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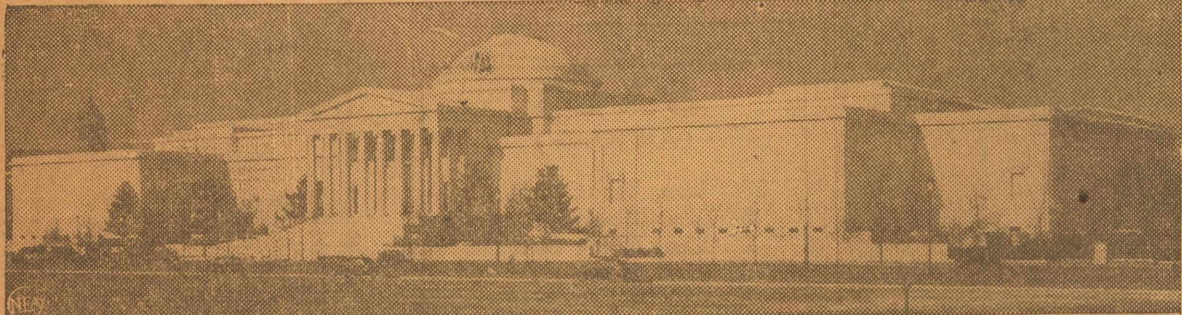

MANY KILLED AS JAPANESE TRAIN BOMBED

SHANGHAI, China, Nov. 29.—At least 150 persons were killed or injured today when a train bearing prominent Japanese and Chinese diplomats to Nanjing for recognition of the Wang Ching Wei regime, was dynamited by Chinese guerrillas.

Reports concerning the wreck were meager, because of strict censorship, and no report was received as to how many of the Japanese officials, nor their rank and importance, was allowed to be sent out immediately.

The reports stated that as the train neared the Nanjing railway station it struck a dynamite bomb, apparently placed by the Chinese to wreck the train.

Estimates as to the number of killed or injured were mostly guesses because of the censorship restrictions imposed immediately after the explosion.

Ranger Youth Ends Second Season As A College Gridster

ABILENE, Nov. 29.—Charles Whitefield, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Whitefield of Ranger, concluded his second season on the Abilene Christian college football team last week-end when the Wildcats defeated McMurry college 6 to 0 to gain a third-share in the Texas conference title.

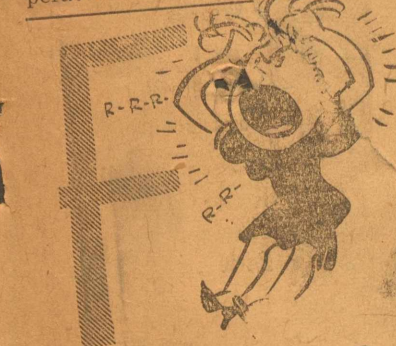
Letterman on the squad will be named in about three weeks. Twelve of the squad of 30 will be graduated this Spring, but ACC is expected to have another strong team next fall.

Conservation District Voting Places are Listed

The election to determine whether the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District shall be formed will be held on Saturday, December 14, 1940.

The district includes parts of Comanche and Erath Counties and all of Eastland County except that part lying East of the Jake Hammond Railroad and that part of Eastland County lying north of the Base Line Road and west of the Canyon Road. These roads run west and north respectively from the city limits of Cisco.

All persons holding legal or equitable title (including wives of landowners) to land lying within the proposed district, who live within the district, and are otherwise qualified voters under the Texas Election Laws are eligible to vote.

Voters must cast their ballots at the designated box for the school district where they live.

Housing Project Is On Glacial Bed

CINCINNATI, O.—Engineers at the Winton Terrace low-rent housing project face a problem whose origin dates back thousands of years to the glacial period.

The housing project site was once the bottom of a glacial lake where fine particles of mud and sand settled into concave layers. Today rain which falls on comparatively high ground runs through underground layers of sand, then accumulates at the concave bottom, turning layers of clay into mud too soft to bear foundations.

