Justice Takes a Holiday

Hitler discovered early in his regime that the courts could be turned into an effective instrument of totalitarianism. World opinion cast an aura of sanctity around the courtroom. There was a general feeing that Justice was an absolute and that anything that happened in a court of law necessarily had the blessing of the blind goddess with the scales in her hand.

Hitler took advantage of this popular feeling. A dictator could, if he wished, plunder, persecute and murder without any higher authority than his own decree. But even dictators must acknowledge the weight of world

In enlisting the formality of courtroom procedure, the Nazi leader started something.

The Reichstag fire trial was probably the first instance in which Der Fuehrer used his new weapon.

All the trappings were there—the judges, the lawyers, h aniformed attendants, the routine procedure. Only the public was locked out. The public and the goddess of jusice. Yet, when it was all over and the victims had been beheaded or put safely out of the way, it didn't look quite so much like outright persecution and murder. Instead here were "convictions" and "executions" and "senences," and that didn't sound nearly so bad.

Sr Hitler just kept on, and Russia got the idea. Several housand people who didn't see eye to eye with Stalinist olicy were "sentenced" to death. Not murdered, mind ou. There were "trials" and that took the sting off the ofcial massacre.

When France's share of the war was over, the Vichy government decided something had to be done to cleanse e soul of France. So the former leaders of what was once a great republic were brought to trial and charged with

Next in the chain of trials may be that of Mme. Magda apescu, the unpopular friend of former King Carol of umania. There is some talk among the Nazi Iron Guards of asking Spain and Portugal to extradite Mme. Lupcu and Ernest Urdareanu, former Rumanian minister

To the dwindling democratic world, where justice still eans something more than a dress rehearsal for murder, overnmental trials in continental Europe no longer mean a lything. Americas have long since ceased to be deluded.





Town Gets All of Its Taxes Yearly

TORRINGTON, Conn. - This industrial city of 27,000 popu'ation never has to worry about its

It has what is believed the country's only 100 per cent collection system.

Each year when the taxes are due the city treasurer receives a check from James E. Mallette for all assessments. This year it will receive \$1,149,953.40.

All the finance board needs to do is meet annually to correct the grand list and set the tax rate.

Mallette is an unusual collector. He guarantees the city will get its money, and he has made good since 1931 when the system was inaugurated.

Here's how it works: The idea was conceived by a

local banker, John N. Brooks. The 1931 legislature passed a special law allowing it to be operated only in Torrington.

The law provides every four years the city ask for bids for the office of tax collector, the appointee to furnish a \$75,000 fidelity bond, a \$60,000 surety bond and \$40,000 bond covering other possible delinquencies.

The collector guarantees the minute talk with my cousin alone city all taxes due, and in return receives a fee of nine-tenths of one per cent of the collections.

Mallette was the first person to qualify and may be tax collector as long as he desires.

The plan stipulates there will be no delinquent, or non-collectable taxes, reported to the city. When a tax is delinquent, Mallette pays the city the amount and

BENEFIEL contacted Pacific Coast Conference officials—"Alabama," they cried. "Why, the militia will stop it!"

But Alabama was the best they could do, and Alabama went west to upset mighty Washington, 20-19. Since that eventful afternoon, eight of the Pacific Coast Conference's Rose Bowl opponents have come out of the south, and another has come out of the southwest.

The Western and Pacific Coast Conference are getting heads together. I hope they maintain their standard, and continue to be dumb to make a deal.
