IN RESPONSE to many requests, Mrs. Earl Horton submits this recipe for publication:

### CARROT CAKE

2 c. granulated sugar; 1 1/2 c. Wesson or Corn oil; 4 unbeatens eggs; 2 c. flour; 2 tsps. each of soda, baking powder, and cinnamon; 1/2 tsp. salt; 3 c. shredded raw carrots; 1 c. finely chopped pecans.

Combine sugar and oil, add eggs, beat two minutes. Measure sifted flour and sift with other dry ingredients. Add to mixture, fold in vanilla, carrots, and pecans. Bake in three layers at 350 degrees. When cool, put together with cream filling.

### Cream Filling

In a large bowl, combine 1 8-oz. pkg. Philadelphia cream cheese, 1/2 stick softened oleo or butter, add 1 1/2 tsps. vanilla, and gradually blend in one 1 (Continued on Page 2)

Mr. Stewart, who had been making his home at 306 Plummer St. in Eastland since 1959, passed away in Eastland Memorial Hospital Wednesday morning at 2:07 o'clock following a lengthy illness.

He was born Oct. 24, 1893, in Travis County. A veteran of World War I, he was engaged in ranching most of his life and was a member of the Christadelphian Church, Lampasas.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Elsie Brashears of Eastland and several nieces and nephews.

## 4-Day Storage Deer Totals 149

Among the first deer bagged on the opening day of the season in this area were a pair of bucks shot by Houston Smith and Bess Smith of Abernathy.

These two were the first kills placed in storage at the Ranger Frozen Food Center, according to records kept there for the Texas Wildlife & Parks Commission.

A total of 81 deer were put in coolers at the Ranger plant Saturday—first day of the 1965 hunting season. Sunday's carcasses numbered 40, a two-day total of 121.

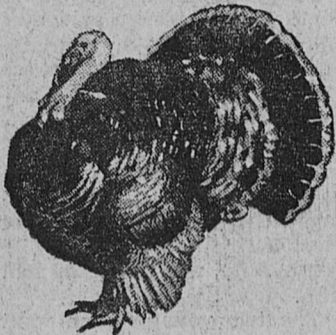
The Ranger Jaycee-Ettes will operate a concessions stand in the building dispensing soft drinks, candy, cup cakes, etc.

## Husband Is Fatally Shot Sunday; Mate Charged

Marital difficulties between a Ranger couple resulted in the death of the husband Sunday at 1:15 a.m. in Ranger General Hospital.

Forty-five minutes earlier—before he died—the husband, Melvin E. Harvick, 32-year-old machanic, had been fatally shot with a 22-caliber revolver at the couple's apartment at the Terry Place housing project.

Charged in the fatal shooting was Harvick's wife, Shirley Sue, 30, who remained in the Eastland County jail late Tuesday awaiting a hearing before the grand jury sometime Wednesday.

M. D. Underwood, Ranger justice of peace, ruled that "Harvick met his death from gunshot wounds from the hands of Shirley Sue Harvick." She was charged with "murder with malice" after making a statement in connection with the midnight shooting.

The Ranger justice of peace said Harvick was shot twice in the chest, once in the chin, and another bullet entered his side.

According to statements made to investigating officers, the couple, accompanied by her 12-year-old son by a previous marriage, and her mother, had attended a barbecue supper in Ranger earlier Saturday night, then later went to a night club at Strawn.

There trouble occurred between the man and wife, heated words were passed, and he is alleged to have struck her while they were in the club.

They left to return to Ranger about midnight, and Mrs. Harvick said in a statement,

her husband threatened to "fix her good" when they got home.

She stated that when they arrived at Terry Place Apartments she was the first to enter the dwelling, rushed into the bedroom and got the 22-caliber pistol. A few moments later she was in the living room when Harvick entered and grabbed her. The first bullet ripped into his chin. As he continued to struggle with her two more bullets were fired, one into his left, the other into his right chest. Then as Harvick fell to the floor, the last shot struck him in the side.

The couple had made their home in Ranger since last

May. He was employed by Southwest Machine & Engineering of Ranger.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Owens-Brumley funeral home chapel in Wichita Falls.

Mr. Harvick was born in Wichita Falls Sept. 16, 1933, and resided in Fort Worth for about a year, but spent most of his life in the city of his birth.

Survivors include the wife; his father, Melvin H. of Wichita Falls; his mother, Mrs. Conley A. Hill of Wichita Falls; and two daughters, Vicki Lynn and Georgia Gayle Harvick, both of Bossier City, La.

## 2 Murders, Burglaries Confront Grand Jury

Two murder charges and a series of burglary counts were to be investigated by a 91st District Court Grand Jury as it convened Wednesday morning.

Grand jurors will consider the two Ranger murders and the siege of Gorman burglaries. Man charged with the Gorman burglaries is presently serving time in Huntsville on a probation violation, it is reported.

Judge E. H. Griffin of Olney will preside in the absence of Judge J. Frank Sparks, who is recovering from surgery at his home in Eastland.

A jury commission was alive to have been convened Wednesday to select prospective jurors for the forthcoming term of court, it was reported.

## Beating Victim Dies In Dublin; Death Is Probed

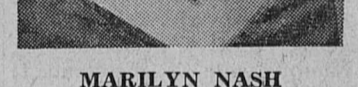

### SEEKING COMPETITIVE BIDS FOR NEW MINGUS POST OFFICE EDIFICE

The Post Office Dept. is seeking competitive bids for an improved building to house its postal operations at Mingus, according to an announcement Thursday by John R. Maddox, acting postmaster.
