STRIKE IS ENUEL

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 11.-Tre coal miners' strike is ended.

With only one dissenting vote, the general committee of the United Mine Workers of America, in session here today, voted to accept President Wilson's proposal for immediate return to work, pending final settlement of their wage controversy with operators by a commission to be appointed by him.

Telegrams were sent out tonight to the four thousand locals of the union by international officers of the miners instructed the men to inturn to work immediately. Full instructions with regard to the agreement will be sent out tomorrow morn-

Operators tonight predicted full resumption of operations Friday and shipment of coal from mines beginning Monday morning.

Miners, operators and government officials alike were heartily gratified over the settlement of the strike by the commission.

The action today ends a tie-up of the coal industry of more tha, infive weeks' duration and which was more far-reaching in its effect than any other in the history of the country. As a result of the strike the country was fast approaching a shut-down of industry and suffering among its 100,-000,000 inhabitants.



INVENTOR MAKES WATER TALK

Hailed as a Most Valuable Aid to Navigators.

"Katie," one of the most wonderful inventions exhibited at the recent London, is likely to prove the most valuable aid to sea captains and naviname given to the invention of an engineer, by which he makes water talk.

An average hog weighs 220 pounds.

Of this, only 70 per cent (154 pounds) is meat and lard.

So, when we pay 15% a pound for live hogs, we are really paying more than 21¢ a pound for the meat which we will get from these animals, even after taking into account the value of the by-products.

But people show a preference for only one-third of the whole-the pork chops, fancy bacon, and choice euts from juicy hams.

This means that when we are selling Premium bacon at 431/2 per pound wholesale and Premium hams at 304, there are other parts for which we get as low as 6f or 8f per pound. The net result is an average profit to us of less than 1# a pound.

The choice cuts are higher because of a demand for them.

Another thing: Only 35 pounds of the entire hog-or about 1/6th-is usually marketed at once. The rest must be pickled, cured, or smoked. This takes months, and adds to the costs which must be met.



U. S. RESERVATIONS

Paris, Dec. 13 .- As a result of the conference being held in London by Prime Minister Lloyd George and Premier Clemenceau the American government will be notified that in order to ficilitate a compromise between the adverse parties in the American senate the Allies are willing to accept, to as great extent as possible, some of the reservators to the Versailles treaty made by the foreign relations committee, according to the Matin. It is said the Allies will do everything in order that America may participate in futur conferences. Inportant problems, the newspapers says, will henceforth be settled by a council of the premiers of France, England and Italy in the presence of John W. Davis, the American ambassador to Great Britain. WEALTH IN BAMBOO GROVES

Their Cultivation in the Southern States is Expected Seon to Be a Recognized Procedure.

One thinks more readily of an American farm with a wood lot than of one groves may yet become common in the southern states, if the idea of "iastruct the farmer" in the desirability of planting them makes reasonable progress. It will be a new idea to the farmer, and he will have to think it over. Meantime the country has one important bamboo grove flourishing in the state of Georgia, where it stands in the custody of the United States department of agriculture, to serve as an object lesson. The young bamboo shoots provide an early spring vegetable, said to have a flavor much like that of sweet corn, and the stalks. have a wide range of uses which should make a bamboo grove profitable. It is worth the farmer's consideration, for example, that millions of small canes are yearly imported from Japan, and fishing rods made out of them, for which the United States pays annually about \$5,000,000.