Cincinnati's metropolitan housing authority, to meet this problem, recently approved a proposal whereby deep ditches, carrying regular sewer lines, will be filled with gravel or rock to carry away excess water before reaching the building foundations.

CORPUS CHRISTI NAVAL AIR BASE RISES SWIFTLY

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas.—The navy has come to the Texas coast, and Corpus Christi is on top of a mile-high boom that may double its population of 50,000. The expansion was set off by a \$25,000,000 appropriation to build a naval air training base at Flour Bluff, 12 miles southeast of Corpus Christi.

Hotels and lodging houses are jammed, and laborers in search of work crowd their families into a single room to eat, sleep and cook, until they can find jobs or the high rents force them to move on.

Despite a recent building program by the board of education to take care of normal growth for the next 10 years, schools are so crowded that classes have been broken up into half-day shifts to take care of all students.

Twice as many workers have registered with the local office of the state employment service as have been placed on construction jobs.

No completion date has been set for the naval base, although has been indicated that it will be ready for the first cadet fliers in February. The first class will be graduated in July.

When the base is completed, 2,500 student fliers will be in training at all times, with a monthly graduating class of 300. Approximately 15,000 students, officers and civilian employes will be stationed at the base.

The Federal Housing Authority is rushing construction of a 250-unit housing project near the city limits of Corpus Christi for the training base's civilian employes.

In addition to the navy air school, the Canadian government has looked over prospective sites for winter training bases at Ingleside Cove, on the north shore of Corpus Christi Bay, Aransas Pass and Copano Bay, near Rockport, 30 miles northeast of Corpus Christi.

The U. S. air forces long have recognized the Texas coast as ideal for air training bases. The area from San Antonio to the coast has more cloudless days per year than any other region of the United States, government surveys showed.

Admiral Arthur J. Heyburn recommended that a naval base be built at Corpus Christi after inspecting the area with members of the senate military committee in early 1939.

No appropriation was forthcoming until war obliterated France, when Congress in its preparedness rush appropriated \$25,000,000 to the base. In early October an additional \$2,700,000 was appropriated for the construction of a channel to the air base at Flour Bluff.

The Texas-Mexican Railway has built a railroad at a cost of \$400,000 from its main line to the base. The city of Corpus Christi laid a water line from its municipal system at a cost of \$420,000, and the Houston Natural Gas Company extended lines from a nearby gas field into the base.

The drive from Corpus Christi to Flour Bluff over the highway takes only 20 minutes. A transportation company has assigned 25 new buses to the 12 mile stretch to carry workers to and from the project.

The government was reported considering a new military highway from Corpus Christi to the naval high school.

Docks will be constructed at the base end of the new channel being dug from the main canal.

The main base is located on 2,000 acres of land, and three primary training bases will contain a square mile each, in addition to several auxiliary landing fields several miles from the main base. Land for the base was condemned by the government where necessary.

Eastland Man's Father Is Dead At Abilene Home

Funeral services for J. Soule McDaniel, 69, father of R. A. McDaniel of Eastland and prominent business man of Abilene, who died in Abilene Thursday afternoon, will be conducted from the St. Paul Methodist church in Abilene at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning by Dr. C. A. Long, pastor.

Apparently in good health McDaniel suffered a heart attack as he was leaving his place of business Wednesday afternoon. He was taken to a hospital where he died a few hours later.

As president of the Texas Coca-Cola Bottling company, which operates the Coca-Cola plant in Eastland, McDaniel had been prominent in Abilene and West Texas business, civic and church affairs for 20 years. He was a member of the Kiwanis, treasurer of the Texas State Bottler's association, and a director of the Taylor county Tuberculosis association, Abilene Chamber of Commerce and West Texas Fair association.

Reared in Fort Worth McDaniel entered the bottling business as a boy and was engaged in it 52 years. He went to Wichita Falls in 1916, sold his interest there in 1918, and went to Abilene two years later.

