If any of you people miss seeing C. B. Pruet in his usual haunts around town these days, it is a pretty safe bet to say that he is off somewhere looking after the interests of Ranger in his capacity as president of the Chamber of Commerce.

In almost any city in America, any man who has gained a position of prominence in his community can expect sooner or later to be tagged as president of the Chamber of Commerce. The club is quite active in supporting the activities of the Youth Center, and helping to provide wholesome recreation for the town's Teen Ager during those after school hours when time hangs heavy on their hands.

Every mother in town who has a Teen-Ager is invited to join the Teen Town Mother's Club, and there is always an open invitation to all of them to visit Teen Town at any time. As long as youngsters have a place to go and spend their energies in supervised games and other recreational activities that they are interested in, there is little danger that they will be running around at night robbing Coke boxes and getting themselves shot. Every mother in town should consider it her duty to support the activities of Teen Town through cooperation with the Mothers Club.

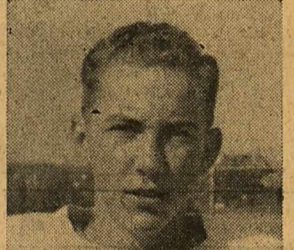
Incomplete Returns For Mothers' March Show \$520 Given

Rev. Ferguson New Pastor At Eastside Chapel

Rev. J. T. Ferguson of Monahans, who has accepted the pastorate of Eastside Baptist Chapel, will preach at both services Sunday, it is announced.

Rev. Ferguson is a graduate of Howard Payne College of Brownwood, and has served as pastor of the Southside Baptist Chapel at Monahans for the past two years. Prior to that time, he had served as pastor of the Eastside Baptist Chapel at Lubbock.

The Eastside Baptist Chapel of Ranger was opened in October 1954 by the First Baptist Church and has had a steady growth in membership and attendance in both the Sunday School and Training Union. Jackie Heath, former pastor, started with the Chapel and resigned on January 20 to enter Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Ft. Worth.

C. S. Goodman is Sunday School Superintendent and Millard Herweck is Training Union Director. Joe Harper is Treasurer. The Chapel has over 100 members and as many enrolled in Sunday School as there are members.

Baptists living in Ranger who are not affiliated with any church are invited to visit the Chapel services and a cordial invitation is extended to visitors and those who have no church home in the city. There is a fine Christian spirit prevailing in all services.

The lovely auditorium seats 108 and chairs can be added to increase the seating capacity by several score. The new Educational Building is nearing completion and will have 12 class rooms with folding doors between many of the rooms. There will be a large assembly room at the north end of the building some 20 by 25 feet. Kitchen and rest room facilities will also be in the new building.

