## NAZIS CLAIM A SOVIET FORCE SURROUNDED IN THE CRIMEA AREA NOW

Ukraine today were reported to have cut off the Crimea area in a lightning drive by land, sea and air against stubborn defenses around the Black Sea.

The Germans directed one thrust against the Red Army lines east of Kiev and another into the South Ukraine to cut off the nartions from Bulgarian bases.

#### The 13 Become 363

When the American Revolution began, the colonies were terribly handicapped by the fact that the British commanded the sea. British troops could be brought to any place along the American coast without opposition, coastal cities could be assaulted, and American commerce ravaged at will.

Something had to be done about it. The first thing was an obvious step. Commercial vessels were bought and hurried attempts made to convert them into fighting ships. Privateers were commissioned. It was quickly and painfully clear that this was not enough against the highly professional English navy. So the Continental Congress approved the building of 13 frigates, the first-beginnings of a real American navy.

Those 13 ships will have become 363 by the end of the year. Already this year, 23 fighting ships have been placed in active service, including two huge new battleships, nine submarines, and 12 destroyers.

By the end of the year it now seems certain that the Navy will have in commission 363 fighting ships as compared to 322 on last Jan. 1; 18 battleships as compared to 15; six plane carriers as compared to six;38 cruisers as compared to 37; 179 destroyers as compared to 159 and 122 submarines to 105. Note that 20 new destroyers will have been added to the fleet this year in the place of the 50 sent to Britain in the deal for Western Hemisphere ases. No sensible person will deny that these 20 new destroyers, new, modern, and more powerful than the old, plus the new bases from which to operate them, constitute a gain in defensive strength over the 50 World War destroyers sent to Britain.

Two-Ocean naval protection is on the way and ahead of schedule. Is it any good, in view of the bomber? The best way to get a quick and easy answer to that question is to ask two others:

1. Where would England be today if she hadn't had throughout the war a dominant fleet? And,

2. What would Germany give today to have, in addition to her air power, a fleet capable of meeting that of the British on equal terms?