Besides the bottling firm he had many other interests including the Elm Cattle company, McDaniel Oil company and the Paducah Motor company.

His survivors include his wife, his son at Eastland, two daughters, Kathryn of Abilene, and Mrs. Clyde Barr of Leesville, S. C.; three brothers, E. R. McDaniel of Abilene; Sam McDaniel of Ardmore, Oklahoma; and M. W. McDaniel of Brownwood; a sister, Mrs. S. M. Jay of Abilene; a niece, May Belle McDaniel of Abilene; and four grandchildren.

The Eastland Coca-Cola plant will be closed Saturday morning.

Expanding Dairy Industry is Seen

AUSTIN, Texas.—An expanding Texas dairy industry, while retarding by fall cold weather, continued during October to turn out more products than in October, 1939, University of Texas Bureau of Business Research officials report.

Creamery butter production gained 13.8 per cent over October a year ago, ice cream manufacture 20 per cent. Cheese output remained about the same.

The seasonal slump from September brought declines ranging from 2.1 per cent in butter production to 21 per cent in ice cream production. Cheese manufacture declined 13.5 per cent. The state's total output of these three products in October was estimated at 3,288,000 pounds of butter, 1,162,000 pounds of cheese and 861,000 gallons of ice cream.

NAVAL VICTORIES ARE CLAIMED BY THREE OF BELLIGERENT NATIONS

U. S. Air Goal Is Speed, Accuracy

SUNNYVALE, Cal.—America's aviation program will be carried out with the aid of the most profound aeronautical research ever before attempted in any country, according to Dr. George W. Lewis, of Washington, director of aeronautical research of the National Advisory Committee on Aeronautics.

Here for the purpose of inspection, Dr. Lewis declared this work will be carried on at the old research laboratory that is in full operation already at Langley Field, Va., and the new \$10,000,000 plant that is now under construction here at Moffett Field.

"Three wind tunnels are under construction here," Dr. Lewis said, "and one of these will operate at a higher speed than any other one in the world. It is 16 feet in diameter and will be ready in two months."

Dr. Lewis declared that the war has demonstrated the two things which count most in aerial warfare are quality and speed as against quantity. These, he declared, would be the lines along which America's aerial armada will be built.

"The whole trend in airplane development is toward higher speeds," he said. "When the war started, pursuit planes had a speed of 330 miles an hour. Today, planes which cannot perform at speeds of 400 to 500 miles an hour are almost obsolete."

"Aeronautical research is of major importance in an emergency, England found that out in the World War. She had a B2C plane that did wonders in that day, and stopped her research work."

"Then along came Germany with the Fokker, which outperformed the English craft — and that one fact nearly cost England the war."

"The present fighting over London has demonstrated that quality in planes is more important than quantity. The superior performance of British planes is standing off the Germans.

"Speed, gun capacity and maneuverability, than, are as important as production. It is realized now that the warplane is just a vehicle for the mounting of guns. Our job will be to build a better plane to carry more guns."

Mrs. Nellie Couch Succumbs After Two-Year Illness

Mrs. Nellie Couch, 62, wife of Pat Couch of Eastland, died yesterday at the family home on East Sadosa street. She had been confined to her home for the past two years from the effects of a paralytic stroke.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Eastland Methodist church Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock by Rev. Lance Webb, pastor, and Elder A. F. Thurman, pastor of the Eastland Church of Christ. Interment will be in the Eastland cemetery.

Deceased was born Nellie Hatcher on Sept. 23, 1878, at Marshall, Arkansas. She was married to Pat Couch on August 26, 1917, and had resided in Eastland twenty years. She had been a member of the Methodist church since childhood.

Survivors, other than her husband, are three sisters, Mrs. E. L. Castleberry, Vernon, Texas; Mrs. J. S. Dyer, San Diego, Calif.; and Mrs. R. E. Plummer, Long Beach, California; and one brother, W. B. Hatcher, Maysville, Oklahoma. Also a number of nieces and nephews.

