

All last summer and right on up until the November election, we wrote a column for another newspaper in Texas. We weren't employed by this other newspaperjust wrote a column for it—and one day we happened to say something about Dwight Eisenhower not being as lilly white and perfect in all things as some of the high priced advertising agencies conducting his campaign made him out to be, and we were promptly fired as a columnist.

We had recalled that on October 12, Eisenhower had made a nationwide television address in which he wide television address in which told the people of America that everything in the Middle East was just lovely, simply grand, that if things could possibly be any better over there he didn't know how it could be, and there just never everybody to know it.

And now it was in the last days of October and Ike was on the TV screen again trying to cover up his wool-pulling job at a time when Egypt had Suez blocked tighter than a drum and four big nations, Egypt, Israel, Britain and France were all shooting it out toe to toe, and the whole Middle East was ablaze with war.

Ike was so desperate he even tried to take credit for the successful revolt of the Hungarians that threw off the yoke of communism, but the Russians jerked that rug out from under him marched into Hungary and started shooting down men, women and children like rats in a barrel and dared anybody to stop

that the big advertising agencies had again foisted Ike off on the public like a box of Carter's Little Liver Pills which the FCC had jus proven to be fakes after all these years, and that's when our caree as a columnist came to a screech ing halt, because one of the big advertisers liked Ike.

At any rate, our opinion about Ike hasn't changed a bit and we think this latest fiasco of his belooking into before they start passing out those very large and very

Ike's speech had been advertised in advance as a "new policy," a "remarkable doctrine," and a "bold new program," but all he said was this: "Look, fellows, we don't have any Middle East policy, never did have one, don't have one now, and wouldn't know what one looked like if it hit us in the face, but give us a lot of money and a lot of force and the authority to use it and maybe we will think of something."



Chicken Pox Warning

Dr. A. W. Brazda, city health officer, issued a warning today that chicken pox was on the increase in Ranger schools, and called attention of parents to the fact that children having had chicken pox need to be kept out of school and from contacting others for at least 14 days from date of the onset of the disease.

Dr. Brazda quoted Rule 15 of the Special Quarantine Regulations ssued by the State Department of Health which says:

"Persons suffering from measles, whooping cough, mumps, German measles and chicken pox shall be required to be barred from school for 14 days or more (at discreation of local health officer) from date of onset of disease, with such additional time as may be deemed necessary, and may be readmitted only on a certificate by him attesting to their recovery and non infectiousness.

the University Cancer Foundation.
The Cancer Foundation operates at the M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, a component unit of the University in the Texas Medical Center, Houston. The Cancer Foundation is dedicated generally to strengthening the hospital's educational and research

The gift from the Anderson Foundation, one of the hospital's principal benefactors, was announced at a University Board of Regents meeting held primarily to give initial consideration to recommendations for a Permanent University Fund investment policy which will become operative early

The Board will give full consideration to this policy at a Jan. 11-12 meeting. It has the task of outlining objectives, policies and procedures for a more diversified investment program authorized by a constitutional amendment approved in the Nov. 6 general elect-

Permanent Fund investment heretofore had been limited to government bonds. Under the recently - approved amendment, up to 50 per cent of the total fund (currently about \$267,000,000) may be invested in corporate bonds, corporate stocks and guaranteed real estate mortgage paper.
