## Local Hospital Planning Expansion/Renovation

The board of directors of Parmer County Community Hospital has been busy with long term planning. The board requested a facility study of the existing building which houses both the hospital and clinic in the spring of 2000.

The facility study came as a result of overcrowding in the current building and anticipated growth with Doctor Jeff Dickson coming to the area in August 2001. The board, current medical staff, Drs. Alexander and Jubay, and the hospital staff then went to work.

HD&D, an architectural firm based in Amarillo, developed a phased master facility plan for Parmer County Community Hospital and Clinic.

The board recognized that we have five major issues to

consider, said Danny Kendrick, board chairman. Those issues are that we have a new physician coming to the area and the clinic is at full capacity. Our current facility was built in 1955. There have been shifts from inpatient to outpatient services, which we need to accommodate.

Renovation of the existing space is probably not practical because of mechanical structures and asbestos. And, the building codes have changes to an extent that we need to address the new building standards.

Facility planners and architects have made a recommendation to increase some space, and update some existing space, said Brett Whitten, D.V.M., a board member. The phased-in approach to accomplish keeping the facility open at all times to the public and the financial needs for construction made sense to the board.

The board agreed that the new physician must have a place to work and that is the first priority, second comes laboratory, x-ray and a new emergency room to address

the shift in health care to more outpatient services. Thirdly, plans include updating the inpatient rooms for those that require hospitalization.

Dale Schueler, D.V.M., board member, said, "We are looking for all alternatives for financing and recognize that we need to be fiscally responsible in the construction. We are exploring all funding options including some grants which are available to rural and community health care providers both in Texas and nationally."

"We plan to leave no stone unturned. We would also be grateful to community groups and individuals who may consider making donations to the hospital for construction," Dr. Schueler concluded.

The board is expecting to receive bids on the initial phase of construction within the next 45 days. The board wants to let the communities in the Hospital District know what the plans look like so drawings will be placed in two visible places within the community and publishing the plans on page 3-A in *The Bovina Blade*.

## Board Hires Ag Teacher During Monday Meeting

The Board of Trustees of Bovina ISD met in regular session on Monday, October 9. The meeting was called to order at 7:15 p.m.

Installation of new board member Joe Steelman was held and minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The board presented awards for TEA Recognized Campus to Bovina Elementary and Bovina High School. Also TEA Migrant awards for Bovina Middle and Elementary schools were presented.

Discussion items included

participation in the Lone Star Investment Pool; a sample policy for student drug testing; and the results of the Board long range planning survey.

Board action items included:

A. Beauchamp made a motion to award the LB5 grant installation to MicroAge for \$17,180. Steelman seconded, motion passed unanimously.

B. Beauchamp moved to approve the American Medical Security bid with \$1000 deductible for employee group health insurance. Jamerson seconded, motion passed unanimously.

C. Whitten made a motion to appoint the campus principals as textbook committee chairmen and include all teachers on the textbook committee. Beauchamp seconded, motion passed unanimously.

The superintendent's report covered student enrollment, a 1999-2000 overpayment from TEA and current grant applications.

Beauchamp made a motion to approve the resignation of Kevin Eschberger (ag teacher). Coffey seconded, motion passed unanimously.

Kerby made a motion to approve a pro-rated 12 month probationary teacher contract with a \$1500 local supplement for Mark Standlee, the new ag teacher. Jamerson seconded and motion passed unanimously.

## NEW ENGLAND IN AUTUMN.

I've heard about it all my life: the glorious colors of the trees, shrubs and bushes. What I may not have known about was the many varieties of trees, etc., and the amount of country they cover (per square mile). Mountain after mountain is completely covered with bright trees, which also line the roads much of the way. (It is hard to see the forest for the trees!)

Carol and I had always wanted to make the trip up to the Northeastern U.S., but somehow had never made it. But now we have. A week ago Wednesday, we were part of a group of 52 people, made up mostly of Friona's Senior Club, who flew to Boston and then made an eight-day tour of New England. We enjoyed every minute of it. The colors could not have been better, and neither was the fellowship of friends and neighbors.

