

For wintering cattle and goats the fall produced forage in these rested pastures is more valuable in many respects than hay in the barn. The better native grasses cure out into palatable forage needing only a small amount of protein supplement to make a balanced diet. In addition to the cured out warm season grass, these pastures have ankle - deep Texas winter grass and winter annuals on many sites. Texas winter grass is well known for its ability to fatten livestock. On
