



#### Texas Gets Social Security Grant for Month September

SAN ANTONIO—The Social Security Board has authorized certification to the Secretary of the Treasury the amount of \$907,200 for a grant to Texas covering the month of September for old-age assistance, according to telegraphc advice received by Oscar M.

Powell, Regional Director.
On May 21, the Social Security Board announced the authorization of a \$1,181,250 grant to Texas, thus this state to date has received a total of \$2,088,450 covering the first quarter of the fiscal year 1937. These grants include \$1, 989,000 which will pay half of any amount, not in excess of a Federal-State total of \$30 a month to an individual, which Texas grants to needy persons 65 years of age or over who are not inmates of a public institution. The total amount also includes an additional 5 per cent, or \$99,450, which Texas may use toward ad-





Those on relief number more than the population of any state except New York and Pennsylvania.

If any error has been made in this chart, it has been on the side of conservatism. The number of civil employees was contained in the monthly reports of the Civil Service Commission. Army and Navy figures were obtained from the headquarters of those two arms. The legislative and judiciary establishments' figures were from the monthly Labor Review of the Department of Labor. WPA project workers were from the latest report of that organization. Relief figures were from the latest report of FERA. State and local government employees are from the report of the Commission on Inquiry on Public Service Personnel for 1935, but this report refers to the number of employees in 1932 and hence is, as of