Livermore's Widow Left Suicide Note

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Jesse L. Livermore's widow tearfully studied Livermore's suicide note today, in which the one-time "Boy Plunger of Wall Street" declared himself to be a failure.

Italy rushed reinforcements to the Albanian front today as both Axis and Great Britain claimed important victories in sea and air fighting from the Mediterranean Sea to the Irish Coast.

While the Nazi bombers hammered out with the aid of the most profound aeronautical research ever before attempted in any country, according to Dr. George W. Lewis, of Washington, director of aeronautical research of the National Advisory Committee on Aeronautics.

Germany claimed a triumph in the warship skirmish in the English Channel, but London asserted the British Navy chased the Nazi ships to France. Both the British and Italians claimed successes in the Mediterranean Sea with naval bombers participating.

The Mediterranean engagement is of special importance because it spurred British agitation for a knock-out blow against Italy and may affect the Albanian war, where the Greeks claimed continued successes today. The Greeks reportedly are threatening the Fascist's main base at Elbasan.

According to reports reaching Yugoslavia's frontier, 11 more Italian transports landed fresh troops at Durazzo and rushed them to the front lines as the Fascists sought to block the Greek drive to the West from Pogradec and to cut off the Italian units falling back on Elbasan.

Frontier reports said the Italians are in danger of being caught between the Greek forces south-west of Argirokastron, which border reports said the Greeks took yesterday, but which Rome claimed was still held by the Italian defenders.

The British said the Italian dreadnaught strength was cut to two warships by the Taranto raid and by Wednesday's action off Sardinia. Italy said they had badly damaged a British battleship and one aircraft carrier and three cruisers were damaged.

Father of Jess Siebert Is Dead

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at Sadler, Texas, for J. A. Siebert, 90 year old father of Jess Siebert of Eastland, who died Tuesday after a week's illness of pneumonia. Jess Siebert went to Sadler upon information that his father was ill, arriving shortly before he passed away.

J. A. Siebert was a pioneer settler of the Sadler community, having resided there 65 years.

Sixteen children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Siebert, eleven girls and five boys, including two sets of twins, and all but two survive. The ten daughters surviving are Mrs. O. B. Parham of Austin, Mrs. Pitt Cowan of Littlefield, Mrs. Jim Barnes of Mexia, Mrs. William Gouder of Houston, Mrs. Charles Watson and Mrs. Charles G. Meek of Whitesboro, Mrs. S. C. Franklin and Mrs. C. L. Walker of Sadler. The sons are O. A. and Roy Siebert of Sadler, Jess Siebert of Eastland and Lee Siebert of Ashtown, Ark. Also surviving are a sister, Mrs. Emma Bradley, and a brother, Haunce Siebert, both in Illinois.

Roosevelt Not In Favor of Sales Tax

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—President Roosevelt said today he was opposed to any proposals to enact a sales tax to finance the new governmental expenditure for national defense.

It was expected that the president would confer, probably tonight, with the congressional tax committees, upon ways and means of raising taxes for the new defense measures being carried out.

The president also said that American aid for Greece had been agreed upon in principle, and that minor parts of the agreement were expected to be worked out soon.

Anti-United States Outbreak Trivial

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—The State Department today dismissed as trivial the anti-United States demonstrations before the American embassy in Mexico City last night.

'Kick Me!' Say American Exporters

The fellow who goes around on April Fools' Day with a sign pinned to his coat-tail reading "Kick Me!" is simply an innocent victim. When he finds out about it, he removes the sign.

We hope American exporters to Mexico and Central and South America will prove equally smart when they fully realize the extent to which they have been inviting the same kind of treatment—and providing a nice heavy shoe for the kicker, to boot.

Recent scanning of American trade in Mexico shows that American exporters are actually helping to pay the bill for Nazi penetration in that country.

