We are told that the British fleet is deficient in battleship, in cruisers, n submarines, in everything that makes an admiral's life worth living, and that the Mediterranean show caused the empire as a unit to quake in its shoes because of the fleet's

Now it happens that there are two prominent Englishnen, amply informed on naval matters, who don't agree with this diagnosis. They are Lord Stabolgi, formerly Lord ment, and the Right Honorable Albert V. Alexander, for- 0. er First Lord of the Admiralty.


These men say bluntly that England's navy is still the strongest on earth. They point out that England has the wo most modern battleships afloat in the Rodney and Nelson; that her Hood is the mightiest warship in the world; that the British navy is the only one which posseses battle cruisers, having three of these craft; and that vhen ships now under construction are finished, Britain vill have 17 more cruisers than any other power on earth.

That is not a picture of a navy that is rotting away in he midst of heavily-armed enemies. It is rather a picture of the world's greatest sea power taking care that it renain the world's greatest sea power.

Well, this naval conference is coming; and if the way can be paved properly, Americans will pat the mother ountry tenderly on the back and tell her for heaven's ake to go build a few warships before her fleet falls apart in her.
