# Appeal Is Argued On Purchasing Of Big Bend Land

AUSTIN, Oct. 25 .- In an appeal argued before the Third Court of Civil Appeals here today, State Rep. A. H. King of Throckmorton contended through attorneys that District Judge Roy Archer made nine errors when he refused an injunction to keep State Comptroller George H. Sheppard from paying state funds for land for Big Bend National Park on the Rio Grande.

King, a wealthy taxpayer at Throckmorton, filed the injunction suit to prevent expenditlre of \$1,-500,000 appropriated by the 47th legislature for land to add to the park. He had voted against the appropriation.

Pending decision of the appeal argued today, the State Parks Board is proceeding with negotiations for approximately 678,000 acres of land in Brewster county to add to the existing park.

The attack on the appropriation alleged many technical faults in addition to assertions that th legislature is without power to make such an appropriation, to create such a debt in view of a state general fund deficit of more than \$25,000,000 (now more than \$30,000,000) or to dispose of the state school land without reservation of mineral rights.

The act included provision for transfer of school land and payment to the permanent school fund of \$1 an acre for the land and 50 cents an acre for mineral From School Kids rights. The act permits purchase of land from individuals at not to exceed \$2 an acre.

Speaking in the House of Representatives, Congressman Clarence Lea of California, recently paid a fullyearned tribute to the railroad industry.

"It is a modernized transportation system that faces the carrier problems of 1941," he said. "It is unquestionably the best the world has produced.

"The railroads have gone through a long period of reduced earnings. They have maintained a credit for equipment beyond that available for other purposes. In nearly all cases railroad betterment has been given first place over dividends and other desirable expenditures. They have frequently spent money not earned in order to keep up their equipment.

""Twenty-one years have witnessed many changes in railroad management that have improved efficiency, economy and service. Scarcely any of these changes were spectacular. They came as a result of hard-headed experience urged on by the necessities of their time. In the aggregate, the practical accomplishments growing out of these improvements represent a marvelous record. These things have been done with little fanfare and accomplished without any decoration of heroes."







## Steel Industry Of Britain Undergoing A Major Change

LONDON—Supplies of shells a new type shatter-proof, fire-and munitions now being ade- proof and "sound proof" glassquate for the time being, British steel mills are turning full attention to the manufacture of heavy armored plate for ships, plane and tanks. This swing in manufacturing technique is causing a ma jor industrial revolution in Brit ain's steel centers, but so far the shift has gone without hitch.

Under a new system of gov ernment priorities adopted by the ninistry of labor, this change is being made to conserve man power at the steel plants. Cast products are manufactured on a smaller scale. Armour plate production has quadrupled since the start of the war.