Like this: An American firm wishing to sell in Mexico turns to a well-established firm as distributor. It does not realize it, but that firm is German, run perhaps by naturalized Germans maintaining that curious dual citizenship which is one of the current German contributions to honesty and candor. The more American goods sold by the German jobber, the more commissions he has to contribute to Nazi work in Mexico—and if he is remotely German, he contributes; the Gestapo or the consul see to that.

Further, advertising money spent in such countries by American firms is often doled out through German-controlled advertising firms or managers, who see to it that only papers favorable to the Axis receive the money, while papers devoted to freedom strive for lack of advertising.

Since this loop-hole in American export policy was revealed as applied to Mexico, it has cropped up in Bolivia and other countries, so it is fair to assume that it is general practice in the countries to the south.

There is no good reason why firms in those countries should not favor with their advertising such papers as are favorable to them, and no reason why they should not "kick back" to the Nazi organization profits made from the sale of Nazi goods.

But it goes against the grain to see commissions paid on the sale of American goods used by Nazi agents to undercut the increasing good-will toward the United States, and to see American advertising appropriations shunted by Nazi agents into Axis-favoring papers while papers devoted to democracy starve.

American business is not silly. As soon as it clearly sees the "Kick Me!" sign it has been wearing when it travels south, it is pretty sure to tear it off and see to it that if there is any kicking done it is wearing good stout shoes itself.

Livestock Shipped In October Shows A Small Increase

AUSTIN, Texas.—A slight gain in Texas livestock shipments was registered during October, when 12,367 carloads moved to interstate points and the Fort Worth stock yards—up 2 per cent over October, 1939.

These figures were compiled by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research through data furnished by more than 2,500 station agents representing every livestock shipping point in the state.

A 48.7 per cent gain in sheep shipments—1,625 cars—accounted for most of the increase over October a year ago, though the hog movement also increased from 683 to 730 cars.

Cattle shipments were down 3.9 per cent to 7,669 cars, calves down 1.1 per cent to 2,343 cars.

Despite the increase in the total shipments during October, movements for the first ten months of 1940 are still 10.8 per cent under those of the like period of 1939, the bureau pointed out. Sheep shipments alone showed a gain — 12 per cent, while cattle declined 16.5 per cent, calves 10.3 per cent and hogs 5 per cent.

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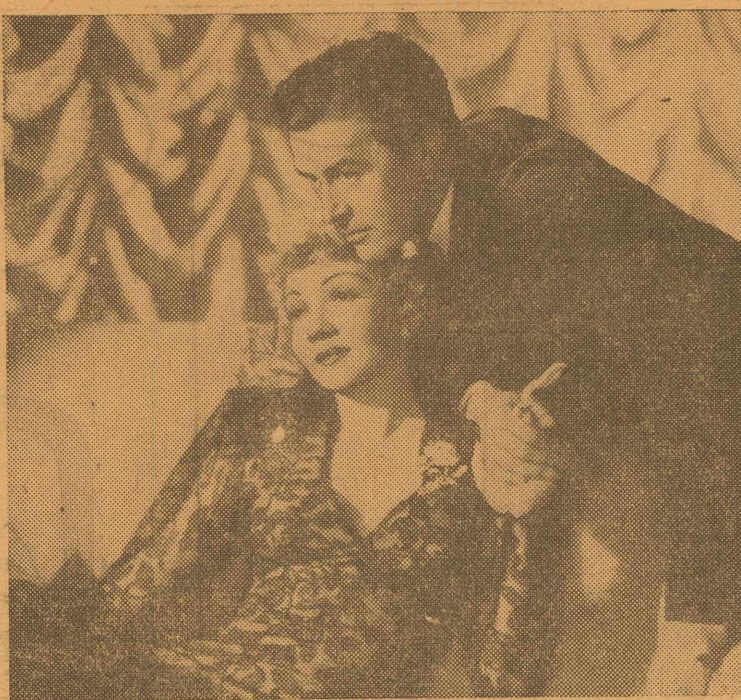