New England, of course, is the nation's "Cradle of Liberty." Every child learns about the Boston Tea Party, Paul Revere's Ride, Lexington, and Concord, where the term "The Shot Heard 'Round the World" was born, plus Bunker Hill, Beacon Hill, Old North Church, Modern sites include Fenway Park!

People up there have done a marvelous job of preserving and protecting their historical sites. In Boston alone there must be several hundred such sites per square mile.

One of the sites we visited was the battleship "Old Ironsides," from the Revolutionary War. Back in the 1860s, some residents grew tired of spending money to keep the battleship "afloat." That was when Henry W. Longfellow penned his famous poem which says: "Aye, Tear Her Tattered Ensign Down," to convince people that the nay-sayers were wrong.

Many sites in New England date back to the 1600s & 1700s. We visited a church whose building was 200 years, but whose congregation was closer to 300 years old. Makes Parmer County seem like an unruly teenager!

We marveled at the sheer number of historical sites, since New England is barely larger, if at all, than the Panhandle/South Plains area. If you extend the boundary east from the "El Paso intersection" with our Western state line, then back up to Childress, we may be larger.

In Vermont, the Bennington Battle Monument is 306 feet tall, beaten only by the Washington Monument in height, to honor that area's Revolutionary War heroes. It was built in 1880, of huge granite blocks native to Vermont and New Hampshire. Each block weighed over 100 tons, and they were assembled before there were cranes, using a system of pulleys. At the top you could see three states, with many bright colors as far as you could see.

When you're with a group, it's always fun. Our waiter Tuesday evening at Portland, Maine, asked if the people in our group were longtime friends (which we are). He said that many groups who eat with them late in their trips are quarrelsome among themselves, and some make catty remarks about others in the group. None of that with our bunch. Many of us hugged each other when first meeting in the morning.

Thursday morning was the first time in a week we had not come down with our group for a hearty breakfast, to kick off another day of eating and sight-seeing, two of our favorite things. And it's always more enjoyable with friends.

Thanks to our staff at the newspaper for keeping things going during our absence in great fashion.

It was a clear, crisp, cold October evening. Good football weather and a nice

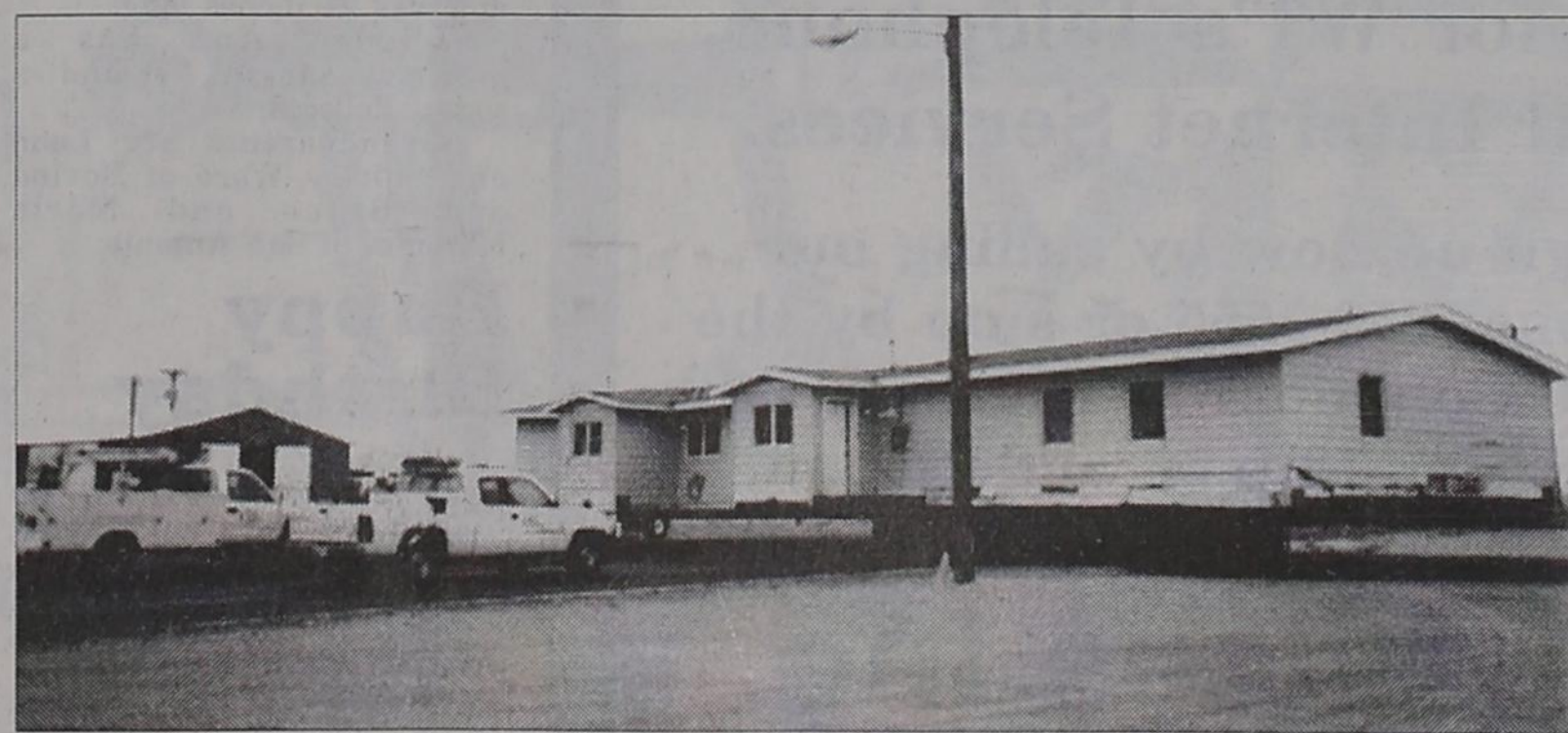
Friday night setting for Bovina's 2000 homecoming game.

