Telling about the unproductivity of the country on account of the eternal drouth in that region of the world, he said we should embark upon a program of building huge dams and water conservation projects to be used for irrigation purposes along the Nile, the Jordan, the Tigris and the Euphrates a long range project that would cost Americans billions of dol-