520 Poll Taxes Sold In Ranger

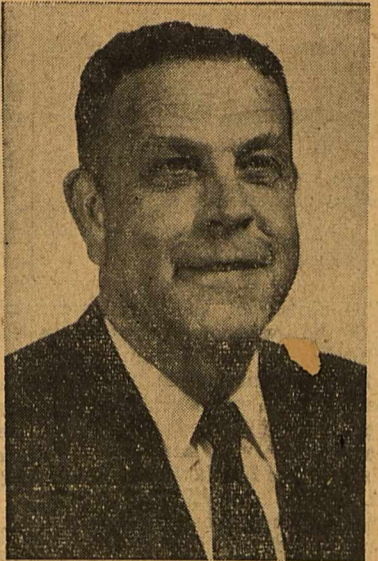

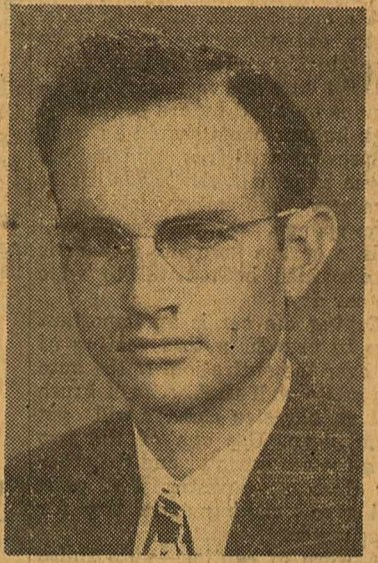

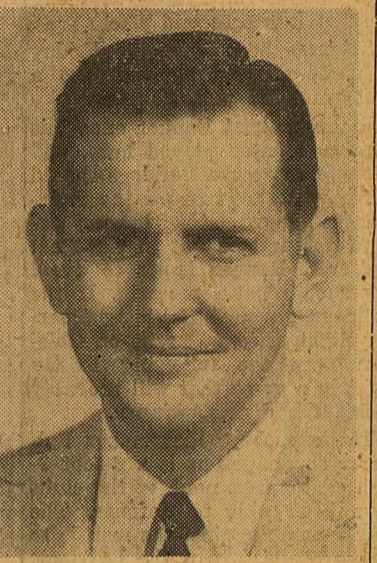

Howard Payne Will Start Senior Courses At RJC Wednesday

Arrangements have been made with Howard Payne College to offer two advance courses at Ranger Junior College that will count on Junior and Senior Class work, as well as on graduate work, according to Dr. Price Ashton, president.

The two courses will be Municipal Government and Education, and registration will begin at 6:30 Wednesday evening in the main

office at the college, under supervision of Dr. Joe Rushing of Howard Payne.

The class in Education will be held on Wednesday evening of each week, and the Municipal Government class will be held on Thursday evening of each week. Both are full 3-hour courses, according to Dr. Ashton. Tuition for Junior and Seniors is \$30 for the course, and for graduate students it is \$36.

By taking the two courses, veterans can get credit for half-time in the matter of expenses. Veterans with one child can take the two courses and be allowed \$80 a month. Married veterans with no children can draw \$67.50 a month, and single veterans can draw \$55 a month, Dr. Ashton said.

In offering these two advance courses, Ranger Junior College is making it possible for those wishing to further their education to do so at the least possible expense while staying close to home, and at the same time receive full credit for senior college work.

Born In February?

You Share Amethyst Birthstone With Charles Darwin, Charles Lindbergh, Clark Gable

February's birthstone, the amethyst—symbol of sincerity—is said to have been the favorite stone of St. Valentine. He wore one engraved with a Cupid, popularizing it as a stone for lovers and making it particularly appropriate in modern times as a St. Valentine's Day expression of sentiment.

Entitled to wear the amethyst, birthstone for February, are Charles Lindbergh, American pioneer in aviation, and Charles Darwin, scientist and naturalist. Also on the February list are inventor Thomas Alva Edison and the author of the 17th Century diarist, Samuel Pepys, along with well-known contemporaries in theatrical arts: Clark Gable, Katherine Cornell and Lana Turner.

Worn by the Crusaders as symbols of inner serenity, amethysts, according to legends compiled by the Jewelry Industry Council, were long left to be ample safeguards against unrest. They still are traditional in bishops' rings and appear in the English Coronation Service and in the coronet of the Prince of Wales. They are mined in Uruguay, Brazil, Ceylon, the Urals and Madagascar.

Sets Important Meeting Tuesday All Committees

Chamber of Commerce President C. B. Pruet has announced the appointment of a brand new committee for the chamber, to be known as the Industrial Research Committee.

Named as members are Dr. Price Ashton, G. B. Rush, Archie Robinson, Charles Bomar and Ronald Pruet.

President Pruet said his idea for forming the new committee was suggested at a meeting of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce where it was recommended that all cities have such a group to meet and talk with representatives of new industries who may have need of specific and expert information in a wide variety of fields, and which a research committee could provide.

He said all members of the committee had been selected for their knowledge in certain fields, and that all of them were holders of university degrees. Dr. Ashton, president of Ranger Junior College, holds a Bachelor of Science degree, a Master of Arts Degree and a PhD in Business and Law.

Superintendent G. B. Rush of the Ranger Public Schools, holds a Bachelors Degree in science, and a Master of Arts; Archie Robinson of the Lone Star Producing Company holds a Bachelor of Science degree; Charles Bomar, general manager of Featherlight Corp., holds a degree in Industrial Engineering, and Ronald Pruet holds a degree in Bachelor of Science in Petroleum Engineering, and is also a registered petroleum engineer.

Pruet said he felt that a committee made up of a group of men with such specialized knowledge could very well supply the answers to most any question that prospective builders of industry might wish to ask.

Pruet has also called a meeting of all the new Chamber of Commerce committees for 1957 to meet in Ranger Junior College Cafeteria Tuesday evening at 7:30 for an important discussion upon which the entire year's work might hinge.

All committee chairmen of the 15 or more committees are being held responsible for getting their committee members out to the meeting Tuesday night, and it is expected that attendance will be 100 per cent unless prevented by something unavoidable.

Coffee and cookies will be served, and a well outlined program of discussion has been planned.

