prevent its spread. Parents are asked to cooperate by keeping their children out of all public places if they have been ill with chicken pox until the city health officer has issued a certificate attesting to their recovery and non-infectiousness, and teachers are asked to cooperate by not readmitting children to school until such certificate has been obtained. Parents are asked to cooperate further by keeping their children out of such places as Sunday school and picture shows where regulations are more difficult to enforce than in the public schools, until clearance has been given.


