideration, for example, that millions of small canes are yearly imported from Japan, and fishing rods made out of them, for which the United States pays annually about \$5,000,000.

Hard to Account for Figures

Statistics have recently been published in Germany which are so striking that the Medical Record's Geneva (Switzerland) correspondent says they "need confirmation." It is stated that for every 1,000 boys born in the later years of the war, 1,088 girls have been born. Before the war the ratio was 1,000 boys to 1,024 girls. "Nothing," writes the correspondent, "is known with certainty as to the conditions that determine sex in the human species, but there is quite a large amount of evidence in support of the generalization that during wars and famines, when the conditions are generally adverse, especially with regard to nutrition, the proportion of male relative to female births increases. If there is any foundation for this generalization, then we must conclude either that the figures are wrong or that Germany was mighty well nourished during the war, or else that some entirely aberrant influence was at work."

Koran Brought Up to Date

It is not surprising that most of the Arab population should be illiterate since the language used in writing and printing is literary Arabic, the very name in which the Koran was composed 12 centuries ago. It has been preserved intact, while the spoken tongue has gradually changed, as spoken tongues will. Literary Arabic today is about as much like the ancient language as Latin is like French. Ninety per cent of the people do not understand the language in which the books are written.

An interesting experiment has been begun by Rev. Percy Smith, a missionary in North Africa, who is translating the Bible and the hymns of the church into the ordinary speech of the people, instead of in literary Arabic.—Christian Herald.

New Power is Wanted

In the field of research in connection with automobile underwater torpedo, there needs to be developed a new source of power, said Rear Admiral Ralph Earle, U. S. N., chief of the bureau of ordnance, at a recent meeting of the American Chemical Society. The present source is compressed air and the new source must be of greater potential per unit volume and weight and be nearly as safe to handle and store on board ship. Oxygen has been proposed but is too dangerous to handle.
