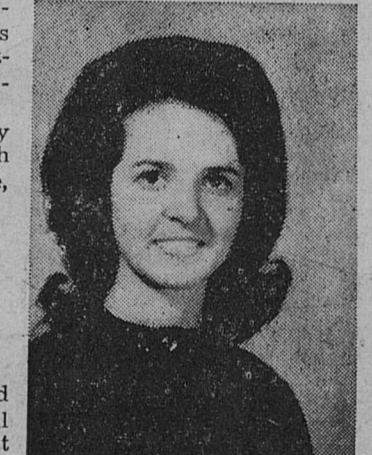
JAYCEES START WORK DOWNTOWN PROJECT

Mrs. Nancy B. Bethany of Ranger has been appointed a registrar for the Eastland-Stephens county draft board in the Ranger area.

Young men who reach the age of 18 can register in Ranger by calling on Mrs. Bethany at the Chamber of Commerce, 212 W. Main, from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., Monday through Friday.

A registrar is maintained in this area so that men will not have to travel to the draft board at Eastland.

Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state director of the draft system, expressed public appreciation of the services of Mrs. Bethany.

"People of the Ranger area should appreciate the service she renders to them," Colonel Schwartz said, "as she is doing the work without pay as a public service to her country."

All males are required to register under the draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter. Maximum penalties that can be applied for failure to register are \$10,000 fine, or five years in prison, or both.

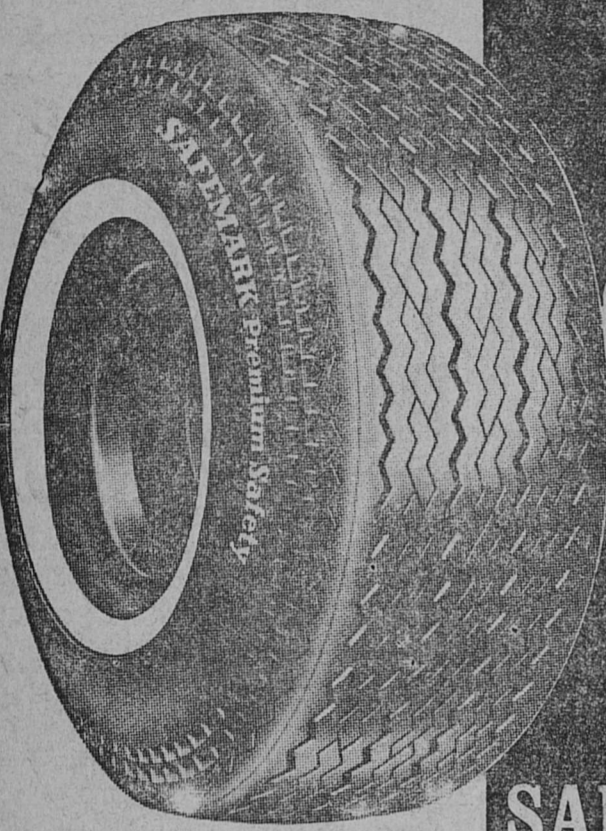

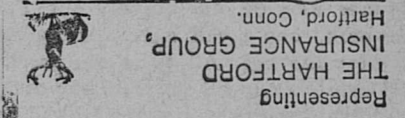

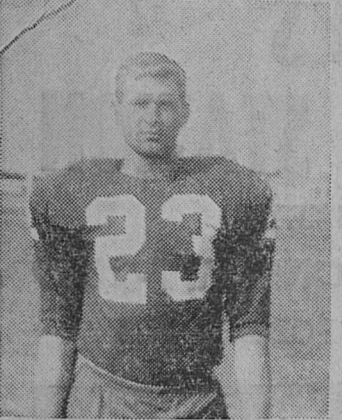

Special Memorial Services will be held at Bullock community on Sunday, Nov. 14, in observance of Veterans Day, Nov. 11.

National Commander Herbert M. Houston of the Veterans of World War I states that "men and women not only fail to stand at salute as our National Flag passes down the street during parades, which would signify to our foreign guests who might be present that we do not care, and when such events are telecast, are evidence to the enemies of our country that our citizens do not show proper respect to the Flag of our Country. When at assemblies, sports events, etc., when the National Anthem is played, even though they stand while it is sung or played, many do not stand at attention. They visit among themselves, paying little or no attention, when they should be standing with their hand over their heart, or at salute, quiet and attentive."

Houston further stated that "The recent movement of draft evasions, draft card destruction, protests against our National Policy against Communism are the products of a lack of national patriotic concern."

"We call upon the combined news media, TV, radio, newspapers, and magazines to point out these breaches of proper respect for the National Anthem and the Flag of our Country to the American public," Commander Houston said. "Our young men are fighting for us to protect and preserve this land of ours. We owe a debt of respect to them, and to ourselves, to show the world our belief in the respect of America."

Houston stated further that "We call upon all veteran organizations, thru their periodicals and otherwise, to join with us, and use our combined influence in combating this spirit of lethargy and lack of proper respect for our Country now so prevalent."

The Veterans of World War I of the U.S.A., Inc. is the third largest veterans' organization in the country. It was chartered by the United States Congress on July 18, 1958.

## County Draft Board May Call Young Childless Married Men

Young childless married men of Eastland and Stephens counties will not be overlooked when Selective Service Board 36 calls 31 men for pre-induction physical examinations Nov. 17, according to Mrs. Jewell Reeves, clerk.

Childless married men who pass the examinations will be eligible for December's draft, regardless of date of

state draft director, Colonel Schwartz has said that childless married men will not be called until exhaustion of sources of eligible single men 19 through 25 years old.

Married men with children or an expected child will be exempt from the draft, provided the draft board is notified. "Otherwise, said Col. Schwartz, "a young husband and father may find himself

selected." He said an unborn child must be certified by a physician.

Draft Board No. 36, which serves both Eastland and Stephens counties, will forward six men for induction to help fill November's state quota of 1,456. Texas' December quota is 1,714, a part of the national call for 45,224 men, 40,200 for the Army and 5,024 for the Marine Corps.

Childless married men may be called for examinations in December as well as November.

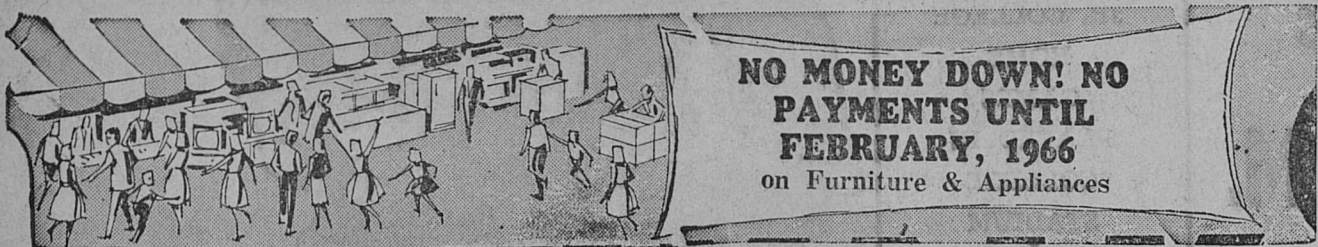