## Parmer County Hospital Receives \$60,000 Grant

In May, 1995, Governor George W. Bush signed into law HB 2128 which created the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF). The fund is governed by a nine-member board of directors that is charged with disbursing up to \$150 million per year through loans and a formal grant program.

TIFB's specific charge is to help develop the telecommunications infrastructure that connects certain public entities in Texas—public schools, public libraries, two- and four-year colleges and universities, and the public health delivery system—to Texas' emerging statewide telecommunications network.

TIFB's goal is to link rural health clinics, public libraries and public schools when appropriate, with academic health centers and associated teaching hospitals for telemedicine and telehealth programs. Telemedicine includes, but is not

limited to, the remote delivery of medical care consultations using interactive video, teleradiology and telepathology technologies. Other technologies will be used to deliver remote education to healthcare professionals throughout the state.

Parmer County Community Hospital plans to utilize the grant to increase connectivity to the internet and to support distance education and/or provide telemedicine services for direct patient care.

Equipment installation is scheduled to begin within sixty days.

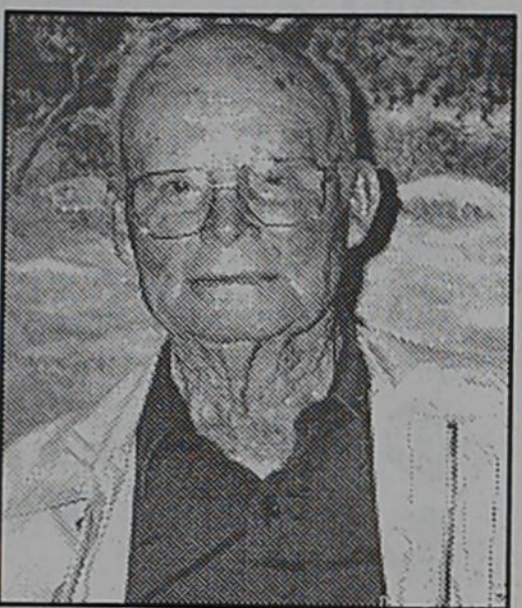
## Roy Miller Celebrates 95th Birthday Oct. 7

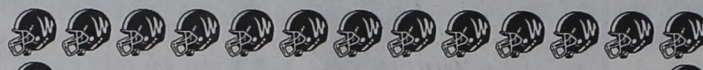