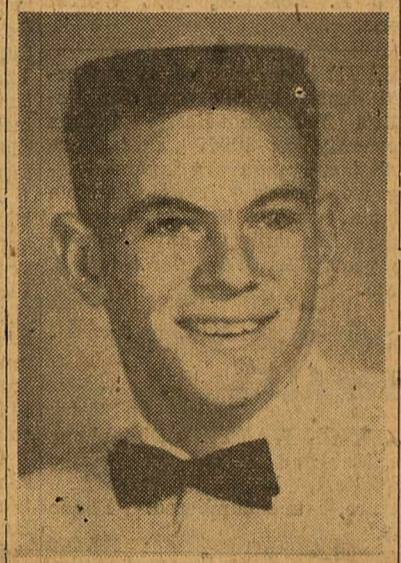

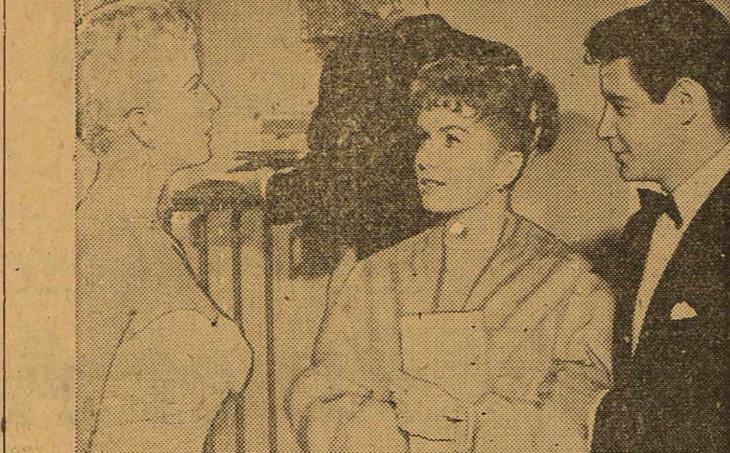

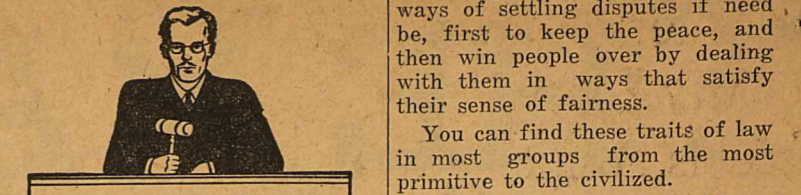

Superintendents For Stock Show Revealed

Superintendents of the various divisions for the annual County Livestock Show to be held at the airport northeast of Eastland, March 29 and 30 have been named according to C. M. McCain, Eastland rancher and general superintendent of the show.

Frequent Wash Important To Finish of Car

The finish on the family car should be washed as often in winter as in the summer, according to automobile manufacturers. They say street-salt and other chemicals used to melt ice on streets are very harmful to the car's lustrous finish.

A weekly washing is recommended to remove these harmful chemicals from the paint and chrome trim. Bumpers and hubcaps should be cleaned as thoroughly as the finish.
If a once-a-week car wash looks pretty expensive, the job can be done quickly and easily at home. Make sure the necessary equipment is on hand before beginning. High hubber boots should be worn to prevent wet feet, and rubber gloves to protect the hands. Other necessary equipment includes a large sponge, two galvanized steel pails, a garden hose and a chamois or discarded bath towel to wipe the car dry.

Drying the car is an important step to prevent a thin coating of ice over the entire job. If the auto has white wall tires, a steel brush and an abrasive cleaner will get them clean. Use one of the two pails for soapy water and the other for clean rinse water. Two pails will save making extra trip for rinse water.
A word of caution—auto finish specialists recommend the use of lukewarm or cool water when washing the car in cold weather. Hot water on a cold car may take the life out of the car's paint, leaving it dull and lustreless.

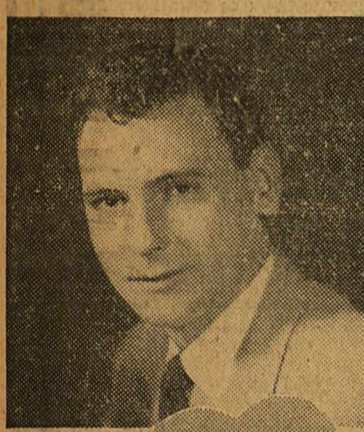
